ADDRESS BY RETIRING PRESIDENT

H. B. ALLMAN

TO THE INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The Indiana High School Athletic Association has reached its majority. Twenty-one years ago a group of forward looking educators joined in a cooperative effort to better school relationships. The Association resulting from this first meeting has passed through its infancy; has been schooled by two decades of activity; has survived the stress and uncertainty of adolescence; has expended during the latter teens to include within its membership practically all the high schools of the state. Development in the future will be characterized by enlarging the scope of its activities and interests rather than by continued growth in membership. These enlarged activities of the Association must be directed by mature thought, in accord with its years of successful experiences. The attitude of those responsible for its policies must reflect that good judgment, characteristic of majority and full manhood, if the Association is to function properly as a mature organization. Its deliberations must be marked by a spirit of fairness, and calm judgment.

Through the years of its growth and development the I. H. S. A. A. has occasionally been disturbed by waves of sectionalism and of class interests. Up to the present hour, however these have never become serious enough to disrupt the Association. Let us hope that the spirit of fairness and reasonableness will continue to prevail, and that the good judgment of the disaffected elements will assert itself to the end that harmonious relationship of all classes of schools may continue. What a pitiable commentary it would be upon the educators of Indiana if the division of spoils were to outweigh the high ideals and the inestimable benefits of the I. H. S. A. A.

From its beginning, the purposes of the Indiana High School Athletic Association have been definite and clear cut. Its founders hoped to bring about a closer cooperation among its members. They strove to secure conditions favorable to courteous treatment, fair play and clean competition. They aimed also to promote ideals of good sportsmanship, and as evidence of their clear sighted vision we can weekly observe the progress of hundreds of contests between communities without the slightest evidence of ill feeling or bad sportsmanship. Schools can meet, can contest, can win or lose, without any semblance of unfairness, discourtesy or violence.

The members of the I. H. S. A. A. have cooperated to elevate standards of scholarship. Athletic teams representing Indiana high schools are now composed of students who are making creditable progress in their scholastic enterprises. A premium has been placed upon scholarship and intellectual attainment. There is no longer room on the team for the flunker or the intellectual drone.

The Association has demanded that all competition be kept upon a strictly amateur basis. Players are no longer bought and sold or offered inducements because of athletic prowess. The student is not permitted to capitalize his athletic ability, or to barter his self respect, for the spirit of professionalism has been effectively outlawed.

The organization of a complete and well balanced program of physical education for every school of the state has been encouraged. Games are used as a means to secure a perfect and complete development. Every child is entitled to his full inheritance of good health and physical vigor, and to guarantee this heritage, the Association is using its good offices to secure for every community ample play grounds, adequate gymnasiums, practical equipment and well trained directors.

It also has been the aim of the I. H. S. A. A. to protect and conserve the health and physical well being of every boy and girl. To this end, contests are carefully regulated, certificates of physical fitness are required, conditions of play safeguarded and competent officials demanded. To foster all that is highest and best in the educational interests of boys and girls should continue to be a dominant ideal. Desire for winning teams should at all times be kept subordinate to the welfare of students.

The principals of the member schools are the responsible agents in determining the policies of the Association. Upon the principal rests the responsibility for the management of athletics in his local school. Upon the principal also rests the responsibility for the selection of the Permanent Secretary and the Board of Control. The expression of his will has been secured both by direct vote at the annual business session and through the mails.

The Board of Control functions in both an administrative and judicial capacity through its regular sessions called for the purpose of considering all cases arising under the constitution and rules. Special sessions are held occasionally for the purpose of determining policies and providing for activities of the Association. Board members are also frequently called upon to visit the schools of their district, and to attend special conferences.

On August 1, 1922, as authorized by vote of the high school principals and under a contract the terms of which were agreed upon by the Board of Control, A. L. Trester, who has been Permanent Secretary continuously since 1913, consented to devote his entire time to the work of the Association. Mr. Trester has been untiring in his

efforts to serve the best interest of the I. H. S. A. A. Since the beginning of his full time contract he has issued 35 bulletins and circulars, written thousands of letters, held many interviews, conducted hundreds of investigations, attended a number of conferences, spoken at numerous clinics and delivered 200 addresses to high schools, teachers associations, community meetings, Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs, Commercial Clubs and Parent Teacher Organizations. In addition he has inaugurated a plan for approving officials, has arranged the details of tourneys and track meets and by a complete system of reports has satisfactorily supervised them. The I. H. S. A. A. is fortunate to have secured the services of one of Indiana's foremost educators. His influence is felt in every community, and perhaps no other school man has come in so direct and helpful contact with the boys and girls of the State. An effort should be made to continue his services indefinitely.

The activities of the Indiana High School Athletic Association are numerous. In addition to fostering a full time physical training program through the medium of play and games, the Association encourages in a definite way certain major sports. It is the purpose of the Association to recognize all sports and games that have within them the elements of character building; that are not contaminated by unwholesome environments; or are not too strenuous for growing children. The interest of the present day, however, centers in track, baseball, basketball and football. The latter is regaining popularity as a high school sport, and will soon assume the role that it deserves in Indiana high schools. Track and baseball are handicapped by a short and frequently unfavorable season, yet enviable records have been achieved in each.

Basket ball has assumed the position of preeminence among high school games and sports. Within a comparatively short time, it has risen from practical obscurity and eclipsed all other games in popular interest. For a period of five months each year the school communities of the State are absorbed in the performance of their basket ball teams. This popular interest is not to be regretted. In fact it should be fostered and encouraged so long as it remains wholesome and is based upon ideals of true sportsmanship. Wherever gambling, fan control, low ideals of sportsmanship, professionalism or proselyting of players exist, there the benefits may be counteracted by attendant evils.

While there are some complaints that basket ball is over-emphasized to the detriment of other games, yet there are fundamental reasons why it will continue to be a popular game. In the first place it is a keen spirited contest, full of action and thrilling excitement, requiring an abundance of skill, speed and endurance of the successful player. Then too, it is an indoor sport, played under conditions that can be easily regulated, making it a game suited

to the winter season. Finally it is usually played in the evening after business hours, when people are free to seek entertainment and recreation.

The universal popular appeal of basket ball is attested by the fact that a successful journal devoted exclusively to its interest in Indiana is now being published. The high plane upon which this journal has been conducted has made its influence both positive and constructive in developing ideals of fair play and true sportsmanship. The attitude of its management toward all the activities of the Association has been one of helpful cooperation.

The increasing popular interest in basket ball emphasizes the need for careful regulation and supervision. The season is accordingly definitely defined, the number and time of games regulated, and the educational interest of the boys and girls safeguarded by scholarship, attendance and age eligibility requirements. The I. H. S. A. A. has never promoted basket ball to the exclusion of other games, but has continually fostered a well rounded program of athletic activities. Definite suggestions are prepared and circulated, encouraging the development of new games and group contests that will reach every boy and girl in the school.

There is an ever present need for more effective publicity relative to the program, the practices, and policies of the I. H. S. A. A. Its ideals should be kept constantly before student bodies. They should be made familiar with all eligibility standards, and should know how the Association functions. The public also should be kept informed concerning its rules and decisions. Wherever the general public is familiar with the program and the work of the Association, there you will find a genuine appreciation of its worth. The fan who understands our high standards, and is made conversant with the rules of contests is an invaluable asset in controlling our athletic situations.

The constitution of the I. H. S. A. A. consists of its original provisions, supplemented and changed by proposals adopted at its various business sessions. During the past year the Board of Control and Permanent Secretary, as authorized at the annual meeting of 1923, reorganized it. This redrafted constitution was submitted to the recent annual meeting and adopted, with the single exception of the provision requiring a two-third vote to amend. This provision should be re-submitted at the next annual meeting and be made a part of the constitution. Such a provision is reasonable and in conformity with the usual method of amending constitutions. Furthermore, it would safeguard the Association against radicalism and frequent change.

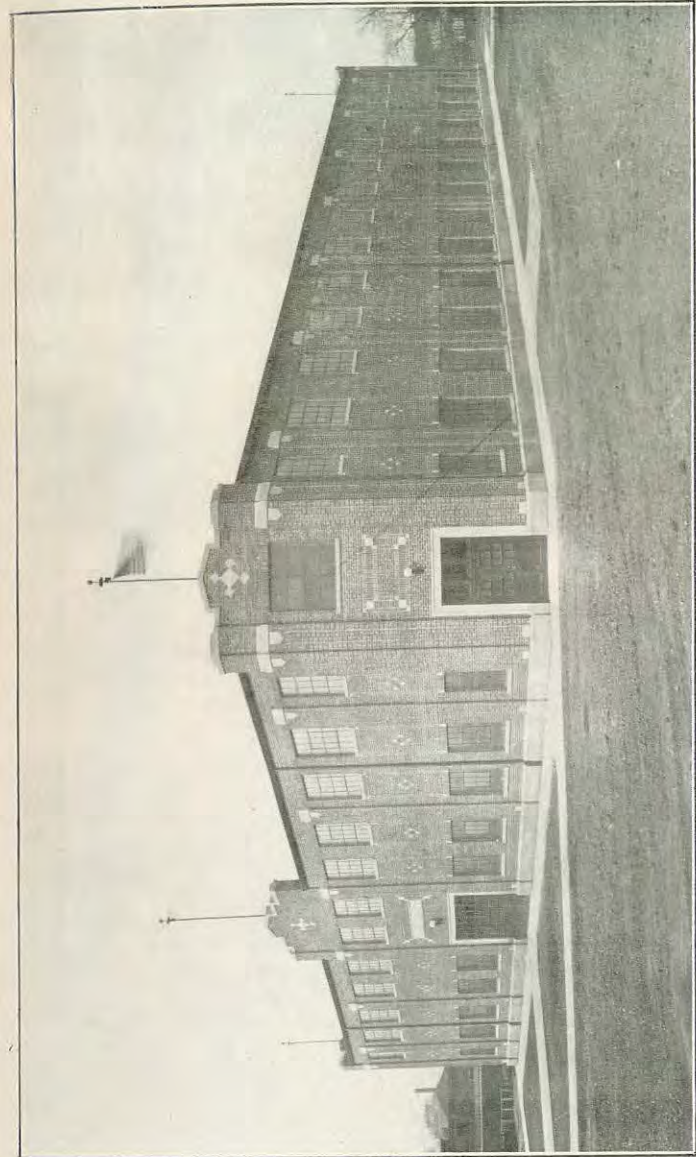
There is also an urgent need for systematizing the control of the Association by creating a representative legislative body. It is impossible for the representatives of high schools to adequately and

intelligently consider proposed legislation in the short space of two or three hours. There is need for more thoroughness and more deliberation than can be secured from mass representation. One representative could be chosen from each equal group of schools. These representatives could meet with the Board of Control at a time, and under conditions, that would be favorable to careful deliberation.

Such a plan of representative control would bring about a closer cooperation among the schools of the local unit. A clearer understanding of the relationship and responsibilities of Association members would be fostered thereby. Then, too, every section of the State could be fairly and equally represented. A study of the distribution of voting delegates in the recent annual meeting indicates that seven counties had no representative present; eighteen counties had one only; twenty-five counties had either two or three; thus making a total of fifty counties having no more than three representatives. Some system of delegate control should be adopted in the near future.

Have you ever paused to consider and evaluate the benefits that you enjoy from your affiliation with the Indiana High School Athletic Association? Does it mean more to you than a method of promoting your own interests? Are you not bound to it by a higher desire than merely to take advantage of its protection or to profit from its activities? Is it not more to you than a court of appeal to which you can refer your grievances and from whose decisions you can dissent in case they are not favorable to you? Are you ever tempted to think of your relationship to the Association as a means by which you can embarrass your neighbor by asking for an investigation without first appraising him of the condition that you think exists? Have you ever been inclined to feel that the rules of the Association should be applied stringently to the other fellow, but that the extenuating circumstances in your own school justify their violation? Have you ever assumed that ignorance, either actual or apparent, of the conditions existing in your school would be a justification for your violations? Do you think of the influence of your Association as being negative and restrictive, or do you think of it as being positive and constructive?

The program and provisions of the I. H. S. A. A. are in full force throughout every day of the year. You are constantly enjoying the advantages of its protection, and benefiting by the enterprises which it promotes. Could you think of returning to the days when your athletic activities were not safeguarded by the power of the State Athletic Association? Could you conduct your contest more satisfactorily without the guarantee of the I. H. S. A. A.? Would your problems of schedule making and contracting games be simplified if there were no State Association to guarantee their fulfillment? Would you be able to secure good officials more easily if there were no approved lists? Could standards of eligibility be maintained more effectively

if they were applied to your school only? Could tournaments, meets and contests be conducted more satisfactorily under local than under state management? Do you appreciate your Association? Are you in sympathy with its programs?

The fact that there is in existence in Indiana the largest and most effective high school athletic association in the world is the reassuring answer to these queries. Its privileges are constant; its program is constructive; its influences are uplifting; its protection is positive; its activities are popular; its benefits are coveted; its membership is loyal; its future is secure.

All hail to the success of the I. H. S. A. A.!

I. H. S. A. A. PROGRAM

(We believe in boys and girls.)

1. Real physical training for all boys and all girls built around drills, rythms, games, contests, competitive activities and legitimate sports rather than arround formal gymnastic exercises or around highly organized military training.

2. Incorporation and use of the valuable elements in formal gymnastic exercises and in military training as contributory measures to a materialization of real physical training.

3. Physical training as an integral and vital part of the school curriculum and athletics as an integral and vital part of physical training.

4. Belief in games and contests between schools and just as strong belief in games and contests between classes, groups, clubs and leagues within the schools so that all boys and all girls may secure their physical chances.

5. Education of the public regarding the ideals, program and policy of the I. H. S. A. A., and also in the idea that an opportunity furnished by facilities in the way of gymnasiums, playfields, equipment and a competent personnel in adequate numbers to direct is all that is necessary to secure general and voluntary participation in this program by boys and girls.

6. Physical training and athletics as elements only in the proper training of boys and girls. These things are extremely valuable but must be considered as contributory to scholarship, high ideals, real sportsmanship and to the building of the proper habits of real living in a democracy. A proper sense of relative values will save us.

7. General recognition of the possibilities for real training for boys, girls and adults in athletic contests and in the many competitive activities in a real physical training program. Real situations filled with real opportunities for real training in the elements of real citizenship arise in athletic activities. An adequate and competent personnel to direct will turn these situations into habits that will function in right thinking and in right acting.

8. Clean amateur athletics, fair competition, honest dealings, and real sportsmanship at all times. These things bar the recruiting of players and remove the money-changers from our gymnasiums and playfields.

9. Elimination of the "win at any cost" ideal and substitution of the "play hard and win by fair means only" ideal. The former ideal is far too low for boys and girls, too low for communities and too low for our country.

10. Clean, competent and fair-minded coaches, physical directors, managers, teachers and officials who are vitally interested in the welfare of boys and girls and who have backbone enough and of sufficient rigidity to stand firmly at all times for the best interests of boys and girls.

FUNDAMENTAL PRINCIPLES AND BELIEFS OF THE I. H. S. A. A.

I. Commercialism is antagonistic to the best interests of clean amateur athletics.

II. Professionalism should play no part in school athletic activities.

III. Athletics and physical training should be managed in accord with other educational aims and values.

IV. School athletic activities are educational activities and should be managed by school authorities.

V. The training of all and the exploitation of none should be considered fundamental in physical education.

VI. Provision for spectators, as well as participants, is highly desirable, as the educational values in moral, civic and social ways gained by having men, women and children interested in clean sport are valuable.

VII. Physical training and athletic activities should be dignified by being assigned a prominence in the curriculum on a par with other work.

VIII. Intelligent leadership and sympathetically efficient management will do much more than critical denunciation.

IX. Athletics is one of the greatest of forces for the development of school morale and school spirit, when properly handled.

X. Athletics should have its proper setting in physical training activities. Physical training should have its proper setting in physical education, and physical education should have its proper setting in the whole health program.

XI. Games, contests, competitive activities, sports, drills, folk dances, rythms and marches are basic in physical training work, because such are natural and free and furnish real genuine interest without which the highest development does not take place.

XII. Artificial exercises have a certain value, but such value is not comparable to the values secured in free play, organized play and in well conducted contests, sports and games.

LIABILITY AND RESPONSIBILITY

According to the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A., the High School Principal is the responsible party in all athletic activities and relations. This association was formed largely by High School Principals, was fostered by High School Principals and the constitution places the responsibility on the High School Principals. For the most part these men and women have shouldered the responsibility

of athletic activities and relations in a fine way. Sometimes authority commensurate with the responsibility has not been given to these High School Principals and of course difficulties have arisen. In some cases High School Principals have evaded or neglected to exercise the direct responsibility of athletic activities and affairs have not been satisfactory.

The only true basis of any responsibility is liability. To be responsible in the strictest sense means to be liable and really there is no responsibility when there is no liability. In saying, therefore, that the High School Principal is responsible in all athletic activities, it is said that the High School Principal and his school are liable under the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. for any infractions or violations of these rules and regulations. When a school joins the I. H. S. A. A. the Principal assumes the responsibility of knowing the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A., of acquainting his students, teachers and community with these rules and regulations and his responsibility of a strict observance of them and of supporting the ideals of the I. H. S. A. A. in a constructive way at all times. In assuming this responsibility a sense of liability presents itself to every Principal who takes his work as Principal seriously. It is hoped that the responsibility of belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. will be assumed by High School Principals in a larger way and that this responsibility will be supported by a clean-cut liability. It is also hoped that High School Principals will be given willingly authority commensurate with their responsibility in athletic affairs. A keen sense of responsibility backed up by a felt sense of liability and coupled with the right degree and quality of authority will work wonders in our I. H. S. A. A.

Basket Ball

There was more and better basketball played than ever in the history of the State Association. The membership of the I. H. S. A. A. reached the highest for all years and most schools had more than one team among the boys and more than one team among the girls. Inter-school games were played by both girls and boys on the first teams and many inter-school games were played by teams lower in ranking. Intra-mural work in basketball was given in practically all High Schools for both boys and girls.

A number of County and Invitational tourneys were held over the State under High School auspices in addition to the sectional, regional and final tourneys arranged by the Board of Control. It is now a rule of the I. H. S. A. A. that all tourneys other than the sectional, regional and final tourneys shall be held prior to February 1 of each year so that there will be several weeks intervene between these other tourneys and the tourneys arranged by the Board of Control.

SECTIONAL, REGIONAL AND FINAL TOURNEYS

The sectional tourneys ended by the elimination method with the following winners:

Anderson, Angola, Versailles, Bainbridge, Bedford, Brazil, Otterbein, Columbus, Veedersburg, Crawfordsville, Evansville, Delphi, Frankfort, Columbia City, Franklin, Whiting, Elkhart, Mt. Comfort, Jeffersonville, Liberty Center, Huntington, Southport, Kendallville, Kokomo, West Lafayette, Lebanon, Logansport, Midland, Marion, Martinsville, Michigan City, Monticello, Muncie, Mooreland, Arcadia, North Manchester, Winslow, Bunker Hill, Clayton, Pennville, Morton, Rochester, Connersville, Seymour, Shelbyville, Lakeville, Sullivan, Tell City, Wiley (Terre Haute), Vincennes, Warsaw, and Stoney Creek.

There were fifty-two (52) tourney centers with six hundred sixty-five (665) teams participating. In 1923 there were forty-eight (48) centers with five hundred ninety-six (596) teams playing and in 1922 there were thirty-two (32) centers with five hundred sixty-four (564) teams playing. No sectional tourney this year had entered less than eight (8) teams nor more than sixteen (16) teams.

The Regional Tourneys were four (4) in number and ended with the following winners: At Purdue University,—Frankfort, Logansport, Michigan City and Otterbein; At Indiana University,—Bedford, Franklin, Martinsville and Wiley (Terre Haute); At South Side High School, Fort Wayne,—Liberty Center, North Manchester, South Side and Rochester; At Earlham College,—Anderson, Connersville, Richmond and Shelbyville.

The sixteen (16) winners of the regional tourneys met in a final

tourney at Indianapolis and the Martinsville High School team won the tourney and the State Championship in I. H. S. A. A. Basketball for 1924 by the elimination method.

All games in all tourneys were played in fifteen-minute halves and no team played more than four (4) games or more than one hundred twenty (120) minutes in any tourney within a period of two days. The tourneys found the players physically fit for the most part and there seemed to be evidences of better training and a higher type of physical vigor among the players. Most of the players were trained to withstand the mental strain of tourneys in a way that was encouraging. Very few were the signs of ungentlemanly conduct or unsportsmanlike actions.

Phillip Kessler of Richmond won the Gimbel Prize for "Mental Attitude." The Board of Control served as a committee to make the selection and such was made after conferences with the officials, coaches and unbiased spectators and after careful consideration was given all players and all elements that go to make a real gentleman.

All of the tourneys were successful in every way and the spirit on the part of the hosts and guests was excellent. Better trained teams, better coached teams, better managed crowds, better officiating and better arrangements in general made the tourneys for this year the best of all years to date. Clean amateur athletics was in evidence and the old expression "Athletics Is An Evil" received a decided blow. The tourneys were worth while from the standpoint of the social values to schools and communities to say nothing about the mental, moral and physical values.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF I. H. S. A. A. SECTIONAL, REGIONAL AND FINAL BASKETBALL TOURNEYS, 1924.

THE THIRTEENTH ANNUAL

The Board of Control has completed the details for the State Championship Basketball Tourneys and announces the scheme in full:
Sectional Tourneys, February 29—March 1.

The following bases were used in selecting centers:

(1.) Location—geographical and with reference to schools desiring to participate. (2.) Railway and interurban facilities. (3.) General conditions—attitude of local authorities, floors and entertaining facilities.

Schools have been assigned by counties with the intention of having no more than 16 teams in each Tourney. The following scheme gives the Centers and also the counties assigned to each center. The name of your County locates your center.

Board reserves the right to readjust the scheme if conditions make it advisable and necessary. The numbers indicate the schools from each county that have expressed their desire to enter at the present time.

Management—The management of these Tourneys rests solely with the Board of Control. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center Principals. Two officials for each Tourney will be selected by the Board and none but fair, disinterested and competent men will be chosen. All schedules of hours, floor, teams and officials will be made out and printed by the Board. All schedules will be drawn by lot by the Board of Control and no changes will be made in them.

Open Contest—The Tourneys are open to all members of the Association, irrespective of their season's record.

Protests—All protests against teams or individuals must be made in writing by the Principal and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before 11 a. m., February 20. Protests must be accompanied by evidence.

Entertainment—Teams are limited to eight men, but ten men can be certified. The Center Principals have contracted with the Board to entertain nine men (which MUST include the faculty manager) from each competing school. Entertainment will begin, if necessary, at 7 a. m. Friday, February 29 and continue, if necessary, to 8 a. m. Sunday, March 2. Printed schedules will be sent to each competing school in plenty of time to arrange for making the trip. All competing schools are requested to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary, but all schools are entitled to entertainment throughout the Tourney.

Expenses—An entrance fee of one one (1) dollar for each team must accompany the entry blank, which money will go into the treasury of the I. H. S. A. A. to defray expenses of the Tourneys incurred by the Board of Control. The Center Principals have contracted to make settlement according to the following scheme:

First, all legitimate expenses except for transportation shall be paid from the gross receipts.

Second, The Center High School shall receive one hundred (\$100) dollars.

Third, The I. H. S. A. A. shall receive (10) per cent. of the second balance.

Fourth, the transportation shall be paid.

Fifth, the Center High School shall receive one hundred (\$100) dollars.

Sixth, The balance shall be divided among the competing schools on the basis of season tickets sold and paid for on or before Thursday, February 28.

Privileges—All competing teams, one attendant, and one faculty manager for each team are to be admitted free to all games.

Eligibility—The eligibility of each player must be certified to by the Principal of the school sending the team. Certificates must be made on the regular blanks furnished by the Permanent Secretary, and all data must be given as indicated. Entries will close Monday, February 18. This means that they must be in the hands of the Permanent Secretary, complete in every detail, on that date. It is recommended that these be sent by registered mail. All students must be eligible when they participate as well as when they are certified.

Admission Fee—The admission fee to all Tourney games shall be forty (40) cents for single admission tickets and one (1) dollar and fifty (50) cents for season tickets and no more shall be received for said tickets. No more tickets shall be sold than the capacity of the house will justify.

Prizes—No prizes of any kind are to be awarded to any school or individual from any source.

Distribution of Tickets—An equitable distribution of tickets shall be made among the competing schools based on distance, enrollment in High School, and probable attendance from the competing schools, due consideration being given to the stipulations outlined under expenses above. Season tickets should be ready for distribution on Monday, February 25. All Principals have duties in this matter. Any unfair methods or prices higher than those mentioned in this announcement should be reported to the Board of Control with evidence.

Warnings—Entries close Monday, February 18 and cannot be changed nor received afterwards. An entrance fee of one dollar (\$1.00) must accompany each entry blank. SECTION IX.

The financial settlement of all tourneys shall be made as follows: First—All legitimate expenses except for travel shall be paid. Second—The Center High School shall receive one hundred (100) dollars. Third—The I. H. S. A. A. shall receive (10) per cent. of the balance. Fourth—The transportation shall be paid the Center High School not sharing. Fifth—The Center High School shall receive one hundred (100) dollars. Sixth—The balance shall be divided among the competing schools on the basis of season tickets sold and paid for. Season tickets shall be distributed on the basis of actual enrollment in school, and the Board reserves the right to judge what expenses are legitimate.

SECTION X.

The High School under whose auspices the Tourney is held promises hearty cooperation with the State Board of Control and the State Board of Control promises as much to the High School conducting the Tourney.

SECTION XI.

The details of all Tourneys, such as protests, eligibility lists, schedules, etc., are to be cared for by the State Board of Control through the Permanent Secretary.

SECTION XII.

The State Board of Control shall manage all Tourneys and the High Schools are to work under this direction.

SECTION XIII.

The High School representative shall send by telegram the name of the winning school to Arthur L. Trester, Anderson, Indiana, as soon as the Tournament is completed. All entry blanks must be sent to Arthur L. Trester by special delivery Saturday evening, March 1. The High School representative shall send to Arthur L. Trester on or before Monday, March 3, the complete scores of all games, a complete and itemized statement of receipts and disbursements, and a check as called for in Section IX.

SECTION I.

The dates of the Sectional Tournaments shall be February 29 and March 1, 1924.

SECTION II.

..... agrees to officiate in such games as designated by the I. H. S. A. A. on the above dates. The I. H. S. A. A. through Arthur L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, agrees to pay for his services fifty (\$50.00) dollars and no more. The High School Principal holding the Tourney shall pay this amount to the official at the close of the Tourney. Entertainment, traveling and hotel expenses must be met by the official. Officials shall not request nor accept entertainment from any one connected with the Tourney.

SECTION III.

..... agrees to co-operate with the Board of Control and the competing teams to make the Tourney fair in every way. The I. H. S. A. The I. H. S. A. A. will furnish two officials for each Tourney. These officials shall work in alternate games unless it seems advisable to use both in some games and then they shall work as referee and umpire.

Spalding's Official Basket Ball Rules for 1923-24 shall govern all games, except that the halves in all games shall be 15 minutes in

SECTIONAL BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS OF THE INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

FEBRUARY 29 AND MARCH 1, 1924.

THE THIRTEENTH ANNUAL

Tournaments are scheduled at fifty-two (52) sectional centers and the same rules and regulations govern all tournaments.

Teams must be on floor as scheduled under penalty of forfeiture of game.

No changes will be made in the schedule and no substitutions of non-entered players will be permitted. Eight of the players on the certified entry blank must constitute the team and these men must be chosen prior to the opening game of the tourney.

The official entry list will be in the hands of the Center Principal at all times and shall constitute final evidence in all cases. Players will be subject to identification at any time.

Teams are limited to eight men and MUST be in charge of a faculty manager who will be held responsible for the students and their conduct.

Spalding's Official Guide for 1923-1924 shall govern. The halves shall be fifteen minutes in all games.

The officials have been assigned by the Board and no changes will be made. Their decisions will be final.

The admission fee to all tourney games shall be forty (40) cents for single session tickets and \$1.50 for season tickets.

The winning teams in each tourney will participate on March 7 and 8 in a Regional Series assigned by the following scheme: Winners at Bedford, Brazil, Columbus, Evansville, Franklin, Lyons, Mar-

tinsville, Oakland City, Seymour, Sullivan, Tell City, Terre Haute and Vincennes will play at Indiana University; the winners at Anderson, Aurora, Greenfield, Hanover, Indianapolis, Muncie, New Castle, Noblesville, Pittsboro, Richmond, Rushville, Shelbyville and Winchester will play at Earlham College; the winners at Bainbridge, Brook, Covington, Crawfordsville, Flora, Frankfort, Gary, Kokomo, Lafayette, Lebanon, Logansport, Michigan City and Monticello will play at Purdue University; and the winners at Angola, Fort Wayne, Goshen, Hartford City, Huntington, Kendallville, Marion, North Manchester, Peru, Portland, Rochester, South Bend, and Warsaw will play at Fort Wayne (South Side High School). Sectional entry blanks may be used for the Regional Series providing the Permanent Secretary is so informed on or before Monday, March 3.

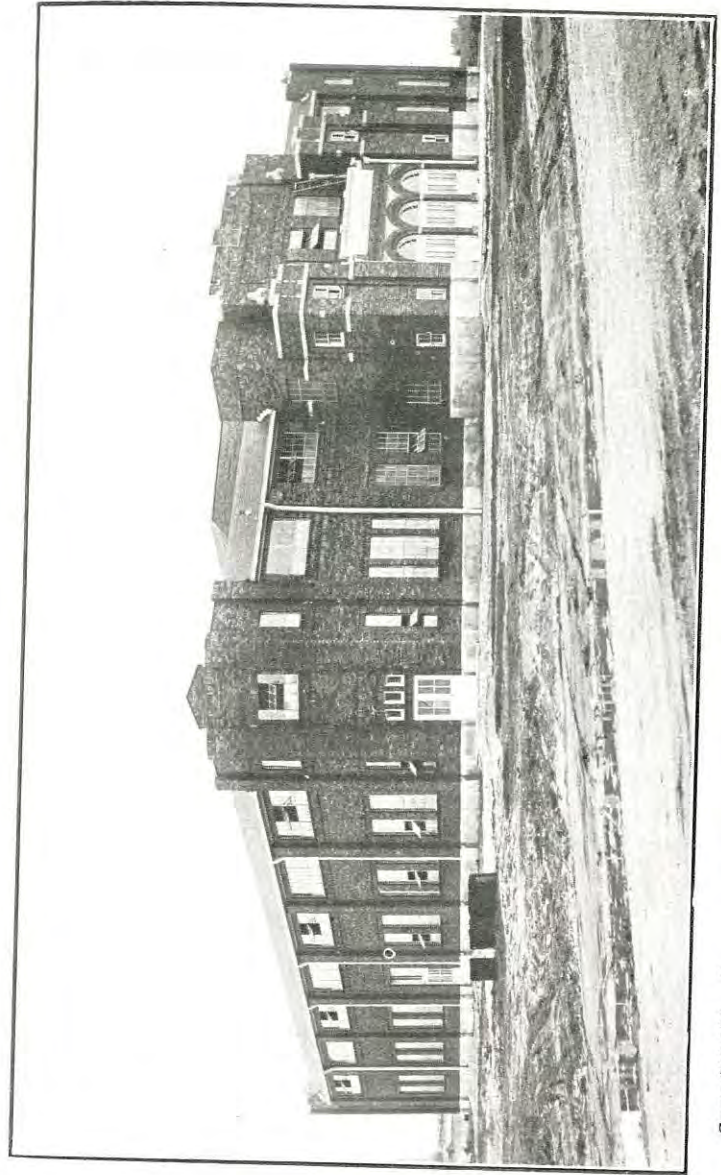

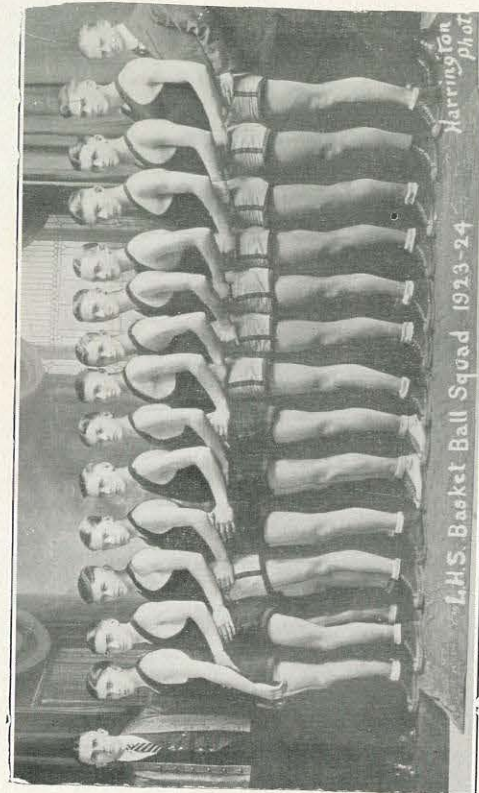

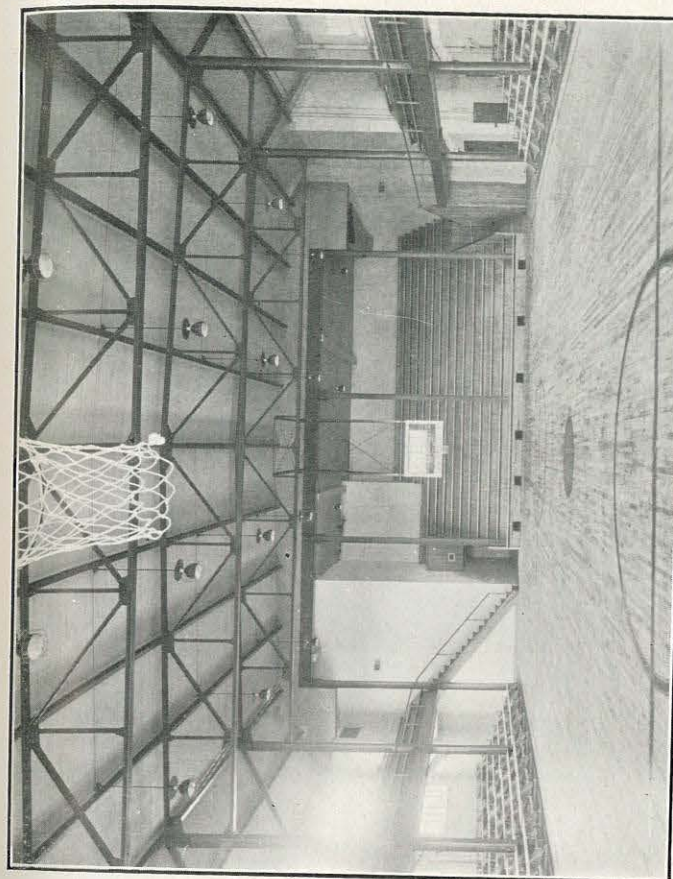

Interpretation of Items

"Expenditures" covers the legitimate expenses of the tourneys other than transportation. "Division" covers the amounts divided on the basis of season tickets sold. "I. H. S. A. A." covers ten percent (10%) of the balance after the legitimate expenses were paid and after the center high school received one hundred dollars (\$100.00). "Center" covers the amounts received by the center schools for holding the tourneys and for the division on basis of season tickets sold.

All sectional tourney reports were made as follows:—Out of the gross receipts legitimate expenses other than transportation were paid first; the center school received \$100.00 second; the I. H. S. A. A. received 10% of the second balance third; the transportation of the teams were paid fourth; the center school received \$100.00 fifth; and the balance was divided among the competing schools on the basis of season tickets sold prior to February 28. These items were considered in order and the reports terminated when the money was exhausted.

The regional tourney reports were made as follows:—All expenses were paid and the balance was divided equally between the I. H. S. A. A. and the center school.

The final tourney report was made as follows:—All expenses were paid and the balance was divided on the basis of sixty percent (60%) to the I. H. S. A. A. and forty percent (40%) to the center schools.

GIMBEL PRIZE FOR MENTAL ATTITUDE

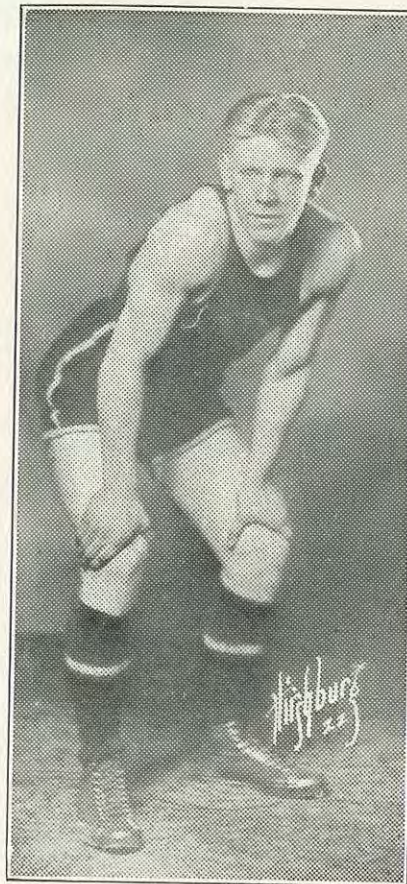
In 1917 Jake Gimbel of Vincennes presented to the I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control a proposal to give a prize each year at the State Basketball tourney to the boy among the teams represented that showed the best mental attitude throughout the tourney. Mr. Gimbel did not have in mind the quality of the playing of any boy on any team, but did have in mind the qualities that belong to a real gentleman. He clearly recognized the mental and moral strain under which the players play during the tourney and he also recognized the numerous opportunities for the players to lose control of themselves and to do something not conducive to true sportsmanship.

The Board of Control accepted the proposal of Mr. Gimbel and the awarding of this prize known as the "Gimbel Prize for Mental Attitude" has been an annual affair, calling for much favorable comment. The prize and the things it represents are cherished by the players and schools of Indiana. The prize has meant much to real sportsmanship and self-control in the High Schools of the State and it is a prize sought for by all schools. The school to which the winner of this prize belongs claims the winner as their own and accordingly the whole school and the whole community are proud. In a number of cities similar prizes are being given to the players who show the best mental attitude within their own schools. The Gimbel prize and these other similar prizes have exalted in a very real sense the qualities belonging to a gentleman in the minds of our boys and girls.

The following articles of agreement are subscribed to by the Board of Control of the Indiana High School Athletic Association through Arthur L. Trester, Permanent Secretary and..... representing University or High School.

SECTION I.

The date of the Indiana High School Semi-Final Basket Ball Series shall be Friday and Saturday, March 7 and 8.

SECTION II.

The State High School Board of Control through Arthur L. Trester Permanent Secretary, shall furnish the University or High School representative with lists of qualified teams and the names of the men on the respective teams, on or before Tuesday, March 4.

SECTION III.

The University or High School representative shall provide free entertainment for the respective teams of nine men, which shall include one Faculty Manager for each team, between the hours of 10 a. m. Friday, March 7 and 8 a. m. Sunday, March 9. If possible this period of entertainment will be shortened by the Board of Control. All teams are entitled to entertainment throughout the series.

SECTION IV.

The University or High School representative shall provide tickets, door-men, ushers, announcers, scorers, timekeepers, basket balls, and all necessary equipment for the game. No prizes whatever are to be given by any one.

SECTION V.

The matter of complimentary tickets shall be in the hands of the University or High School representative, who shall issue them to the Press, the officials, and to the helping students. All men on the competing teams and one Faculty Manager for each team are to be admitted to the Series.

SECTION VI.

The I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control shall select and assign the officials for the games not included in Section IV.

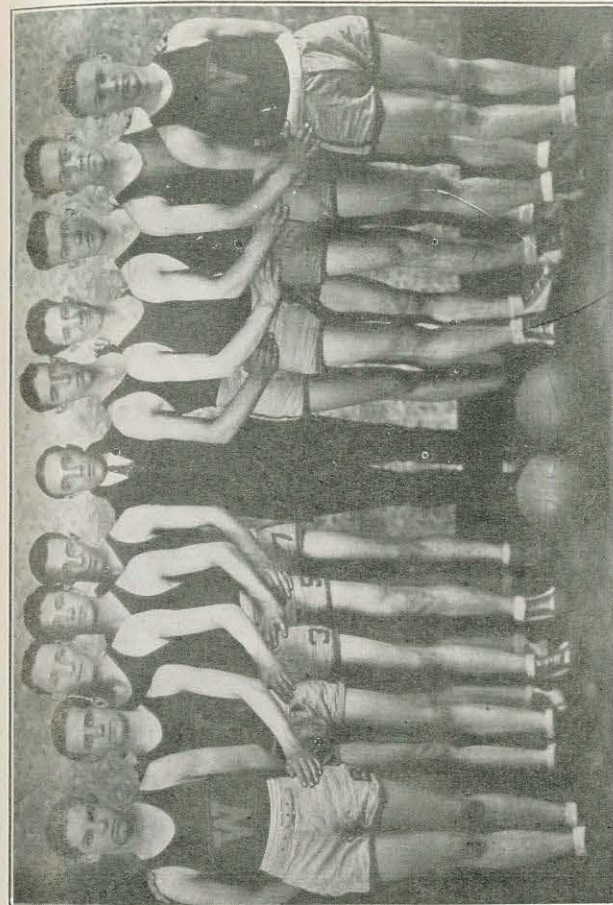

ARTICLES OF CONTRACT

Anderson, Indiana, January, 1924.

The following Articles of Agreement are subscribed to by the Indiana High School Athletic Association, through Arthur L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, and representing the "Indianapolis High Schools."

SECTION I.

The dates of the Indiana High School Final Basket Ball Tourney shall be March 14 and 15, 1924, at Indianapolis, Indiana, on the Coliseum Floor.

SECTION II.

The High School Board of Control, through Arthur L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, shall furnish with lists of qualified teams and the names of the men on the respective teams, on or before March 11, 1924.

SECTION III.

The Indianapolis High Schools' representative shall provide free entertainment for the respective teams of eight men each, together with one attendant and one Faculty Manager for each team, between the hours of 4:00 p. m. Thursday, March 13 and 8:00 a. m. Sunday, March 16.

SECTION IV.

The Indianapolis High Schools' representative shall provide tickets, gate men, announcers, scorers, timekeepers and all necessary equipment for the Tourney. He shall further provide a suitable shield for the school winning the Tourney and badges for the individual members of the winning team. The standard design of the I. H. S. A. A. shall be used.

SECTION V.

The matter of complimentary tickets shall be in the hands of the Indianapolis High Schools' representative, who shall issue them to the representatives of the Press, the High School officials and to the helping students. The men of the competing teams, with one attendant and one Faculty Manager for each team, are to be admitted free to the Tourney. The members of the Board of Control and the Permanent Secretary shall be furnished with official badges and reserved seats.

SECTION VI.

The High School Board of Control shall choose and assign the officials other than those mentioned in Section IV.

SECTION VII.

The admissin fee shall be forty (40) cents for single session tickets and one dollar and a half (\$1.50) for season tickets.

SECTION VIII.

The financial settlement shall be made as follows:

First, all legitimate expenses shall be paid from the gross receipts and second, the balance shall be divided on the basis of sixty percent (60%) to the I. H. S. A. A. and forty percent (40%) to the Indianapolis High Schools.

SECTION IX.

The Indianapolis High Schools shall pay seventy-five dollars (\$75) each to the officials chosen by the Board of Control, and also, expenses of the Board of Control incurred on account of the Tourney. All expense accounts shall be submitted by both parties at the time of settlement.

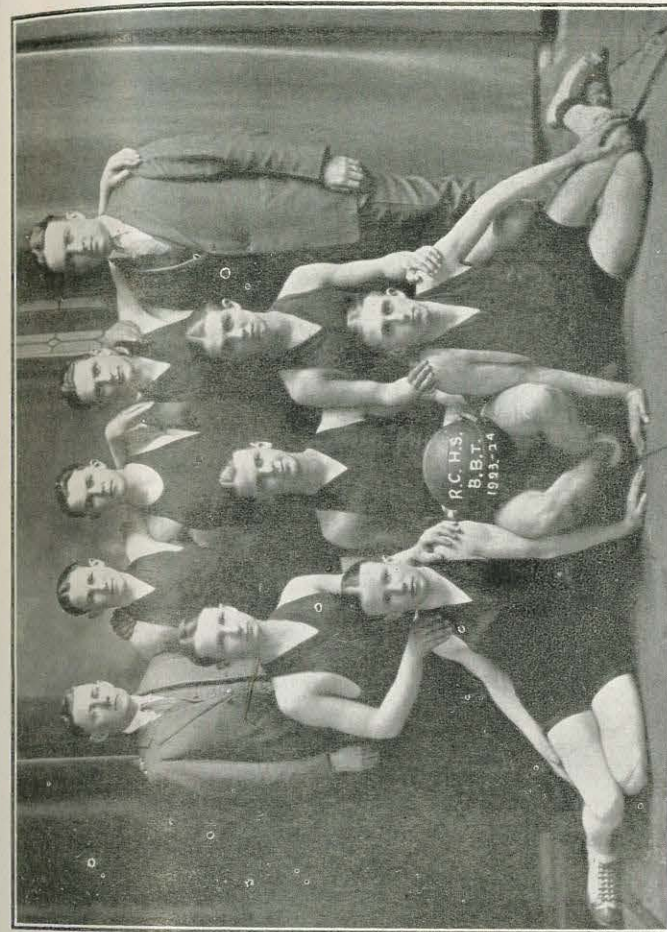
SECTION X.

THE THIRTEENTH ANNUAL.

The sixteen teams in the Final Tourney have survived the elimination games in fifty-two (52) sectional and four (4) regional tourneys. All schedules for all tourneys were drawn by lot.

The officials have been assigned by the Board of Control and no changes will be made. Their decisions will be final.

The admission fee for each session shall be forty (40) cents and for a season ticket one dollar fifty cents (\$1.50).

A bronze shield will be presented to the winning team and gold watch fobs will be presented to each of the eight members of the winning team at the close of the tourney. This team will be considered the State Championship Basketball Team in the I. H. S. A. A. for 1924.

A medal, known as the "Gimbel Prize for Mental Attitude" will be given to the player showing the best mental attitude during the tourney.

No other prizes shall be awarded by any one.

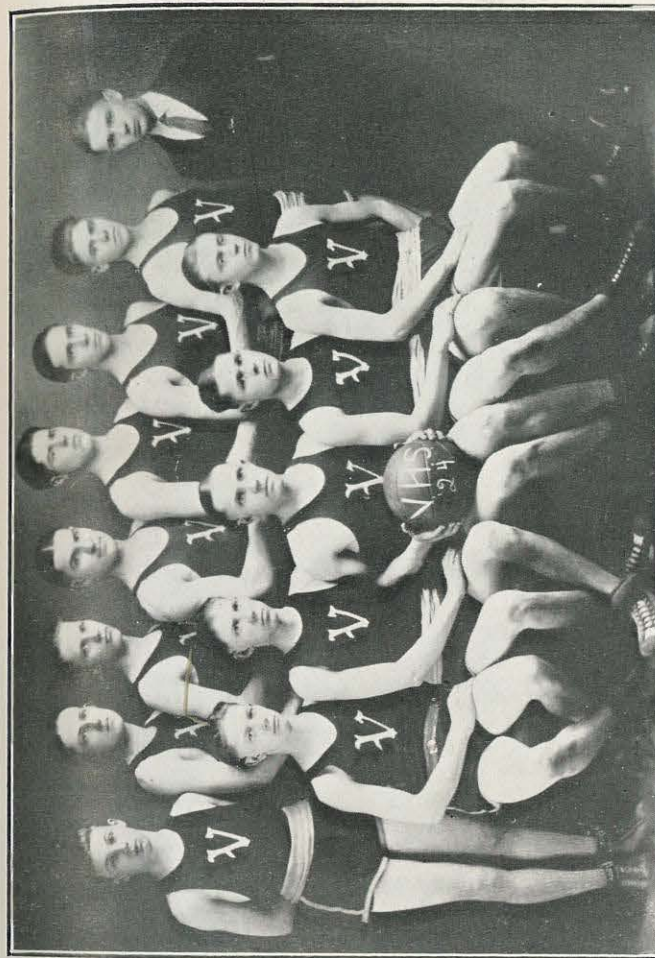

TRACK AND FIELD

Although the weather was unfavorable during the spring months there was increased interest and participation in track and field work. Dual meets, triangular meets and sectional meets were held in many places during the season.

Increased attention to the management of the meets and the training of the participants brought forth increased popularity for track and field work. Efforts were made in all meets to use less time in the conduct of the events and the public appreciated these attempts. The I. H. S. A. A. must continue, however, to cut down the time devoted to running off track meets. Too much time is consumed by unnecessary delays of one kind and another. As a result we do not have the crowds that we should have at these events. We can not expect many persons to give a whole half day to a track meet when the meet should be run off on time and in two hours or less time.

There were one hundred forty-two (142) teams entered in fifteen (15) sectional meets and there were fourteen hundred sixty-six (1466) boys entered in these meets. Walters of Kokomo set a new record of 22 seconds in the 220 yard dash. Henderson of Brazil set a new record of 26.1 seconds in the 220 yard hurdle. Bell of Whitestown set a new record of 47 ft. 6.6 inches in the Shot Put. Morrow of Wabash set a new record of 12 ft. 3.78 inches in the Pole Vault. Christie, Deater, Misner and Walters of Kokomo set a new record of 3:36 4-5 minutes in the Mile Relay.

Of the one hundred forty-two (142) teams entered in the sectional meets ninety-one (91) were entitled to enter the final meet by winning a first or second place in a sectional meet. Twenty-seven (27) teams won points in the State final meet.

The following schools were sectional track and field winners: Vincennes, Brazil, Elkhart, Noblesville, Reitz (Evansville), Fairmount, Central (Fort Wayne), Emerson (Gary), Technical (Indianapolis), Kokomo, Crawfordsville, Rochester, Rennselaer, Richmond and Scottsburg.

Kokomo won the final track and field meet held at Technical High School, Indianapolis, and thus won the State championship in Track and Field for 1924.

Each contestant in these meets must have previously made, in a fair test, a record equal to the following in every event in which he is entered:

The above, together with a mile relay and a half-mile relay, will constitute the events of the Meets. Winning first place in any event counts five points; second place, three points; and third place, one point. Points in the relays will not be counted in determining the winning team. In case of a tie in any event the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot. No contestant will be permitted to run in both relay races.

The order of events is as follows:

Track Events—100 yard dash trial; 120 yard hurdle trial; 100 yard dash final; one mile run; 440 yard run; 120 yard hurdle final; 220 yard dash trial; 220 yard hurdle trial; 880 yard run; 220 yard dash final; 220 yard hurdle final; mile relay; half-mile relay.

Field Events—Running high jump; shot put; pole vault; running broad jump.

SECTIONAL TRACK AND FIELD MEETS, MAY 10.

The following bases were used in selecting centers:

(1) Location—geographical with reference to schools desiring to participate. (2) Transportation accommodations. (3) General conditions—attitude of local authorities, tracks, fields, entertaining facilities, etc. (4) Existing organizations.

Schools have been assigned by counties, and the accompanying scheme gives the Centers and the counties, assigned to each Center. The name of your county locates your center. The Board reserves the right to readjust the scheme, if necessary. The numbers indicate the schools from each county that have expressed a desire to enter. Entry blanks are necessary, however.

Management—The management of these meets rests solely with the Board of Control. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center Principals. All officials will be selected by the Center Principal.

The Center Principal shall arrange a program for his Meet from the list of entries sent to him by the Permanent Secretary. All Meets shall begin at 1:00 o'clock, and follow the order of events here given. Places on the track must be assigned by lot. Spalding's National Collegiate Athletic Association Track and Field Rules shall govern except as modified in this announcement regarding scoring, eligibility, events and order of events.

Open Contest—These meets are open to all members of the Association irrespective of their season's record.

Protests—All protests against teams or individuals must be made in writing and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before May 1, at 11 a. m. Protests must be accompanied by evidence.

Entertainment—Two men for each event, four men for each relay team and a faculty manager from each competing school will be entertained by the Center Principal. Entertainment will begin if necessary at 9 a. m. Saturday, May 10 and continue, if necessary, to 8 p. m. Saturday, May 10. All competing schools are requested and expected to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary. Only actual contestants and the faculty manager from each school will be entertained. Since track and field meets usually produce little revenue, all schools are requested to be exceedingly careful in their expenditures.

Expenses—An entrance fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each team must accompany the entry blank to be retained by the I. H. S. A. A. Traveling expenses must be paid by the competing schools.

Privileges—All contestants, one rubber and one faculty manager for each team are to be admitted free to the Meets.

Eligibility—The eligibility of each player must be certified to by the Principal of the school sending the team. The regular blank of the I. H. S. A. A. must be used and all data must be given. Entries positively will close Thursday, May 1. This means that they must be in the hands of the Permanent Secretary, complete in every detail, on that date.

Admission Fee—The admission fee to all meets shall be fifty cents (50c).

Prizes—Suitable ribbons shall be given to the winner of first, second and third places in each event, and to each member of the winning relay teams.

Warnings—Entries close Thursday, May 1 and can not be changed afterwards. An entry fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each team must accompany the entry blank. Special privileges will be granted to no one. Send all entry blanks and money to the Permanent Secretary.

FINAL MEET, INDIANAPOLIS, MAY 17.

Entrants—The winning relay teams and all men winning first and second places in each event in the Sectional Meets shall constitute the participants in the final Meet. One entry fee and one entry blank covers both the sectional and the final Meets.

Entertainment—The Indianapolis High Schools have contracted with the Board to entertain all actual contestants according to the plan just given above. Entertainment will begin, if necessary, at 6 p. m. Friday, May 16 and continue, if necessary, to 8 a. m. Sunday, May 18. All competing schools are requested and expected to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary. Traveling will be at the expense of the competing schools. Since track and field meets usually produce little revenue, all schools are requested to be exceedingly careful in their expenditures. Only actual contestants and the faculty manager from each school will be entertained.

Trial Events—Trials will be held beginning at 10:00 o'clock Saturday morning in the following events: 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash, 120 yard hurdle, 220 yard hurdle, pole vault, shot put, broad jump and high jump.

Races—The following events will be run in two races in the afternoon: 440 yard run, 880 yard run and one mile run. Points and medals will be given for first, second and third place winners in each of the two races for each event. The afternoon events will begin at 1:30 o'clock.

Privileges—All contestants, one rubber and one faculty manager for each team are to be admitted to the Meet.

Admission Fee—The admission fee to the Meet shall be fifty cents (50c).

Management—The management, protests and privileges will be governed according to the regulation pertaining to the Sectional Meets.

Prizes—The Indianapolis High Schools will award the winning school a shield or cup; the winning relay teams, plaques; medals of gold, silver and bronze to the winners of 1st, 2nd and 3rd places respectively in each event.

SECTION I.

The date of the Indiana Sectional High School Track and Field Meets shall be Saturday, May 10, 1924.

SECTION II.

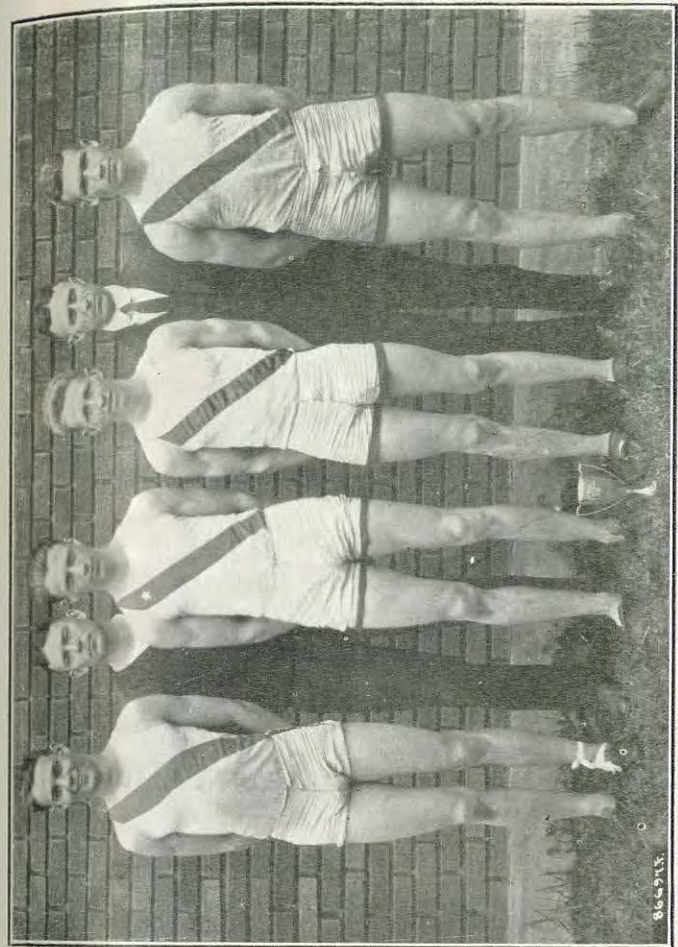
The State High School Board of Control, through Arthur L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, shall furnish the High School representative with lists of qualified teams and the names of the men on the respective teams on or before Monday, May 5.

SECTION III.

The High School representative shall provide free entertainment for the respective teams of four men each for the two relay teams, two men for each event, and a faculty manager for each competing school between the hours of 9:00 a. m. Saturday, May 10 and 8:00 p. m. Saturday, May 10. If possible, this period of entertainment will be shortened by the Board of Control. It is understood that entertainment shall be for contestants and the faculty manager only.

SECTION IV.

The High School representative shall provide tickets, announcers, scorers, timekeepers, judges, a referee, a starter and all necessary equipment and officials for the Meet. He shall select competent men

for all positions. The referee and starter shall be on the approved list of officials in the I. H. S. A. A.

SECTION V.

The matter of complimentary tickets shall be in the hands of the High School representative, who shall issue them to the Press, the officials and to the helping students. All contestants of the competing teams, one rubber and one Faculty Manager for each team are to be admitted free to the Meet.

SECTION VI.

The High School representative shall provide suitable ribbons for first, second and third winners in each event and for each member of the two winning Relay Teams.

SECTION VII.

The admission fee to all Meets shall be fifty (50) cents.

SECTION VIII.

The proceeds of the Meet, after meeting items mentioned in the several items of this contract, shall belong to the High School holding the Meet.

SECTION IX.

The High School under whose auspices the Meet is held promises hearty cooperation with the State Board of Control and the State Board of Control promises as much to the High School conducting the Meet.

SECTION X.

The details of the Meets such as protests, eligibility lists, schedules, etc., are to be cared for by the State Board of Control.

SECTION XI.

The State Board of Control shall manage all Meets and the High Schools are to work under this direction.

SECTION XII.

The High School representative shall send a complete program at the Meet containing all winners, records, distances, etc., by special delivery immediately after the close of the Meet, Saturday, May 10, to Principal K. V. Ammerman, Broad Ripple High School, Indianapolis, and also to the Permanent Secretary. This is very necessary for final meet purposes. 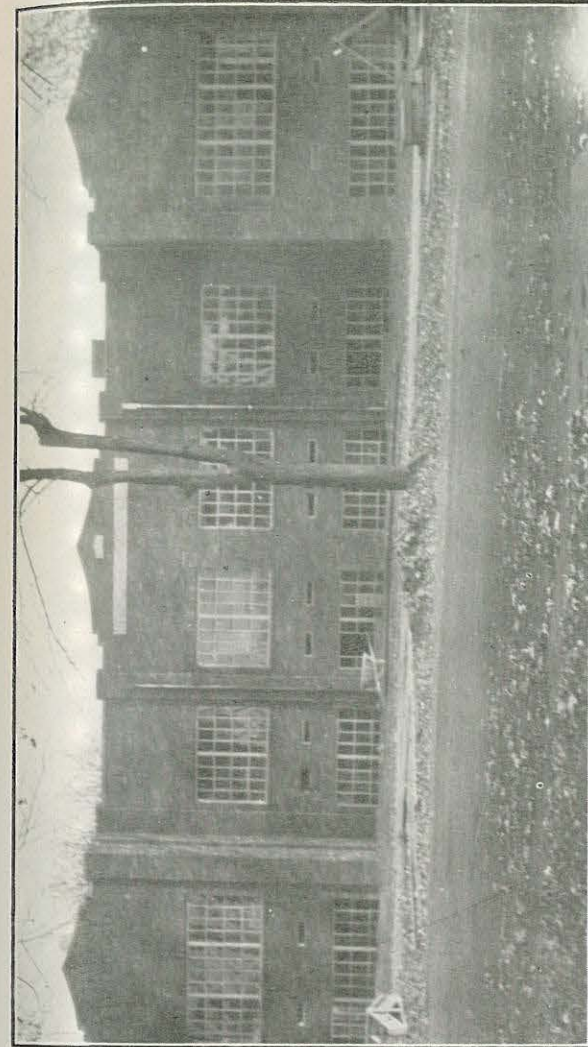

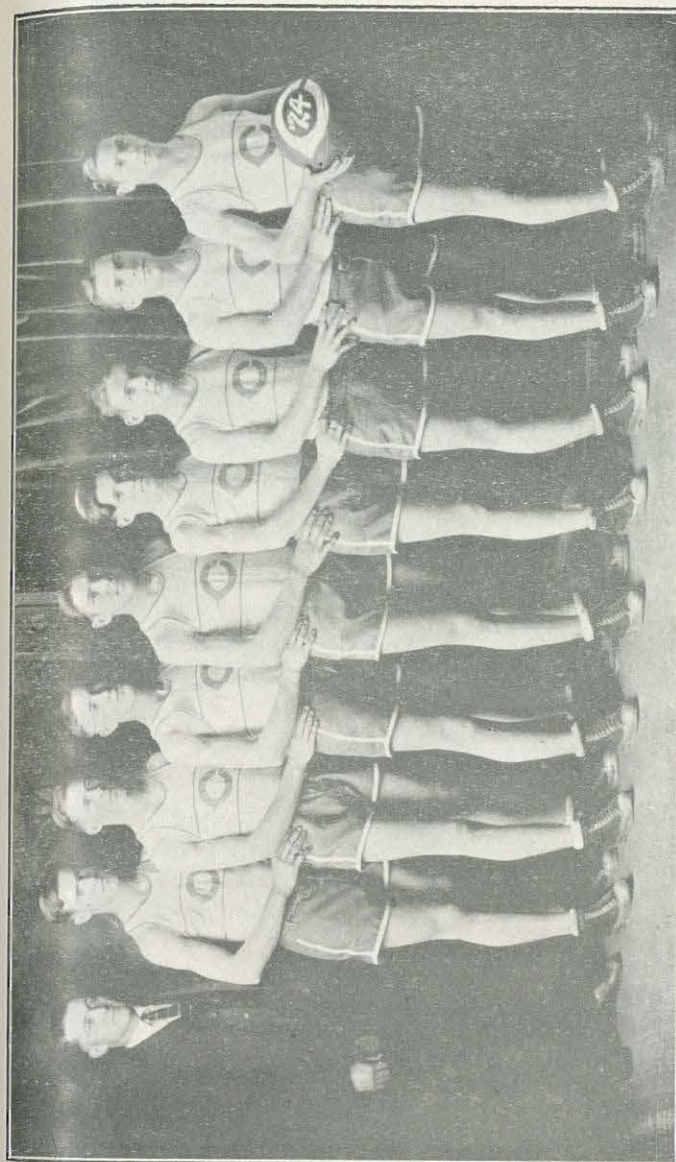

The following Articles of Agreement are subscribed to by the Indiana High School Athletic Association through Arthur L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, and representing the Indianapolis High Schools.

SECTION I.

The date of the Meet shall be Saturday, May 17, 1924, and the beginning time shall be 1:30 o'clock p. m. Trial heats will be held beginning at 10:00 o'clock Saturday morning in the following events: 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash, 120 yard hurdle, 220 yard hurdle, pole vault, shot put, broad jump and high jump.

SECTION II.

The I. H. S. A. A. shall furnish with lists of qualified participants and the events in which they are qualified on or before Monday, May 12, 1924.

SECTION III.

The Indianapolis High Schools shall provide entertainment for all of the men in the 1st and 2nd places in the Sectional Meets; for four men constituting each of the winning relay teams in each Sectional Meet; and for a Faculty Manager for each school represented, between the hours of 6 p. m. Friday, May 16 and 8 a. m. Sunday, May 18. All teams will be asked to request no longer entertainment than is necessary.

SECTION IV.

The Indianapolis High Schools shall provide tickets, gate men, announcers, scorers, timekeepers, judges and all necessary equipment for the Meet. They shall further provide a cup or shield for the winning school, a plaque for each of the two winning relay teams, and medals of gold, silver and bronze for the winners of first, second and third places respectively in each event. No other prizes shall be given by anyone.

SECTION V.

The matter of complimentary tickets shall be in the hands of the Indianapolis High Schools, who shall issue them to the Press, officials, participants, helping students and faculty managers. The members of the Board of Control shall be furnished with at least 12 reserved seats near the finishing line.

The Board of Control has gone on record against the presence of coaches and other representatives from Colléges and Universities proselyting at the contests of the I. H. S. A. A., and such is not to be permitted at this Meet.

SECTION VI.

The I. H. S. A. A. shall sanction the choice of Referee and Starter selected by the Indianapolis High Schools.

SECTION VII.

The admission fee shall be fifty (50) cents to all.

SECTION VIII.

The Indianapolis High Schools shall keep any balance and stand any deficit incurred by the Meet.

SECTION IX.

An itemized financial statement covering all receipts and disbursements shall be filed with Arthur L. Trester when final settlement is made.

SECTION X.

The events and order of events shall be as listed in the 1923 Handbook of the I. H. S. A. A. and the N. C. A. A. Track and Field Rules shall govern. All exceptions will be found on page 108 in the 1923 Handbook of the I. H. S. A. A. and in Bulletin Number XI.

SECTION XI.

Traveling will be entirely at the expense of the competing schools.

SECTION XII.

The general management shall rest with the I. H. S. A. A. but all local arrangements shall be in the hands of the Indianapolis High Schools.

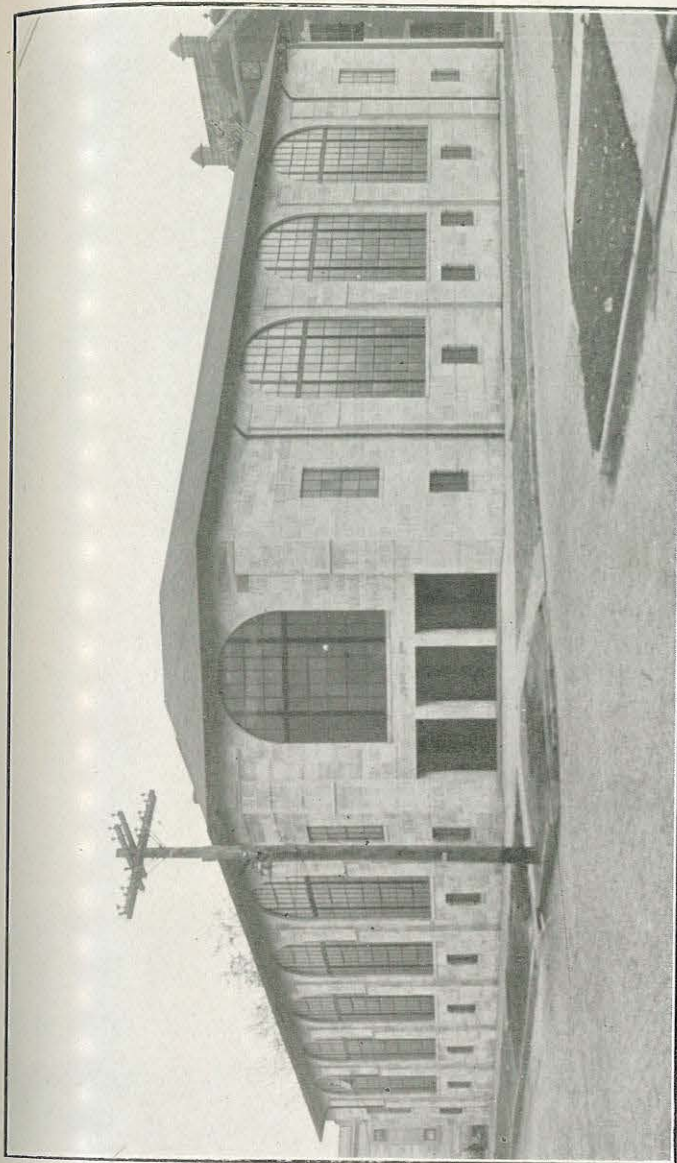

FOOTBALL

This sport is growing in popularity as the past season shows that eighty-two (82) schools played the game. Last year there were seventy-six (76) teams in the State. Increased attention has been given to playing fields, officials, training and physical fitness. At present some of the High Schools in the State have excellent play fields and excellent facilities for caring for the crowds. High School football will continue to grow in favor in Indiana if the game is kept clean, the management is kept efficient, the coaching is kept high class, the gambling element is kept suppressed and physical fitness is stressed at all times.

The Board of Control has never determined the State Championship team in football as it knows of no satisfactory way of doing so. Any claims to the championship are not official although made by an undefeated team. Such claims should be given no serious consideration as anyone can claim the championship but no one has won it. There is no such championship in the I. H. S. A. A.

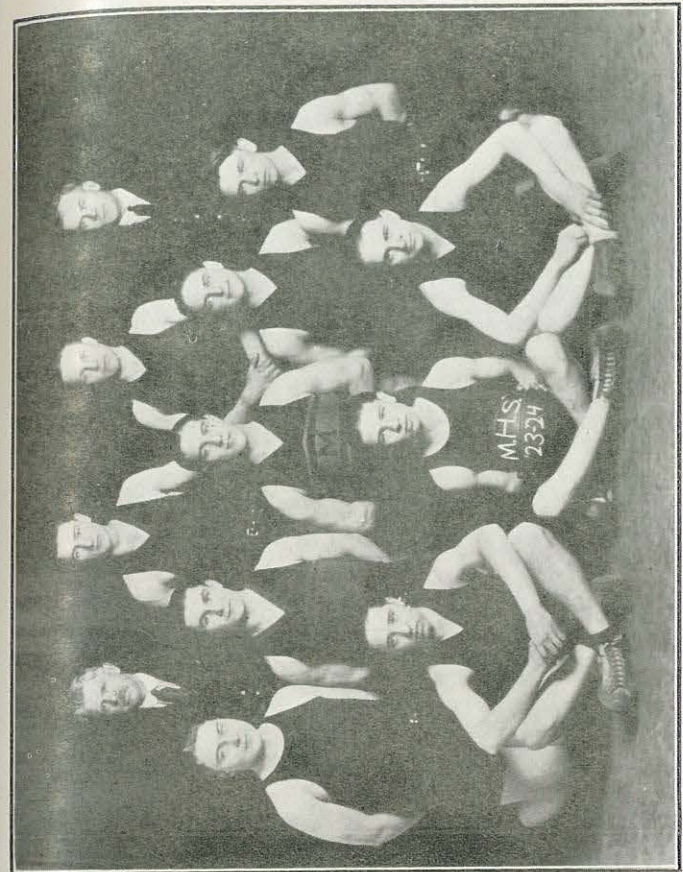

MINUTES OF MEETINGS OF BOARD OF CONTROL

BLOOMINGTON, INDIANA, NOV. 24, 1923.

The Board met at eleven (11:00) o'clock in the Commerce Building Indiana University, Bloomington, Indiana. All members and the Permanent Secretary were present.

Greensburg presented evidence regarding the eligibility of Walter Harker. The Board declared the boy ineligible for all inter-school athletics until the beginning of semester two of this school year, due to his changing schools for a few days at the beginning of the present semester without changing his residence.

Attica presented evidence regarding the eligibility of Clifford Watkins. The Board declared the boy ineligible until he has been enrolled in Attica one full semester.

Brookville presented evidence regarding the official work of Referee Best and regarding the sportsmanship of Brookville. The Board decided that there existed no cause for action in either case.

Worthington and Linton gave evidence in the case between these two schools. The Board continued the case.

Lafayette and Wabash gave evidence regarding a partly played game of football between these two schools. The Board decided (1) That the game was poorly managed by Lafayette, (2) That Wabash should have played the entire game even if all was not as it should be, (3) That the Referee should have arranged ground rules prior to the game, (4) That Lafayette be placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1924, and (5) That the decision of the Board be printed in the local papers of both cities, be read to both High Schools and that complete copies of the papers carrying the decision be sent to the Permanent Secretary.

R. K. Story of Midland was declared ineligible until the beginning of semester two of this school year, due to change of schools without a change of residence.

George Hendricks and Hubert Hendricks of Cloverdale were declared ineligible until the beginning of semester two of this school year due to change of schools without a change of residence. Cloverdale was instructed to write letters to the opposing schools of this semester, stating the ineligibility of the boys, forfeiting the games won in which these boys have participated and requesting the opposing schools to notify the Permanent Secretary that such a letter had been received.

Supt. Spencer of the Tipton County Schools requested a statement regarding alumni games and the Board explained that alumni games had always been considered as games and that all of the rules and regulations should govern such games.

GREENCASTLE, INDIANA, DEC. 1, 1923.

The Board of Control met at nine (9) o'clock Saturday morning in Greencastle. All members, except Principal Posey, and the Permanent Secretary were present.

The question of the professionalism of Paul Harrold of Muncie was considered and continued for lack of sufficient evidence.

The Stewartsville-Haubstadt controversy was continued until Principal Posey completed his investigation and made his report.

The Board decided that the rules and policy of the I. H. S. A. A. prevented the membership of the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Home School at Knightstown in the I. H. S. A. A.

It was decided that the rules and policy of the I. H. S. A. A. prevented the membership of the Indiana Masonic Home School at Franklin in the I. H. S. A. A.

Culver Military Academy had asked if participation in their track, swimming, golf and tennis work by High School students during the summer would make the students ineligible for High School athletics. The Board decided that such participation would not make the students ineligible.

All of the students of the Garrett and Avilla High Schools, who participated in a game of basketball at Garrett on November 24 without the knowledge or sanction of the school authorities of either school, were declared ineligible for the entire basketball season.

The Board decided that the following statements should govern Girls' Basketball:

1. Girls can not play by boys' rules under any condition.
2. The three-court plan shall be used unless mutual consent is secured for using the two-court plan.
3. Six girls shall constitute a team.
4. Spalding's Guide for Women shall govern all else.
5. The rules of the I. H. S. A. A. govern girls as well as boys.

The details of the several tourneys in basketball in the I. H. S. A. A. were considered and the following was decided:

1. The contracts for sectional, regional and final tourneys shall be the same as in 1923, with the exception that the responsibility for one-half of the deficit be omitted from the regional contracts.

2. The pay of tourney officials was fixed at fifty dollars (\$50) for the sectional and regional and seventy-five dollars (\$75) for the State Final Tourney.

3. The admission prices were set at forty cents (40c) for single session and one dollar fifty cents (\$1.50) for season tickets in the sectional, regional and state final tourneys with the provision that an adjustment should be made in case there were some small tourneys.

The "Data Cards" regarding the pay of officials were considered and the Board of Control decided to publish the results, provide blank contracts for officials and state that it did not appear wise nor feasible to definitely fix the pay of officials.

It was decided to re-word and re-classify the constitution, print it separately and submit it to the membership for suggestions and corrections before definitely deciding on it.

The National Collegiate Athletic Association Rules for Track and Field were sanctioned by the Board with the understanding that the events, the order of events, the eligibility in the events and the counting scheme shall remain as they have been in the I. H. S. A. A.

It was decided to hold the State Track and Field meet at Indianapolis under the auspices of the Indianapolis High Schools.

The Board went on record in favor of assigning all of the schools of a county to the same sectional tourney if such could be done satisfactorily.

It was decided that in Gymnasiums having no "out-of-bounds" other than the walls, that the ball should be considered "out-of-bounds" whenever it touches the walls. A player, however, should not be considered "out-of-bounds" when touching the walls. Out-of-bounds lines should be used wherever possible.

The invitations to hold tourneys were gone over and no selections were made for any tourneys. Discussion was given to High School gymnasiums as centers for regional tourneys.

The selection of officials was considered and the Permanent Secretary was authorized to employ such after the Board members had made their written recommendations of officials.

The New Haven-Harlan controversy was considered and upon a promise that the case would be settled satisfactorily soon by both Principals no action was taken other than that both Principals shall notify the Permanent Secretary that a satisfactory settlement has been reached at an early date.

The meeting adjourned to meet in Anderson at ten (10) o'clock Saturday, December 29, all new members of the Board of Control to be invited to attend the next meeting.

ANDERSON, INDIANA, DEC. 29, 1923.

The Board of Control met at 9:00 o'clock in the office of the Permanent Secretary. All members of the old Board, the newly elected member, Supt. Baird, and the Permanent Secretary were present.

The vote cards submitted in the elections for Board Members were gone over and checked by the members of the Board of Control. The results, as announced by the Permanent Secretary, were declared correct.

It was decided, since there were two members of the Board who had served two years, that Principal Posey should be the President of the Board until July 1, 1924 and that Supt. Allman should be President from then until January 1, 1925.

A copy of the constitution of the I. H. S. A. A. in re-classified and re-worded form was given to each Board Member by the Permanent Secretary with the request that they submit their suggestions and reactions soon.

The details of the basketball tourneys were considered carefully and the Permanent Secretary was authorized to print an announcement covering the tourneys completely. The Permanent Secretary was also authorized to secure contracts with centers and officials for all tourneys.

It was decided that the Permanent Secretary should secure a straw vote from the Principals regarding the holding of tourneys under University and High School auspices.

The Board decided to not approve High School students as officials in the I. H. S. A. A.

The Board recommended basketball tourney dates for 1925 as follows: Sectional March 6 and 7; regional March 13 and 14; and final March 20 and 21.

ECONOMY—James Lundy declared ineligible for basketball since he had played in a High School team for four years although he was an eighth grade student during one of these years.

EVANSVILLE COURIER—The Board decided that teams in High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. would jeopardize their standing by participating in games or tourneys held under auspices other than the High Schools concerned or the Board of Control.

KNIGHTSTOWN—Verne Jordan declared ineligible for the present semester due to grades. All games in which he participated this year forfeited to opponents.

BREMEN—Elmore Rice declared ineligible for this school year due to changing schools. All games in which he participated this year forfeited to opponents.

PIMENTO-FAIRBANKS—Referee Walter Horner placed on pro-

bation for this basketball season. The score of the game stands as given. Both Principals warned regarding their duties and responsibilities in handling games.

SELMA-MOORELAND—Referee Philip White placed on probation for this basketball season. Both Principals warned regarding their duties and responsibilities in handling games.

SOUTH WHITLEY-CHURUBUSCO—Continued.

SPURGEON and WINSLOW—All students who participated in a game of basketball with the Turners of Evansville under assumed names and without the sanction of the school authorities, declared ineligible for this basketball season.

WORTHINGTON-LINTON—Continued.

FORTVILLE—Perry Bixler declared ineligible for all inter-school athletics due to time in school. All games in which he participated this year forfeited to opponents.

FREELAND PARK—John Edwards declared ineligible for basketball due to time in school and changing schools. All games in which he participated this year forfeited to opponents.

GARRETT-AVILLA—Previous decision of Board stands.

HARLAN-NEW HAVEN—Continued.

HEBRON-DeMOTTE—Principals agreed to reach a satisfactory settlement and to give increased attention to all athletic affairs in the future.

MELLOTT-PERRYVILLE—Cancellation of game by Mellott because Perrysville refused to play the walls "out-of-bounds" declared legal.

STEWARTSVILLE-HAUBSTADT—Principals agreed to reach a satisfactory settlement and to give increased attention to all athletic affairs in the future.

SWEETSER-VAN, BUREN—Referee Arnold Merrill placed on probation during the present basketball season. Both schools placed on probation until June 1, 1924.

The meeting adjourned to meet at nine (9) o'clock Saturday morning, January 19, in the Lincoln Hotel, Indianapolis.

* INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA, JAN. 19, 1924.

The Board of Control met at 9:00 o'clock Saturday morning, January 19, in the Lincoln Hotel. All members and the Permanent Secretary were present.

The Permanent Secretary had submitted to each member of the Board a re-worded and re-arranged copy of the Constitution of the I. H. S. A. A. Discussion was given to this wording and the Board

instructed that the constitution in its new form be printed and sent to the Principals for suggestions before being adopted finally.

NEW HAVEN-HARLAN—The contest was declared "no game" as far as the score was concerned. Harlan was placed on probation until June 1, 1924. Referee Zimmerman and Coach Heine warned regarding their respective duties in games. These decisions were made because the contest was unsatisfactory and the blame widespread.

PATRIOT-VEVAY—The case was dropped on account of lack of evidence and failure of Patriot to be present as requested. Vevay was represented by the Principal and the Referee in the game in question.

LAKEVILLE-BREMEN—Case continued.

WORTHINGTON-LINTON—Mr. Posey requested to investigate and report his findings at an early date.

SOUTH WHITLEY-CHURUBUSCO—Referee Thompson placed on probation until June 1, 1924.

EVANSVILLE COLLEGE—Request to sanction an invitational tourney under the auspices of the College refused by the Board of Control.

EVANSVILLE COURIER—Request to sanction an invitational tourney under the auspices of the Evansville Courier refused by the Board of Control.

SCIPIO, BUTLERVILLE and HAYDEN—All students who changed schools from Hayden to Scipio and Butlerville without a change of residence of the parents to a new school district declared ineligible until they have been enrolled one full semester with the understanding that parts of two semesters do not make a semester.

PRINCETON—Robert Martin declared ineligible for basketball and Princeton instructed to forfeit to the opponents all games won this year in which this boy played with the request that these opponents notify the Permanent Secretary that such has been done.

HARDINSBURG—Victor Davis declared ineligible due to change of schools and Hardinsburg instructed to forfeit to the opponent games won in which this boy participated with the request that the Principals notify the Permanent Secretary that such has been done.

The selection and assignment of officials was discussed at length and the Permanent Secretary was instructed to employ and assign a sufficient and competent number of officials for all tourneys.

The dummy schedules for tourneys of all sizes were discussed in regard to hours, days and sessions and the Permanent Secretary was authorized to have such ready for the drawings later.

The assignment and transfer of schools was discussed in the light of several requests from over the State, and the Board decided to

hold no tourneys having more than 16 teams nor less than 8 teams entered. The Board also decided to stick to the assignments as made unless unforeseen conditions make a few changes necessary later when the entries are received.

The question of holding regional tourneys under the auspices of High Schools or Universities was discussed in the light of the cards returned on this question by the High School Principals.

The drawings for the regional tourneys and the final tourney were made by the Board of Control.

INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA, FEB. 22 AND 23, 1924.

The Board of Control met in the Lincoln Hotel, Indianapolis at 7:00 p. m., Friday, February 22 and at 9:00 a. m. Saturday, February 23. All members and the Permanent Secretary were present.

Officials for all tourneys,—sectional, regional and final, were assigned by the Board.

The request of Oolitic to be transferred from the Bedford Tourney was not granted by the Board of Control.

The Worthington-Linton case was considered and Linton was suspended from the I. H. S. A. A. until January 1, 1925 for playing Russell Hewlitt in football when he was 21 years of age according to the evidence in the hands of the Board.

Francesville was instructed to notify all of their opponents in basketball that Cleo Fenstermaker was ineligible and that they forfeited all games in which he played this season. The right to the championship of the county tourney in basketball was taken from Francesville. Francesville was instructed to request all of their opponents to notify the Permanent Secretary that the provisions of this decision had been carried out.

The Board re-affirmed former decisions to the effect that all so-called practice games with teams not representing the home school should be classified as games and so counted on the regular schedule.

Assignments of teams to tourneys so that no center would have not less than eight (8) teams nor more than sixteen (16) teams were made. All schedules for all of the sectional tourneys were then drawn by lot by the Board.

It was decided that no substitutions on the entry blanks should be permitted after the announced date, Monday, February 18.

The boys who played on a mixed team against the Leo Independents declared ineligible for the present season.

The eligibility of Herbert Valk of Montmorenci was considered but no decision was given due to incomplete evidence.

Milton Brooks of Greensfork was declared ineligible by the Board for any athletics for the present semester due to failing to pass in three regular High School subjects last semester.

INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA, MARCH 15, 1924.

The Board of Control met in the Claypool Hotel at Indianapolis at five o'clock Saturday afternoon, March 15. All members and the Permanent Secretary were present.

A number of players were considered for the winner of the Gimbel Prize and after a careful weighing of all information Phillip Kessler of Richmond was unanimously chosen as the winner.

The Board re-affirmed its stand on the stipulation regarding legitimate expenses in all sectional tourneys that all permanent improvements should not be considered as tourney expenses.

A proposed relay race to be given under the auspices of the Elks of Muncie was refused sanction by the Board of Control.

The Board refused the request of the Olympic Games Fund Committee to assist in a financial way from the funds of the I. H. S. A. A. because the Board felt that it had no such authority.

The Board adjourned to meet at Anderson at ten o'clock Saturday, March 29th.

ANDERSON, INDIANA, MARCH 29, 1924.

The Board met at 10:00 A. M. Saturday, March 29 in Anderson. All members, except Supt. Allman, who was sick, and the Permanent Secretary were present.

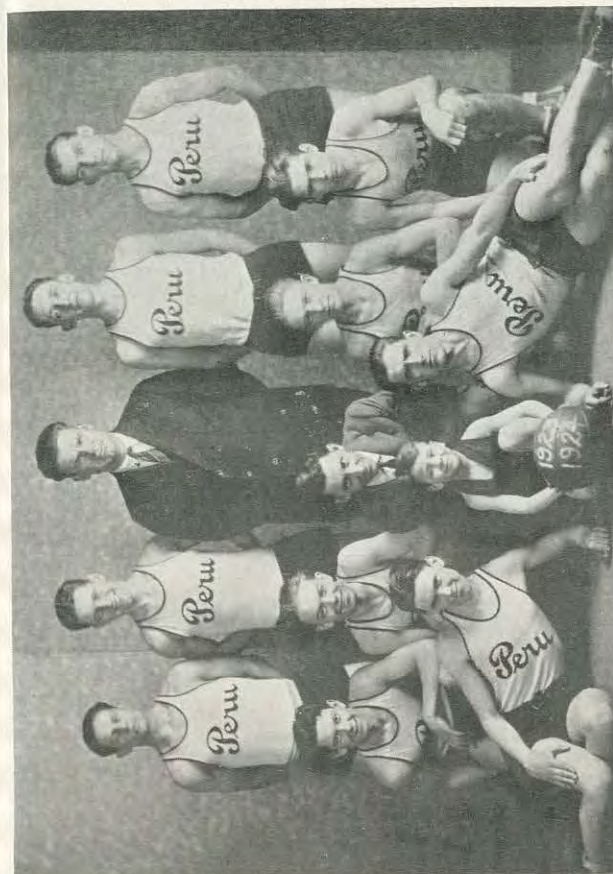
The following decisions were made by the Board after careful considerations had been given to the cases and the questions for settlement:

SHELBURN—Suspended from the I. H. S. A. A. until January 1, 1925 for playing Reuben Denbo in football and basketball this school year, as the evidence is clear that the boy had been enrolled in High School for four years prior to the present school year.

GARY—The items listed under "Help" in the financial report for the Gary Sectional Basketball Tourneys were considered as expenses belonging to Gary and not to the sectional tourney.

The Board objected to the two-mile relay run by four men as an event in the Gary invitational meet as an event too strenuous for High School boys.

CROWN POINT-WHITING—The decisions of the Referee in the final sectional tourney game at Gary were sustained and the alleged

influences listed in the protest by Crown Point were found to be rumors only.

WORTHINGTON-LINTON—The end of the period of suspension of the Linton High School from the I. H. S. A. A. was placed at July 1, 1924, rather than January 1, 1925. The Board holds that it is the duty and responsibility of the High School Principal to definitely prove eligibility of contestants before certifying and using them in any athletic activities.

WEST LAFAYETTE-LAFAYETTE-MONTMORENCI—Montmorenci was instructed to send letters to the Principals of the opposing schools having games with Montmorenci in which Herbert Vaulk participated on and after December 25, 1923, forfeiting the games and requesting the Principals to notify the Permanent Secretary that such letters had been received.

FLORA—The case concerns the sportsmanship of Cutler and Delphi and the officiating. The case was continued.

FRANKLIN—The question of the status of the Masonic High School at Franklin was considered in the light of all correspondence on file and the Board decided that, under arrangements made and agreed upon between the I. H. S. A. A. and Supt. Williams of the Franklin City Schools several months ago, the students of the Masonic High School are bound by the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. in every way.

The Permanent Secretary was authorized to invest such surplus money in the I. H. S. A. A., above the amount needed for current expenses, in Government Securities.

The Board re-affirmed former decisions and rulings regarding students, who play Basketball on teams other than their own High School teams after the State Final Tourney. All students, who participate in basketball games after the State Final Tourney on any teams other than their own High School teams, jeopardize their own standing for spring athletics this year and for basketball next year and also jeopardize the standing of their High School in the I. H. S. A. A. The Board considers it the duty and responsibility of the Principals and Coaches to warn all High School students regarding basketball playing and to declare ineligible all violators.

The number of schools desiring to enter sectional track and field meets and the number of schools desiring to entertain such meets were considered by the Board. The Permanent Secretary was authorized to make all arrangements for the sectional meets and the final meet.

The Board considered the advisability and feasibility of holding a State Baseball tourney this year and decided to not sanction such a tourney. It was felt that efforts divided between a track and field

meet and a baseball tourney would not secure the desirable results in either sport. Further, the Principals in their annual meeting did not authorize a baseball tourney in the I. H. S. A. A.

The Board authorized the Permanent Secretary to send out cards to the membership soon to secure a referendum vote on the matter of Principal representation at the next annual meeting.

The Board adjourned at 6:30 p. m. to meet in the Lincoln Hotel, Indianapolis at 10:00 a. m. Saturday, April 19.

LINCOLN HOTEL, INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA, APRIL 19, 1924

The Board of Control of the I. H. S. A. A. met at ten (10) o'clock Saturday, April 19 in the Lincoln Hotel, Indianapolis. All members except President Posey, and the Permanent Secretary were present.

Principal Stuart of Technical High School, Principal Buck of Shortridge High School and Principal McComb of Manual Training High School were present and the details of the contract for the State Track and Field Meet were arranged on the same plan as the contract for last year.

The referendum vote regarding Principal representation and a meeting for coaches and officials was considered carefully by the Board. At date the vote showed that two hundred forty-six (246) Principals favored Principal representation and sixty-two (62) opposed such. One hundred thirty-four (134) Principals favored a meeting for coaches and officials and one hundred fifty-four (154) opposed such. Cards were returned by four hundred nine (409) Principals. The Board decided to arrange the next annual meeting according to the wishes of the Principals as shown by this referendum vote.

The financial reports of the sectional, regional and final basketball tourneys were studied and the Permanent Secretary was instructed to print and distribute a Bulletin soon giving in detail the reports of the tourneys and the holdings of the I. H. S. A. A.

It was decided that students, who played basketball on any team other than their High School team within their own school after the final tourney should be ineligible for all athletics this school year and for basketball until January 1, 1925.

The Board decided to investigate the participation of some students in the schools of Rush County in a Track Meet, who had played basketball after State Final Tourney.

FLORA TOURNEY—The officiating and the sportsmanship at the Flora Sectional Tourney were considered after hearing from many sources of information. The Board desires to make the following statements and to permit the case to rest with these statements:

1. The tourney was handled well by the Flora school authorities.
2. The officiating was not high enough in standard for a sectional tourney.
3. The sportsmanship of some parties from Delphi and Cutler, as well as a few from some other places, was not conducive to high class athletic competition.
4. Responsibility in all I. H. S. A. A. tourneys rests squarely on the shoulders of the Board of Control, the Permanent Secretary, the Center Principal, the participating Principals, the participating coaches and Officials.

TECHNICAL HIGH SCHOOL, INDIANAPOLIS, IND., MAY 17, 1924.

The Board of Control met in the office of Principal Stuart in Technical High School, Indianapolis at 9:30 o'clock. All members and the Permanent Secretary were present.

The participation of several High School boys from the schools of Rush County in a Track Meet at Moscow this spring when they were ineligible due to the fact that they had played basketball after the State Final Tourney, was considered. Principal Lockwood and Coach Zartman of Carthage and Coach Patterson of Webb High School were present. The case was continued until next fall when it will be convenient to reach all of the Principals and Coaches.

The Board re-affirmed its former opinion that coaches were not permitted to accept money for their coaching from any sources other than the school trustees.

INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA, SEPT. 6, 1924.

The Board of Control met in the Claypool Hotel at ten o'clock Saturday morning, September 6. All members and the Permanent Secretary were present.

The re-worded constitution was discussed but no changes were suggested.

The Permanent Secretary presented a financial report of the I. H. S. A. A. covering the year ending July 31, 1924. It showed a cash balance on August 1, 1924 of \$2,699.10 and financial holdings of \$30,838.20. The report was unanimously accepted by the Board and the Board selected G. G. Eppley of Whiting to present a financial report to the Annual Meeting in October.

It was decided to send a credential certificate to the Principals of the High Schools in the I. H. S. A. A. prior to the annual meeting, entitling them to vote in the meeting. The Permanent Secretary

was instructed to secure a suitable hall for the annual meeting and to arrange the details of the meeting.

Supt. Allman and Principal Julian reported on a track meet held last year in Rush County in which some schools participated without the consent of the Principals. A conference was held by these Board members with the Principals and the County Superintendent and a satisfactory settlement was reached.

The Board appointed H. B. Allman to serve as Board member until January 1, 1925 as he had moved from District Number 2 to District Number 4. An election will take place in District Number 2 in December, 1924.

Since Principal Elmer Posey was President of the I. H. S. A. A. from January 1, 1924 to July 1, 1924 and Superintendent H. B. Allman will be President until January 1, 1925, it was decided to place the pictures and addresses to the I. H. S. A. A. of both men in the 1924 Handbook.

The Board re-affirmed the decision of last year that all students who participated in basketball after the State Final Tournament would be ineligible in all spring athletics last year and in basketball this year until January 1, 1925.

It was decided to present the constitution and importance of the National Association of State Athletic Associations to the Annual Meeting so that action on the I. H. S. A. A. becoming an active member could be taken if desired by the High School Principals.

The case of John Wargon of Kentland was considered and it was decided that he would be eligible as far as residence was concerned, as soon as his parents actually move from Morocco to Kentland.

The students in the Syracuse High School, who have been attending other High Schools, were declared eligible since the Syracuse High School is now under control of the Township Trustee.

The Board discussed the basketball tourneys with a view to lessen the strenuousness and with a view to an improvement in the management of the crowds.

A resolution commending Bulletin Number One dated September 1, 1924 was passed unanimously.

Principal Posey reported that the South Western Teachers Association had arranged an athletic session for Principals, coaches, managers and physical training teachers, and that the officers of the association desired the I. H. S. A. A. Board members to be present at the session.

It was decided to recommend that whenever there occurs a difficulty in the color of shirts worn by the members of two contesting teams, the following should govern— (1) The home team should

make the changes necessary, (2) In tourneys a toss of a coin should decide.

The meeting adjourned to meet at ten o'clock Saturday morning, October 4, in the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis.

INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA, OCTOBER 4, 1924.

The Board of Control met in the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis at 10:00 A. M. Saturday, October 4. All members and the Permanent Secretary were present.

EVANSVILLE—Principal Bosse of the Reitz High School presented the case of Shelby Mullen, who participated in boxing matches and accepted remuneration for the same during last summer. The Board declared the boy ineligible for all High School athletics.

PARAGON-MARTINSVILLE—Principal Dyer, Coach Wershing, Russell Whitaker and father, Principal Vandiver, Asst. Principal Williams and Coach Curtis gave evidence regarding the alleged use of "undue influences" being used to secure Russell Whitaker as a student in the Martinsville High School. The Board decided that the evidence did not show that any "undue influences" had been used.

LOGANSPOORT-NOBLESVILLE—A game of football played at Noblesville on September 20 was protested by Principal Mitchell of Logansport on the grounds that the Referee only was approved as an official in the I. H. S. A. A. and that the work of the other officials was not satisfactory. Principal Griffey, Superintendent Stockinger, Coach Buck, Coach Eberhart and Referee Miller were present. The Board declared the contest "no game" as far as the score is concerned and instructed each Principal to have the decision printed in their local papers in their next issues and to send copies of the papers containing the decision to the Permanent Secretary as soon as they are ready for mailing.

BROWNSVILLE—Ralph Winters, Daniel Paddock and William Leonard were declared ineligible for all inter-school athletics as they have been enrolled three years in the Brownsville High School and one year in the Clifton Schools which gave each boy 15 or more hours of High School work during the year.

EAST CHICAGO—The date of birth of Nick Spudic is in question. The Board decided that the evidence is as convincing and conclusive, if not more so, that the boy was 21 years of age March 14, 1923 as it is that he was 20 years of age on that date. He was declared ineligible on account of age.

Copies of the proposals to be presented at the annual meeting were given to the Board members but no discussion was given to them. It was decided, however, that all proposals should be owned

and supported by their makers at the annual meeting and it was also decided to distribute copies of all proposals at the annual meeting.

The meeting adjourned to meet in the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis at 8 o'clock Wednesday evening, October 15.

The Board of Control met at 8:00 o'clock in the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis. All members, except Mr. Eppley, and the Permanent Secretary were present.

The details of the annual meeting were discussed and approved. It was decided to request that the makers of all proposals present the proposals.

EVANSVILLE—Benjamin McDonald of the Bosse School declared ineligible due to the fact that he failed to pass in three regular High School subjects during his last semester in High School.

MERCY—Max Daugherty declared eligible as far as his enrollment and work in the Academy of the Union Christian College is concerned.

NORTH MANCHESTER—George Ogden declared ineligible because he was enrolled and attended High School some time in Lake-ton High School this year.

DALEVILLE—August Barkdull declared eligible at Daleville as far as his attempt to enroll in the Muncie High School is concerned.

KOKOMO—A request from the Y. M. C. A. Physical Director that High School students be permitted to play on Sunday School teams until they are called for participation on the High School teams by the High School was considered but was not granted, as it is in violation of a rule of long standing in the constitution of the I. H. S. A. A.

The Board adjourned to meet at 9 o'clock Friday, October 17 in the Claypool Hotel.

INDIANAPOLIS, INDIANA, OCTOBER 17, 1924.

The Board of Control met at 9 o'clock Friday morning, October 17, in the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis. All members and the Permanent Secretary were present.

The minutes of the annual meeting were gone over carefully and voted correct.

All proposals that were passed at the annual meeting were considered in view of their execution and plans were made to carry them out as they were passed. It was decided to print and distribute the adopted proposals at once and to request that all invitations to hold

tournaments be presented to the Permanent Secretary on or before November 15.

By unanimous vote of the five Board of Control members it was decided to tender the Permanent Secretary, Arthur L. Trester, a contract for three (3) years beginning August 1, 1925 at a salary of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) a year with all other stipulations to be in accord with the contract and agreement now in force. The tender of the Board of Control was accepted and the Permanent Secretary was instructed to draw the contract accordingly and to include the action in the minutes of the Board of Control.

ANNUAL MEETING

The meeting was held at ten (10:00) o'clock Thursday morning in the K. of P. Auditorium and was well attended.

There must have been 300 visitors present and there were 405 certificates signed and presented at the door by the High School Principals having the right to vote.

The reading of the minutes was dispensed with due to the fact that they were printed in the 1923 Handbook.

Mr. Eppley presented the financial report covering the year August 1, 1923 to August 1, 1924 and the financial holdings of the I. H. S. A. A. The report was passed unanimously.

Mr. Eppley presented the question of the I. H. S. A. A. joining the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations and it was voted that the I. H. S. A. A. should join.

The Board presented the re-worded constitution of the I. H. S. A. A. as a report of the Board of Control and it was unanimously accepted with the exception of the stipulation making a two-thirds vote necessary to amend the constitution.

By vote of the Principals all proposals that were received too late for printing and distribution were not permitted to be presented to the meeting.

The following proposals were passed.

The voting representation of all High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. shall be by the Principals or their duly certified faculty managers.

The number of places and scoring in the State Final Track Meet shall be changed so as to give five places in each event with the scoring as follows: First, 5 points; Second, 4 points; Third, 3 points; Fourth, 2 points; Fifth, 1 point.

For the Regional and State Basketball Tournaments, the teams shall be allowed ten players instead of eight. Eight players shall be used in the District Tournaments as before.

The High School Regional Tournaments shall be held under High

School auspices. Final arrangements and selection of centers to be left in the hands of the I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control.

No distribution of funds be made on basis of season tickets sold by any school or schools in any community or communities for any basketball tourneys or track meets.

No High School or University shall reserve a single seat or seats for any one except those designated, by the I. H. S. A. A. (Competing members, coach, officials of tourney, executive committee of the I. H. S. A. A. and press.)

Subject, Expenses—Sectional Tourney Contract.

1st. All legitimate expenses except for travel shall be paid from the gross receipts.

2nd. The center High School shall receive one hundred dollars (\$100.00).

3rd. The I. H. S. A. A. shall receive ten (10) percent.

4th. The transportation shall be paid.

5th. The center High School shall receive one hundred dollars (\$100.00).

6th. The balance shall be divided equally among the competing schools.

7th. Ticket sellers, ticket takers, ushers, janitors, water carriers and helpers to be furnished by the local school and paid for out of the funds it receives as its share for holding the tourney and not charged to the association as tourney expenses.

Subject, Expenses—Regional Tourney Contract.

1st. All legitimate expenses except for travel shall be paid from the gross receipts.

2nd. The center High School or University shall receive two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00).

3rd. The I. H. S. A. A. shall receive ten percent.

4th. The transportation shall be paid.

5th. The Center High School or University shall receive two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00).

6th. The I. H. S. A. A. shall receive fifty percent of the balance.

7th. The remainder shall be divided equally among the competing schools.

8th. Ticket sellers, ticket takers, ushers, janitors and water carriers to be furnished by the local school and such remuneration as they receive to come from the treasury of the local school and not charged to the association as tourney expense.

The Board of Control shall be in session during the District Tournament.

The High School of the Soldiers and Sailors' Orphans Home located near Knightstown, may become a member of the I. H. S. A. A. through the regular procedure.

All other proposals were voted down, tabled, tardy or were not sponsored.

TRACK AND FIELD RULES

The following proposal was passed at the 1923 annual meeting: "The Track and Field Rules shall be so worded and arranged as to conform to current practice and to the National Collegiate Athletic Track and Field Rules."

The Board of Control has studied the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. and the rules of the National Collegiate Athletic Association and in compliance with the above proposal announces the following to govern all track and field meets in the I. H. S. A. A.:

The National Collegiate Athletic Association Track and Field Rules, published by Spalding shall govern with the following exceptions:

I. Rule 2, regarding a Games Committee shall be void.

II. Scoring—

Three places shall be counted in all meets except the state final meet and the places shall count 5, 3 and 1. In the 1924 annual meeting it was voted to score as follows in the State Final Meet: First, 5 points; Second, 4 points; Third, 3 points; Fourth, 2 points; and Fifth, 1 point. Places in the relay races will not count for points. In case of a tie in any event the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.

III. Events—

The events in all meets shall be 100-yard dash, 220-yard dash, 440-yard dash, half-mile run, mile run, 120-yard high hurdle, 220-yard low hurdle, running high jump, running broad jump, pole vault, putting 12 lb. shot, mile relay and half-mile relay.

IV. Order of Events—

Track—100-yard dash trial; 120-yard hurdle trial; 100-yard dash final; one mile run; 440-yard run; 120-yard hurdle final; 220-yard dash trial; 220-yard hurdle trial; half-mile run; 220-yard dash final; 220-yard hurdle final; mile relay; half-mile relay.

Field—Running high jump; shot put; pole vault; running broad jump.

V. Eligibility—

Each contestant in a meet must have previously made, in a fair test, a record equal to the following in the events in which he is entered:

INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

Anderson, Indiana, March 10, 1924.

To I. H. S. A. A. Principals:

The following proposal was passed at the last annual meeting, October 18, 1923: "The Constitution of the I. H. S. A. A. shall be re-worded and re-classified by the Board of Control, omitting such rules and parts of rules as are dead or conflicting, but keeping intact the meaning of all rules and regulations."

In compliance with the provisions of this resolution the Board submits the constitution in a new temporary form for the suggestions and reactions of the High School Principals. Principals are urged to study carefully the new wording in connection with the old wording and send to the Permanent Secretary the results of their study, so that the Constitution may be presented to the next annual meeting in a form and wording already studied and sanctioned for the most part. Your suggestions and reactions will be studied carefully by the Board of Control.

Anderson, Indiana, October 16, 1924.

The re-worded constitution was presented to the annual meeting of 1924 by Supt. Baird as a report of the Board of Control and was unanimously passed with the exception of the suggestion for amending the constitution. This has been omitted. The constitution here printed is, therefore, as it was passed at the annual meeting on October 16, 1924.

CONSTITUTION OF THE INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I.

NAME

The name of this association shall be the "Indiana High School Athletic Association."

ARTICLE II.

MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Membership in this association shall be limited to the public High Schools of the State and each school shall have one vote.

Section 2. Any public High School in Indiana may become a member of this association by subscribing to these rules and regulations and by paying the annual dues of one dollar fifty cents (\$1.50) to the Permanent Secretary on or before January 1 of each year.

Section 3. All memberships lapse on January 1 of each year unless the annual dues are paid.

ARTICLE III.

ADMINISTRATION

Section 1. I. H. S. A. A. Districts.

For the purpose of administration only, the State shall be divided by counties into the following districts:

First District—Benton, Carroll, Cass, Fulton, Jasper, Lake, LaPorte, Marshall, Newton, Porter, Pulaski, Starke, St. Joseph, Tippecanoe and White.

Second District—Adams, Allen, Blackford, DeKalb, Elkhart, Grant, Howard, Huntington, Kosciusko, LaGrange, Miami, Noble, Steuben, Wabash, Wells and Whitley.

Third District—Boone, Clay, Clinton, Fountain, Hamilton, Hendricks, Marion, Montgomery, Morgan, Owen, Parke, Putnam, Tipton, Vigo, Vermillion and Warren.

Fourth District—Bartholomew, Dearborn, Decatur, Delaware, Fayette, Franklin, Hancock, Henry, Jay, Jefferson, Jennings, Johnson, Madison, Ohio, Randolph, Ripley, Rush, Shelby, Switzerland, Union and Wayne.

Fifth District—Brown, Clark, Crawford, Daviess, Dubois, Floyd, Gibson, Green, Harrison, Jackson, Knox, Lawrence, Martin, Monroe, Orange, Perry, Pike, Posey, Scott, Spencer, Sullivan, Vanderburg, Warrick and Washington.

Section 2. Board of Control.

MEMBERSHIP.

(a.) The Board of Control shall consist of five members, (principals, members of the faculty or superintendents) to represent the five districts into which the State is divided for administration purposes only.

(b.) Elections shall take place each year between December 1 and December 10, all votes being mailed to the Permanent Secretary on ballots prepared by him.

(c.) Each member of the I. H. S. A. A. in a district shall have one vote for a Board member from his district.

(d.) Beginning with December, 1916 members shall be elected as follows: First District, to serve until January 1, 1918; Second District, to serve until January 1, 1919; Third District to serve until January 1, 1920; Fourth District will have an election in December, 1917, the member to serve three years; and the Fifth District will have an election in December, 1918, the member to serve three years.

(e.) After the initial elections, each member shall be elected for three years or for the unexpired term in case such is less than three years.

(f.) All newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their offices on the first day of January next following their election.

(g.) The person receiving the highest number of votes in a district shall be elected.

(h.) In case of a tie the vote shall be taken again, the votes being cast for the men who are tied for first place.

(i.) Three members of the Board shall constitute a quorum at any meeting.

(j.) Removal from the district or withdrawal from the teaching profession shall constitute a vacancy and in such cases the remaining members of the Board shall choose a person from the district wherein the vacancy exists to serve until the member chosen at the next election assumes office.

(k.) No retiring member of the Board, having served three years, shall be eligible for re-election and service in any district for a period of one year after the date of retirement.

Section 3. Board of Control.

POWERS AND DUTIES.

The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties:

(a.) It shall have general control over all athletic contests between and among the members of this association.

(b.) It shall have exclusive control of the annual inter-scholastic tourneys and meets.

(c.) It shall determine forfeitures as provided for in these rules.

(d.) It shall give interpretation of the rules of this association.

(e.) It may at the end of the athletic season and at its discretion issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standing of teams.

(f.) When charges are made in writing by a member of the association against another member for violation of these rules, the Board of Control, after giving due notice of the time and place for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges and may suspend the offending school for a period not exceeding one year.

(g.) The Board of Control shall decide all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants in meets and tourneys.

(h.) When any matter comes before the Board for decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the Board is a representative, the remaining members of the Board shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter.

Section 4. Permanent Secretary.

At the annual meeting of 1906 a Permanent Secretary shall be elected, who shall have charge of the property and records of the Association; shall receive all money for dues and the sale of publications of the association; shall issue all circulars authorized by the Board of Control; shall attend meetings of the Board when requested to do so by the Board; shall turn over to the Treasurer of the Board all money in his possession when called upon to do so; shall perform such other duties as the growth of the Association, as determined by the Board, may require; shall receive as compensation such sum and such allowance for expenses and clerical help as the Board may approve; and it shall be his duty to publish the I. H. S. A. A. Handbook immediately following the annual meeting of the association. Vacancies in the office may be declared by the Board for cause, and a successor appointed by the Board to act until the next annual meeting. (A referendum vote was taken by the President in May, 1922 in regard to placing the Permanent Secretary on a full-time basis. The vote (which is on file in the office of the Permanent Secretary) showed conclusively that such was desired by the Principals. On May 27, 1922, therefore, the Board of Control submitted a contract to the Permanent Secretary offering him a salary of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) a year with clerical help, office rent and legitimate expenses to conduct the work of the I. H. S. A. A.

About the middle of July this offer was accepted and he began work on a full-time basis August 1, 1922.)

ARTICLE IV.

LOCAL MANAGEMENT

Section 1. (a.) The Principal or his authorized representative shall accompany his team to all contests.

(b.) The Principal of the school, or high school teachers auth-

orized by him, shall be manager or managers of the teams representing the school.

(c.) No games shall be played without the sanction of the Principal.

(d.) The eligibility of all contestants shall be certified to by the Principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statements shall be presented in writing within ten days before any contest. In case of disputes the Principal must furnish the Board of Control the following data in regard to each contestant; the date of last enrollment; the number of years he has been a member of a secondary school athletic team; date and place of birth; average mark in each study for the last preceding semester in school; average mark in each study from the beginning of the current term and semester. A school which does not furnish this data shall be denied championship honors, and may be excluded from all games, tourneys and meets.

(e.) The Principal has power and is advised to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not represent his school in a becoming manner.

(f.) It is recommended that principals, in arranging for games, provide a forfeit of \$10.00 to be exacted should there be a failure on the part of either party to carry out the arrangements made. Should such forfeitures be stipulated and not be paid during the same season, the Board of Control, after hearing both sides, shall have authority to expel the delinquent school from the association. Notification of such expulsion shall be published in the papers with cause therefor.

ARTICLE V.

COACHES

Section 1. Paid Coaches, other than those regularly employed as teachers by the trustees of the school are prohibited. The expression "Paid Coach" refers to any person who receives directly or indirectly remuneration of any kind,—money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any High School athletic team.

Section 2. No High School shall be permitted to employ a coach or athletic director who receives any extra pay, salary, gifts, trophies, trips or presents from any outside sources.

ARTICLE VI.

OFFICIALS

Section 1. The major officials in all inter-contests shall be on the approved list of officials in the I. H. S. A. A.

Section 2. Approval shall be secured by making application to the Board of Control through the Permanent Secretary, and approved officials shall be given approval cards signed by the Permanent Secretary.

Section 3. The Board of Control shall drop from the approved

list of officials any persons who are palpably unfair and incompetent in their officiating or who do not serve the ideals and policies of the I. H. S. A. A. Disbarment cards shall be given to such officials and their names shall be published in the bulletins of the association.

ARTICLE VII.

CONTESTS.

Section 1. The games recognized by the I. H. S. A. A. are:—Football, soccer, basketball, track and field, and baseball.

Section 2. All inter-school athletic contests shall be subject to the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. and the Board of Control.

ARTICLE VIII.

RULES FOR CONTESTS.

Section 1. Spalding's Official Football Rules shall govern in football.

Section 2. Spalding's Official Basketball rules shall govern in basketball. (For the season of 1923-1924 paragraph 2, section 1, rule 8 shall be void. All tourney games shall have two halves of 15 minutes each.)

Section 3. Spalding's National Collegiate Athletic Association Track and Field Rules shall govern with the following exceptions:

(a.) Rule 2, regarding a Games Committee shall be void.

(b.) Scoring.

Three places shall be counted in all meets and the places shall count 5, 3 and 1. Places in the relay races will not count for points. In case of a tie in any event the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.

(c.) Events.

The events in all meets shall be 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash, 440 yard dash, half-mile run, mile run, 120 yard high hurdle, 220 yard low hurdle, running high jump, running broad jump, pole vault, putting 12 lb. shot, mile relay and half-mile relay.

(d.) Order of Events.

Track—100 yard dash trial; 120 yard hurdle trial; 100 yard dash final; one mile run; 440 yard run; 120 yard hurdle final; 220 yard dash trial; 220 yard hurdle trial; half-mile run; 220 yard dash final; 220 yard hurdle final; mile relay; half-mile relay.

Field—Running high jump; shot-put; pole vault; running broad jump.

(e.) Eligibility.

Each contestant in a meet must have previously made in a fair test, a record equal to the following in the events in which he is entered:

Section 4. Spalding's Official Basketball Rules for women shall govern girls' games with the following exceptions:

- (a.) The three-court plan shall be used unless there is mutual agreement to use the two-court plan.
- (b.) Under no condition may girls play basketball according to boys' rules.

Section 5. Spalding's Official Rules in Baseball shall govern in baseball.

Section 6. No inter-school basketball games shall be played by players or schools prior to October 1 of each year nor after the last evening session of the State Final Tourney. Intra-mural practice and gymnasium work in basketball may be done prior to October 1 and after the final tourney. (The penalty is suspension.)

Section 7. The maximum number of games for the regular schedule of any team or any player in basketball shall be twenty. (The penalty is suspension.)

Section 8. Teams and players may play in two basketball tourneys in addition to the sectional, regional and final tourneys of the State Tourney and in addition to the twenty games on the regular schedule providing the games in one of these "two tourneys" shall be counted in the twenty games permitted for the regular schedule of a team or player. (The penalty is suspension.)

Section 9. The football season shall close on November 30 of each year.

Section 10. No games shall be played with public High Schools of this State not belonging to this association. This rule does not prevent a member of the association from playing High Schools outside of the State nor from playing non-high school teams within the State, providing all players on the I. H. S. A. A. teams are eligible in every way and also providing there are no public High School boys of Indiana on the opposing teams.

Section 11. All basketball tourneys other than the State Tourneys shall be held prior to February 1 of each year.

ARTICLE IX.
ELIGIBILITY RULES.
SCHOLARSHIP

Section 1. Each contestant must have and be maintaining for

the current semester, a passing grade in each of three or more studies requiring a minimum of fifteen regular High School recitations per week, exclusive of rhetorical, physical training, military drill and deportment; in his last preceding semester in school he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire semester.

Section 2. Students enrolled for the first time must comply with the requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended.

Back work may be made up, providing that it is done in accordance with the regular rules of the school and becomes a matter of final record before the opening day of the next semester.

Interpretation—In each of the studies representing the minimum requirement of work specified above, the following shall govern: (a.) For the current semester the average of the period grades up to the time of certification must be passing; (b.) for the current or school grading period the average of the daily or weekly grades must be passing; (c) if the average of the period grades at the beginning of any grading period is below passing in any study, the pupil is ineligible as far as that study is concerned for the entire grading period.

ENROLLMENT.

Section 1. No student, who has been enrolled as a High School student in any High School, shall be permitted to participate in any inter-high school contest as a member of another high school until he has been enrolled in such high school for one full semester, unless the parents of such student actually change their residence to the second school district. In the latter case, the student will be as eligible as he was in the school from which he withdrew.

Interpretation—

(a.) A student enrolled in one High School of a city or school corporation shall not be eligible in another High School of the same city or school corporation until he has been enrolled in the other High School for one full semester, unless there are definitely marked school districts and his parents actually change their residence to the new district.

(b.) Students finishing the courses offered in high schools maintaining less than four years of High School work are not bound by this section.

(c.) The fact that a transfer has or has not been issued or that the student pays or does not pay his tuition, has no bearing on this section.

(d.) Parts of two semesters do not make a full semester.

Section 2. No person, who has been enrolled as a student in an institution of college standing, and has done work which may be counted toward a degree in that institution, shall be eligible as a

member of any athletic team under I. H. S. A. A. rules in any game with any other team, either within or without the State of Indiana.

Section 3.

(a.) Any student who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days before September 1 and December 1 for four times shall be ineligible for football.

(b.) Any student who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days between December 1 and March 1 for four times shall be ineligible for basketball, except a student who entered high school for the first time during the second semester of a school year and who did not participate in any game during this semester, shall not be ineligible for basketball until he has been enrolled thereafter twenty (20) or more days between December 1 and March 1 for four times.

(c.) Any student who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days between March 1 and June 1 for four times shall be ineligible for baseball and track, except a student who entered High School for the first time during the second semester of a school year and who did not participate in any game or meet during this second semester shall not be ineligible for baseball and track until he has been enrolled thereafter twenty (20) or more days between March 1 and June 1 for four times.

Section 4. A student withdrawing permanently from school within the first twenty school days of a semester shall not be regarded as having an opportunity to engage in athletics that semester unless he has already played in one or more interscholastic games, in which case he shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

Section 5. The eligibility rules of this association shall apply to students taking part in all contests, whether with schools inside or outside of the State of Indiana.

Section 6. In order to be eligible for athletic competition during any semester a student must have entered some public High School within the first twenty school days of the semester in which the contest occurs.

PARTICIPATION.

Section 1. Any member of a High School athletic team who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that season.

Section 2. A student, who has played in one or more inter-scholastic games in any season shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

FOOTBALL CERTIFICATES

Section 1. On and after January 1, 1911, no student shall be eligible to play football unless he has been examined by a regular

physician and his physical condition has been pronounced satisfactory. Further, such a student shall not be eligible until the physician's certificate has been filed with the Permanent Secretary of the association. Said certificate shall be good from September 1 to December 1 only.

Section 2. On and after January 1, 1911, no student shall be eligible to play football without the written consent of his father, mother or guardian. Said written consent shall be attested by the Principal, and shall be filed with the Permanent Secretary of the association. The copy of said written consent shall be attached to the Physician's certificate when filed with the Permanent Secretary.

REMUNERATION

Section 1. No High School student shall be eligible to participate in any inter-school contest under the rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, if it shall be shown that he, or any member of his family is receiving any remuneration, either directly or indirectly, to influence him or his family to reside in a given school district in order to establish eligibility on the team of said school, and any school permitting such participation shall, upon satisfactory evidence, submitted to the State High School Board of control, be suspended by them from membership in the I. H. S. A. A. for a term of not less than one year. This rule shall not interfere with the right of High School pupils to work during vacation or during out of school hours in order to earn their way through High School. It shall apply to the use of any funds created by gift or by subscription with the intent offering them or parts of them for the free use of the player or any member of his family as an inducement to get them to change their residence to the district of the said school and to maintain residence there.

POST GRADUATES

Section 1. Post graduates are not eligible but students graduating from regular courses of less than four years in length shall not be deemed post-graduates.

Section 2. A student is a post graduate of a High School when he has completed the work required for graduation by that school and has received his diploma providing the school offers four years of work.

Section 3. Students meeting requirements for graduation in three and one-half years in a High School with a regular four years course shall be eligible to participate in school athletics the last half of the fourth year, providing they meet all other eligibility rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

AGE

Section 1. Students shall be ineligible for any athletic competition upon reaching twenty-one years of age.

AMATEURISM

Section 1. All contestants in the I. H. S. A. A. must be amateurs.

Section 2. Professionalism is defined in the I. H. S. A. A. as accepting remuneration, directly or indirectly, for playing on athletic teams, for officiating in athletic games or for managing athletic teams; or playing, officiating or managing under assumed names. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted, if accepted in service and not in any other way.

MISCELLANEOUS

ORDER OF BUSINESS

The order of business in regular meetings of this association shall be as follows:

- a. Reading of Minutes.
- b. Financial Report.
- c. Report of Committees.
- d. Basketball Tourneys.
- e. Track Meets.
- f. Proposals.
- g. Miscellaneous.
- h. Adjournment.

SUPPLIES

Parents and Physician's Certificates, contracts for games, application blanks for officials, blanks for reporting contests, eligibility certificates, bulletins and handbooks may be secured of the Permanent Secretary.

INTERPRETATIONS AND SUGGESTIONS

First—When a contestant, official, game or decision is protested the game should be played as scheduled and the protest with evidence filed with the Board of Control for settlement later.

Second—Any student who carries at least 15 hours of regular High School work is a High School student.

Third—It is recommended that Principals take the proper measures to control the crowd and the players at all contests. Failure to do so shall be considered sufficient reason for suspension from the association.

Fourth—A game is any athletic contest entered into by a member of this association with players or teams not belonging to the member.

Fifth—As the Principal is the responsible party in High School

athletics, it is recommended that he carry on all correspondence with the Board of Control and the Permanent Secretary.

Sixth—By passing work is meant work of such character that credit should be entered on the school records were credit given at the time of certification.

Seventh—Mutual agreements to violate the rules of this association shall result in suspension of all schools concerned.

Eighth—Visiting schools shall be held responsible for the conduct of visitors from their home city regardless of the place of the contest.

Ninth—For athletic purposes the record at the end of a semester shall be final. Deficiencies in one semester can not be made up in a subsequent semester for qualification purposes during that semester. An incomplete or condition at the end of a grading period or semester counts as a failure. Back work may be made up and counted toward eligibility during the summer providing it is done and becomes a matter of final record prior to the opening day of the next semester.

Tenth—The baseball season is defined as beginning and ending with the school year.

Eleventh—The Principal of each school or a teacher in his school delegated by him in writing shall represent such school at all meetings of the Association.

Twelfth—Enrollment for any time is considered enrollment and students who do not pass in three regular High School subjects in any semester in which they are enrolled are ineligible until they have done so.

Thirteenth—Schools may have as many teams in the same sport as they desire, and all rules apply to all teams and all individuals on all teams.

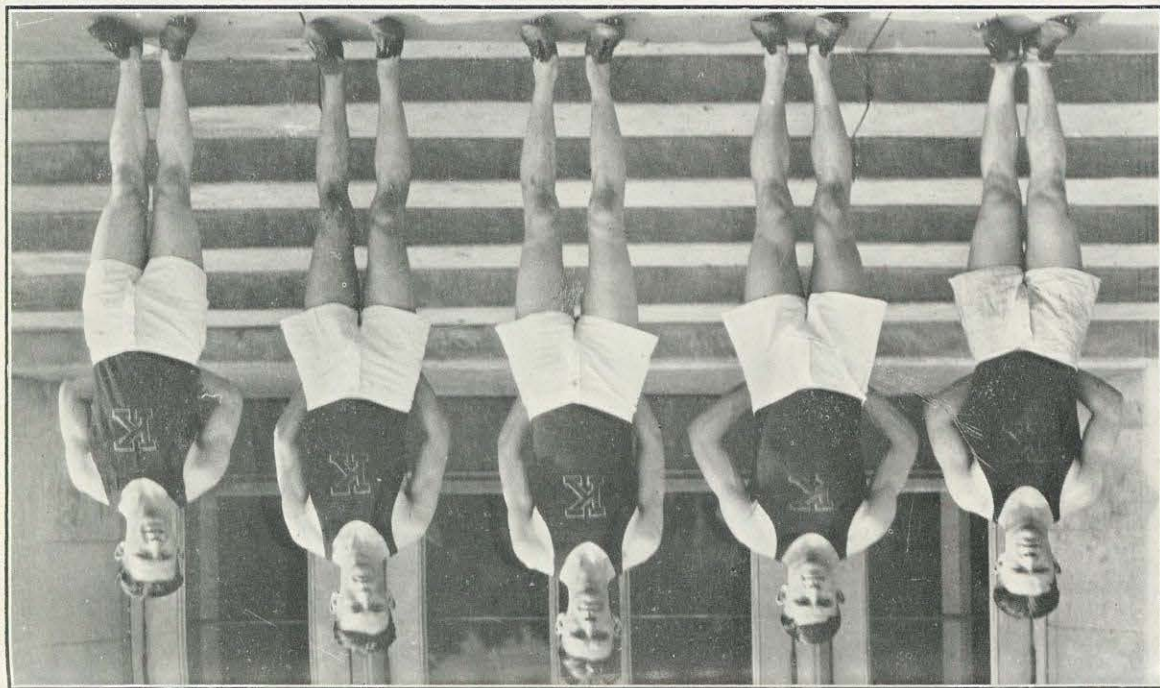

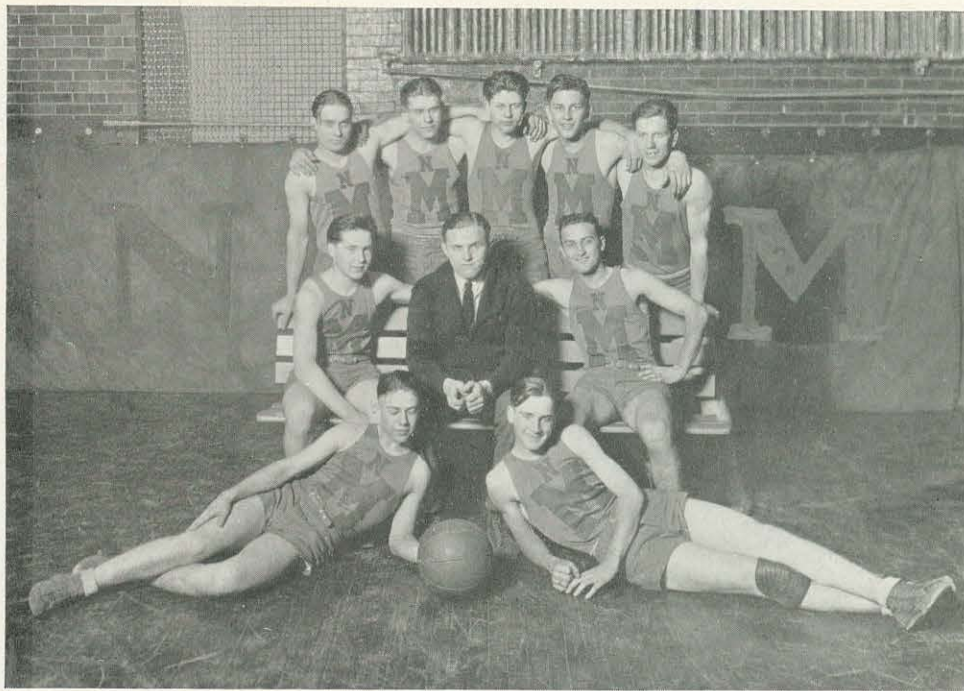

Baseball

This sport suffers as a High School sport because the fall season is short and the spring season is short. Then, too, professional baseball has the front seat usually. In the fall the professional baseball season is coming to a close, and in the spring the High School has difficulty in competing with the professional playing.

The game was played, however, by many schools last spring, and also this fall. In several counties there were baseball leagues that scheduled games to be played during the week after school hours. Much interest was shown in these games. The following report covers an invitational baseball tourney held at Purdue University last spring under the auspices of the Lafayette and West Lafayette High Schools.

The I. H. S. A. A. recognizes that High School boys have many opportunities and desires to play on independent teams during the summer months, so the following statements have been made:

High School students may play on independent baseball teams during the summer months, when school is not in session, without jeopardizing their standing in the I. H. S. A. A., providing they do not play under assumed names, and also providing they do not accept remuneration, directly or indirectly, for their playing.

Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted by the students, if such are accepted in service rather than in money, or in some other material form. The I. H. S. A. A. expects all High School students to conduct themselves at all times in a way that will honor their High School, the I. H. S. A. A., and themselves.

These statements will enable principals to know the eligibility of their students, as a professional in one sport is a professional in all sports, as far as eligibility in the I. H. S. A. A. is concerned.

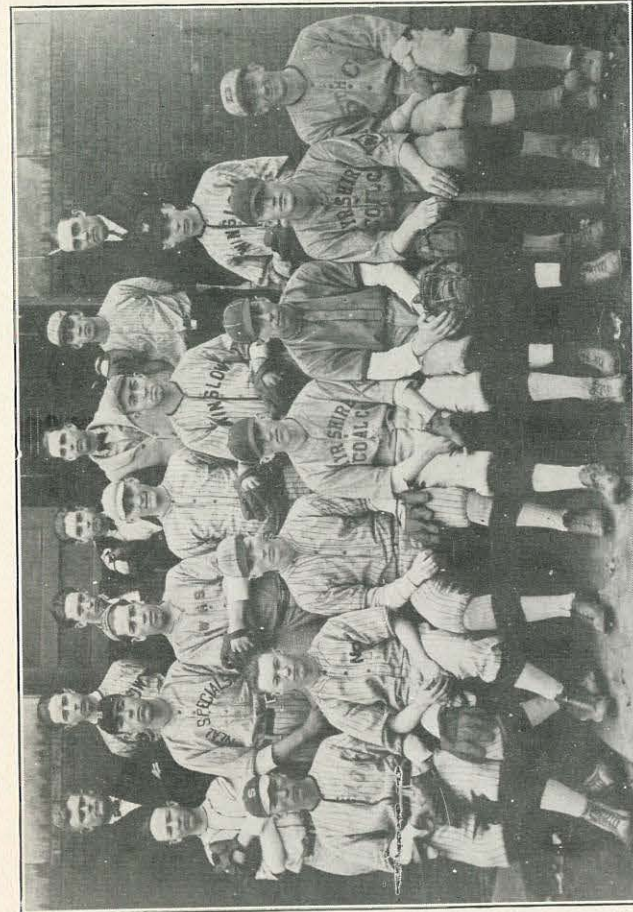

The first attempt to organize the High Schools of Indiana in a single organization for the purpose of handling athletic activities was made in a meeting of the Northern Indiana Teachers' Association, held at Richmond, in April, 1903. At this time there was a conference of High School Principals, and the conference ended with a body of suggested rules and regulations, called the Richmond Agreement. Due to the fact that there was no central organization having executive power, the Richmond Agreement did little more than point the way toward something better.

Principal J. B. Pearcy, of Anderson, issued a call for a meeting of High School Principals interested in a State Athletic organization for December 5, 1903. At this meeting a provisional constitution was adopted. At a similar meeting on December 29, 1903, a final constitution was adopted and a Board of Control of three members was chosen to administer the affairs of the I. H. S. A. A.

The first Board of Control was made up of Principal George W. Benton, Shortridge High School, Indianapolis; Superintendent Lotus D. Coffman, Salem, and Principal J. T. Giles, Marion. These men thought and planned well, and we are enjoying the fruits of their vision.

There were fifteen (15) High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A., March 1, 1904, and now there are seven hundred sixty-six (766) High Schools belonging. The membership has had a gradual growth through the years, and now the limit is recognized as the limit in the number of High Schools in the State.

A study of the men who have served on the Board of Control through the years will show clearly that the activities of the I. H. S. A. A. have been in good hands. The titles and addresses are given as they were when the men were board of control members. A complete list of the several Board members of the I. H. S. A. A. follows:

In the beginning, one member of the Board of Control served as Secretary, but it soon became very evident that this office furnished enough work for a special man. It was also seen that the future of the organization demanded that the office of Secretary be made more permanent than the office of Board Member. Accordingly, at the annual meeting in 1906 the office of Permanent Secretary was established, and Principal J. T. Giles was chosen by the Principals to be the first Permanent Secretary. Principal Giles resigned on December 26, 1912, and Principal Isaac E. Neff was chosen by the Principals to succeed him. Principal Neff resigned March 15, 1913, and the Board of Control appointed Principal Arthur L. Trester to serve as Permanent Secretary until the next annual meeting in December, 1913. At this meeting, Principal Trester was chosen by the Principals as Permanent Secretary.

The Board of Control consisted of three members, chosen by the Principals in their annual meetings, until the annual meeting of October 27, 1916. At this meeting it was decided to divide the State into five districts for administrative and representative purposes, and that each district should have one representative on the Board of Control, chosen by mail ballot from his own district by the Principals of his district.

The primary purpose of the organizers of the I. H. S. A. A. to manage and to foster High School athletics on a high plane has been held up as an ideal by the Association through the twenty years of the life of the I. H. S. A. A. New and advanced steps have been

taken whenever conditions made them necessary. It became increasingly evident as time went on that the I. H. S. A. A. should assume a larger and larger initiative in real physical education for all boys and all girls, and that physical education should be interpreted in the light of other educational aims and ideals. Accordingly, the I. H. S. A. A. now has a program, not only for the managing and fostering of High School athletics, but for the stimulation of communities and schools to the end that real physical education be given all boys and all girls throughout the grades and the High School.



Gymnasiums

For a number of years each successive year has seen a large increase in the number of High School gymnasiums in Indiana. It has not been many years since a gymnasium in a High School in Indiana was considered a fad, a luxury and a misappropriation of money. A few of the larger High Schools had training gymnasiums for boys and girls but very few indeed were the High Schools that had gymnasiums with provisions for spectators. In several cities there were halls, armories and coliseums that were used occasionally by the High Schools in meeting the needs and desires for handling in some adequate way the element of games and sports. Since these facilities were under the direct control of persons outside of schools and since the number present at contests, although small, was usually made up of non-school people, conditions were far from satisfactory. The halls were not school property and often were not under school control. The crowds were not crowds that were particularly interested in school control and in school ideals.

In recent years, however, the value of physical education and the large part that the element of play should hold in any system of physical education has made possible the building of hundreds of gymnasiums in our State. Practically all of the more than seven hundred fifty High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. have gymnasiums of their own or have access to such under their direct control. All new High School buildings in Indiana are provided with gymnasiums and many have been the gymnasiums added to old High School buildings or built separately on the same tracts of land.

The methods of building these gymnasiums in Indiana have been many and varied according to local financial conditions and according to how well the idea of Physical Education for all boys and all girls has been sold. The following schemes have been the most commonly used:

1. The bonding of the school city for an addition to the existing building to include school class-rooms and a gymnasium.
2. The bonding of the school city to cover a part only of the cost, the remainder to be secured by donations without any expectations of a return.
3. Money raised by popular subscription and interest-bearing notes given by the building committee or holding committee to be met out of gate receipts through a series of years.

4. Donations of considerable amounts by one or a few citizens.

Of course, these schemes have taken on different aspects in different communities but in all cases there has been a new and encouraging alignment of the schools and the citizens. Cooperation of a new type has been brought to the front and communities have found perfectly legitimate ways to build gymnasiums to serve as integral units of the school system and of community welfare.

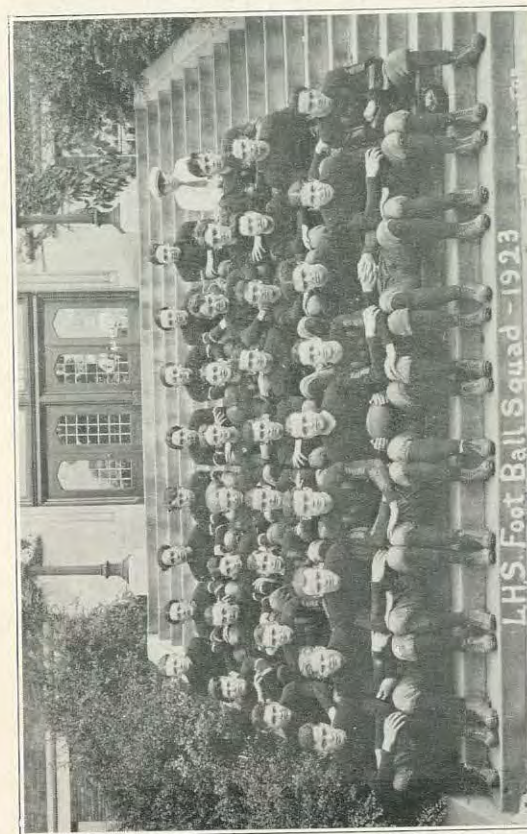
In the building of these gymnasiums in our State their multiple use for school purposes and for community purposes has been kept in mind. As a result we find these buildings should be designated as community buildings rather than school gymnasiums. They serve in a very real and a much needed way the demands of the schools for physical education, for auditorium work and for classroom activities and the demands of the community for an auditorium to accommodate meetings of large numbers as well as for play purposes for adults when not used by the schools. A fine spirit of adjustment between the school and the community has been necessary and has been prevalent. The inter-relationships of the school and the community have been brought to the front and good has resulted to both parties. Community and school welfare has been fostered in such a way that the school claims and supports the community and the community claims and supports the school. In truth has the school been shown to be what it was intended to be, a part of society set aside to do some of the work necessary for society but which society can not do as a whole. Furthermore, it has been shown that school is not something aside from society but the school is an integral part of society.

It is very evident at the present time that the following principles should be kept in mind in the construction and use of gymnasiums and playfields for schools and communities. These principles will not apply in all communities alike as conditions are very different in different communities. Needs in one place would mean luxuries in another place and vice versa, but in the main these principles will be found worth-while for study and planning:

1. Provision for buildings, playfields and teaching personnel should be made for all boys and all girls in our schools to the end that physical education of the right type may be given as a regular and an integral part of the school program.

2. Provision for the accommodation of spectators should be made in all gymnasiums and on all playfields. Spectatoritis is not a disease but a training medium for the young and the old when properly conceived.

3. Gymnasiums and playfields should be considered not only as facilities for physical exertion and maneuvering but as laboratories

for mental, moral, physical and social training for the participants and the spectators.

4. Gymnasiums and playfields should serve the school population with their numerous needs and demands first of all and then should be opened to the adult population for civic, social and recreational purposes throughout the entire year.

5. The teaching personnel should be chosen with the greatest care and should be adequate as to numbers. Physical education for all means not a few but many trained leaders.

6. The work of the school during the school year in gymnasiums and on playfields should merge into the recreation and playground work of the summer and the summer work should dovetail into the work of the school in the fall. In other words an all year program, preferably under the same supervision and administration, is necessary and desirable in all communities.

7. The training of all and the exploitation of none should be the guiding principle underlying all of this work.

8. The introduction of games and sports rather than the stressing of formal work is highly important. We are rapidly moving from the idea of effort to the idea of interest in all physical education work.

9. The element of competition and the idea of winning are legitimate and should be encouraged but we must stop short of the "win at any cost" ideal because nobody wins and everybody loses under such an ideal.

10. "Gambling" is not an athletic activity and has no place on the program of physical education. Gymnasiums and playfields must not provide shelter and seats for the money changers. They do not deserve standing room.

11. Gymnasiums should be arranged for a number of games such as handball, baseball, volleyball, etc., and for the administration and supervision of physical examinations, tests, remedial work and the more meaningful elements in the formal types of physical education work. Apparatus and equipment should be such as will be used for actual and worth-while results. Locker rooms, toilet rooms, shower rooms, dressing rooms, inspection rooms, etc., should be carefully planned.

12. Basketball is the game that is played as much or more than any other indoor game and the I. H. S. A. A. has established, by custom and practice, a playing court for this game having dimensions of 50' by 70' between the baskets with from 5' to 10' extra on the ends and sides. Such a floor can be used for a number of team games such as volleyball, tennis and indoor baseball. Some indoor track and field work can be done also.

In the following paragraphs will be given some information regarding some of the gymnasiums of the State. Pictures of these buildings will be found in this book and detailed information about the buildings, their construction and use may be secured by writing to the High School Principals.

BEDFORD

The building was built in 1924 at a cost of \$80,000 raised by popular subscription in a two-day drive under the supervision and direction of the School Board. It has outside dimensions of 108' x 148' and the playing court for basketball is 50' x 70' with 10' additional at each end and some room on each side. There are 5,020 marked and numbered seats, on the main floor and in the balcony running around the court. No seat is behind a post. The receipts of the numerous activities scheduled in the gymnasium will pay for the building. Some of the features of the building are: Stage, electric score boards, toilets, dressing rooms, moving picture arrangements, telephone and telegraph wires, lights of varying intensity and knock-down bleacher seating. The building is now serving for physical education work for 960 boys and girls in a regular program way under trained supervisors.

CONNERSVILLE

This gymnasium is an integral part of the new High School building and the cost of the Gym is estimated at \$45,000.00. The main building was built in 1924 out of school funds but the gymnasium was built by an association of interested business men. The playing floor is 50' x 74' with 3' additional on the ends and sides, and the seating capacity is 2,500. The equipment and facilities for games, public meetings and regular physical education work are very good. An inside picture is included in this book.

MARTINSVILLE

It was built in 1923 in time for the sectional tournament in March, at a cost of \$90,000.00 by a holding company. Some contributions were made by the citizens and the remainder will be paid for by receipts from the activities. It will seat 5,000 in a comfortable way. The playing court is 50' x 70', and there are ten dressing rooms with shower baths and locker rooms. A large part of the industrial work of the High School is done in the building. The space under the seats is used for rooms for this work.

ANDERSON

The structure is 135' wide and 165' long and the girders are 25' 6" from the floor. The playing court is 50' x 70' and the whole floor is 61' x 91' thus giving ample room surrounding the court. It will seat 5,000 and was built at a cost of \$96,000. In addition to being a gym-

nasium there are facilities for wood-turning, pattern work, cabinet making, tool storage, lecture rooms, recitation rooms, machine shop, auto shop and other industrial work rooms. The building is complete with dressing rooms, shower baths, check-rooms, etc. The gymnasium was built by the "Anderson Public School Athletic Association." Two hundred forty guarantors obligated themselves for the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00). that the provisions would be carried out as specified.

RISING SUN

This gymnasium is a part of the new High School in 1924. The room is 52' x 80' and has a playing floor 40' x 68'. There is a balcony on three sides and a stage with a 30' opening at one end. For games the seating capacity is about seven hundred (700). The cost of the building was \$40,000.00 and is an obligation of the school city.



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
