

## CONSTITUTION

OF THE

## Indiana High School Athletic Association

Revised December 23, 1910

ISSUED BY ORDER OF THE BOARD OF CONTROL

#### Administration.

Section 1. A Board of Control, composed of three members (principals, members of the faculty, or superintenden's sha'l be elected by the Association December 29, 1903, as follows: One for one year, one for two years and one for three years, the chairman each year to be the one whose term expires at the end of that year. Thereafter each member of the Board shall be elected for three years. This election to take place at the annual meeting of the Indiana State Teachers' Association. In case of vacancy, the remaining members of the Board may appoint a person to fill the vacancy until the next annual meeting of the Association.

Sec. 2. The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties: (a) It shall have general control over all athletic contests between secondary schools in this Association; (b) It shall have exclusive control of the annual Interscholastic Meet; (c) It shall give interpretations of the rules of the Association; (d) It shall determine forfeitures under Sec. 11; (e) The Board of Control at the end of any athletic season may, at its discretion, issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standing of teams. No school which has violated the rules of the Association in regard to the qualifications of players shall be awarded special honors in that particular branch of athletics.

Sec. 3. (a) When charges are made in writing by a member of the Association against another member for violation of rules of the Association, the Board of Control, after giving due notice of place and time for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges, and may suspend the offending school for a period of not exceeding one year. (b) The Board of Control shall decide on all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants in the Interscholastic Meet. (c) When any matter comes before the Board for decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the Board is a representative, the remaining members shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter.

Sec. 4. Membership in this Association shall be limited to public high schools of the State, and each school shall have one vote. The Annual dues shall be \$2.00, payable when the school becomes a member and thereafter by December 1 of each year in advance.

Academies with commissioned high school standing shall be eligible to membership in the Association and where-ever the word "high school" appears in this constitution, it shall be understood to apply equally to these academies.

Section 5. The principal of the school, or high school teachers authorized by him, shall be manager or managers of the teams representing the school.

Sec. 6. No games shall be played without the sanction of the principal.

Sec. 7. No game shall be played with high schools of this State not belonging to this Association.

This rule does not prevent a member of the Association from playing high school teams outside of the State nor from playing non-high school teams within the State except as follows:

It is a violation of the constitution for schools in the Association to play non-high school teams including high school boys, unless the latter are certified as eligible by the principal of the school to which they belong.

Sec. 8. Non-playing student officials or assistants shall conform to the same rules as the players.

Sec. 9. The principal or his authorized representative shall accompany his team to all contests.

Sec. 10. In football contests held under these rules, the length of each half shall be twenty-five minutes, unless changed by mutual consent.

Sec. 11. It is recommended that principals, in arranging for games, provide a forfeit of \$10, to be exacted should there be a failure on the part of either party to carry out the arrangements made. Should such forfeitures be stipulated and not be paid during the same season, the Board of Control, after hearing both sides, shall have authority to expel the delinquent school from the Association. Notification of such expulsion shall be published in the papers, with cause therefor.

Sec. 12. No retiring member of the Board of Control, having served three years, shall be eligible for re-election for a period of one year after date of retirement.

Section 13. At the annual meeting of 1906, a permanent secretary shall be elected, who shall have charge of the property and records of the Association; shall receive all money for dues and the sale of publications of the Association; shall issue all circulars authorized by the Board of Control; shall attend meetings of the Board when requested to do so by the Board; shall turn over to the treasurer of the Board all moneys in his possession when called upon to do so; shall perform such other duties as the growth and needs of the Association as determined by the Board may require; and shall receive as compensation the sum of \$50 annually, and such allowance for expenses as the Board may approve. Vacancies in the office may be declared by the Board for cause, and a successor appointed by the Board to act until the next annual meeting.

Sec. 14. Each school in the Association shall report to the Permanent Secretary a list of the pupils representing that school in athletic contests during the year. Each school is asked to report also the kind of treatment accorded them to, from and on the field, while the guests of another school.

Sec. 15. On and after the adoption of this amendment every newly elected member of the Board of Control shall assume the duties of his office on the first day of January, next following.

Sec. 16. The games recognized by the I. H. S. A. A. shall be: Football, Rugby Football, Soccer, Basketball, Track Work and Baseball. Further, all forms of inter-school athletic games shall be subject to the rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

#### RULES.

Rule 1. To represent a school in any interscholastic contest a person must be under twenty-one years of age; must have entered some public high school within the first twenty school days of the semester in which the contest occurs, and must be an amateur as defined by the A. A. C. U. Eighth grade pupils are not eligible. A semester is one-half of a school year.

Rule 2. Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current semester a passing grade in each of three or more studies requiring a minimum of fifteen regular high school recitations per week exclusive of rhetorical, physical culture, military drill, and deportment; in his last preceding semester in school he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire term.

Pupils enrolled for the first time must comply with the requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended.

Back work may be made up, providing that it be done in accordance with the regular rules of the school and becomes a matter of final record before the opening of the next semester.

Interpretation. In each of the studies representing the minimum requirement of work specified above: (a) for the current semester, the average of the monthly grades up to the time of certification must be passing; (b) for the current school month the average of the daily or weekly grades must be passing; (c) if the average of the monthly grades at the beginning of any month is below passing in any tsudy, the pupil is ineligible so far as that study is concerned for the entire month.

Rule 3. The eligibility of all the contestants shall be certified to by the principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statements shall be presented in writing within ten days before any contest. In case of disputes the principal must furnish to the Board of Control the following data in regard to each contestant: The date of last enrollment; the number of years he has been a member of a secondary school athletic team; date and place of birth; average mark in each study for the last preceding term in school; average mark in each study from the beginning of the current term or semester. A school which does not furnish this data shall be denied championship honors, and may be excluded from the annual Interscholastic Meet.

Rule 4. No pupil shall be allowed to take part in high school athletics for more than four school years or eight semesters nor shall be take part in any form of athletics for more than four seasons. Post graduates are not elible, but pupils graduating from regular three year courses shall not be deemed post graduates.

Time spent in athletic sport by pupils while in grades below the high school shall not be counted as part of the four years.

Rule 5. No person shall enter a contest under an assumed name.

Rule 6. The principal shall have power and is advised to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not represent his school in a becoming manner.

Rule 7. Any member of a high school athletic team, who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that season.

An exception is hereby made for basketball and basketball players in those towns and cities whose schools have no gymnasium and whose students are forced by necessity to use a Y. M. C. A. or some other gymnasium for their practice games. It is a well known fact that the use of such gymnasium by highschool students under such circumstances will likely require that such students play on the teams of the organizations maintaining such gymnasiums. No student, however, will be permitted to play on any other team than that representing the organization controlling the gymnasium, and no student will be allowed to play in the teams of the latter without the knowledge and consent of his principal.

Rule 8. The number of interscholastic football games played by any team in one season is limited to six.

Rule 9. Paid coaches, other than those regularly employed as teachers by the trustees of the school are prohibited. By paid coach is meant any person who receives directly or indirectly, renumeration of any kind, money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any high school athletic team.

Rule 10. The basketball rules as published in Spaulding's official basketball rule book, shall be the official rules governing all contests between members of the I. H. S. A. A. However, the rule governing the selection of officials in the above rules shall be void, and unless otherwise agreed by mutual consent, each school shall furnish one official and these officials shall alternate their duties each acting as referee and each acting as umpire one-half.

Rule 11. No person who has been enrolled as a student in an institution of college standing and has done work which may be counted toward a degree in that institution shall be eligible as a member of any athletic team under I. H. S. A. A. rules in any game with any other team, either within or without the State of Indiana.

Rule 12. On and after January 1, 1910, all the major officials in all athletic contests participated in by teams connected with schools in the I. H. S. A. A. shall be regularly licensed teachers in the public schools of Indiana, or shall be persons whose names have been furnished and approved by the Board of Control. It is recommended that these officials shall be disinterested, and it is required that when a school demands disinterested officials at the time of scheduling the game, such officials shall be furnished. The Board shall drop from its list of approved officials any person who is palpably unfair and biased in his decision in games.

Rule 13. The eligibility rules of this Association shall apply to students taking part in all contests whether with schools inside or outside the State of Indiana.

Rule 14. On and after Jan. 1, 1911 no student shall be eligible to play football unless he has been examined by a regular physician and his physical condition has been pronounced satisfactory. Further such student shall not be eligible till the physician's certificate has been filed with the Permanent Secretary of the Association. Said certificate shall be good from Sept. 1 to Dec. 1, only.

Rule 15. On and after Jan. 1, 1911, no studnet shall be eligible to play football without the written consent of his father, mother, or guardian. Said written consent shall be attested by the Principal or Faculty manager, and shall be filed with the Permanent Secretary of this Association. The copy of said written consent shall be attached to the physician's certificate when filed with the Permanent Secretary.

#### INTERPRETATIONS.

First, A game is any athletic contest where an admission fee is charged or where any collection or contribution is received from spectators.

Second. The football season is defined as beginning with the opening of school and closing with November 30.

Third. No student who violates the rules of the Association will be reinstated by the Board.

Fourth. When a member or members of any team are protested, the game should be played as scheduled and the protest filed with the Board for settlement later.

Fifth. By mutual consent of both teams, pupils over the age limit may be allowed to enter contests played under I. H. S. A. A. rules.

Sixth. Pupils under twenty-one at the time of registration in school shall be so regarded until the time of their next registration.

Seventh. A student is a post graduate of a school after he has completed the work required for graduation by that school irrespective of the time of granting the diploma.

Eighth. A pupil who has played in one or more interscholastic games in any season shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

#### NOTES.

- 1. Seven year books have been issued by the Board of Control. Copies of any of these handbooks may be had of the Permanent Secretary. Price ten cents each post paid.
- 2. Copies of the constitution may be had of the Permanent Secretary at the rate of fifty cents per hundred, post paid.
- 3. Printed blanks for reporting the data of all games will be sent by the Permanent Secretary on application. Reports on basket ball, baseball and track athletics should be in the hands of the Secretary by June 1; football reports are due December 1.
- 4. The annual dues are payable to the Permanent Secretary on or before December 1 of each year.
- 5. Any high school in Indiana may become a member of the Association by the payment of two dollars to the Permanent Secretary. (See Section 4.)

- 6. All correspondence and remittance from members of the Association to the Board of Control or the Permanent Secretary must be endorsed by the principal or a member of the faculty.
- 7. The term "amateur" is defined and fully explained on pages 80 and 160 of Spaulding's "Official Rules of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States," and on page 80 of Spaulding's Official Y. M. C. A. Athletic League Handbook."
- 8. Official blank forms will be issued by the Board which must be used in securing a physician's certificate and parents' consent to play football.
- 9. The Board of Control for 1911 is as follows: E. E. Ramsey, Bloomington, President; I. E. Neff, Richmond; A. L. Trester, Alexandria; J. T. Giles, Permanent Secretary, Marion.

## High School Athletics during 1910

The year just closing is the seventh year of the activities of the Indiana High School Athletic Association. There has been progress during the year, and there is every prospect that the Association will long continue its career of usefulness. This Asociation has a great work to do not only in regulating the athletic activities of the schools belonging to the Association but also in inculcating higher ideals in athletic procedure. The age of the "rough neck" in athletics and of the win-in-some-manner idea is rapidly passing away. There are yet a few schools, sad to say, that are willing to violate the spirit, if not the rules, of the Association in trying to turn out winning athletic teams. When winning in athletics becomes the main purpose of a school's existence it is about time to make a change in that school's management. Conditions generally are highly satisfactory, however.

The athletic activities of the past year have been football, basket ball, baseball and track and field events. There were fewer interschool games of football this past season than for many years. The drift in the public schools is, undoubtedly, away from inter-school foot ball games. There is an increasing sentiment that this game is for more mature athletes than those in our High Schools. Indiana gave more than its share of fatalities during this past year. One High School boy and one College freshman were killed. Besides, there were many injuries that were made note of in the public press. It is unquestionably true that the school man who invites his students to take part in this game is not doing the best thing for his school. If his boys insist on playing it is well for him to undertake to guide and direct their activities but, where there is not enough demand for football to maintain a team without the help of the faculty, it ought to be counted unprofessional for teachers to take a hand in the organization of teams.

There is no question but that additional legislation is needed by this Association in regard to regulating football. Many advocate the entire abandonment of this game as an interscholastic sport. Whether such a drastic step should be taken at this time or not, it is undoubtedly true that the rules ought to make such provisions that only the student best able to stand the game can enter it.

There has been a lot of loud newspaper talk about state championships this past year. All such talk is cheap. There are so many teams taking part in the various forms of athletic activities that it is impossible for any one team to play any but a very small per cent. of the rest of the teams. Unless a schedule could be provided so that any one team could meet all the rest in any branch of athletics, it is impossible to determine what team can be given real championship honors. How can any team play a small part of the teams in this state and proclaim itself the best team of all? The constant talk about champions is to be deplored.

The State High School Track Meet at Crawfordsville last May was a very successful affair. The Wabash College Athletic Association authorities took the greatest interest in the event and were responsible for the great success of the meet. The next State Meet will be held at Terre Haute at Rose Polytechnic Institute next May. Track activities are very commendable because they involve he activities of so many boys of various talents. It would be well for some of our schools to encourage this form of athletics rather than foot ball.

Athletic events of the past year that deserve mention were the games of Rugby played by the Richmond, Hartford City and Marion High Schools last December. There was plenty of activity in the games for all the boys, no one was hurt and there were interested crowds present to see this innovation in Indiana athletics. If this game were taken up, especially by boys who have not been trained in American football, it would, undoubtedly, enlist their enthusiastic support. The most of the boys who played at Richmond and Marion had played the other game and found some difficulty in adapting themselves to the new sport. These games were a distinct success. There is no reason why other schools should not play it.

One matter that needs attention in High School basket ball is the dimensions of the floors used for the games. It is undoubtedly true that it is very difficult in some towns to provide floors of the right size but, nevertheless, more of an effort ought to be made by some schools to provide the proper conditions for their games. No team ought to be asked to play in a room with the ceiling only eleven or twelve feet high or where the spectators can easily interfere with the game, or any other conditions not provided by the rules. It ought to be more of a matter of pride with some schools to get the proper conditions if they ask other teams to visit them.

Many schools ought to make more of an effort to get larger numbers of their students to take part in athletics of some form. If athletic training is a good thing, then all ought to have the benefit of such training. Further, each student should have what suits him best. This can be determined only by physical examinations.

Everything considered, the high school athletic situation in this state is very hopeful. The large number of clean, honest school men that have charge of the teams see to it that honesty and fair dealing are the rule every where. Boys can learn life lessons in playing games fairly. This Association can do its best work by insisting on "the square deal" in all athletic activities.

## Seventh Annual Track and Field Meet Announcement

The Seventh Annual Track and Field Meet of the Indiana High School Athletic Association will be held at Wabash College May 21, 1910, in the afternoon. Entries for the Meet will close May 11, and all schools desiring to participate in the Meet must become members of the Association before that time.

#### Eligibility.

Every contestant in this Meet must have previously made in a fair test a record equal to the following in every event in which he is entered.

100 Yard Dash	11 s
220 Yard Dash	26 s

The above, together with a mile relay, will constitute the events of the Meet. Winning first place in any event counts five points; second place, three points; and third place, one point. Points in the relay will not be counted in determining the winning team.

The order of Events is as follows:

Track Events—100 yards dash trial; 120 yards hurdle trial; 100 yards dash final; one mile run; 440 yards run; 120 yards hurdle final; 220 yards dash trial; 220 yards hurdle trial; 880 yards run; 220 yards dash final; 220 yards hurdle final; relay.

Field Events—Discus; running high jump; shot put; pole vault; running broad jump.

#### Recent Board Rulings.

- 1. The hammer throw shall hereafter be excluded from the events of the State Field Meet, and the Board recommends that it be excluded from local Meets.
- 2. In case of a tie in the high jump and pole vault the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.

#### Entries.

The entries in each event are limited to three, and the contestants in each to two, from any school, except in the relay race, where entries will be limited to six and the number placed in competition to four, each running one-fourth mile.

All schools, in order to enter the contests of the State Meet, will be required to certify that all athletic contests in which they have taken part since becoming members of the Association have been conducted in accordance with the rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association and that all their contestants in such contests have been qualified according to the rules.

Principals will be required to certify in writing that the contestants from their respective schools have all qualified in every event in which they are entered in the State Meet. Each principal must fill out entry blanks with the names of the contestants from his school, and all required data, and send to J. T. Giles, Permanent Secy., Marion, Ind., on or before May 11, 1910. This requirement must be strictly complied with. Special blanks for this purpose will be furnished to all members of the Association.

#### Protests.

All protests and complaints against members of the Association for violation of the rules must be made in writing and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before May 11. Protests as to the eligibility of individual contests under the constitution are to be decided by the Board of Control and may be filed with the Secretary at any time.

#### Management.

The management of this Meet rests solely with the Board of Control. The selection of officials to be approved by the Board, has been delegated to the athletic management of Wabash College. The referee and starter are to be chosen from A. A. U., in order that records made at the Meet may be recognized by that body. The Board will arrange a program, assigning place on the track by lot, and the printed program will indicate the order in which the men will be called upon the track. The rules governing the Meet correspond to those of the Western Inter-Collegiate Amateur Athletic Association except where these have been modified by the Board of Control. These rules, as adopted by the Board, are printed in the I. H. S. A. A. Hand Book of Athletics and Annual Report of the Board of Control. Copies may be had of the Permanent Secretary for 10 cents each, post paid.

#### Prizes.

No prizes will be awarded except a cup to the winning team, a pen-

nant to the winning relay team, and badges for point winners. Admission to all high school pupils 25 cts. Contestants and one rubber from each school admitted free.

#### Entertainment.

Wabash College will furnish free board and rooms to all contestants during the Meet.

#### Fees.

A fee of fifty cents for each contestant must accompany the entries. This fee will be returned to the Principal of the school for all entries who actually participate in the Meet.

### Report of the Meet

The Crawfordsville Journal gave the following story of the Meet:

Linton high school won the seventh annual track and field meet of the Indiana High School Athletic Association which was held last Saturday afternoon on Ingalls field. They scored fifteen points. The result of the meet was in doubt until the finish of the pole vault, which was the last event. Kokomo was leading the other contestants with a score of fourteen when the pole-vault was called. The entrants dropped out until Rogers, of M. T. H. S., Garner of Brownsburg and Brantley of Linton were fighting it out for places. All three vaulted 9 feet 10 inches and could go no higher. The points were divided and the three which went to Brantley, the Linton athlete, won the meet for his school.

Although the condition of both the track and the field was good, but one record was broken. This was in the high jump. Ellis, of Blufton, cleared the bar at 5 feet 9½ inches, breaking the former record of 5 feet 8½ inches which was held by Morrison of Shortridge. In jumping off a tie for third place Haseman of Linton tied the new record which had just been set, but his record will not stand, as he had missed a lower heighth.

Daggy, of Wolcott, tied the state record in the 440-yard dash. The record is 54 2-5 seconds, and is held by Sumner, a Bloomington athlete. He ran a pretty race keeping among the leaders until near the finish and then sprinting past them. The large number of entrants in this event was a handicap to all of the runners.

The 100-yard dash was one of the closest races on the program. Applegate and Chancellor, of Kokomo, got first and third place, and Phillippe, of Vincennes, took second. All three men were not more than two feet apart at the finish. The time was 3 seconds slower than the state record, which was made by Blair, of Hammond, at the meet which was held on Ingalls field four years ago. All three men who won places ran the distance in 10 1-5 seconds in the trials.

Marchal, of Gas City, who holds the state record of 2 minutes and 7 seconds in the half mile run, was again entered, but ran the race 1-5 of a second slower than his record. Newlin, the holder of the mile run record, was entered for M. T. H. S., but the best he could do was fourth place, although the time for the event was 11 1-5 seconds slower than his record. Oliphant, who won the race, took the lead near the start and was never far behind.

The time in many of the races was very slow. This was not due to the track, as it was in fine condition. The rains of the morning did not affect it and the hot sun in the afternoon soon made it perfectly dry.

Anderson won the relay race after a hard fight. Monticello was sec-

ond and M. T. H. S. third. The race was close until the last 100 yards. Only three teams were entered in the race.

Applegate, of Kokomo, was the best all around athlete. He scored thirteen of the fourteen points made by his team. He won firsts in the 100-yard dash and in the broad jump and second in the 440 yard dash.

The visitors expressed their appreciation of the treatment accorded them and pronounced the meet the best yet held by the Association.

The report given by the Indianapolis Star was as follows:

Linton won the seventh annual Indiana High School Athletic Association track meet which was held here this afternoon under the auspices of Wabash College. The meet was not decided until the last event was over. The pole vault was the last event, and when it began Kokomo was leading with fourteen points. Linton had only twelve points until the tie in the pole vault gave them three more points, one more than enough to get first place.

Ellis, of Bluffton, was the only athlete to break a state record. He cleared 5 feet 9½ inches in the high jump, thus breaking the former record of 5 feet 8½ inches, which was held by Morrison of Shortridge. Daggy, of Wolcott, tied the state record of 54 2-5 seconds in the 440-yard dash. He ran a pretty race. South Bend also made a good showing. They scored twelve points. Honor and Rowe, who represented this school in the 220-yard hurdles, won first and second in this event. The other point was made by Morrison in the mile run.

#### Record Holder Wins.

Marchal, of Gas City, who held the record in the 880-yard run, had no trouble in winning the event, although he did not come up to his former record. His time was 2:07 1-5, which is 1-5 of a second slower than his record.

Bissell, an M. T. H. S. runner, made a hard fight for third place and finally won out. Newlin, who tied the holder of the state record in the mile run, was again entered for M. T. H. S., but the best that he could do was fourth place, although the time in the event was 11 1-5 seconds slower than his record. Oliphant, of Linton, who won the race, was up among the leaders from the start and was never passed. Five runners fell on the first turn in this race. Fifteen men were entered and they became tangled while fighting for the inside track. No one was injured.

None of the entrants in the weight events was exceptional. Conwell, of Van Buren, won first in the discus hurl and second in the shot put, but he did not show unusual form. Seventeen of the thirty schools which were entered in the meet scored points.

## Constitution of the Indiana High School Athletic Association

Administration.

Section 1. A Board of Control, composed of three members (principals members of the faculty, or superintendent) shall be elected by the Association December 29, 1903, as follows: One for one year, one for two years and one for three years, the chairman each year to be the one whose term expires at the end of that year. Thereafter each member of the Board shall be elected for three years. This election to take place at the annual meeting of the Indiana State Teachers' Association. In case of vacancy, the remaining members of the Board may appoint a person to fill the vacancy until the next annual meeting of the Association.

Sec. 2. The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties: (a) It shall have general control over all athletic contests between secondary schools in this Association; (b) It shall have exclusive control of the annual Inerscholastic Meet; (c) It shall give interpretations of the rules of the Association; (d) It shall determine forfeitures under Sec. 11; (e) The Board of Control at the end of any athletic season may, at its discretion, issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standing of the teams. No school which has violated the rules of the Association in regard to the qualifications of players shall be awarded special honors in that particular branch of athletics.

Sec. 3. (a) When charges are made in writing by a member of the Association against another member for violation of the rules of the Association, the Board of Control, afer giving due notice of place and time for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges, and may suspend the offending school for a period of not exceeding one year. (b) The Board of Control shall decide on all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants in the Interscholastic Meet. (c) When any matter comes before the Board for decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the Board is a representative, the remaining members shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter.

Sec. 4. Membership in this Association shall be limited to public high schools of the State, and each school shall have one vote. The Annual dues shall be \$2.00, payable when the school becomes a member and thereafter by December 1 of each year in advance.

Academies with commissioned high school standing shall be eligible to membership in the Association and wherever the word "high school" appears in this constitution, it shall be understood to apply equally to these academies.

Section 5. The principal of the school, or high school teachers authorized by him, shall be manager or managers of the teams representing the school.

Sec. 6. No games shall be played without the sanction of the principal.

Sec. 7. No game shall be played with public schools of this State not belonging to this Association.

This rule does not prevent a member of the Association from playing high school teams outside of the State nor from playing non-high school teams within the State except as follows:

It is a violation of the constitution for schools in the Association to play non-high school teams including high school boys, unless the latter are certified as eligible by the principal of the school to which they belong.

Sec. 8. Non-playing student officials or assistants shall conform to the same rules as he players.

Sec. 9. The principal or his authorized representative shall accompany his team to all contests.

Sec. 10. In football contests held under these rules, the length of each half shall be twenty-five minutes, unless changed by mutual consent.

Sec. 11. It is recommended that principals, in arranging for games, provide a forfeit of \$10, to be exacted should there be a failure on the part of either party to carry out the arrangements made. Should such forfeitures be stipulated and not be paid during the same season, the Board of Control, after hearing both sides, shall have authority to expel the delinquent school from the Association. Notification of such expulsion shall be published in the papers, with the cause therefor.

Sec. 12. No retiring member of the Board of Control, having served three years, shall be eligible for re-election for a period of one year after date of retirement.

Sec. 13. Each school in the Association shall report to the Permanent Secretary a list of the pupils representing that school in athletic contests during the year. Each school is asked to report also the kind of treatment accorded them to, from and on the field, while the guests of another school.

Sec. 14. On and after the adoption of this amendment every newly elected member of the Board of Control shall assume the duties of his office on the first day of January, next following.

Sec. 15. The games recognized by the I. H. S. A. A. shall be: Football, Rugby Football, Soccer, Basketball, Track Work, and Baseball. Further, all forms of inter-school athletic games shall be subject to the rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

Rule 1. To represent a school in any interscholastic contest a person must be under twenty-one years of age; must have entered some public high school within the first twenty school days of the semester in which the contest occurs, and must be an amateur as defined by the A. A. U. Eighth grade pupils are not eligible. A semester is one-half of a school year.

Rule 2. Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current semester a passing grade in each of three or more studies requiring a minimum of fifteen regular high school recitations per week, exclusive of rhetorical, physical culture, military drill, and deportment; in his last preceding semester in school he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire term.

Pupils enrolled for the first time must comply with the requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended.

Back work may be made up, providing that it be done in accordance with the regular rules of the school and becomes a matter of final record before the opening of the next semester.

Interpretation. In each of the studies representing the minimum requirement of work specified above: (a) for the current semester, the average of the monthly grades up to the time of certification must be passing; (b) for the current school month, the average of the daily or weekly grades must be passing; (c) if the average of the monthly grades at the beginning of any month is below passing in any study, the pupil is ineligible so far as that study is concerned for the entire month.

Rule 3. The eligibility of all the contestants shall be certified to by the principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statements shall be presented in writing within ten days before any contest. In case of disputes the principal must furnish to the Board of Control the following data in regard to each contestant: The date of last enrollment; the number of years he has been a member of a secondary school athletic team; date and place of birth; average mark in each study for the last preceding term in school; average mark in each study from the beginning of the current term or semester. A school which does not furnish this data shall be denied championship honors, and may be excluded from he annual Interscholastic Meet.

Rule 4. No pupil shall be allowed the opportunity of taking part in high school athletics for more than four school years or eight semesters, nor shall he have the opportunity of taking part in any form of athletics for more than four seasons. Post graduates are not eligible, but pupils graduating from regular three year courses shall not be deemed post graduates.

Time spent in athletic sport by pupils while in grades below the high school shall not be counted as part of the four years.

Rule 5. No person shall enter a contest under an assumed name.

Rule 6. The principal shall have power and is advised to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not represent his school in a becoming manner.

Rule 7. Any member of a high school athletic team, who participates in an athletic contest is a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that season.

exception is hereby made for basketball and basketball players in those towns and cities whose schools have no gymnasium and whose students are forced by necessity to use a Y. M. C. A. or some other gymnasium for their practice It is a well known fact that the gymnasium by high school students under such circumstances will likely require that such students play on the teams of the organizations maintaining such gymnasiums. No student, however, will be permitted to play on any other team than that representing the organization controlling the gymnasium, and no student will be allowed to play in the teams of the latter without the knowledge and consent of his principal.

Rule 8. The number of interscholastic football games played by any team in one seasion is limited to six.

Rule 9. Paid coaches, other than those regularly employed as teachers by the trustees of the school are prohibited. By paid coach is meant any person who receives directly or indirectly, remuneration of any kind, money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any high school athletic team.

Rule 10. The basketball rules as published in Spaulding's official basketball rule book, shall be the official rules governing all contests between members of the I. H. S. A. A. However, the rule governing the selection of officials in the above rules shall be void, and unless otherwise agreed by mutual consent, each school shall furnish one official and these officials shall alternate their duties, each acting as referee and each acting as umpire one-half.

Rule 11. No person who has been enrolled as a student in an institution of college standing shall be eligible as a member of any athletic

team under I. H. S. A. A. rules in any game with any other team, either within or without the State of Indiana.

Rule 12. On and after January 1, 1910, all the major officials in all athletic contests participated in by teams connected with schools in the I. H. S. A. A. shall be regularly licensed teachers in the public schools of Indiana, or shall be persons whose names have been furnished and approved by the Board of Control. It is recommended that these officials shall be disinterested, and it is required that when a school demands disinterested officials at the time of scheduling the game, such officials shall be furnished. The Board shall drop from its list of approved officials any person who is palpably unfair and biased in his decision in games.

Rule 13. The eligibility rules of this Association shall apply to students taking part in all contests whether with schools inside or outside the State of Indiana.

#### Interpretations.

First. A game is any athletic contest where an admission fee is charged or where any collection or contribution is received from spectators.

Second. The football season is defined as beginning with the opening of school and closing with November 30.

Third. No student who violates the rules of the Association will be reinstated by the Board.

Fourth. When a member or members of any team are protested, the game should be played as scheduled and the protest filed with the Board for settlement later.

Fifth. By mutual consent of both teams, pupils over the age limit may be allowed to enter the contests played under I. H. S. A. A. rules.

Sixth. Pupils under twenty-one at the time of registration in school shall be so regarded until the time of their next registration.

Seventh. A student is a post graduate of a school after he has completed the work required for graduation by that school irrespective of the time of granting the diploma.

Eighth. A pupil withdrawing permanently from school within the first twenty school days of the semester shall not be regarded as having an opportunity to engage in athletics that semester unless he has already played in one or more interscholastic games, in which case he shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

Ninth. Students finishing four years in high school at the mid-year promotion shall be eligible for basketball for the remainder of the basketball season.

Tenth. Any work done in an institution of college standing, which

6. All correspondence and remittances from members of the Association to the Board of Control or the Permanent Secretary must be

endorsed by the principal or a member of the faculty.

7. The term "amateur" is defined and fully explained on pages 80 and 160 of Spaulding's "Official Athletic Rules of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States," and on page 80 of Spaulding's Official Y. M. C. A. Athletic League Handbook."

## Athletic Rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association

Based on Rules of the Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association.

#### RULE I.

#### Officials.

Section 1. All meetings must be under the direction of

The Board of Control.

One referee.

Two or more inspectors.

Three or more field judges.

Three judges at finish.

Three or more timekeepers.

One starter.

One Clerk of the Course.

One scorer.

One marshal.

Sec. 2. If deemed necessary, assistants may be provided for the clerk of the course, the scorer, and the marshal, and an official announcer may be appointed.

#### RULE II.

#### The Board of Control.

Shall have jurisdiction of all matters not assigned by these rules to the referee or other game officials.

#### RULE III.

#### The Referee.

Must decide all questions relating to the actual conduct of the Meet, whose final settlement is not otherwise covered by these rules; have the power to add to or alter the announced arrangements of heats in any event. A referee has no authority, after heats have been drawn and published in a program, to transfer a contestant from one heat to another.

When in any but the final heat of a race a claim of foul or interference is made, he shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to cupable carelessness and shall also have the power to allow the hindered competitor to start in the next round of heats, just as if he had been placed in his trial.

When in a final heat a claim of \_oul or interference is made, he shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault, if he

considers the foul intentional or due to his carelessness or conduct, and he shall also have the power to order a new race between such of the competitors as he thinks entitled to such a privilege.

If during an athletic contest under the rues of the I. H. S. A. A. a competitor shall conduct himself in a manner unbecoming a gentleman or offensive to the officials, spectators, or competitors, the referee shall have the power to disqualify him from further competition at the Meet; and, if he thinks the offense worthy of additional punishment, must promptly make a detailed statement of the facts to the Board of Control.

Power to change the order of events as laid down in the official program is reserved to the Board of Control, which shall, through its chairman, exercise this authority, unless it sees fit to expressly delegate this power to the referee.

The referee shall not have authority to disqualify any competitor for violation of the eligibility rule of the I. H. S. A. A. All protests as to eligibility made on the field must be referred to the Board of Control, and the protested competitor must be allowed to compete until disqualified by the arbitrator of the I. H. S. A. A.

#### RULE IV.

#### The Inspectors.

It shall be the duty of an inspector to stand at such point as the referee may designate, to watch the competetion closely, and, in case of a claim of foul, to report to the referee what he saw of the incident. Such inspectors are merely assistants to the referee, to whom they must report, and have no power to make any decision.

#### RULE V.

#### The Judges at the Finish.

Must determine the order of finishing of contestants and must arrange among themselves as to noting the winner, second, third and fourth, etc., as the case may require, and there must always be two judges whose duty must be to choose the winner.

Their decision in this respect must be without appeal, and, in case of a disagreement, a majority must govern.

#### RULE VI.

#### The Field Judges.

Must make an accurate measurement and keep a tally of all trials of competitors in the high and broad jumps, the pole vaults and the weight competitions.

They must act as judges in these events, and their decisions must

likewise be without appeal. In case of disagreement, a majority must govern. There must be at least three judges for very event.

#### RULE VII.

#### The Timekeepers.

Must be three in number and must individually time all events where time record is called for. At the conclusion of each heat, each time-keeper must present his watch to the referee for inspection, and he must decide the official time. Should two of the three watches mark the same time and the third disagree, the time marked by said two watches must be accepted. Should all three disagree, the fime marked by the intermediate watch must be accepted.

The flash of the pistol must denote the actual time of starting.

If, for any reason, only two watches are held on an event, and they fail to agree, the longer time of the two must be accepted.

#### RULE VIII.

#### The Starter.

Must have sole jurisdiction over the competitor after the clerk of the course has properly placed them in their positions for the start.

The method of starting must be by pistol report, except that in time handicap races the word "go" must be used.

An actual start is not effected until the pistol has been purposely discharged after the competitors have been warned to get ready.

In case the pistol was not purposely discharged, the competitors shall be called back by the starter by pistol fire.

Note.—The starter must have at least two good cartridges in his pistol before starting a heat.

When any part of the person of a competitor touches the ground in front of his mark before the signal is given, it must be considered a false start.

Penalties for false starting must be inflicted by the starter, as follows: In all races to and including 125 yards, the competitor must be put back one yard for the first and another yard for the second attempt; in races over 125 yards and including 300 yards, two yards for the first and two more for the second attempt; in races over 300 yards and including 600 yards, three yards for the first and three more for the second attempt; in races over 600 yards and including 1,000 yards four yards for the first and four more for the second attempt; in races over 1,000 yards and including one mile, five yards for the first and five more for the second attempt; in all races over one mile, ten yards for the first attempt and ten more for the second attempt.

In all cases, the third false start must prevent his competing in that event.

The starter must rule out of that event any competitor who attempts to advance himself from his mark, as prescribel in the official program, after he has been given the warning to "get ready."

#### RULE IX.

#### The Clerk of Course.

Must be provided with the names and the numbers of all entered competitors, and he must notify them to appear at the starting line before the start in each event in which they are entered.

#### RULE X.

#### The Scorer.

Must record the order in which each competitor finishes his event together with the time furnished by the referee.

He must keep a tally of the laps made by each competitor in races covering more than one lap, and must announce, by means of a bell or otherwise, when the leading man enters the last lap.

He must draw up a list of the actual competitors in each event, which shall be filed with the papers of the association and shall be the official record of competing entrants, and shall be final evidence in the enforcement of Rule III, of the rules of eligibility.

He must control his assistants and assign to them such of his duties as he may deem proper.

#### RULE XI.

#### The Marshal.

Must have police charge of the enclosure and must prevent any but officials and actual competitors from entering or remaining therein, He must control his assistants and assign to them their duties.

#### RULE XII.

#### The Official Announcer.

Must receive from the scorer and field judges the result of each event, and announce the same by voice or by means of a bulletin board.

# RULE XIII. Competitors.

Must report to the clerk of the course immediately upon their arrival at the place of meeting, and must be provided by that official with their proper numbers, which must be worn conspicuously by the competitors when competing, and without which they must not be allowed to start.

Each competitor must inform himself of the time of starting, and must be promptly at the starting point of each competition in which he is entered, and there report to the clerk of the course.

Under no condition shall attendants be allowed to accompany competitors at the start or during any competition.

#### RULE XIV.

#### Track Measurement.

All distances run or walked must be measured upon a line eighteen inches outward from the inner edge of the track, except that in races on straightaway tracks the distance must be measured in a direct line from the starting mark to the finishing line.

#### RULE XV.

#### The Course.

Each competitor must keep in his respective position from start to finish in all races on straightaway tracks, and in all races on tracks with one or more turns he must not cross to the inner edge of the track, except when he is at least six feet in advance of his nearest competitor. After turning the last corner into the straight in any race, each competitor must run a straight course to the finish line, and must not cross to either the outeside or inside from such straight course.

In all races of the I. H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have a separate course marked out and measured, whether races are run straightaway or with turns.

The referee must disqualify from that event any competitor who wilfully pushes against, impedes, crosses the course of, or in any way interferes with another competitor.

The referee must disqualify from further participation in the Meeet any contestant competing to lose, to coach, or in any way impede the chances of another competitor, either in a trial or final contest.

# RULE XVI.

# The Finish.

Of the course must be represented by a line between two finishing posts, drawn across and at right angles to the sides of the track, and three feet above which line must be placed a tape attached at either end to the finishing posts. A finish must be counted when any part of the winner's body, except his hands or arms, touches the tape at the finishing line. The tape must be considered the finishing line for the winner, but their order of finishing across the track line must determine the position of the other competitors.

# RULE XVII.

#### Hurdles.

In the 120 yards hurdle race, ten hurdles must be used, each hurdle

to be three feet six inches high. They must be placed ten yards apart, with the first hurdle fifteen yards distant from the starting point, and the last hurdle fifteen yards before the finishing line.

In the 220 yards hurdle race, ten hurdles must be used, each hurdle to be two feet six inches high. They must be placed twenty yards apart, with the first hurdle twenty yards distant from the starting mark, and the last hurdle twenty yards before the finishing line.

In making a record, it must be necessary for the competitor to jump every hurdle in its proper position.

In all hurdle races of the I. H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have a separate course and hurdles marked out and measured, whether races are run straightaway or with turns.

#### RULE XVIII.

#### Jumping.

Section 1. A fair jump must be one that is made without the assistance of weights, diving, somersaults, or handsprings of any kind.

In scratch events competitors must jump in order as placed on the program.

Sec. 2. The running high jump. The field judges must decide the height at which the jump shall commence and must regulate the succeeding elevations.

Each competitor must be allowed three trial jumps at each height, and if on the third trial he shall fail, he must be declared out of the competition.

Competitors must jump in order, as provided in Sec. 1; then, those failing, if any, must have their second trial jump in a like order, after which those having failed twice must make their third trial jump.

The jump must be made over a bar resting on pins projecting not more than three inches from the uprights, and when this bar is removed from its place by the competitor when trying, it must be counted as a trial jump.

Running under the bar in making an attempt to jump must be counted as a "balk," and three successive "balks" must be counted as a trial jump.

The distance of the run before the jump must be unlimited. A competitor may decline to jump at any height in his turn, and by so doing forfeits his rights to again jump at the height declined.

Sec. 4. The running broad jump. When jumped on earth, a joist five inches wide must be sunk flush with it. The outer edges of this joist must be called the scratch line, and the measurement of all jumps must be made from it, at right angles, to the nearest break in the ground made by any part of the person of the competitor.

In front of the scratch line the ground must be removed to the depth of three and the width of twelve inches outward.

A foul jump must be one where the competitor, in jumping off the scratch line, makes a mark on the ground immediately in front of it, or runs over the line without jumping, and must count as a trial jump without results.

Each competitor must have three trial jumps, and the best three must have three more trial jumps.

The competition must be decided by the best of all the trial jumps of the competitors.

The distance of the run before the scratch line must be unlimited.

Sec. 5. The pole vault. Pole must be furnished by the managing committee, but contestants may use their own private poles if they so desire, and no contestant shall be allowed to use any of these private poles, except by the consent of their owners. The poles must be unlimited as to size and weight, but must have no asisting devices, except that they may be wrapped or covered with any substance (to obtain a firmer grip), and must have but one prong at the end.

No competitor shall, during his vault, raise the hand which was uppermost when he left the ground to a higher point of the pole, nor shall he raise the hand which was undermost when he left the ground to any point on the pole above the other hand.

The rules governing the running high jump must also govern the pole vault for height, except that when the man leaves the ground in an attempt, it shall be counted a trial.

#### RULE XIX.

# Putting the Shot.

The shot must be a solid sphere, made of metal and must weigh twelve pounds.

It must be put with one hand, and in making the attempt, it must be above, and not behind, the shoulder.

The competitor must stand in a circle seven feet in diameter. The circumference of the circle must be divided into halves by a line drawn through it. On four feet of the front half of the circumference a board four inches high must be placed, the edge of which must be equally distant from the intersection of the line with the circumference and at which the competitor must stand when the shot leaves his hand.

A fair put shall be one where no part of the person of the competitor touches in front of the circle, or on the board, in making the attempt.

A put must be counted as foul if the competitor steps over the front half of the circle or on the board. A competitor must leave the circle by the rear half. Leaving by the front half must be declared a foul.

The measurement of all puts must be made from the nearest mark by the shot to a point on the circumference of the circle, on a line with the object mark and the center of the circle.

Foul puts and letting go the shot in making an attempt must be counted as trial puts without results.

A board similar to the one in front may be used at the back of the circle.

The order of competing and number of trials shall be the same as for the running broad jump. Shots must be furnished by the managing committee. Any contestant may use his private shot, if correct in weight and shape; in which case the other contestants must also be allowed to use it if they wish.

#### RULE XX.

### Throwing the Discus.

The discus shall be made of smooth, hardwood body,, without finger holes, weighted in center with lead discs and capped with polished brass discs, with steel ring on the outside. The weight of the discus shall be four and one-half pounds; outside diameter, eight inches; thickness in center, two inches.

All throws shall be made from a seven foot circle, with four foot lapboards and similar in all respects to the circle for putting the shot. In making his throws, a competitor may assume any position he chooses. Foul throws and letting go of the discus in attempts shall count as trials without result. A fair throw shall be one in which no part of the person of the competitor touches the ground outside the front half of the circle, and the competitor leaving the circle by its rear half. A throw shall be foul if any part of the person touches the ground outside the front half of the circle before the throw is measured.

The order of competing and number of trials shall be the same as for the running broad jump.

A discus shall be furnished by the managing committee.

#### Ties.

In case of a ie in the high jump and pole vault the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.

In case of a tie in a scratch contest at any game decided by distance each of the tying competitors shall have three additional trials, and the award shall be made in accordance with the distances cleared in these additional trials. In case of a second tie three more trials shall be allowed, and so on, until a decision is reached. In case of a dead heat in any track event, the competitors shall not be allowed to divide the prize or points, or to toss for them, but must compete again at a time and place appointed by the referee.

# Minutes of the Annual Meeting of the I. H. S. A. A., December 28, 1909

Meeting called to order by Pres. Knouff in room 29, State House. Minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved.

The report of the Permanent Secretary for the past year was presented to the Association. A report of the decisions of the Board during the past year was also read by the Permanent Secretary.

The Treasurer's report for the year 1909 was made by L. N. Hines, Treasurer, and was accepted by the Association.

The Association then proceeded to the adoption of amendments to the constitution as follows:

- 1. On and after the adoption of these amendments every newly elected mmber of the Board of Control shall assume the duties of his office on the first day of January, next following.
- 2. The games recognized by the I. H. S. A. A. shall be,—Footba.l, Rugby Football, Soccer, Basketball, Track Work, and Baseball. Further all forms of inter-school athletic games shall be subject to the rules of the J. H. S. A. A.
- 3. No person who has been enrolled as a student in an institution of college standing shall be eligible as a member of any athletic team under I. H. S. A. A. rules in any game with any other team, either within or without the State of Indiana.
- 4. On and after January 1, 1910, all the major officials in all athletic contests participated in by teams connected with schools in the I. H. S. A. A. shall be regularly licensed teachers in the public schools of Indiana, or shall be persons whose names have been furnished and approved by the Board of Control. It is recommended that these officials shall be disinterested and it is required that when a school demands disinterested officials at the time of scheduling the game, such officials shall be furnished. The Board shall drop from its list of approved officials any person who is palpably unfair and biased in his decisions in games.
- 5. The eligibility rules of this Association shall apply to students taking part in all contests whether with shoods inside or outside the State of Indiana.

A motion to amend Section 4 of the Constitution by substituting \$1.00 instead of \$2.00 as the amount of the annual dues was laid on the table for one year.

The Board of Control was instructed to consult with the authorities of Indiana University in regard to the holding of an invitational meet at Bloomington during the coming season.

The Board then proceeded to the election of officers as follows: Isaac E. Neff of South Bend was unanimously elected to succeed C. W. Knouff, whose membership on the Board of Control expires January 1, 1910.

There being no further business, the Association adjourned.

#### MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF CONTROL.

December 27th, 1909.

Board met in called session, Room 328, Claypool Hotel; all members present. The Board discussed various matters relative to the welfare of the Association. Several amendments to the Constitution were discussed and prepared to be offered to the Association meeting on the following day.

The Secretary was instructed to notify members of the Association that the Board demands of the principals a closer interpretation of the eligibility rules of the Association. Also that they be reminded that Rule I applies to games with schools both inside and outside of the state and that student management of teams is strictly prohibited.

Mr. Hines reported that the Oxford High School had been protested by Monticello in a basketball game at Oxford, in which the charges were student management of team, failure to control the crowd, threatening officials and unsportsmanlike conduct.

Motion was carried to summon a representative from the Oxford High school before the Board of Control at their next meeting.

Meeting adjourned.

December 28, 1909.

Board met in called session, Room 328 Claypool Hotel, all members present. Mr. Reitzel, Superintendent of the Brownsburg Schools, was present to defend himself against the charges of having played ineligible men against teams outside of the state, offering as his excuse that he did not understand that this was contrary to the rules of the Association. He offered evidence to show that W. Rinearson, a member of his team, was eligible, under the rules. He was instructed by the Board to secure additional evidence in regard to Rinearson's eligibility and present the same to the Board as soon as possible.

A motion was passed suspending the Muncie High school from the Association for one year for playing ineligible men during the football season.

No further business, meeting adjourned.

December 29, 1909.

Board met in called session, Room 328 Claypool Hotel, all members present. Prin. Walker and Supt. Brown, of Lebanon, appeared before the Board and explained the conditions under which Walter Gipe was employed by the Lebanon School Board as a teacher of Physical Cul-

ture and basketball coach. The matter was freely discussed, but action deferred until a future meeting of the Board.

The Permanent Secretary was instructed to notify the Brownsburg, Oxford, Monticello, Morocco, Rensselaer and Muncie High Schools to send a representative from their school to the Board meeting, Saturday, Jan. 8th, at 11 o'clock, in the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis.

No further business, Board adjourned.

January 8, 1910.

The Board of Control of the I. H. S. A. A. met in called session, Room 326 Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis, all members present.

The Board then proceeded to organize for the year by electing Supt. L. N. Hines, of Crawfordsville, Chairman of the Board and Prin. I. E. Neff, of South Bend, Treasurer.

Supt. H. G. Brown and Mr. C. E. McClintock of the Lebanon High School, appeared before the Board to explain the conditions under which Mr. W. W. Gipe of Indianapolis, was employed to coach the Lebanon High School Basketball Team and teach Physical Culture. Owing to a report that Mr. Hines, a member of the Board, was interested in prosecuting this charge because of the rivalry between the Crawfordsville and Lebanon High Schools, Mr. Hines offered to withdraw from the Board during the consideration of this case. Upon the request of Supt. Brown and by motion of the Board, Mr. Hines was retained as a member of the Board during the consideration of these charges. Supt. Brown explained that Mr. Gipe was employed by the School Board of Lebanon at a salary of \$60 per month to spend two hours each week coaching their basketball team and giving instruction in physical culture. He, therefore, claimed that the Lebanon High School was within the letter of the law contained in the I. H. S. A. A. Constitution.

Prin. W. F. Smith, of Oxford, then appeared before the Board to defend the Oxford High School against the charges of improper treatment of visiting teams. Mr. Preston of the Monticello High School also appeared before the Board and made a statement regarding the treatment accorded him as an official in the basketball game played at Oxford in November between the Monticello and Oxford High Schools. He stated that the spectators at this game threatend and abused him and that the Oxford official was eminently unfair. No evidence was offered by Mr. Smith in refutation of this charge.

Supt. Reitzel of the Brownsburg High School next appeared before the Board and presented evidence to show that Rynearson, a member of the Brownsburg High School Football Team during the past season, was 22 years old and was, therefore, ineligible.

Prin. C. F. Bradshaw of Rensselaer, appeared before the Board to answer charges of having played two ineligible men,—Kirk and Wartena,



on the Rensselaer Football Team during the past season. Mr. Bradshaw admitted that there was considerable doubt as to the eligibility of these two men and requested additional time in which to secure evidence in regard to the matter. The request was granted.

The \_oard then rendered the following decisions:

The Muncie High School charged with having played on their football team during the past season, Kenneth Spurgeon, who was ineligible because during his last preceding semester in school he had failed to make the required number of credits for eligibility, was found guilty of the charge and was suspended from the Association until Sept. 1, 1910. All football games won by Muncie during the season of 1909 were declared forfeited to their opponents.

The Brownsburg High School, charged with having played as a member of their football team during the past season, W. Rynearson, who was ineligible because he was over 21 years of age, was found guilty of this charge and all football games won by the Brownsburg High School during the season of 1909 were declared forfeited to their opponents. The football game between Muncie and Brownsburg High School was develored no game. The membership of the Brownsburg High School was continued on probation until Sept. 1, 1910.

The Oxford High School, charged with failure to control the spectators at a basketball game between the Monticello and Oxford High Schools and with permitting student management of teams, was found guilty of these charges and was severely censured by the Board of Control.

The Rensselaer High School, charged with playing on their football team during the past season two ineligible men, Kirk and Wartena, asked for additional time in which to secure evidence, and the consideration of this case was continued until such evidence could be secured and presented to the Board.

The Lebanon High School, by employing W. W. Gipe, of Indianapolis, at a salary of \$60 per month paid by the School Board, to spend two hours of each week coaching their basketball team and teaching physical culture, is violating the spirit if not the letter of the I. H. S. A. A. rules and all games played hereafter by teams coached in this manner shall be forfeited to the opposing teams.

The football game between Attica and Brazil played at Attica, Oct. 30, was forfeited to Brazil because Attica played Bruce Baker, an ineligible man.

February 19, 1910.

Board of Control of the I. H. S. A. A., met in the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis, at 11 o'clock a. m., all members present.

They proceeded to render the following

# Decisions and Interpretations:

Darlington vs. New Richmond:

In a game of basketball between these two schools, Darlington charged that the New Richmond school officials failed to control the crowd at the game and also reported ill treatment from the town afterward. New Richmond charged rough play by the Darlington team.

DECISION: It is the duty of officials in basketball games to control the character of the play and the conduct of the crowd. The evidence in this case tended to show that the officials in this game were lax in the performance of this duty. The Board of Control recommends that athletic relations be suspended between the two schools until March 1st, 1911, because of ill feeling existing between the people of the two communities

Morocco vs. Rensselaer:

Rensselaer High School was suspended from the I. H. S. A. A. until December 1st, 1910, on account of playing two ineligible men,—Kirk and Wartena, during the football season of 1909.

Morristown:

Morristown High School admitted having played the Carthage High School in basketball before Carthage became a member of the Association. The Board decided that the Morristown High School should be censured for allowing student management of teams and for failure to ascertain from the official list of membership the eligibility of competing schools.

Bluffton vs. Van Buren:

In regard to a game of basketball scheduled to take place between the Bluffton and Van Buren teams, but cancelled by Van Buren only a few days before the game because of the condition of the floor at Bluffton, the Board decided to award the game by forfeit to Bluffton, but censured the latter school for not giving full information in regard to the conditions under which the game must be played.

Interpretation Rule 4:

Students finishing four years in high school at the midyear promotion, shall be eligible for basketball for the remainder of the basketball season.

Interpretation to Amendment 3, passed Dec. 28, 1909:

Any work done in an institution of college standing, which may be counted toward a degree in that institution, shall render the student ineligible to compete under I. H. S.A. A. rules.

The following matters were laid on the table for consideration at a future meting: The interpretation of Rule 7, Paragraph I. The consideration of a track meet to be held at Indiana University during the coming season and miscellaneous business.

Mr. Ramsey was appointed a committee to report on the attitude of the Educator-Journal toward the I. H. S. A. A.

The Board then adjourned.

May, 14, 1910.

The Board of Control met in called session in the Oliver Hotel, South Bend; all members present. The following business was transacted:

Culver High School vs. Rochester High School:

Prin. Reagan came before the Board to defend the Rochester High School against charges of failure to fulfill a contract to play basketball games and against charges of student management. The Culver High School was not represented. Mr. Reagan admitted the failure of the Rochester High School to fulfill contract, but denied the charge of student management. The charge against the Rochester High School was dismissed by the Board with the understanding that Rochester should forfeit to Culver the game which had been scheduled between the two schools. The charge of student management was not sustained.

The Board then proceeded to canvass the list of entries for the State Meet. after which the Board adjourned.

May 21, 1910.

Board of Control met in called session at the Public Library, Crawfordsville, Indiana; all members present. The following matters were considered:

The Franklin High School was charged with having played a basketball game with a high school team from Columbus without the knowledge or consent of the principal of the Columbus High School.

DECISION:—It is the opinion of the Board that the Franklin High School management was at fault in playing a Columbus basketball team without a certified eligibility list signed by the principal of the Columbus High School, and the management is warned against a repetition of this violation of the rules of the Association. Prin. Van Riper was present to speak for the Franklin High School.

In regard to the charges of the students of the Columbus High School who played a game of basketball with the Franklin High School without the knowledge or consent of the Columbus Principal, the Board rendered the following decision:

The following students of the Columbus High School having violated the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. by playing a basketball game with the Franklin High School without the knowledge and consent of their High School principal are hereby declared ineligible to compete under I. H. S. A. rules in the future: W illiam Hacker Herbert Bassett; Charles Evans, Frank Snider, Lewis Patts and Virgil Wagoner.

Rockville High School vs. Bloomingdale Academy:

Charges were brought against the Bloomingdale Academy by the

Rockvill High School of having refused to fulfill a contract to play a basketball game between the two schools. Principal Coppock represented the Bloomingdale Academy and Principal Jewett appeared for Rockville. The decision of the Board was as follows:

The Bloomingdale Academy is suspended from the Association until January 1st, 1911, for failure to fulfill contract with the Rockville High School and the game contracted for is awarded to the Rockville High School by forfeit.

An invitation from the Rose Polytechnic Institute, Terre Haute, Indiana, to hold the State Meet under their auspices at Terre Haute in 1911, was accepted by the Board. The date set for the Meet was Saturday, May 20, 1911. There being no further business, meeting adjourned.

October 22, 1910.

The Board of Control met in called session at the Claypool Hotel in Indianapolis, Saturday, October 22, at 11 a. m. All members present.

Supt. Geo. H. Reitzel, of Brownsburg, appeared before the Board, asking for a ruling from the Board on certain questions of eligibility.

Huntingburg vs. Evansville. A protest was received from the Huntingburg High School claiming that Evansville had failed to play a game of football on October 15th as previously agreed upon. Neither school was represented at the meeting and action was deferred to a future meeting for more evidence to be presented by both sides.

Jacksonville vs. Linton. Jacksonville High School asked for a ruling on a decision in a football game with Linton during the present season. The decision was referred to Coach Sheldon, of Indiana University, after the facts have been agreed to by the two schools.

There being no further business, the Board adjourned.

November 5, 1910.

Board of Control met in called session at the Bowles Hotel, Bloomington, Indiana, Saturday, Nov. 5, 1910. All members present.

Bids were received for printing the forthcoming handbook and the contract was awarded to the Commercial Printing Company, Marion, Indiana, for \$170.00, this bid being considered lowest and best.

The resolution of the State Superintendents' Association recommending that the I. H. S. A. A. take steps looking toward the elimination of football from high school sports was discussed, but no action taken.

The Permanent Secretary was instructed to secure from members of the Association suggestions on the above and other topics relating to the welfare of the Association.

The Permanent Secretary reported that the dispute between Evansville and Huntingburg had been compromised satisfactorily to both schools.

There being no further business, the Board adjourned.

The Board of Control met in called session at the Claypool Hotel at Indianapolis. All members present.

The Board proceeded at once to the consideration of the case of Washington vs. Brazil.

The following charges were preferred against the Brazil High School:

- 1. Frank Baxter and Roy Decker, ineligibles, were played by the Brazil High School in football games against Greencastle, Oct. 1st; Brownsburg, Oct. 15th; Linton, Oct. 22nd; Robinson, Nov. 5th; and Logansport, Nov. 12, 1910. Frank Baxter is ineligible because this is his fifth year in school. Roy Decker is ineligible because he had not maintained a passing grade in three subjects for the semester ending in June, 1910.
- 2. Roy Decker was played under an assumed name in the games against Greeneastle and Brownsburg.
- 3. Brazil has scheduled more than six games for the current season.

Each school was represented personally at the meeting. After a thorough discussion of the charges and evidence presented by both sides, the Board rendered a unanimous decision that the charges preferred by the Washington High School against the Brazil High School are unfounded.

The Permanent Secretary was instructed to correspond with the Principal of the Worthington High School regarding a report that this school was violating the rule against paid coaches.

Jasonville vs. Linton: In a game of football between these two schools, Linton had the ball and punted. Jasonville secured the ball and scored a touchdown which was not allowed by the official on the ground that the ball had not advanced 20 yards.

Coach Sheldon, to whom the matter was referred by the Board, gave the following decision:

"Under the facts as presented to me, there is no question in my mind but that a touchdown should have been allowed against Linton. However, the referee ruled otherwise, and his decision, in my opinion must stand, even though he was in error."

The expenses of the Permanent Secretary for the year, December 1, 1909-Nov. 30, 1910, amounting to \$310.73, was allowed by the Board and the Treasurer was instructed to pay the same.

A communication was received by the Board from the Physical Director of Indiana University, asking for the Board's endorsement of a plan to hold a championship series of basketball games at Bloomington under he auspices of the University.

The Permanent Secretary was instructed to notify the University

that it would neither endorse nor oppos such a plan. It was the opinion of the Board, however, that the plan as proposed, was not a workable one.

In view of the many claims for the high school football championship of the state, the Board affirmed that it is neither possible under existing conditions, owing to the large number of schools and the small number of games allowed each school, nor in the opinion of the Board is it desirable to attempt to determine the football championship of the state and that no team has a record entitling it to any such position.


