# MESSAGE TO MEMBERS OF THE INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

from

#### Maurice N. Davis, President

The proper administration of high school athletics is the prime concern of the members of this organization. The basic purpose of interscholastic athletics is to promote the goals of education through wholesome competition in sports. The IHSAA was created to foster athletics as a positive influence in the educational experience of high school students. Much time and effort are spent by educators throughout our state in order to accomplish this purpose. The cooperation of all member schools is necessary in order to continue to raise standards and promote the worthwhile values of high school athletics.

Society is experiencing rapid change, although much of it seems to occur without purpose or direction. Meaningful change is essential in a society which hopes to continue to improve itself. In order to provide for each member of this association the opportunity to promote improvements, the constitution gives each principal of a member school the privilege of making proposals to the Athletic Council which acts as a legislative body. It is the responsibility of the IHSAA office and the Board of Control to manage the affairs of this organization within the framework of its constitution and the rules adopted by the Athletic Council. All rules of our Association apply equally to all members and have the purpose of fostering athletics in the proper educational perspective.

The efforts of all members should be directed toward athletic programs which promote the best interests of the youth of our state. In athletics our students have the opportunity to cultivate good habits, enjoy wholesome competition, and continue to develop mental and physical abilities. Security is one of the basic needs which society fails to provide for many young people. Athletics can, and should, provide the security which comes from knowing the rules of competition and playing within these rules. Athletics, like democracy, stresses the importance of self-discipline, and rules are made and applied only when proper self-discipline is not exercised.

The Indiana High School Athletic Association has a well-formulated set of rules under which schools have agreed to operate. It is the responsibility of every principal, athletic director, coach, and athlete to live within these rules. Very few questions of policy should need to be referred to or acted upon by the Commissioner, the IHSAA office, or the Board of Control, if the responsible people in each school know the rules and apply them as they have agreed to do. It is the responsibility of each school principal to be in charge, and in control, of the athletic program of his school.

The place of the spectator in high school athletics needs more and more attention. A wholesome athletic program must also have values and responsibilities for its spectators as participants. By its voluntary membership in this organization, each school indicates its willingness to assume the responsibility for the promotion of good sportsmanship among its fans. Without sportsmanship, athletics is wasted effort and not worthy of sponsorship by an educational institution.

We are proud of the heritage of athletics in the State of Indiana as promoted by such men as Arthur L. Trester, L. V. Phillips, Bob Hinshaw, and our present staff of Commissioner Phil N. Eskew, and Assistant Commissioners Herman F. Keller and Ward E. Brown. The schoolmen who have been willing to serve on the Board of Control and Athletic Council throughout the years of the Indiana High and purpose. To these men we owe an expression of gratitude. Much of the rest of the United States looks to us for leadership because of the reputation achieved through the efforts of these men. The encouragement and support of all school people are important to our continued success. Through the cooperation of all members we will continue to progress. Our youth and society will benefit through our mutual efforts.

# CONSTITUTION OF INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

# Preamble

We, who administer athletic programs in the schools of Indiana, in recognizing the constant need for an association to plan, supervise, and administer athletic activities in which schools and students thereof participate, do decree and establish this Constitution for the Indiana High School Athletic Association.

# Article I - Name

The name of this association shall be the "Indiana High School Athletic Association." (The abbreviation of this name is understood to be "IHSAA.")

# Article II - Purpose

The purpose of this Association shall be to encourage and direct wholesome amateur athletics in the schools of Indiana. In keeping with this purpose the Association shall regulate, supervise, and administer interscholastic athletic activities among its member schools. All such activities shall remain an integral factor in the total secondary educational program. This shall be accomplished by cooperating with all agencies vitally concerned with the health and educational welfare of secondary school students; furnishing protection against exploitation of schools or students; determining qualifications of individual contestants, coaches and officials; and providing written communications to establish standards for eligibility, competition and sportsmanship.

# Article III - Membership

# Section 1.

- a. All Memberships Are Voluntary. Any high school in the state may become a member of this Association by meeting the requirements, by subscribing to these rules and regulations, and by paying the annual dues of one dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50) to the Commissioner on or before October 1 of each year. All memberships expire on October 1 of each year unless the annual dues are paid.
- b. Any member that is at anytime unable to voluntarily comply with any and all rules and regulations and final decisions of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, its officers or representatives, by virtue of any order or injunction of any court or for any other reason, is automatically suspended from membership for the duration of such disability without any notice or formal action of the Association, its officers or representatives.

- c. If at any time the Association, its officers or representatives are prohibited or restrained from carrying out any rule, regulation, decision or action of or for said Association in relation to any member by order or injunction of any court or action of any intervening authority, such member in relation to which the Association, its officers or representatives are so prohibited or restrained is automatically suspended from member-bership for the duration of such prohibition or restraint without any notice or formal action of the Association, its officers or representatives.
- d. Any suspension from membership under Section 1b or 1c shall continue until such time as the suspended school and the Association, its officers and representatives, are all again free and able to exercise their own free will and volition without restraint or direction from any authority, except as provided under this Constitution and By-Laws, and a written request for reinstatement may be made by the suspended school immediately.

#### Section 2.

Full Membership in this Association shall be open to all public, private, parochial, and institutional high schools of the state offering and maintaining three or four years of high school work, provided they meet the requirements of the association and also subscribe to its rules and regulations. A school to be eligible for membership in the IHSAA must be accredited by the State Department of Public Instruction.

# Section 3.

Preparatory membership may be extended to any school accredited by the State Department of Public Instruction offering and maintaining school work on the ninth and tenth or tenth grade level with the understanding that such preparatory membership shall extend the privilege of participating in single athletic games, contests, tourneys and meets with other preparatory members. Teams from preparatory members composed of ninth and/or tenth grade students may compete against teams composed of ninth and/or tenth grade students from full members and junior members composed of ninth grade students in single games, contests, tourneys and meets without special restrictions as to the number of teams entered, trial runs, or geographical location within the state.

Such schools are not eligible to enter teams in state tourneys or meets. It must be clearly understood that a preparatory membership is a membership in the Indiana High School Athletic Association that requires the principal to subscribe to all of the rules and regulations of the Association. It is further understood preparatory membership is available only to schools that will become eligible for full membership within a two year period. At the end of the two year period the preparatory membership will be reviewed by the Board of Control.

They may receive tickets for the state final championship basketball tourney and other state final meets at the discretion of the Board of Control. Students may participate on the following bases:

- A student must meet the eligibility rules of the Association in all respects.
- b. Students in the ninth and/or tenth grade in a school having preparatory membership may compete against only ninth and/or tenth grade students from other member schools.
- c. Schools having preparatory memberships in the IHSAA may not use students below the ninth grade on their athletic teams in interscholastic games.
- d. Schools having preparatory memberships may not compete with schools who do not hold membership in the IHSAA, if such schools are eligible for membership.
- e. The principal in a school holding membership is responsible to the IHSAA for the conduct of athletics in that school.

Note: Schools holding preparatory memberships are subject to all rules and regulations of the IHSAA with the modifications given above.

#### Section 4.

Junior membership may be extended to any school accredited by the State Department of Public Instruction offering the ninth grade, but not eligible for full, preparatory or associate membership. Junior membership shall extend the privilege of participating in single athletic games, contests, tourneys and meets with other junior members. Junior membership also shall permit teams from junior members composed of ninth grade students to compete against teams composed of ninth and/or tenth grade students from full, preparatory and associate members in single games, contests, tourneys and meets without special restrictions as to the number of teams entered, trial runs or geographical location within the state. Schools holding junior memberships are not eligible to enter teams in state tourneys or meets. It must be clearly understood that a junior membership is a membership in the Indiana High School Athletic Association that requires the principal to subscribe to all of the rules and regulations of the Association. Junior members may share in the distribution of tickets to the state final championship basketball tourney and other state final championship meets on a limited basis as determined by the Board of Control.

#### Section 5.

Associate membership may be extended to any high school accredited by the State Department of Public Instruction and operating as a boarding school, with the understanding that:

- a. Associate membership shall extend the privilege of participating in single athletic games and contests and invitational tourneys and meets, but not in any tourneys or meets conducted for the purpose of determining an official state championship in the IHSAA.
- b. Associate members are bound by all rules and regulations of the IHSAA with the exception that a student who changes schools without a corresponding change of residence on the

part of his parents is eligible as to residence immediately, provided there is no undue influence involved in any way.

c. Associate members are not privileged to share in the distribution of tickets to championship tourneys and meets or in the distribution of surplus funds to member schools.

#### Section 6.

Each member school shall have one vote.

#### Section 7.

The Board of Control shall be judge on all memberships.

# Article IV — Administration and Legislation

#### Section 1. Districts

- a. For the purposes of election and representation only, there shall be five districts, which may, from time to time, be modified by the authority of the Athletic Council.
- b. The state shall be districted by counties into the following districts:

District 1—Benton, Carroll, Cass, Fulton, Jasper, Lake, LaPorte, Marshall, Newton, Porter, Pulaski, Starke, St. Joseph, Tippecanoe and White.

District 2—Adams, Allen, Blackford, DeKalb, Elkhart, Grant, Howard, Huntington, Kosciusko, LaGrange, Miami, Noble, Steuben, Wabash, Wells and Whitley.

District 3—Boone, Clay, Clinton, Fountain, Hamilton, Hendricks, Marion, Montgomery, Morgan, Owen, Parke, Putnam, Tipton, Vigo, Vermillion and Warren.

District 4—Bartholomew, Dearborn, Decatur, Delaware, Fayette, Franklin, Hancock, Henry, Jay, Jefferson, Jennings, Johnson, Madison, Ohio, Randolph, Ripley, Rush, Shelby, Switzerland, Union and Wayne.

District 5—Brown, Clark, Crawford, Daviess, Dubois, Floyd, Gibson, Greene, Harrison, Jackson, Knox, Lawrence, Martin, Monroe, Orange, Perry, Pike, Posey, Scott, Spencer, Sullivan, Vanderburg, Warrick and Washington.

# Section 2. Classes

a. For the purposes of election and representation only there shall be five classes of high schools in each IHSAA District as follows:

Class I-Schools having enrollments of 1-250

Class II—Schools having enrollments of 251-450

Class III—Schools having enrollments of 451-750

Class IV-Schools having enrollments of 751-1300

Class V-Schools having enrollments of 1301-and above

b. The determination of the class of any high school shall be based on the enrollment, in grades nine through twelve, as

certified in the latest September Annual Report required by the Division of Inspection of the State Department of Public Instruction.

#### Section 3. Athletic Council

- a. The twenty-five district-class units shall at all times be entitled to representation in the Athletic Council of the IHSAA.
- b. All elective terms of Athletic Council members shall be for five years, beginning on July 1 following election, or for the remainder of an unexpired term in case of a vacancy.
- c. Any faculty member from a member school in good standing in the IHSAA must have his name submitted on an official IHSAA nominating petition which shall be requested from the IHSAA Office. This petition must be signed by five high school principals in his district at least two of whom shall be in his class of school. This petition must be filed with the Commissioner of Athletics not later than November 15, of each year. Superintendents who have more than one member school under their supervision, are not eligible for election to the Athletic Council. Such person shall be from the class of high school from which the selection is to be made in that particular year. The Commissioner shall send printed ballots listing all such names to all principals of member schools in good standing in that district, who constitute the electorate. The person receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected by the Board of Control, who shall constitute the canvassing board. In case of a tie, the vote shall be taken again, printed ballots listing only the names of those tied to be sent out by the Commissioner, with a return date designated by the Board of Control. (Note: A teacher to be eligible for the Athletic Council must be teaching full time in grades nine, ten, eleven or twelve.)
- d. Removal from an IHSAA district, withdrawal from the teaching profession, resignation, suspension of his school, or a lapse in membership of his school in the IHSAA shall constitute a vacancy to be filled in the manner hereinafter provided. A person elected to represent a certain class member school, who changes to a school of a different class or whose school changes from class to class due to a decrease or increase in enrollment, shall continue to serve out his term as long as he remains in his original district.
- e. Vacancies in the Athletic Council may be filled by the Athletic Council, the appointees to serve until the successors chosen at the next annual election take office. Such persons must be from the same district and class member school as the member originally chosen.
- f. The Athletic Council shall choose a Board of Control of five members from the membership of the Athletic Council. Their term of office shall be from July 1 to June 30 following their selection. All five classes of member schools shall be represented on the Board of Control, except as hereinafter stated for members who change their school class after being elected. Expiration of membership on the Athletic Council shall auto-

matically terminate membership on the Board of Control, Temporary vacancies on the Board of Control may be filled by the Board of Control from the membership of the Athletic Council, but only until the next meeting of the Athletic Council, when the Athletic Council shall itself choose the successors, Both the Athletic Council and the Board of Control shall choose their own presiding officer, who may or may not be the same individual.

- g. No member of the Athletic Council shall be eligible for a longer term on the Athletic Council than the one he is serving until the expiration of his term.
- h. All elections shall take place each year between December 1 and December 10, all votes being mailed to the Commissioner on ballots prepared by him. Such ballots shall be open for inspection by the candidate or the principal of any member school.
- i. All newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their office on the first day of July next following their election.
- j. There shall be held an Annual Meeting for the explanation and interpretation of rules and regulations, for inspirational addresses by recognized leaders, for committee reports and such other business as may come before the meeting. The Board of Control shall set the date of the Annual Meeting and may call a special meeting of the Athletic Council when considered advisable.
- k. Each year at the time of the State Track Meet the Athletic Council shall meet to reorganize for the ensuing year. At this meeting there shall be elected members of the Board of Control to fill the places which will be vacated by retiring Board Members on the following June 30. The Athletic Council shall meet at the time of the Annual Meeting of the Association. At these meetings proposals by high school principals will be acted upon and other business may be transacted.
- The Commissioner of High School Athletics shall serve as Secretary of the Athletic Council.
- m. All legitimate expenses of the Athletic Council shall be paid out of the IHSAA funds.
- n. Details in connection with the conduct of business of the Athletic Council shall be determined by the Athletic Council.
- o. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum.
- p. It shall be the duty of the Athletic Council to establish the rules and by-laws of the Association.

# Section 4. Board of Control

The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties:

- a. It shall have general control over all athletic contests between and among the members of this Association.
- b. It shall have exclusive control of the annual interscholastic tourneys and meets.

- c. It shall determine penalties and forfeitures for violations of the rules and by-laws of the IHSAA.
- d. It shall give interpretations of the rules and by-laws of the IHSAA.
- e. It may at the end of the athletic season and at its discretion issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standings of teams.
- f. When charges are made in writing by a member of the association against another member for violation of these rules, the Board of Control, after giving due notice of the time and place for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges and may suspend the offending school for a period not to exceed one year.
- g. The Board of Control shall decide all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants to meets and tourneys.
- h. When any matter comes before the Board for decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the Board is a representative, the remaining members of the Board shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter.
- i. The Board of Control shall have the power to initiate investigations regarding inter-school athletic activities participated in by the members of this Association and to make and enforce, with such penalties as this Board may consider proper, the regulations deemed necessary by this Board to make effective the spirit, the purpose and the wording of the provisions of the Indiana High School Athletic Association Constitution, Rules and By-Laws; and further, the said Board of Control shall have power to make and enforce with such penalties as this Board may consider proper, temporary regulations deemed necessary by this Board to handle emergencies and special conditions that may arise in the management of the interschool athletic activities participated in by members of this Association.
- j. The Board of Control shall execute the rules governing the IHSAA in the spirit as well as the letter in which they are written.
- k. The Board of Control shall employ a Commissioner of Athletics, said Commissioner to serve for a period not to exceed five years on any one contract beginning on the first day of July following his employment at a salary to be determined by the Board of Control. He shall receive as compensation such sum and such allowance for expenses and clerical help as the Board may approve. All contractual agreements between said Commissioner and Board of Control shall be in written form.
- 1. The Board of Control may employ one or more Assistant Commissioners of Athletics, said Assistant Commissioner/s to serve for a period of not to exceed five years on one contract beginning on the first day of July following his employment

at a salary to be determined by the Board of Control. The Assistant Commissioner/s shall receive as compensation such sums and such allowances for expenses and clerical help as the Board of Control may approve. All contractual agreements between said Assistant Commissioner/s and Board of Control shall be in written form.

- m. Vacancies in the office of Commissioner or Assistant Commissioner/s may be filled in a manner to be determined by the Board of Control.
- n. The Board of Control shall determine and set out the powers and duties of the Commissioner and Assistant Commissioner/s with the idea of giving the office of Commissioner the powers and duties of a Commissioner of Athletics, whose opinions and actions will be subject to review by the Board of Control upon appeal.
- o. Three members of the Board of Control shall constitute a quorum at any meeting.
- p. The Board of Control shall have the duty, right and authority to refuse sanction to games, meets, tourneys and athletic contests in which member schools are connected if these games, meets, tourneys and athletic contests seem, upon investigation, to be in conflict with the spirit, purpose, ideals, standards, policies or best interests of the Association in their inception, arrangements, promotion or management.
- q. The Board of Control may, when an emergency arises, make a temporary regulation of the IHSAA. Such regulation shall be in force until the next meeting of the Athletic Council, at which time it will be subject to the disposition of this body.
- r. Expenditures in excess of the budget shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Control.
- s. The Board of Control may establish a pension retirement plan for regular employees of the Indiana High School Athletic Association.
- t. The Board of Control shall provide for the annual audit of the books of the IHSAA and for the proper bonding of the Commissioners and office personnel.
- u. The Board of Control may make any adjustments it deems necessary as they pertain to the State School for the Blind when participating against other blind schools in the Blind School Conference.
- v. The Athletic Council authorizes the Board of Control to employ legal assistance when deemed necessary.

# Section 5. Commissioner

a. The Commissioner shall file with the President of the Board of Control, on or before June 30 of each year, an estimate of the expense of the IHSAA for the ensuing year. Such budget to be approved by the Board of Control and become effective on July 1 for the fiscal year. The estimate shall include the following: Salaries of the Commissioner, Assistant Commissioner.

sioner/s, and the secretaries, extra office help, traveling expenses of the Commissioner, Assistant Commissioner/s, office equipment and supplies, insurance, printing, postage, telephone and telegraphic expense, expenses of Board of Control and Athletic Council members.

- b. The duties of the Commissioner shall be to:
  - Collect all receipts and funds and report same to the Board of Control at the next regular meeting following their collection.
  - 2. Approve officials as provided in By-Laws.
  - 3. Collect and compile materials for the Annual Handbook. The same shall be submitted to the Board of Control for approval before publication.
  - 4. Issue bulletins as directed by the Board of Control.
  - Prepare all official forms approved by the Board of Control for the use of the IHSAA.
  - Recommend to the Board of Control new standards, regulations and policies for the good of the IHSAA.
  - 7. Initiate investigations, conduct hearings, collect information, render decisions and fix penalties based on the evidence, and in accordance with the rules and regulations of the IHSAA. Such decisions shall be subject to review by the Board of Control on appeal by the Principal's of the member school's involved.
  - 8. Conduct correspondence for the IHSAA.
  - 9. Furnish all proper information requested by the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations and other State High School Athletic Associations.
  - 10. Maintain contacts and relations between the IHSAA and: State Department of Public Instruction, colleges, universities, high schools, service clubs, teachers' associations, Athletic Directors' Association, officials' associations, press, physical education groups, coaches' groups, junior high schools, city superintendents, county superintendents, fans, American Legion and similar organizations, and principals of member schools.
- 11. Assist IHSAA committees in their work by furnishing data and information requested by them.
- 12. Make detailed arrangements for all interscholastic meets, tourneys and events as directed by the Board of Control.
- 13. Check all tourney reports and other financial statements, to reconcile discrepancies, if possible, and report the same to the Board.
- 14. Prepare and present at each regular meeting of the Board of Control a complete report of the activities of his office since the last preceding meeting of the Board.
- 15. Arrange the program and details of the Annual Meeting of the IHSAA. He may secure speakers subject to the approval of the Board and he may delegate speakers for athletic meetings elsewhere when requested to do so by school officials.
- 16. Have charge of the property and records of the Association.

- 17. Attend meetings of the Board of Control and serve as Secretary.
- 18. Include the rules, amendments and regulations of the Athletic Council, as they are passed, in the Constitution, Rules and By-Laws of the IHSAA, harmonizing the related sections in the Constitution with the inclusions.
- 19. The Athletic Council authorizes the Commissioner to employ legal assistance when deemed necessary.

# Section 6. Assistant Commissioner/s

- a. It shall be his or their duties to:
  - 1. Assist the Commissioner in any and all such duties as the Commissioner may require.
  - 2. Act in the capacity of Commissioner in the absence of the Commissioner.
  - 3. Establish and promote such publicity and public relations, as may be required by the Commissioner and Board of Control, for the well being and the promotion of the Indiana High School Athletic Association.

# Article V - Finances

# Section 1.

There shall be the accumulation and establishment of an adequate working balance in the IHSAA treasury, this amount to be established and maintained as a guarantee that existing obligations will be met; that expansions in the program of service may be made if thought desirable; and that any emergencies in the future may be solved.

# Section 2.

There shall be a distribution on an equitable basis among the schools in the IHSAA membership (except associates) of the amounts accumulated above the adequate working balance and above the amount legitimately necessary for the running expenses of the IHSAA, these distributions to be made on October 1, 1932, and on October 1 of and for each three-year period thereafter. Special distributions of surplus funds above the budget and required reserve may be ordered by the Board of Control.

# Section 3.

There is granted power and authority to the IHSAA Board of Control to make the financial adjustments in contracts for interscholastic games, tourneys, meets and athletic contests that are deemed necessary through the years and to administer, execute and control all receipts, expenditures and holding of monies in connection with the IHSAA.

# Article VI — Amendments

The Athletic Council may amend the Constitution at any of its regular meetings. Such amendments shall be required to have a

minimum affirmative vote of two-thirds of the membership. Upon written petition signed by twenty (20) high school Principals from each of the five (5) IHSAA districts, the amendments made by the Athletic Council shall be subject to a referendum vote of the Principals in the membership.

\* \* \* \*

- Q.1 Does the Commissioner or the Assistant Commissioners have a vote in the Board of Control and in the Athletic Council?
- A. The Commissioner or the Assistant Commissioners are not members of either group and have no vote in any of their deliberations.
- Q.2 How are the funds of the IHSAA invested?
- A. In U. S. Government Securities.
- Q.3 How are these Government Securities protected?
- A. Burglary and Robbery Insurance are carried on the bank vault box and the Commissioners carry Fidelity Bonds.
- Q.4 Who examines the financial books of the IHSAA?
- A. Ernst and Ernst, Public Accountants, the Board of Control and any high school principal so desiring.
- Q.5 How often is an audit made?
- A. Annually by Ernst and Ernst. The same is printed in the annual Handbook of the Association.
- Q.6 Who is eligible for election to the Athletic Council?
- A. Any bona fide faculty representative of a member school belonging to the IHSAA.
- Q.7 How are Board of Control members selected?
- A. By the members of the Athletic Council from their own membership.
- Q.8 Do Board members represent districts?
- A. Yes, they represent districts and enrollment classes of high schools.
- Q.9 Do Athletic Council members represent districts or classes?
   A. They represent classes and districts.
- Q.10 Is it necessary for a member school to meet and maintain the policies, regulations and standards for the accreditation and classification of schools in Indiana in order to be a member of the IHSAA?
- A. Yes.

# BY-LAWS

# PART I — BOYS INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS

#### RULE 1 - RULE COVERAGE

#### Section 1.

The IHSAA rules apply to all teams and all contestants in all games, contests, tourneys and meets between member schools, with independent groups, alumni or teams whose schools are members of other state associations.

#### Section 2.

All students enrolled in grades nine, ten, eleven and twelve are considered high school students.

#### Section 3.

Mutual agreements to violate the rules of this Association shall result in suspension of all schools involved.

# Section 4.

Member schools may maintain any number of teams in the same sport.

\* \* \* \*

- Q.1 When and how may principals submit proposals for the consideration of the Athletic Council?
- A. Principals may submit such proposals at any time in writing to the Commissioner who will submit them to the Athletic Council for consideration and action.
- Q.2 May the rules of a school be changed or special examinations be given in order to make students eligible?
- A. The IHSAA expects its members to observe not only the letter but the spirit of its rules and regulations. Changing of school rules and special examinations are not looked on with favor.
- Q.3 May two or more member schools combine to form one athletic team?
- A. No, this is not permitted, unless they legally consolidate and become one school.
- Q.4 May a member school support a grade team in the same school system out of its athletic funds?
- A. Yes, so far as the IHSAA is concerned.
- Q.5 Are any special regulations in force pertaining to discharged veterans?
- A. No. By action of the Athletic Council, May 23, 1947, all IHSAA special regulations concerning discharged veterans were discontinued.

- Q.6 Do seniors have any rights and privileges in athletics not granted to other students?
- A. No, in fact, seniors should appreciate the opportunities that have been extended to them for four years and should be very loyal to the rules and regulations of their high school and of the IHSAA in which their high school holds membership.
- Q.7 What is considered the school year?
- A. A school year covers all time from the first day to the last day of the school year, including vacations. The IHSAA considers the first day of school to be the day that attendance is counted and for which teachers are paid.

# RULE 2 — CLASSIFICATION OF SCHOOLS

# Section 1.

Schools are not classified for competition purposes

# RULE 3 — ADMINISTRATIVE RESPONSIBILITY

# Authority

#### Section 1.

The principal of each member school shall be the authorized representative of his school and is responsible to the IHSAA for the conduct of the athletic program.

# Section 2.

The principal has the authority to designate a faculty member employed in his school system to act as manager of the teams representing the school.

# Section 3.

The principal of the member school or member school teacher delegated by him in writing shall represent such school at all called meetings of the Association.

# Section 4.

The principal or his authorized representative shall accompany his team to all contests.

# Section 5.

The principal has the authority to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not represent his school in a becoming manner.

# Section 6.

It is understood that any school corporation may narrow the scope of athletic activities provided it does not violate the rules of the IHSAA.

#### Section 7.

It is strongly recommended that the spirit and philosophy of the rules and regulations of the IHSAA be followed by all schools in conducting their athletic program for students below the ninth grade.

#### Section 8.

Principals shall take the proper measures to control the crowd and the players at all contests at home or away. Failure to do so shall be considered sufficient reason for suspension from the Association.

# Certification of Eligibility

#### Section 9.

The eligibility of all contestants shall be certified to by the principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statements shall be exchanged by the principals, in writing, prior to the beginning of any contest.

# Ineligibility

#### Section 10.

In cases in which an ineligible student has been used, the member school principal shall be held responsible and take action as set out in the succeeding sections.

#### Section 11.

Inform the IHSAA office definitely by giving the name of the student, the cause of ineligibility, the list and scores of contests in which the pupil participated when ineligible, how the error was made and other particulars about the case.

# Section 12.

Send definite and explanatory letters to the opponent principals of contests in which the student participated when ineligible; forfeiting points, games, meets, matches, and honors won, and requesting these principals to notify the IHSAA office as soon as they receive these letters. Note: In team contests, other than tournaments, the game must be forfeited. In contests where individual points are awarded, only the points that the ineligible student scored are forfeited.

# Section 13.

Consider and so declare the student not only ineligible for all athletics for the current semester, but also for all of his next semester following. Note—Such action shall always be subject to review by the Commissioner and by the Board of Control.

# Section 14.

A student who becomes ineligible under the rules of another state cannot remove that ineligibility by transferring to an Indiana high school. Note:—Questions in a case of this kind are to be referred to the Board of Control.

# Parents' and Physicians' Certificates

#### Section 15.

Previous to a student's first practice for any interscholastic athletic contest, he shall have on file in the principal's office for each school year, a Parent and Physician's certificate of physical fitness, giving the written consent of the father, mother or guardian for such athletic participation. The physical examination shall be made prior to the student's first practice for any interscholastic athletic contest by a physician licensed to practice medicine in Indiana.

# Section 16.

Previous to the student's first inter-school participation, the principal shall certify to the IHSAA that the certificates required herein are on file in his office.

# Section 17.

A student properly certified to participate in interscholastic athletic activities, who is absent from school or who is physically unable to practice for five consecutive days due to illness or injury, must present to his principal a statement from a physician licensed to practice medicine in Indiana that he is again physically fit to participate in interscholastic athletics.

1 Who is the responsible party in IHSAA athletics?

A. In the execution of its powers and duties, as designated and authorized in the Constitution of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, the Board of Control presumes that the principal of each member school voluntarily taking out a membership in the IHSAA has secured the consent of his superiors, the administrative head or heads of the school system, to take out said membership and that he, the principal, is the administrative head, not only in name but in fact, of the inter-school athletic activities of the school and of the students in the school.

Wherever and whenever in the IHSAA membership the conditions are found to be such that the school principal is not the administrative head in name and in fact of the inter-school athletic activities of the school and of the students in the school, the Board of Control will consider that the member school has broken its agreement with the IHSAA and has in fact removed itself from the membership in the Association.

The IHSAA Board of Control will assess at its discretion, after a careful investigation has been made, the penalties deemed necessary in all cases in which it is found that the member school principal is not the administrative head, in name and in fact, of the inter-school athletic activities of the school and of the students in the school. The proof that the member school principal is the administrative head, in name and in fact, of the inter-school athletic activities

of the school and of the students in the school shall rest in all cases with the school officials concerned.

- Q.2 Who may manage a member school team?
- A. A member school principal or teacher authorized by him. Student management is not permitted.
- Q.3 Is a Parent and Physician's Certificate required of a student each school year prior to his first practice for any interscholastic athletic contest?
- A. Yes, this one certificate will satisfy the requirement of the rule for the school year in all interscholastic athletic contests except a student who is absent from school or who is physically unable to practice for five consecutive days due to illness or injury must present to his principal a statement from a physician licensed to practice medicine in Indiana that he is again physically fit to participate in interscholastic athletics.
- Q.4 May students, who are ineligible for the first team, play on teams of lower ranking?
- A. No, ineligibility for one team means the same for all teams.
- Q.5 Would a student, declared ineligible by one principal, be ineligible under another principal?
- A. Yes, if the student is ineligible according to the rules of the IHSAA. The IHSAA has no jurisdiction unless its rules are violated.
- Q.6 May an ineligible student practice with the regular team?
- A. Yes, at home in regular practice, but ineligible students should not appear in athletic uniforms at games.

# RULE 4 - AGE

# Section 1.

Students shall be ineligible for any inter-school athletic competition upon reaching nineteen years of age, with the following exceptions: If the student's nineteenth birthday occurs on or after August 15, he is eligible for fall sports; if the nineteenth birthday occurs on or after November 1, he is eligible for winter sports; if the nineteenth birthday occurs on or after March 1, he is eligible for spring sports.

\* \* \* \*

- Q.1 What is considered evidence of age?
- A. One or all, if there is doubt, of the following documents duly authenticated and considered in the order named:
  - (a) Birth certificate, properly recorded at or near time of birth.
  - (b) Baptismal certificate.
  - (c) Documentary evidence such as family record of birth in Bible, certificate of arrival in the United States, a passport or a life insurance policy of at least a few years standing.

- (d) Grade and high school records.
- (e) Written and signed statements by superintendent of schools, public health physician, attending physician, parent or guardian.
- (f) Other evidence.
- Q.2 How may a birth certificate be secured from the Indiana State records?
- A. By writing to Vital Records, Board of Health, 1330 W. Michigan Street, Indianapolis, giving complete information in your first letter.
- Q.3 If doubt exists regarding the age of a student should the student be permitted to participate in games pending removal of doubt?
- A. No, the doubt must be removed prior to participation.
- Q.4 What should be done in cases of doubt as to age?
- A. Submit all evidence to the Board of Control after a complete investigation as outlined in Q1, Q2, Q3 above has been made. If a certificate or document cannot be secured, a signed statement to this effect should be submitted by the proper officials.
- Q.5 If, after all available data regarding the age of a student are submitted to the Board of Control, it cannot be known definitely about the date of birth of a student, what step is taken?
- A. The Board of Control will establish a date for athletic eligibility purposes on the data submitted subject to change should convincing evidence to the contrary be found later.
- Q.6 May the Age Rule be waived in the case of a returned war veteran who has been honorably discharged?
- A. No, all students are, without exception, bound by this rule.

# RULE 5 - AMATEURISM

# Section 1.

All contestants in the IHSAA must be amateurs.

# Section 2.

Professionalism is defined in the IHSAA as accepting remuneration, directly or indirectly, for playing on athletic teams, for officiating in athletic games or for managing athletic teams; or playing, officiating or managing under assumed names. Any member school student who directly or indirectly signs a professional contract loses his amateur standing and immediately becomes ineligible for all interschool high school sports.

# Section 3.

A member school student shall be considered as violating his amateur standing if he participates in athletic activities, schools, tryouts, practices and games held or sponsored by professional athletic organizations, clubs, or their representatives during the season

of a sport or between the seasons of a sport. This rule applies to all sports except baseball and golf during the summer vacation.

# Section 4.

Member school students must not play under assumed names, nor accept remuneration directly or indirectly for their playing.

#### Section 5.

Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted by a student if such are accepted in service rather than money or in some other material form.

#### Section 6.

A member school student shall not be considered as violating his amateur standing if he participates, during the summer vacation, in baseball schools and clinics sponsored by professional major and minor league baseball clubs.

Note—Any employee or school official of a member school who acts as an agent or encourages any negotiations between a high school student and representatives of organized baseball prior to the student's graduation, is violating the Agreement between the National Federation and Organized Baseball. Such action on the part of any employee or school official may cause his school to be suspended from the IHSAA for a period of time to be determined by the Board of Control.

Any evidence that a representative of Organized Baseball is attempting to or has signed a student prior to graduation should be reported to the IHSAA at once. This is a violation of the Agreement between the National Federation and Organized Baseball, and the penalty for such action is under the jurisdiction of Organized Baseball.

# Section 7.

A member school student, who has violated his amateur standing according to the rules and by-laws of the IHSAA may apply to the Board of Control for reinstatement as an amateur in the association one calendar year after the date he was declared ineligible on account of the violation, provided he has been in school throughout the year.

The application shall be signed by the student and his school principal, and shall certify that one calendar year has elapsed since the student was declared ineligible and that the student has not violated amateur rules during that calendar year.

\* \* \* \*

- Q.1 What constitutes professionalism in the IHSAA?
- A. Accepting remuneration, directly or indirectly, for playing on athletic teams, officiating in athletic games or managing athletic teams, or playing, officiating or managing under assumed names. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted, if accepted in service and not in any other way. (See Rule 5)

- Q.2 If a student violates his amateur standing in one sport does he become ineligible for all sports?
- A. Yes, a professional in one sport is ineligible for all sports.
- Q.3 Should a reasonably definite line of demarcation be drawn between professional athletic activities and high school athletic activities?
- A. Yes, there seems to be no justifiable reason for a high school student to participate in professional athletics and also in high school athletics.
- Q.4 Should amateurism be defined by the IHSAA for its specific purposes or should the definitions of other organizations be accepted in the Association?
- A. Amateurism should be defined by the IHSAA for IHSAA purposes. There is no definition of amateurism acceptable to all organizations.
- Q.5 Are member school students permitted to play on teams that split the gate receipts among the players including the high school students?
- A. No, this would be considered professionalism.
- Q.6 Does a student who receives money for his services as a life-guard or as a caddie jeopardize his eligibility status in high school?
- A. No, provided he merely receives reasonable and legitimate wages for services actually rendered.
- Q.7 May a student, who has violated his amateur standing be reinstated?
- A. Yes, a member school student, who has violated his amateur standing according to the rules and regulations of the IHSAA may apply to the Board of Control for reinstatement as an amateur in the Association one calendar year after the date he was declared ineligible on account of the violation, provided he has been in school throughout the year.

The application shall be signed by the student and his school principal and shall certify that one calendar year has elapsed since the student was declared ineligible and that the student has not violated amateur rules during that calendar year.

- Q.8 Does a student violate his amateur status when he signs a college enrollment "Letter of Intent"?
- A. No. However, acceptance of other material things might violate his amateur status.

# RULE 6 - AWARDS, PRIZES, GIFTS, TRIPS

# Section 1.

The giving and receiving of awards and medals shall: (a) be kept within reasonable bounds; (b) have symbolic value only and (c) be done by and with the consent and under the supervision of the member school principals concerned.

Note—The giving and receiving of awards by and with the consent and under the supervision of the member school principals

concerned shall mean that the member school principal in each school shall have real control and supervision without pressure of any kind from outside persons or groups of persons.

#### Section 2.

Only one sweater, jersey, jacket, blanket or similar article may be given in each sport to a high school student for participation in athletics in each high school in which he may be enrolled.

# Section 3.

Awards such as a trophy, metal football, metal basketball, metal track shoe or similar article of symbolic value only may be given in addition to the one award permitted in Section 2, provided the cost of the award shall not be more than the cost of the award in Section 2.

Note—The word "symbolic" shall be understood to refer to a symbol, an emblem or a token rather than to an article having intrinsic value. A diamond ring, a gold watch, an automobile or similar awards do not fall under the term "symbolic" even if the award is duly inscribed. An inscription cannot validate such awards in the IHSAA.

# Section 4.

Schools belonging to athletic conferences, or participating in tourneys and meets under the rules of the IHSAA, except in the championship series conducted by the IHSAA, may make awards to the winning school or winning participants, provided such awards are made within the bounds of Sections 1, 2 and 3.

# Section 5.

Suitable awards may be accepted by schools and/or students from such local organizations as: service clubs, patriotic organizations, civic groups, dads' and mothers' clubs, and the sports department of a newspaper or radio station. No awards should be accepted which, in any way, advertise any firm or individual so far as commercial or business interests are concerned.

# Section 6.

The Board of Control shall have the authority to designate, give and control the medals and trophies to be awarded to the schools and to the individuals on state championship teams in any sport with the understanding that these be kept within the bounds of Sections 1, 2 and 3.

# Section 7.

Awards, medals, recognitions, gifts, trips and honors shall not be accepted by players or schools from colleges, universities and higher institutions of learning or their alumni. High school athletes should be permitted to complete their high school careers without being molested by outside sources. The acceptance of travel expenses either directly or indirectly from a college as a prospective student-athlete shall be considered a violation of this rule. (See Rule 16, Section 7 regarding college tryouts).

# Section 8.

No member school or student shall accept a championship award unless the championship has been determined by the IHSAA or its member schools. No award of any type shall be accepted from any outside organization designating athletes as having "All-State" or "All-America" status.

#### Section 9.

Athletic equipment is considered as merchandise. Any student who attempts to evade the rule by "purchasing" a merchandise prize for a nominal or token sum will be considered as having forfeited his amateur standing in the IHSAA.

# Section 10.

Penalties for violations of the above rule will be determined by the Board of Control after all the evidence and circumstances have been considered.

\* \* \* \*

- Q.1 Is a member school permitted to give sweaters to athletes?
- A. Yes, the IHSAA recommends that the giving of prizes, gifts, sweaters, etc., be kept within reasonable bounds at all times and that such as are given have a symbolic value only. No more than one sweater, jacket or blanket in each major sport may be given to a high school student for participation in high school for the entire four years.
- Q.2 May a boy be awarded a second sweater in the same sport if he transfers to another high school?
- A. Yes, if he qualifies in the new high school.
- Q.3 May schools give awards to students for scholarship, sportsmanship and conduct?
- A. Yes, such may be given if sanctioned and administered by the school principal.
- Q.4 What gifts, awards and prizes may athletes receive?
- A. The IHSAA requires that the giving of awards, prizes, medals, etc., be kept on a reasonable basis at all times, and that such as are given have a symbolic value only and be given by and with the consent of the school principal.
- Q.5 What are the regulations regarding prizes and awards made to member school students by organizations outside the school?
- A. 1. Donors should be checked carefully regarding attitudes, purposes and types of business.
  - 2. Recipients should be selected by committees on which the principal and school authorities hold the balance of power.
  - 3. All prizes and awards should be limited in number and confined to those reasonable in price and having symbolic value only. Cash or merchandise prizes or awards are not permitted. Awards or prizes of any kind which may be construed as advertising for any individual or firm are not permitted.

4. Purposes should be critically studied so that commercial interests, proselyting interests and interests foreign to good school procedure may be eliminated.

5. Principals shall be expected to know and to execute the rules, regulations and policies to the best of their ability according to their wording and spirit since the giving and receiving of awards shall be done by and with the consent and under the supervision of the principal in each member school.

6. No awards should be made by a "secret committee" of any outside organization, without the knowledge and consent of the high school principal as to the recipient.

Q.6 Is it a violation for a student to compete in an athletic event in which prizes such as merchandise, merchandise certificates, bonds, stamps, cash or articles having intrinsic value are given?

A. Yes, the violation consists in the participation in such events regardless of whether or not the prizes are won, accepted, refused or returned after they are won. (See Exception for Golf. Rule 28, Section 2)

# RULE 7 - COACHES

# Section 1.

Paid coaches, other than those regularly employed as full time teachers by the trustees of the school, are prohibited. The expression "Paid Coach" refers to any person who receives, directly or indirectly, remuneration of any kind—money, travel expenses, gifts, etc., in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any high school athletic team.

# Section 2.

No member school shall be permitted to employ a coach or athletic director who receives any extra pay, salary, gifts, trips or presents from any outside sources for coaching.

\* \* \* \*

Q.1 Who may coach a member school team?

A. Qualified teachers in the school system, who are regularly licensed, regularly employed and regularly paid as such by the trustee or school board out of school funds.

Q.2 Who is a "paid" coach?

A. Any person who receives, directly or indirectly, remuneration of any kind—money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., from outside sources—in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any high school athletic team.

Q.3 Are "paid" coaches permitted in the IHSAA?

A. No, any remuneration received by a coach must come from the school trustee or the school board from school money and not from other sources.

Q.4 May team members present a gift to their coach?

A. Yes, so long as it is of symbolic value only.

# RULE 8 — CONDUCT, CHARACTER, DISCIPLINE

## Section 1.

Any student, whose habits, conduct or character in or out of school during the school year or during the summer, are such, in the judgment of his school principal or the Board of Control, as to reflect discredit upon his school or upon the IHSAA, is not eligible. The IHSAA expects all member school students to so conduct themselves at all times that they, their school and the State Association will be honored.

\* \* \* \*

Q.1 Is a student, who is expelled from school one semester, eligible for the following semester?

A. The IHSAA has no jurisdiction unless its rules and regulations are broken. Expulsion and suspension from school are usually not athletic matters at all. All rules of the IHSAA are binding on a student under expulsion or suspension. See conduct rule, scholarship rule and enrollment rule.

Q.2 If a student is expelled from school during a semester and does not finish the semester, could he be considered eligible for the next semester?

 No, such student is a failure for his last semester in high school.

# RULE 9 — CONTESTS

These GENERAL RULES apply to all interscholastic contests.

# Section 1.

No games, meets, or tourneys, shall be played by a member school without the sanction of the Principal.

# Section 2.

All inter-school athletic contests shall be subject to the rules of the IHSAA and the Board of Control.

# Section 3.

All games, meets, tourneys and interscholastic activities participated in by the member schools belonging to the IHSAA must be held under the direct supervision, management and auspices of the schools concerned or under the direct supervision, management and auspices of the IHSAA. (Note—This section applies to games, meets, tourneys and inter-school athletic contests within and without the state.)

#### Section 4.

Participation of students in an athletic contest with or against players not belonging to their school constitutes a game. A "scrimmage" or practice by students with or against teams or players not belonging to their school is considered a game. A tryout or demonstration of athletic ability as a prospective student-athlete for a college shall be considered a violation of this rule.

#### Section 5.

In all contests the decisions of the officials are considered final and binding.

# Section 6.

A student may represent only one school in any sport during the tournament series regardless of the change of residence on the part of his parents.

# Section 7.

Boys and girls shall not be permitted to participate in inter-school athletic games as mixed teams, nor shall boys' teams and girls' teams participate against each other in inter-school athletic contests.

# Section 8.

In any athletic contest no oxygen shall be administered by mechanical medicinal means except in genuine cardio-pulmonary emergencies and then only by a doctor licensed to practice medicine in the State of Indiana.

#### Section 9.

No inter-school contests shall be played prior to the opening of the school year in the fall. (Exception, See Football—Rule 27, Section 2)

# Section 10.

There shall be no inter-school athletic contests played or practices held on Sunday. Calling one or more team members together on Sunday for the purpose of studying scouting reports or viewing films of games will be considered a violation of this rule.

# Section 11.

No games shall be played with high schools of this state not belonging to this Association unless such high school is not eligible for membership in the IHSAA. This rule does not prevent a member of the Association from playing high schools outside of the state nor from playing non-high school teams within the state, provided all players on the IHSAA teams are eligible in every way and also provided there are no high school students of Indiana on the opposing teams. No athletic contest shall be held with any high school of another state that is not a member in good standing of its State High School Athletic Association, if eligible for membership.

#### Section 12.

Withdrawal of a school athletic team from an athletic contest will jeopardize the standing of the school in the IHSAA.

\* \* \* \*

- Q.1 May a member school schedule and play single games with teams and schools in Indiana not members of the IHSAA?
- A. Yes, provided these teams and schools are not schools eligible for membership and also provided the members of the IHSAA observe all of the rules of the IHSAA. There should be no high school students on the non-member teams, except school teams not eligible for membership.
- Q.2 What is the difference between a preliminary game and a regular game?
- A. There is no difference as far as the IHSAA is concerned, as the same rules and regulations govern.
- Q.3 May a member school schedule and play games during the week?
- A. The IHSAA has no ruling in regard to this matter, but recommends that mid-week games not be scheduled or played except in emergencies.
- Q.4 May schools hold or sanction Sunday practices?
- A. No.
- Q.5 May a member school of the IHSAA schedule and play single games with high schools of other states?
- A. Yes, provided the high schools of these other states, if eligible for membership, are members in good standing in their state high school athletic associations. The principal is obligated to check this matter carefully.
- Q.6 Does the IHSAA stipulate any price for tickets to other than tourneys and meets held strictly under the supervision of the Board of Control?
- No, other than a recommendation that reasonable prices be made at all times for all games.
- Q.7 Does the omission of an admission charge make any difference as to the designation of a contest as a game?
- A. No, games are "inter"-contests or "inter"-scrimmages with or without admission charges.
- Q.8 In what sports are ten days of practice required before a student is eligible to participate in an inter-school contest?
- Football, baseball, basketball, track, cross country, swimming, wrestling, and gymnastics.

# RULE 10 — CONTESTS REQUIRING SPECIAL ATTENTION

# Section 1.

All interstate meets and tourneys involving three or more schools must be sanctioned by all of the states concerned, and the National

Federation of High School Athletic Associations. Written requests must be submitted to your Association at least 30 days in advance. The IHSAA and National Federation do not sanction participation in basketball tournaments involving one or more schools from another state.

# Section 2.

Inter-state contests involving only two schools need not be sanctioned, provided the round trip travel does not exceed 600 miles.

Note: The IHSAA does not sanction interstate contests involving extensive travel.

#### Section 3.

Participation, directly or indirectly, in the management, supervision, player selection, coaching, or promotion of all star high school teams, high school championship teams or similar teams in contests in any sport, having or not having definite seasons in the IHSAA, unless under the supervision and auspices of the IHSAA by member schools, by their school officials or by their teachers, shall be considered a violation of the spirit and purpose, if not the actual wording of these rules and regulations; and schools violating the spirit, purpose or wording of these rules and regulations as indicated herein shall cause their school to be suspended from the IHSAA for such length of time as the IHSAA Board of Control deems advisable. Approved officials shall be suspended for promoting such contests.

\* \* \* \*

- Q.1 May a member school of the IHSAA schedule and play single games with high schools of other states?
- A. Yes, provided the high schools of these other states, if eligible for membership, are members in good standing in their state high school athletic associations. The principal is obligated to check this matter carefully.
- Q.2 May member schools participate in meets and tournaments, in Indiana or in other states, in which more than two schools are entered, if one or more of these schools are non-members of their own state high school athletic association?
- A. No.
- Q.3 May schools belonging to the IHSAA take part in track meets or tourney games outside of Indiana?
- A. All games, meets, tourneys and interscholastic athletic activities participated in by the high schools belonging to the IHSAA must be held under the direct supervision, management and auspices of the member high schools concerned, or under the IHSAA. Inter-state basketball tourneys are forbidden by the National Federation to which Indiana belongs.

# RULE 11 - CONTRACTS

#### **Game Contracts**

#### Section 1.

The Association's "Official Contract for Games" must be used for all inter-school athletic contests and must be countersigned by the Principals of the schools involved. See contract form for further stipulations.

#### Contracts with Officials

# Section 2.

"Contract For Contest Official" forms must be completed and properly signed for specific dates by the Principal and official involved. See contract form for further stipulations.

\* \* \* \*

- Q.1 Does the suspension or termination of membership of either school in the IHSAA render game and/or official contracts null and void?
- A. Yes, See contracts.
- Q.2 May a member school cancel a contract for an official or game without making settlement?
- A. No, contracts are binding and a settlement by mutual consent or according to the stipulations of the contract must be made.
- Q.3 Is there any penalty for the cancellation of a contract by an official?
- A. The IHSAA expects all approved officials to abide by their contracts and will handle on its merits any case of violation by the school or official.
- Q.4 If contracts specify that first teams shall participate, can second teams be used?
- No, it is recommended that contracts specify the ranking of the teams.
- Q.5 If game contracts do not clearly specify the ranking of the teams what ranking is understood as binding?
- A. First team ranking.
- Q.6 Who is the proper official to sign contracts for games?
- A. The member school principal always. This authority shall not be delegated. IHSAA contracts (forms A and B) call for the signature of the Principal.
- Q.7 How may member school principals secure blank contracts for games and officials?
- A. By writing to the Commissioner.

# RULE 12 - ENROLLMENT AND ATTENDANCE

#### Section 1.

No student, who has been enrolled as a high school student in any member school, shall be permitted to participate in any inter-school contest as a member of another member school until he has been enrolled in such school for one calendar year, unless the parents of such student actually change their residence to the second school district. In the latter case, the student will be as eligible as he was in the school from which he withdrew (See Q.4 below).

# Section 2.

A student enrolled in one high school of a city or school corporation shall not be eligible in another school of the same city or school corporation until he has been enrolled in the other school for one calendar year, unless there are definitely marked school districts and his parents actually change their residence to the new school district.

# Section 3.

Students finishing the courses offered in high schools maintaining less than four years of high school work and transferring, are not bound by sections 1 and 2 above. (See Q.6 below)

# Section 4.

The fact that a transfer has or has not been issued, or that the student pays or does not pay his tuition, has no bearing except when the omission of a transfer or payment of full tuition is done for the purpose of unduly influencing a student to enroll for athletic reasons.

# Section 5.

No student who has transferred from another high school shall be certified for inter-school athletics until the principal has on file an IHSAA Athletic Transfer Blank, signed by the principal of the school from which the student transferred.

# Section 6.

A high school student who is regularly enrolled in three or more high school credit courses may, with prior written approval of his high school principal, enroll in or attend an accredited institution of higher learning for credit that is either acceptable for high school graduation or for college credit. The credit may be counted toward high school eligibility (3 semester hours or the equivalent shall be counted as equivalent to one high school credit).

During a vacation period, a high school student with remaining athletic eligibility may enroll in or attend a program in an accredited institution of higher learning that may give him college credit provided he has prior written approval of his high school principal, a copy of which must be placed on file in the office of the IHSAA.

It is clearly understood the approval is for his attendance. The student is responsible for conducting himself in a manner that in no way violates the rules or the spirit of the rules of the IHSAA.

Note: An accredited institution is one that grants credits that count toward a Baccalaureate Degree.

#### Section 7.

Enrollment eligibility shall be limited to eight semesters with the understanding that a student who enrolls in the ninth grade for the first time at the beginning of semester two may choose either his first or ninth semester for enrollment eligibility. A mid-year student who participates in any sport during his first semester becomes ineligible for all sports during his ninth semester.

#### Section 8.

Any student who has been enrolled more than fifteen (15) school days between September 1 and December 1 for four previous times, shall be ineligible for all fall sports.

#### Section 9.

Any student who has been enrolled more than fifteen (15) school days between December 1 and March 1 for four previous times shall be ineligible for all Winter sports except a student who entered high school for the first time during the second semester of a school year and who did not participate in any game during this semester, shall not be ineligible for basketball until he has been enrolled thereafter fifteen (15) or more school days between December 1 and March 1 for four times.

# Section 10.

A student who has participated in one or more inter-school athlethic contests, and who is forced to withdraw from school for the semester during the first fifteen (15) school days because of a disability incurred in connection with athletics, shall not be considered as having participated for that semester The disability shall be certified to by a physician licensed to practive medicine in Indiana,

# Section 11.

Any student who has been enrolled more than fifteen (15) school days between March 1 and June 1 for four previous times, shall be ineligible for baseball, track, golf, tennis and other spring sports with the following exception: a student who entered high school for the first time at the beginning of semester two, may be enrolled five times of fifteen or more school days each between March 1 and June 1 and be eligible for spring sports during the last four times provided he did not participate in spring sports during his first semester of enrollment.

#### Section 12.

A student who withdraws from school for the semester within the first fifteen (15) days of school without having participated in an inter-school athletic contest, shall not be considered as having had an opportunity to participate that semester.

#### Section 13.

In order to be eligible for athletic competition during any semester, a student must have entered some high school within the first fifteen (15) school days of the semester in which the contest occurs.

#### Section 14.

Students, whose parents change their place of residence during a semester, may complete the semester in the school in which they have been enrolled, then enter the new school in the district in which their parents reside with residence eligibility in each school during enrollment therein.

A student who resides with his parents and attends high school in their residence district may remain as a student with eligibility in athletics in this high school even though his parents move to another school district, provided no undue influence is attached to the case in any way. (This rule is primarily to enable seniors to remain in the school in which they enrolled and remain eligible to compete in athletics when it is impractical for them to move with their parents.)

In every instance when the parents of an underclassman move, the principal must inform the parents of the IHSAA rule and if the athlete remains in the school after his parents move from the school district, it shall be the duty of the principal to check before he is certified for athletic eligibility. The principal shall report the circumstances and reasons why he remained in the school district on the form (Form J) prepared for that purpose. This report shall be sent to the IHSAA office and to the principal of the high school in the district to which the parents moved. A student is not eligible under this rule until his residence eligibility report has been approved by the IHSAA.

#### Section 15.

Change of residence as used in these rules shall mean a bona fide move about which there is no question. If the case is that of a change of residence of parents, the change shall be definite and complete.

#### Section 16.

Foreign exchange students and students of parents assigned to foreign countries may be considered for residence eligibility by the Board of Control.

- Q.1 What is a five-year man?
- A. Students who have been enrolled in high school for more than fifteen (15) school days between September 1 and December 1, or between December 1 and March 1, or between March 1 and June 1, for four previous times are ineligible respectively, for football, basketball, wrestling and spring athletics, with the following exceptions:

A student who enters high school for the first time at the beginning of semester II of any school year, may be enrolled four times of fifteen (15) or more school days each between December 1 and March 1 following this first semester of his enrollment, and he may be eligible for basketball for these four seasons provided he does not play in any game during his first semester of enrollment. A student, who enters high school for the first time at the beginning of semester II, may be enrolled four times of fifteen (15) or more school days each between March 1 and June 1 following this first semester of enrollment, and he may be eligible in spring athletics for these four semesters, provided he does not participate in spring athletics during his first semester of enrollment. Participation in a sport in a school year counts as participation in that sport for one school year.

- Q.2 May a student, who has been in high school four full years, but who has not participated in any athletics, participate in athletics?
- No, enrollment rather than participation is the determining factor in such cases.
- Q.3 Which is the determining factor in eligibility—enrollment or participation?
- A. Either one may cause ineligibility. Both are factors and must be considered.
- Q.4 If a student changes high schools, when is he eligible?
- A. He is just as eligible in the new school as he was in the old school, provided his parents actually, legitimately and correspondingly change their place of residence to the new school district and provided the student changes high schools at that time. Students whose parents change their place of residence during a semester, may complete the semester in the school in which they are enrolled. If the parents do not actually change their place of residence to the new school district, the students will be eligible after they have been enrolled one calendar year in the new school, provided no undue influence is used by any person to secure them as students or their parents as residents. See "undue influence" rule.
- Q.5 What is considered enrollment in a semester?
- A. Attendance for any length of time or enrollment that may be considered attendance for any length of time (See exceptions under Sections 10 and 12 above)
- Q.6 When are students, who finish the work given in one member school, eligible in another school?
- A. Students finishing the work in a member school giving less than four years of high school work are just as eligible in a new school as they were in the old school. Students who complete the ninth grade in a junior high school in a school corporation that also maintains a senior high school are not considered eligible if they enroll in a high school outside their regular high school district.
- Q.7 Does the fifteen (15) day enrollment requirement mean school or calendar days?
- A. School days.

- Q.8 If a student fails in all subjects for a semester does his enrollment count as a semester?
- A. Yes, enrollment is enrollment and always counts as such.
- Q.9 Is a student, who has been out of high school for a semester or more and who has played independent ball during that time eligible when he enters school at the beginning of a semester?
- A. Yes, unless he violated his amateur standing in some way by playing on the independent team and provided he is eligible in all other ways.
- Q.10 Are legal guardians considered as parents in the IHSAA?
- A. Legal guardians may be considered as parents if the guardianship papers issued by an authorized court are submitted and approved, and if the student has been living with the guardian. The Board of Control reserves the right to check and act on the circumstances of a guardianship at all times.
- Q.11 Are all students, who attend school outside the school district in which their parents live, required to present legal transfers or pay the regular tuition?
- A. Check this matter with the Fiscal Officer of the State Department of Public Instruction. The report on aggregate attendance calls for definite information about transfers and tuition cases.
- Q.12 What is considered the first day of school?
- A. The first day of school is the first day on which attendance is counted and for which teachers are paid.
- Q.13 If a student misses school for a few weeks in order to work is he eligible during this time and when he returns?
- A. This is a school problem and must be answered by the consideration whether regular school work to the extent of twenty hours is being maintained or not. Usually students who miss school are not passing in their school work.
- Q.14 When is a student, who intends to enter high school, eligible?
- A. When he actually enrolls, provided all other requirements have been met.
- Q.15 How long may a student be enrolled in a semester then drop out without the semester being counted under the Scholarship Rule?
- A. Within the first fifteen (15) school days of the semester, provided he was eligible when he withdrew.
- Q.16 If a student is passing in four regular high school subjects when he drops out during a semester, may he be considered eligible under the Scholarship Rule at the beginning of his succeeding semester of enrollment?
- A. No, such a student would not meet the requirement of passing in four regular high school subjects throughout the last semester of enrollment (See exception, under Sections 10 and 12 above)

- Q.17 Between August 15 and the 1st day of school a student
  - 1. Turns in his completed Parent and Physician slip
  - 2. Participates in practice.

He then enrolls in a different school without a corresponding change of residence by parents. Is he eligible?

A. No, he is considered as declaring his intent to enroll where he first practiced and is ineligible for one calendar year.

#### RULE 13 — GRADUATES

#### Section 1.

Graduates are not eligible. A student is a graduate of a high school when he has completed the work required for graduation by that school and has received his diploma provided the school offers four years of work.

# Section 2.

Students meeting requirements for graduation in three and onehalf years in a high school with a regular four-year course shall be eligible to participate in school athletics the last half of the fourth year, provided they meet all other eligibility rules of the IHSAA.

\* \* \* \*

- Q.1 May a student, who receives his high school diploma, be eligible afterwards?
- A. No, the granting and acceptancee of a high school diploma makes the student a high school graduate. (See exceptions under Rule 16 Q. 9)
- Q.2 Who is a graduate?
- A. A graduate is a student who has finished his high school work and has received his high school diploma. Students who have completed sufficient work to receive a diploma, but who continue in school until commencement, must be considered eligible or ineligible according to all other rules of eligibility, such as age, time in school, participation, work carried, etc.

# RULE 14 - MARRIAGE

# Section 1.

Students who are or have been at any time married are not eligible for participation in interschool athletic competition.

# RULE 15 — OFFICIALS

# Section 1.

The major officials in all inter-school contests shall be on the approved list of officials in the IHSAA.

# Section 2.

Approval shall be secured by making application to the Board of Control through the Commissioner, and approved officials shall be given membership cards signed by the Commissioner.

# Section 3.

The Board of Control shall drop from the approved list of officials any persons who are visibly unfair and incompetent in their officiating or who do not serve the ideals and policies of the IHSAA. Disbarment letters shall be given to such officials and their names shall be published in the bulletins of the Association. The Board of Control has the authority to refuse approval or reregistration of officials for just cause.

#### Section 4.

There shall be an annual registration of Indiana High School Athletic Association officials each year. The date of registration and membership fee shall be determined by the Board of Control.

#### Section 5.

Approved officials in the Indiana High School Athletic Association will be classified into two groups: Registered and Certified.

# Section 6.

Women may become approved officials with the Indiana High School Athletic Association.

# Section 7.

High School students are not eligible for approval as IHSAA officials.

#### Section 8.

Approved officials may not play with or against high school students during the school year.

# Section 9.

A school using an official who is not approved by the IHSAA shall be suspended for a period not to exceed one calendar year.

# Section 10.

The membership year for approved officials is from July 1 to June 30 each year. All membership cards issued prior to July 1 each year are void as of that date. Principals should not use officials whose names do not appear in the printed lists or who cannot show membership cards issued for the current membership year. Be sure to check all officials carefully and require identification in all doubtful cases. Read membership cards carefully to know sports covered, name, validity and signature.

- Q.1 Who is an approved official in the IHSAA?
- A. A person who has made application to and received the approval of the Board of Control through its Commissioner.

- Q.2 Must all officials be approved?
- A. Yes. (Timers, scorers, etc. excluded)
- Q.3 Is it necessary for a licensed teacher to be approved to officiate in an inter-school game?
- A. Yes.
- Q.4 Are officials, who are certified in other states, eligible to officiate in Indiana?
- A. No, not until they have made application to the Commissioner and have been approved in Indiana.
- Q.5 May a member of a high school team officiate in independent games without jeopardizing his standing?
- A. Yes, provided remuneration is not accepted, directly or indirectly, and provided he does not use an assumed name.
- Q.6 What is the penalty for using a non-approved official?
- A. Suspension of the school usually, but cases are considered individually by the Board of Control.
- Q.7 Are approved officials required for girls' games?
- A. Yes, girls are bound by the same rules as boys, except in Play Days.
- $Q.8\,$  May a student of a high school officiate in games between member schools?
- A. No, a high school student is not eligible for approval as an athletic official.
- Q.9 Must an official renew his membership each year?
- A. Yes, after July 1 each year, to be eligible to officiate for member schools.
- $\ensuremath{\mathrm{Q.10}}$  Does approval in one sport give the right to officiate in other sports?
- A. No, approval is necessary for each sport.
- $\ensuremath{\mathrm{Q.11}}$  What is the policy of the IHSAA toward the decisions of officials?
- A. The decisions of officials are considered final and binding.
- Q.12 Does the IHSAA regulate the pay of officials?
- A. The pay of officials in tourneys and meets arranged by the Board of Control is regulated. In single games, the Principals and officials are expected to have contracts agreed upon prior to the games. The Board will adjudicate difficulties according to contracts.
- Q.13 When was the approval plan established?
- A. First in 1922—Registered and Certified classifications in 1946.
- Q.14 Are Registered officials eligible to officiate for member schools?
- Yes, Registered officials are eligible to officiate the sport or sports in which they are approved.

- Q.15 What is the difference between a Registered and a Certified official?
- A. A Registered official is an approved official who has been registered with the Association for less than three membership years or does not have on file six satisfactory forms for rating officials.
- Q.16 May an approved official promote an All-Star High School Contest?
- A. No. See Rule 10, Section 3.
- Q.17 Does the Board of Control have a regulation regarding the playing of an approved official with or against high school students in basketball after the season has closed in their schools?
- A. Yes, approved officials shall be placed on probation for one calendar year if the evidence shows that they participated in such games with knowledge of the rule against such playing by high school students.

# RULE 16 - PARTICIPATION

# Section 1.

Any student of a member school who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that season.

# Section 2.

A student, who has played in one or more inter-scholastic games in any season shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season. (See Exception, Rule 12, Section 10)

# Section 3.

A student who has participated in an interscholastic contest any one semester when ineligible is ineligible the remainder of that semester and all of his next semester in school.

# Section 4.

A member school student who participates for demonstration purposes, or otherwise, in a coaching school or clinic outside the State of Indiana becomes ineligible for inter-school athletics for a period of time as may be decided by the Board of Control. Such participation within the State of Indiana requires advance approval by the Commissioner.

# Section 5.

A member school student who participates in an athletic contest or demonstration during a season as an individual or on any other than his school team, becomes ineligible in that sport for the remainder of the season. Note: The season for golf, baseball, swimming, gymnastics, track, cross country and tennis defined as the period beginning with the opening day of school and ending with the closing day of

school, each school year. (See football, wrestling and basketball rules for limited seasons.)

#### Section 6.

A ninth, tenth, eleventh or twelfth grade student may not participate in a contest with or against a student enrolled in a grade lower than the ninth.

#### Section 7.

Participation of students in an athletic contest with or against players not belonging to their school constitutes a game. A "scrimmage" or practice by students with or against teams or players not belonging to their school is considered a game. A tryout or demonstration of athletic ability as a prospective student-athlete for a college shall be considered a violation of this rule.

#### Section 8.

All playing on independent teams should be checked carefully and frequently. Managers of independent teams should be warned of the dangers of using high school boys on teams A professional in one sport is a professional in all sports as far as eligibility in the IHSAA is concerned. (See Rule 24, Section 5 regarding independent baseball)

\* \* \* \*

- Q.1 Is an alumni game considered a game?
- A. Yes, such must be counted as one of the games permitted on the regular schedule.
- Q.2 What is considered an "inter" game or an "inter-scrimmage?"
- A. Participation of students in an athletic contest with or against players not belonging to their school constitutes a game. A "scrimmage" or practice by students with or against teams or players not belonging to their school is considered a game.
- Q.3 Is a game between the faculty members and the member school students of a member school considered an intra-mural game or interschool game?
- A. An Intra-mural game.
- Q.4 What constitutes an "intra-mural" contest?
- A. When all participants on both teams are members of your school, e.g., faculty, students, class tourney, will-be hasbeen, etc.
- Q.5 Is an intra-mural contest interpreted by IHSAA as a practice or a game?
- A. A practice.
- Q.6 When may a student (athlete or non-athlete) participate in an intramural sport without affecting his eligibility?
- A. 1. Only during that sport season for basketball, football and wrestling.
  - 2. At any time during the school year for other sports.

- Q.7 Are the same standards of eligibility required for intraschool games as for inter-school games?
- A. No, the IHSAA has no such requirements.
- Q.8 Is a game between the alumni and the high school students considered an intra-mural game or an inter-school game?
- A. Inter-school game.
- Q.9 May students participate in inter-school contests after their school is closed?
- A. Due to the great variation of time in which member schools close in the spring, (a) students may represent their schools in meets and tourneys sponsored by the IHSAA; (b) they may participate in scheduled contests where one of the two schools is still in session; (c) they may participate in a contest where both schools are closed, provided it was a regularly scheduled contest that was postponed because of weather conditions; and (d) graduating seniors may participate in contests according to the above conditions, even though they may have received their diplomas.
- Q.10 May a student play on any team other than a member school team?
- A. A student becomes ineligible in his school for the entire season of that sport in which he participates as a member of any team other than his school team. There is an additional penalty for participation out of season as set out in the rules regarding football, wrestling and basketball.
- Q.11 What is considered participation in a sport for a season?
- A. Playing in a part of one game or contest in a sport constitutes participation in that sport for that season. (See exception under Rule 12—Section 10)
- Q.12 May member schools play against College, Y.M.C.A. and independent teams?
- A. Yes, in single games, but not in tourneys, meets and leagues. In single games the member schools must obey all of the rules of the IHSAA and there must not be any high school students on the opposing teams.
- Q.13 May a student who plays on an independent team be permitted to participate in intra-mural athletics?
- A. Yes, IHSAA rules and regulations govern inter-school athletics only.
- Q.14 Does a student become ineligible in all sports, if he plays on a team other than his school team in one sport?
- A. No, a student becomes ineligible only in the sport in which he participates as a member of a team other than his school team unless he violates his amateur standing or some general rule of the association and then he becomes ineligible in all sports. Playing basketball out of season makes a student ineligible for all sports until the date of the State Final Tourney of the following year. Playing foootball out of season makes the student ineligible for all sports until the following November 30. Wrestling out of season makes the student

ineligible for all sports until the date of the State Final Wrestling Tourney of the following year.

- Q.15 If a student participates in a junior bowling league or tournament during the school year, does he make himself ineligible in other sports?
- A. No, providing he does not violate his amateur standing. Principal and coach approval should be acquired in advance if student would simultaneously be on any of his high school athletic teams.

# RULE 17 - PENALTIES

# Section 1.

Penalties imposed by the IHSAA upon players, member schools or officials for violations will be determined by the Commissioner or the Board of Control or both. The type and duration will be determined in accordance with the nature and extent of the offense.

# Section 2.

#### **FORFEITURES**

- a. When an ineligible student participates in team contests, the game must be forfeited.
- b. When an ineligible student participates in contests where individual points are awarded, only the points scored by the ineligible student are forfeited.
- c. When an ineligible student participates in an IHSAA tournament series contest, he must be disqualified immediately when discovered.
- d. Championship honors will be forfeited for withholding known requested data during investigations.

# Section 3.

WARNING is an official notice that an unexcusable, unethical or unsportsmanlike action has occurred, is a matter of record, and such an occurrence must not be repeated.

# Section 4.

PROBATION is a more severe type of warning. The school may continue its regular schedule and participate in tournaments only after filing a written report with the Commissioner listing measures to be taken to alleviate the problem.

# Section 5.

SUSPENSION—The Board of Control, after a hearing, may suspend a school for one or more of the following reasons or for any other reasons deemed necessary:

- a. Violations of the Constitution or By-Laws.
- b. Failure of the principal to assume direct responsibility for the school's inter-school athletic program.

- c. Refusal to abide by the decisions of the Commissioner or Board of Control.
- d. Violation of the Undue Influence Rule.
- e. Violation of contracts with other schools.
- f. Violation of game officials contracts.
- g. Using an ineligible player knowingly.
- h. Failure to provide adequate police protection.
- i. Removing team from field or floor because of dissatisfaction with the officiating.
- i. Failure to control the spectators and players' bench.
- k. Failure to adequately protect officials and visiting team.
- 1. Violation of practice and playing seasons.
- m. Mutual agreements to violate the rules of this Association.
- Note: Being on probation or previous warnings are not a prerequisite. A suspended school shall be considered as not belonging to this Association. All game and officials' contracts shall be null and void. Following the termination of suspension, the principal must make a written request for reinstatement.

\* \* \* \*

- Q.1 This question is often asked: "What will be the penalty for violation of such and such a rule?"
- A. Penalties in the IHSAA are not assigned in advance, as this democratic organization is built on the idea that the observance of its rules and regulations is more to be desired than the enforcement of them. The IHSAA believes that the essence of proper and willing observance is higher than enforcement and that we should resort to enforcement only when observance fails.

# RULE 18 - PROTESTS

# Section 1.

When a contestant, official, game or decision is protested, the game shall be played as scheduled and the protest, with evidence, then filed with the Commissioner.

# Section 2.

In cases of disputes or protests involving a student, the Principal of the school involved must furnish the Board of Control the following data on the contestant in question: number of years of participation; date and place of birth; average mark in each subject for the preceding semester; average mark in each subject from the beginning of the current semester; etc. Other pertinent information will be requested as needed.

#### Section 3.

In cases of disputes or protests involving school personnel, contracts, etc. the Principal filing the protest must submit all known details in writing to the Commissioner who will determine the action to be taken.

#### Section 4.

If, after receiving such protests, it is determined that information has purposely been withheld until an "advantageous" time, the Board of Control may, at its discretion, deny the protest.

# RULE 19 — REGULATIONS AND INTERPRETATIONS

The Athletic Council may make regulations and the Board of Control may make interpretations (and tournament rules) to promote the aims and interests of this Association.

# RULE 20 - SCHOLARSHIP

#### Section 1.

Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current semester, a passing grade in each of four or more subjects requiring a minimum of twenty regular high school recitations per week, exclusive of rhetoricals, physical training, military drill and deportment; in his last preceding semester in school, he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire semester.

Military Science and Tactics may be accepted for scholarship eligibility, provided it is approved by the State Department of Education as a full-time, solid subject; that it may be counted toward graduation from high school; and that it cannot be substituted for required courses in physical education.

Note: Schools having lengthened periods must meet the time equivalency.

# Interpretation

The part of Rule 20, Section 1 reading, "... a passing grade in each of four or more subjects requiring a minimum of twenty regular high school recitations per week" is interpreted to mean—"a passing grade in each of four regular high school subjects having a full semester value and for which a full semester credit is given." The combination of two subjects, not excluded in this Rule, which total credit value is equal to one full semester credit, may be counted toward eligibility for one and only one of the four regular high school subjects of full semester credit value, provided the two combined subjects remain the same subjects throughout the semester in which they are counted.

A regular high school course granting two credits for the semester due to the fact that additional time and study are required to meet academic requirements, may be counted as equivalent to two subjects.

#### Section 2.

Students enrolled for the first time must comply with the scholarship requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended.

#### Section 3.

In each of the subjects representing the minimum requirement of work specified in Section 1 above, the following shall govern:

- a. for the current semester the average of the period grades up to the time of certification must be passing;
- for the current or school grading period the average of the daily or weekly grades must be passing;
- c. If the average of the period grades at the beginning of any grading period is below passing in any subject, the pupil is ineligible as far as that subject is concerned for the entire grading period.

Note: Each school will establish consistent grading periods within a semester and within the school year. Student scholastic eligibility will be determined at the time when grades or credits have been made a matter of final record in the principal's office but no later than noon of the fifth school day following the end of such determined grading periods. The principal shall certify these specific dates to the IHSAA on his membership card.

# Section 4.

Scholastic deficiencies caused by the inability of a student to take or pass four regular subjects in the previous semester may be made up in night school, summer school, or correspondence school and counted toward eligibility provided:

- a. it be done in a regularly approved school or according to procedures approved by the State Department of Public Instruction.
- b. no more than two credits be given for work done during the summer months.
- c. all work be done and the credits be made a matter of final record in principal's office prior to the opening date of the semester in which eligibility is desired. This does not apply to incompletes.
- d. all work and credits be bona fide in every way and certified as such by the high school principal. In all other cases, the record at the end of the semester shall be final. Deficiencies in one semester cannot be made up in a subsequent semester for qualification purposes during that semester.

# Section 5.

An incomplete or condition at the end of a grading period or semester counts as a failure until deficiency has been removed, providing such is removed before the end of the following grading period or summer.

#### Section 6.

Passing work is meant work of such character that credit should be entered on the school records were credit given at the time of certification.

#### Section 7.

A student who withdraws from school for the semester within the first 15 days shall not be considered ineligible as to scholarship at the beginning of his next semester of enrollment, provided he was eligible when he withdrew.

#### Section 8.

Any student who carries at least fifteen hours of regular high school work is a high school student, provided such a student has been promoted to high school in the regular way and according to good school procedure.

\* \* \* \*

- Q.1 May back work be made up and counted toward eligibility?
- A. Yes. Back work cannot be made up however, during a grading period or semester for eligibility during that grading period or semester. Special privileges should not be granted to athletes.
- Q.2 Is a student, who has made sufficient credits to graduate at the end of semester one, eligible for athletics during semester two?
- A. Yes, provided he is eligible in all other respects and does not actually graduate at the end of semester one. Such a student must carry regular work during semester two.
- Q.3 May a credit in "Physical Fitness" be counted toward eligibility in athletics?
- A. No. See Section 1 above which specifically excludes "physical training" as a subject to count toward eligibility in athletics. The Board of Control has ruled that "Physical Fitness" comes under the term "physical training" as used in this Section.
- Q.4 Does summer school work in a school other than his home school jeopardize the standing of a student?
- A. No, provided the work is accepted by the State Department of Public Instruction and the home school authorities recognize the work of a non-home school for credit. In fact, the IHSAA recommends summer school work of an approved type for students needing credits.
- Q.5 If a student fails to pass in four regular high school subjects during semester two, may he count work done in summer school toward eligibility?
- A. See Section 4 above.
- Q.6 Does the IHSAA have a passing mark for scholarship?
- A. No, the passing marks of the schools are usually honored, but the Board of Control reserves the right to check the validity of grades and credits and to act on their findings.

- Q.7 To determine eligibility, what constitutes the last semester?
- A. The last semester for any student is the last semester in which the student was enrolled in any school for any length of time after the first fifteen (15) school days.
- Q.8 At the end of the second grading period in a semester, is a student eligible if he makes passing grades in four regular high school subjects for this period?
- A. In order to be eligible at the end of any grading period in a semester, a student must have passed in four regular high school subjects for the current grading period and his average grade in each of four regular high school subjects for all of the grading periods in that semester must be passing. A student must MAINTAIN his work in order to be eligible—weekly, by grading periods and by the semester.
- Q.9 Is a "condition" or an "incomplete" considered a "pass" in the IHSAA?
- A. No, the ISHAA considers a "pass" to mean that all work has been done and has been made a matter of final record in the principal's office, at the end of the grading period or semester. See Section 5 above.
- Q.10 Is a student, who carries three regular high school subjects and one or more eighth grade subjects, considered a high school student?
- A. Yes, a student who carries fifteen hours of regular high school work is a high school student, providing such a student has been promoted to high school in the regular way. Such a student would be considered enrolled in high school but would not be eligible because of insufficient subject matter.
- Q.11 Is a student who has been ineligible for a semester on account of scholarship eligible for the night of the last day of the semester?
- A. Yes, provided he has passed in four regular high school subjects and his credits have been made a matter of final record in the principal's office prior to the contest. See Section 3 Note above.
- Q.12 What constitutes scholarship eligibility?
- A. In order to be eligible for a current semester a student must have passed in four regular high school subjects in his last semester of enrollment in any high school and he must be maintaining a similar amount of work for the current semester. This statement for semesters applies to grading periods of the semester also.
- Q.13 If a student becomes ineligible on account of scholarship at the end of a semester, does this make him ineligible for one whole semester afterwards?
- A. Yes.
- Q.14 If a student becomes ineligible at the end of a grading period in a semester, when can he become eligible?
- A. At the end of the next regular grading period in that semester provided he passes in four regular high school subjects during the grading period and also provided his av-

- erage in each subject for all grading periods of the semester is passing in a similar amount or work,
- Q.15 If a student becomes ineligible on Friday at the end of a grading period, is he eligible for that night?
- A. No, a student is ineligible whenever he becomes ineligible. See Section 3 Note above.
- Q.16 If a student becomes eligible on Friday at the end of a grading period, is he eligible for that night?
- Yes, a student is eligible whenever he becomes eligible. See Section 3 Note above.
- Q.17 When is a student maintaining his work during a semester?
- A. When he is passing in four regular high school subjects during the current week, the current grading period, the last grading period and for all grading periods of the semester according to averages.
- Q.18 If a student fails to pass in four regular high school subjects during the last grading period of a semester but earns credits in four regular high school subjects for the semester, will he be eligible at the beginning of the first grading period of the next semester?
- Yes, the books are considered closed at the end of the semester.
- Q.19 If a student passes in four regular high school subjects during the last grading period of a semester but fails to earn credits in four regular high school subjects for the semester, will he be eligible at all for the next semester?
- A. No.

# RULE 21 - SEMESTER

One half of a school year constitutes a semester and parts of two semesters or a part of one semester does not make a semester.

# RULE 22 — TRANSFERS

Also see Rule 12-Enrollment and Attendance,

# Section 1.

No student who has transferred from another high school shall be certified for inter-school athletics until the principal has on file ar IHSAA Athletic Transfer Blank signed by the principal of the school from which the student transferred.

# Section 2.

If a student transfers from one school of a city or school corporation to another of the same city or same school corporation, he shabe ineligible for participation for one calendar year unless ther are definitely marked districts and his parents actually change the residence to the new school district.

#### Section 3.

If a student transfers from one member school to another member school and his parents actually change their residence to the second school district, he shall be as eligible as he was in the school from which he withdrew.

# Section 4.

If a student enters a school other than the public school in his home district in which his parents reside and then transfers to his home school, he must attend for one calendar year to become eligible. Likewise, he would have to attend one calendar year to become eligible if he attended a school not in his home district and transferred to a non public or public school located in his home district.

#### Section 5.

If a student transfers from one non public school to another non public school in the same district, he shall be ineligible for one calendar year whether parents move or do not move.

#### Section 6.

Unavoidable Change of Residence. A student who, because of unavoidable circumstances such as the death of the parents or guardian, finds it necessary to change residence from one school district to another in order to have a home, may be declared eligible by the Board of Control, provided the principal of each member school files a statement, with supporting evidence, with the Board of Control as proof that the change was necessary and that no undue influence was attached to the case in any way. If any action of a legal agency is to be submitted as evidence of unavoidable change of residence, such action should be taken prior to the student's enrollment in the new school.

\* \* \* \* \*

- Q.1 If a student transfers from a member school located in one city or school district to a school in another city or school district, how is his eligibility determined?
- A. By applying Rule 22 above. Following are some statements which will help to clarify this rule:
- a. Under normal circumstances, a student usually attends high school in the district where his parents reside.
- b. If the parents move to another school district, the student is eligible as follows (a) if he changes schools at the same time parents change residence, (b) if parents change during a semester, the student may change at the end of that semester, but no later and (c) student need not change schools at all, provided no undue influence is used to retain him there. An underclassman who does not transfer is ineligible until a "Residence Eligibility After Parents Move From District" form has been reviewed by the IHSAA.
- c. A student who changes schools without a corresponding change of residence by the parents is ineligible for one

calendar year—but if the parents actually change their residence to the new district within the year, the student becomes eligible immediately.

- d. If a student attends a school outside his home school district and subsequently returns to his home school, he is ineligible for one calendar year. This also includes military, private, and religious schools which offer work on the secondary school level.
- e. A student who changes schools because of unavoidable circumstances such as the death of a parent or guardian may be declared eligible by the Board of Control, provided the principal of each school concerned signs a statement that the change was unavoidable, in order that the student have a home. Each case is checked carefully before a decision is made by the Board of Control.
- f. If a student changes schools because of an action by a legal agency taken before the change is made, a copy of such legal action may be filed with the IHSAA in connection with proof that the change of schools was unavoidable.
- g. A student, whose parents are separated or divorced and reside in separate school districts, may choose residence with either parent with residence eligibility. Once his place of residence has been determined, either by order of the court, or mutual agreement of the parents, he cannot change residence to the home of the other parent without losing eligibility for one calendar year.
- h. A student who has been enrolled in Indiana Boys' School may return to his home school with the same residence eligibility as when he left. Credits earned in the state school are considered the same as those earned in any other high school so far as eligibility is concerned.
- i. It is the duty of the principal to check carefully the record of every student who transfers from another school. The principal should also advise the students who contemplate making a change of schools as to the rules of eligibility regarding transfers.
- Q.2 May practices in one school be counted as such in another school where a student changes schools?
- A. Yes, provided definite proof of the practices are on file from the principal of the school in which the practices were held.
- Q.3 When parents contemplate changing their residence soon to another school district, may a student transfer in advance and be eligible for competition?
- A.(1) He may transfer but will be ineligible for competition until parents definitely change their residence to the second school district.
- A.(2) In such cases the Principal shall inform the student and parents that, if for any reason they do not move and student returns to first school, he shall be ineligible for one calendar year.

# RULE 23-UNDUE INFLUENCE

#### Section 1.

The use of undue influence by any person or persons to secure or to retain a student or to secure or to retain one or both of the parents or guardians of a student as residents, may cause the student to be ineligible for high school athletics for a period subject to the determination of the Board of Control and shall jeopardize the standing of the high school in the IHSAA. By action of the Athletic Council and Board of Control, this rule is interpreted to include any undue influence that may be exerted by anyone on a student who has not yet entered the ninth grade, to enroll in a school other than his home school or the one he ordinarily would be expected to attend or any school where he and/or his parents previously had filed a choice of subject matter card or other written evidence of preliminary enrollment or registration.

#### Section 2.

No member school student shall be eligible to participate in any interschool contest under the rules of the IHSAA, if it shall be shown that he or any member of his family is receiving any remuneration, either directly or indirectly, to influence him or his family to reside in a given school district in order to establish eligibility on the team of said school, and any school permitting such participation shall, upon satisfactory evidence, submitted to the Board of Control, be suspened from membership in the IHSAA for a term of not less than one year. This rule shall not interfere with the right of high school pupils to work during vacation or during out of school hours in order to earn their way through high school. It shall apply to the use of any funds created by gift, or by subscription with the intent of offering them parts of them for the free use of the player or any member of his family as an inducement to get them to change their residence to the district of the said school and to maintain residence therein.

\* \* \* \*

- Q.1 Is it the duty of the IHSAA to prove that undue influence has been used?
- A. No, the member school principal has agreed to conduct his athletic activities according to the rules and regulations of the IHSAA. Where there is a question, it is the duty of the high school principal to meet the question. He cannot certify that his students are eligible unless he knows that they are eligible.
- Q.2 Why should a school be penalized because some person outside of school uses undue influence?
- A. Usually a school is not penalized unless it is involved or uses the student in question in athletics. In the second place, the results are the same whether some person in school or some person outside of school uses undue influence: An athlete that has been retained or secured through the use undue influence and the school that uses such an athlete on teams in inter-school athletic competition profits by the use of undue influence.

- Q.3 What constitutes the use of undue influence in the IHSAA?
- A. An all-inclusive answer for all time and under all conditions cannot be given, but the use of any of the following inducements may come under the rule:
  - Offer or acceptance of money or other valuable consideration.
  - 2. Reduction or remission of regular tuition.
  - 3. Waiving the requirement of legal transfers according to law.
  - 4. Offer or acceptance of board, room or clothing.
  - 5. Offer or acceptance of remuneration for work in excess of amount regularly paid for such service.
  - 6. Free transportation.
  - 7. Transportation by coach, principal, teacher or school official.
  - Offer of acceptance of school privileges or considerations not granted to other students.
  - Making home with coach, principal, teacher or school official.
  - 10. Free rent or reduced rent for parents.
  - 11. Offer or payment of moving expenses of parents.
  - 12. Any inducement to get parents or students to change residence for athletic reasons.

#### RULE 24 — BASEBALL

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

# Section 1.

The National Alliance Edition of Baseball Rules shall govern in baseball.

# Section 2.

The baseball season is defined as beginning and ending with the school year.

# Section 3.

There shall be ten separate days of organized practice in baseball under the direct supervision of the high school coaching staff by each player preceding participation in interschool contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day.

# Section 4.

A pitcher may not pitch in more than ten innings in any three consecutive calendar days. This period begins when he officially enters the game as a pitcher.

# Section 5.

# Independent Summer Baseball

a. High school students may play on independent baseball teams during the summer when school is not in session without jeopardizing their standing or the standing of their school in the IHSAA provided

they do not play under assumed names and also provided they do not accept remuneration, directly or indirectly for their playing.

b. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted by the students if such are accepted in service rather than in money or in some other material form. The IHSAA expects all high school students to so conduct themselves at all times that they, their high school and the State Association will be honored.

c. All such playing should be checked carefully and frequently. The requirements should be extended to all students. Managers of independent teams should be warned of the dangers of using high school boys on baseball teams. A professional in one sport is a professional in all sports as far as eligibility in the IHSAA is concerned.

d. High school students, who play on baseball teams other than their high school teams during the school year, make themselves ineligible for baseball in high school in that school year.

e. High school students, who play on baseball teams other than their high school teams during the school year, must have written permission of their high school principal on file in the principal's office prior to the participation. The responsibility of securing and filing this written permission rests with the student, the manager of the non-high school team and finally with the high school principal. See Note at end of next sub-section.

f. The IHSAA considers that a member school is entitled to the high school students in baseball during the school year and that participation in baseball elsewhere should not take place except by the written permission of the high school principal in each case.

Note No. 1: Permission granted by a principal to a boy to play baseball on a team other than his school team during the school year makes the boy ineligible for the school team in baseball. No permit can be issued to violate any of the rules of the IHSAA. The purpose of the permit is to keep the principal informed about his students.

Note No. 2: It is not considered a violation of present IHSAA rules for a member school, during the summer vacation period, to sponsor a team composed entirely of its own students in such sports as baseball, softball, tennis and golf. While an athletic contest conducted under this interpretation would be similar to that of other independent amateur organizations, it is recommended that participating schools, through their principals, mutually agree to abide by IHSAA rules except for such modifications as may be necessary.

# Section 6.

A member school student shall not be considered as violating his amateur standing if he participates, during the summer vacation, in baseball schools and clinics sponsored by professional major and minor league baseball clubs.

Note—Any employee or school official of a member school who acts as an agent or encourages any negotiations between a high school student and representatives of Organized Baseball prior to the student's graduation, is violating the Agreement between the

National Federation and Organized Baseball. Such action on the part of any employee or school official may cause his school to be suspended from the IHSAA for a period of time to be determined by the Board of Control.

Any evidence that a representative of Organized Baseball is attempting to or has signed a student prior to graduation should be reported to the IHSAA at once. This is a violation of the Agreement between the National Federation and Organized Baseball, and the penalty for such action is under the jurisdiction of Organized Baseball.

\* \* \* \*

Q.1 Does a high school student violate the rules of the IHSAA by playing independent baseball during the summer?

A. High School students may play independent baseball during the summer months when school is not in session without jeopardizing their standing in high school, provided they do not accept remuneration, directly or indirectly, and also provided they do not play under assumed names. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted by such players if accepted in service and not in any other way. All such playing should be checked by principals. (See Rule 24, Section 5).

(Note: This answer applies to other summer sports, not having definite seasons, provided other rules and regulations of the IHSAA are observed.)

- Q.2 Is a student, who plays on an independent baseball team during semester one, ineligible for high school baseball during semester two?
- A. Yes, such a student is ineligible for baseball for semester one and two as baseball is a school year sport.
- Q.3 If a student plays on an independent team in baseball or softball during the school year, does he make himself ineligible for baseball in high school?
- A. No, he makes himself ineligible only in the sport in which he participates on an independent team, provided he does not violate his amateur standing in some way.

# RULE 25 — BASKETBALL

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

# Section 1.

The Official Rules of the National Basketball Committee of the United States and Canada shall govern basketball.

# Section 2.

All games other than first-team games shall be played in quarters of six minutes in length.

#### Section 3.

The maximum number of games for the regular schedule of any team in basketball shall be eighteen. (The penalty is suspension.)

- a. A player may participate in a maximum of seventy-two quarters of interschool basketball, and one invitational tourney during any one season. No player may participate in more than four quarters in any one session. If a player participates in two invitational tourneys, the quarters played in one tourney, shall be included in the seventy-two quarters permitted during the season.
- b. A record of the quarters played in basketball by individual players shall be kept on file in the principal's office at all times for his information in certifying eligibility of players.

#### Section 4.

"Donkey Basketball," "Skruball," "Skateball" or any similar game in which a basketball and/or basketball goals are used shall be considered a game of basketball. High school students who participate in "Donkey Basketball," "Skruball," "Skateball" or similar games, shall be subject to IHSAA eligibility rules as in regular basketball games.

#### Section 5.

No inter-school basketball games shall be played by students or schools prior to November 1 of each year or after the closing date of the sectional tourneys of the State Basketball Championship Series each year, except by such students and such schools as are participants in the tourneys of the State Basketball Championship series; and the close of the basketball season for these students and schools shall be not later in any event than the date of the Final Tourney or not later than the elimination of the school in one of these tourneys if earlier than this final tourney date. The penalty is suspension.

Students playing independent, league, recreation or organized basketball games, before November 1 or after the closing date of the Sectional Basketball Tourney of the State Basketball Championship series, make themselves ineligible for all interscholastic athletics until the closing date of the State Basketball Championship Tournament of the following year. A prospective student-athlete who engages in a practice, scrimmage, tryout or otherwise demonstrates his athletic ability either on or off the campus for a college shall be considered in violation of this rule.

# Section 6.

All organized or formal basketball practices by players or teams shall be limited to the period beginning October 1 and ending with the date of the State Final Championship Basketball Tourney each school year.

#### Section 7.

There shall be ten separate days of organized practice in basketball under the direct supervision of the high school coaching staff by each player preceding participation in inter-school contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day.

#### Section 8.

All basketball tourneys, other than the State Championship Tourney series, shall be held prior to February of each year.

- a. No inter-school basketball tourney which involves more than four schools, shall be held without the sanction of the IHSAA, except where all the schools are located in a single county.
- b. Ninth grade basketball tournaments shall be completed prior to the week of the sectional basketball tournament each year. Players who compete in the ninth grade tournament played after January 31, will not be eligible to compete in the State Championship Tourney Series.

#### Section 9.

Teams and players may participate in two basketball tourneys in addition to the tourneys of the State Basketball Championship Series under the following provisions:

- a. The games in one tourney may be in addition to the regular schedule.
- b. The games of the other tourney shall be included within the eighteen game limitation for the season's schedule.
- c. Teams or players participating in a tourney which extends into a second week shall not be permitted to enter a second tourney.
- d. No tourney shall be scheduled to extend over more than two consecutive weekends.

The penalty for violation of this section is suspension.

# Section 10.

A high school shall not be considered eligible to enter a sectional basketball tourney in the IHSAA in any year unless the team representing the high school has played eight (8) or more interscholastic games during that season before the Official Entry Blank for Tourneys is filed in the IHSAA office.

Note: The following apply to the IHSAA tourney games:

- a. Semi-state and State Final Tourney games will be played on floors 50 x 84 feet. Sectional and regional tourney games may be played on the floors of the same dimensions where conditions permit.
- Playing floors shall be marked with a four foot end line wherever deemed practical.
- c. The backboards shall be rectangles, six feet horizontally and four feet vertically in all IHSAA tourneys, but fan shaped boards as described in the official rules may be used in single games by mutual consent prior to the game.
- d. If the backboard is transparent, it shall be marked as follows: A rectangle shall be centered behind the ring and marked by a two-inch white line. The rectangle shall have outside dimensions of twenty-four inches horizontally and eighteen inches vertically. For the rectangular backboard, the top edge of the baseline shall be level with the ring. Borders of the

backboard should be marked with a white line three inches in width.

- e. The regulation type of baskets, as described in the official rules, shall be used in all IHSAA tourneys, but other types of baskets may be used in single games by mutual consent prior to the game. Each basket ring and the attaching flange and braces shall be bright orange in color.
- f. The molded type of basketball, tanned in natural or orange leather color shall be used in all IHSAA tourneys. Other types and other colors may be used in single games by mutual consent prior to the game.

- Q.1 When may students practice basketball within the school?
- Organized or formal practices in basketball by players or teams may be held within the school from the period beginning October 1 and ending on the date of the State Final Championship Basketball Tourney each school year.
- Q.2 Does the game limitation apply to the first team only?
- The game limitation applies to any team-first, second. third, etc.
- Q.3 Are students limited to eighteen scheduled games?
- No students are limited to 72 quarters during the season's schedule of games.
- Q.4 In how many tourneys may a team play in addition to the games permitted on the regular schedule?
- See Section 9 of this Rule. A.
- Would a preliminary tourney and a final tourney count as one tourney or two tourneys?
- Two tourneys. A.
- Q.6 May a high school have a complete schedule for the second team in any sport?
- Yes, each school team can and should be considered a representative team of the high school and, as such, be governed by all of the IHSAA rules and privileges.
- Q.7 Has the IHSAA established the size of a regulation basketball floor?
- No, but the IHSAA uses 84' x 50' in the Semi-State, and State Final, and recommends all floors to be marked with the four foot end-line.
- Q.8 Is there a limit to the number of players a coach may use in a basketball game?
- No; except in games and tourneys sponsored and managed by the IHSAA Board of Control.
- Q.9 What is considered a game of basketball?
- A game of any kind in the IHSAA is an "inter" contest as distinguished from an "intra" contest. An "inter" scrimmage is a game.
- Q.10 Must a boy, who has participated in football during the

season, have ten days of organized practice in basketball before he is eligible to play in a game of basketball?

- A.
- Q.11 Are "Donkey Basketball," "Skruball;" "Skateball" or other similar games considered basketball in the IHSAA?
- Yes, and all IHSAA rules are binding.
- Q.12 When does the basketball season begin and end for teams and individuals?
- See Section 6 of this Rule.
- Q.13 May member school players and teams play independent basketball in the interim between the sectional tourneys and the final tourney if the season in the school is closed?
- No, such playing would constitute a violation.
- Q.14 May more games than are allowed under the game limitation be played by a team by juggling the players on the
- A. No, the game limitation requirement holds for teams.
- Q.15 May an "A" team or "first" team be designated as "B" team and thus evade the rule?
- No, the wording of the rule and the spirit of the rule are clear and binding.
- Q.16 Are vocational, agricultural and similar teams and players bound by the rules and regulations of the IHSAA?
- Yes, all member school teams and players are subject to these rules and regulations. The member school principal is responsible for all players and teams representing the high school in any way.
- Q.17 May the same player be used in more than one basketball game during the same evening or in the same half day (morning or afternoon session)?
- Yes, but players are limited to only four quarters in any one session.
- Q.18 If a "practice" game of basketball is played is it to be counted as one of the eighteen games on the regular schedule?
- Inter-"practice" games are regular games and must be counted as such. Intra-"practice" games are not counted as regular games. In fact, there are no such things as practice games in the IHSAA. There are practice games within the school only.

#### RULE 26 — CROSS COUNTRY

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

#### Section 1.

The National Alliance Edition of Track and Field Rules shall govern Cross Country with the following exception:

a. A member of an Indiana high school cross country team may not run in more than one meet per day in interscholastic competition.

#### Section 2.

There shall be ten separate days of organized practice in cross country under the direct supervision of the high school coaching staff by each player preceding participation in inter-school contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day.

## RULE 27 - FOOTBALL

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

#### Section 1.

Official Football Rules of the National Alliance shall govern in football.

a. All games other than first team games shall be played in quarters of nine minutes in length.

#### Section 2.

All inter-school football games by players or teams shall be limited to the period beginning with the opening day of school or September 1 if school is not in session and ending November 30 of each calendar year. The penalty to a school for playing football after November 30 of any year shall be suspension, and the penalty for a student so playing shall be ineligibility for all inter-school athletics until the following November 30. (Exception, See Section 3e below)

Note: It is assumed that any member school which participates in an interschool football game under the above rule before the opening day of school does so with the approval of their Board of School Trustees through their Superintendent of Schools.

#### Section 3.

The maximum number of inter-school games for any team in football shall be ten and one jamboree.

a. A player may participate in a maximum of forty quarters of inter-school football, exclusive of one jamboree, during any one season. No student may participate in more than four quarters of football on successive days.

b. A record of the quarters played in football by individual players shall be kept on file in the principal's office at all times for his information in certifying eligibility of players.

c. Schools shall be limited to the playing of one inter-school football game in a calendar week for each team sponsored. (Calendar week defined as Monday through Saturday). A student may participate in only four quarters of inter-school football during a week. In order to place the emphasis on the varsity squad, the record of quarters of each student shall start on the day of a varsity scheduled game and end the day before the next varsity game scheduled or seven days which ever comes first. No student may participate in more than four quarters of football on successive days.

d. A team or player may participate in no more than two quarters in one football jamboree without such participation being charged as a game or quarters played.

e. No team or player shall participate in a football jamboree earlier than the day following the tenth day of practice nor

later than the second calendar day prior to the first scheduled game.

(Note: A football jamboree is defined as a contest in which four or more schools participate. Each school shall be limited to playing of no more than two quarters. Quarters shall be no more than 12 minutes in length.)

#### Section 4.

Non-contact football practice will be permissible for 90 minutes or less on each of 3 week days immediately preceding August 15. Except for football shoes, helmets and mouth pieces—no football uniforms, no footballs, no protective equipment such as pads, guards, etc., or training aids such as tackling or blocking equipment or similar devices are to be used. These 3 days are to be used primarily for physical conditioning, sprints, agility drills, etc.

#### Section 5.

All organized and formal contact football practices by players or teams shall be limited to the period beginning August 15 and ending November 30 of each school year.

#### Section 6.

All football practices shall be held on the regular practice or play facilities and under the direct supervision of the member school coach/es.

#### Section 7.

There shall be ten separate days of organized football practice by each player preceding participation in interschool contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day.

\* \* \* \*

- Q.1 What date marks the end of the football season?
- A. November 30 of each year.
- Q.2 May football practices be held any time during the school year?
- A. No. see Sections 4 and 5 above.
- Q.3 Does the rule requiring football practices to be held on the regular practice or play field under the direct supervision of the high school coaching staff prevent summer football camps for high school teams and players?
- A. Yes.

## RULE 28 — GOLF

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

## Section 1.

The United States Golf Association Rules shall govern with such exceptions as the Board of Control deem necessary. When USGA rules conflict with any IHSAA rules and by-laws, the IHSAA rules take precedence.

#### Section 2.

Member school students may participate in independent golf tourneys and meets during the summer vacation period without violating their amateur standing provided they do not accept cash or merchandise prizes or the equivalent thereof. Medals or trophies may be accepted.

#### Section 3.

It is not considered a violation of present IHSAA rules for a member school, during the summer vacation period, to sponsor a team composed entirely of its own students in such sports as baseball, tennis, and golf. While an athletic contest conducted under this interpretation would be similar to that of other independent amateur organizations, it is recommended that participating schools, through their principals, mutually agree to abide by IHSAA rules except for such modifications as may be necessary.

#### RULE 29 — GYMNASTICS

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

#### Section 1.

The Board of Control establishes the rules and regulations for the present time.

#### Section 2.

There shall be ten separate days of organized practice under the direct supervision of the high school coaching staff by each player preceding participation in inter-school contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day.

#### RULE 30 - SWIMMING

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

## Section 1.

The Intercollegiate Swimming Guide for interscholastic swimming shall govern.

### Section 2.

There shall be ten separate days of organized practice under the direct supervision of the high school coaching staff by each player preceding Participation in inter-school contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day.

### RULE 31 — TENNIS

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

### Section 1.

The United States Lawn Tennis Association Rules shall govern.

### Section 2.

It is not considered a violation of present IHSAA rules for a mem-

ber school, during the summer vacation period, to sponsor a team composed entirely of its own students in such sports as baseball, softball, tennis, and golf. While an athletic contest conducted under this interpretation would be similar to that of other independent amateur organizations, it is recommended that participating schools, through their principals, mutually agree to abide by IHSAA rules except for such modifications as may be necessary.

#### RULE 32 — TRACK AND FIELD

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

#### Section 1.

The National Alliance Edition of Track and Field rules shall govern in track and field with the following exceptions:

- a. The section regarding a Games Committee in Rule 2, shall be void.
- b. Scoring: In the State Final Meet, places in the relays shall count as follows: First, 10 points; Second, 8 points; third, 6 points; fourth, 4 points; and fifth, 2 points.

(Note: All other scoring will follow outline in National Alliance Track and Field Rules Book).

- c. Events: The events in all meets shall be 100 yard dash; 220 yard dash; 440 yard dash; half-mile run; mile run; 120 yard high hurdles; 180 yard low hurdles; running high jump; running long jump; pole vault; putting 12-lb. shot; two-mile run; mile relay and half-mile relay.
- d. Order of Events 120 yard high hurdles trials; 100 yard dash trials; 180 yard low hurdles trials; 220 yard dash trials; 120 yard high hurdles final; mile run; 100 yard dash final; 440 yard dash; 880 yard run; 220 yard dash final; 180 yard low hurdles final; twomile run; mile relay; half-mile relay. Note: All track meets, including dual, shall use this order of events.
- e. A contestant who participates in the two mile-run shall not be allowed to participate in any other track event in which he runs 880 or more yards. Note: In the State Meet Series no contestant in the 880 yard run, mile run or two-mile run may participate in any other race of 880 or more yards.

### Section 2.

There shall be ten separate days of organized practice in track and field under the direct supervision of the high school coaching staff by each player preceding participation in inter-school contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day.

## RULE 33 - WRESTLING

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

## Section 1.

The Intercollegiate Wrestling Guide for High School Wrestling shall govern.

#### Section 2.

The maximum number of dual meets for the regular schedule of any student or team in wrestling shall be fourteen. A student or team may participate in the following (1) Fourteen inter-school dual meets and one tournament in addition to the State Tournament Series, or (2) additional tournaments may be scheduled and each shall count as two of the fourteen dual meets. Each weigh-in for any tournament shall count as only one weigh-in toward the minimum requirements for State Tournament Series qualification.

Note: An inter-school wrestling meet which involves three or more schools shall be considered a tournament.

#### Section 3.

There shall be no scheduled wrestling meets or tourneys before November 20 each school year or after the State Final Championship Wrestling Tourney. The penalty is suspension.

#### Section 4.

All organized or formal wrestling practice by students or teams shall be limited to the period beginning November 1 and ending with the date of the State Final Championship Wrestling Tourney each school year. Students who practice or participate in out-ofseason wrestling make themselves ineligible for all interscholastic athletics until the closing date of the State Wrestling Championship Tourney the following year.

#### Section 5.

There shall be ten separate days of organized practice in wrestling under the direct supervision of the high school coaching staff by each player preceding participation in inter-school contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day.

#### Section 6.

During the weigh-in period for dual meets, each coach shall record the name of the student who is to wrestle in each weight classification. These students shall wrestle unless they are unable to do so because of illness or other extenuating circumstances. Substitutions can be made only by mutual consent of the coaches, Penalty: Forfeiture of the match. One additional eligible student in each weight class may be weighed-in at dual meets and tournaments for the purpose of meeting minimum weight classification requirements for the state tournament series.

#### Section 7.

A student shall be considered as having engaged in a bout if he has officially weighed in, his name has been recorded in the official scorebook, and he has appeared on the mat in uniform, willing to wrestle.

#### Section 8.

Each time a student enters a dual meet or tournament his actual weight shall be recorded in the official scorebook in ink and signed by the referee at weigh-in time. The home scorebook shall be the official book.

#### Section 9.

A student may wrestle only in his certified weight class determined in December or in one division above his certified class.

#### Q.1 What is a dual meet?

A meet in which only two schools participate. When three or more schools are involved, it is considered a tournament,

#### PART II JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS

#### Section 1.

Students and/or teams in schools having junior membership may participate on the following basis:

- a. A student must meet all the eligibility rules of the Association in all respects.
- b. Teams may compete against only ninth and/or tenth grade teams from other member schools. This does not affect girls playdays, camps or clinics.
- c. Schools may participate in tourneys and meets in accordance with the membership regulations in Article III, Section 4, of the IHSAA Constitution.
- d. Schools may not use students below the ninth grade on their own ninth grade athletic teams in interscholastic games.
- Member schools may not compete with schools who do not hold iunior membership if such schools are eligible for membership.
- f. A ninth grade student who is eligible in a school having junior membership may compete on either his team or the parent high school team, but not on both. A student who is advanced to the high school team in one sport may not return to his school team in that sport. (Note: It is strongly recommended that ninth grade students

in schools holding junior memberships participate only on their

- g. A ninth grade student may not participate in a contest with or against a student enrolled in a grade lower than the ninth.
- h. The principal is responsible to the IHSAA for the conduct of athletics in that school.
- i. It is strongly recommended that the spirit and philosophy of the rules and the regulations of the IHSAA be followed by schools in conducting their athletic program for students below the ninth grade. Note: Schools holding junior memberships are subject to all

rules and regulations of the IHSAA with the modifications

given above.

#### PART III GIRLS INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS

#### Section 1.

Girls' athletics are bound by the rules and regulations of the IHSAA except for mixed team participation in Girls' Play Day programs.

#### Section 2.

Rules for Girls' contests shall be those published by the Division for Girls' and Women's Sports of the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

#### Section 3.

Inter-school basketball games and tourneys are not recommended for girls.

#### Section 4.

It is recommended that women coaches and officials be employed for girls' contests and Play Day programs.

#### Section 5.

Girls' basketball teams may not play in state or national tourneys.

#### Section 6.

Play Day program for Girls:

- a. A Play Day is a meeting of more than two schools where the program consists of games, sports, folk dancing and social entertainment. Participation is on the basis of mixed teams chosen by lot and does not represent specific schools.
- b. Parents' and physicians' certificates are required for Play Days.
- c. Scholarship, out of season participation, age and enrollment requirements are the same as for inter-school competition.
- d. Play Days shall be approved by the principals of the schools participating and certification given for all girls participating in them.
- e. Girls who play on color or mixed teams in a playday program, camp or clinic, which may include swimming, archery, tennis, track, volleyball, basketball, softball, etc., do not make themselves ineligible for their own high school teams in these sports in regular inter-school games.

# INDIANA LEAGUE OF HIGH SCHOOL GIRLS' ATHLETIC ASSOCIATIONS

#### - Purpose -

Many girls in high school are interested in a more extensive program of physical education than can be provided in the regular physical education classes. This desire for a more extensive physical education program has led many high schools to organize some type of girls' athletic association. In 1931 the Indiana League of High School Girls' Athletic Associations was formed, with the purpose of stimulating the co-curricular phase of the high school girls' physical education program. Membership in the League is open to any high school in the State of Indiana. The League has the endorsement of the Indiana High School Athletic Association and the Division of Health and Physical Education of the Indiana State Board of Health.

The State League offers much to both physical education teachers and students. It provides opportunities for sponsors and students to exchange ideas, share problems, receive encouragement, and engage in a variety of learning activities. The enthusiasm generated through the enjoyment of learning and doing things with people of like interests is one of the main reasons the League is steadily growing.

#### - Activities -

Each organization carries on its own program of varied activities for which points are given. The purpose of awarding points is to encourage regularity of attendance and to furnish a uniform basis for awards., if a school desires to use awards. The Sponsor's Handbook explains the suggested point system.

The State League sponsors activities on both a state and a district basis. Each spring the League, with the co-operation of a state college or university physical education department as host, sponsors a Wall Plaque Winners' playday. Attending this playday is perhaps as great an honor as winning the wall plaque, for here outstanding girls from all over Indiana come together for a day of fun and sport. Each fall the League sponsors a State Leadership Camp—training girls and inspiring both girls and sponsors to be better leaders in their organizations, schools and communities. District activities include dance days, playdays, basketball clinics, and week-end camps—usually two or three such activities each year.

"Sportingly Yours," published six times yearly, contains news of other G.A.A. groups, ideas, new materials, bulletin board materials, and professional articles. Both sponsors and students find it interesting and helpful. "Sportingly Yours," the official organ of the Indiana League, is edited by a high school G. A. A. and is published by the Indiana State Board of Health.

\* \* \* \*

- Q.1 Are girls bound by the rules and regulations of the IHSAA?
- A. Yes, all students on all teams in high schools belonging to the IHSAA are bound by its rules and regulations.

- Q.2 May girls play basketball according to boys' rules?
- A. No, girls must play according to rules published by the Division for Girls and Women's Sports of the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation.
- Q.3 Is the IHSAA opposed to inter-school basketball games and tourneys for girls?
- A. No, but they are not recommended. Special care should be used, however, in such games and tourneys to know that girls are physically fit at all times.
- Q.4 May men coach girls in athletic games?
- A. Yes, it is recommended however that women coaches and women officials be employed for girls' athletics.
- Q.5 May girls' basketball teams play in state tourneys or national tourneys?
- A. No.

### PART IV NATIONAL FEDERATION OF STATE HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATIONS

Indiana was admitted in 1924. The National Federation was organized in 1920 and now consists of 50 member state high school associations. Canadian provinces of Manitoba, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Ontario, Prince Edward Island and Saskatchewan are affiliated.

These state associations have united to secure the benefits of cooperative action which eliminates unnecessary duplication of work and which increases efficiency through the pooling and coordinating of efforts of all who are engaged in high school athletic activities.

The legislative body is the National Council made up of one representative from each member state association. Such representative must be an officer or a member of his state board of control. The executive body is the Executive Committee of seven state board of control members from the seven territorial sections as outlined in the constitution. Their election is by the National Council at the annual meeting.

The growth in size and influence of the state high school associations and their National Federation insures some degree of teamwork on the part of 20,100 high schools and this teamwork has enabled them to formulate policies and plans for improving high school athletic conditions and to make these plans function. The National Federation probably represents the largest closely knit organized body of athletes in the world. The opportunities for contributing to the welfare of the high school athletic program are unlimited.

The Federation was organized primarily to secure proper adherence to the eligibility rules of the various state associations in interstate contests and meets. As the prestige of the national organization grew, a program for the sanctioning of interstate meets was developed. This later led to definite action relative to national and sectional athletic events. At the present time, no national

athletic meet or tournament is sanctioned. Meets or tournaments, which involve the schools of more than one state, are sanctioned in accordance with definite limitations in connection with the distance to be traveled, the type of sponsor, the amount of school time involved, and extent to which such events interfere with smaller meets which insure participation by greater numbers of those who need the training. The scope of the National Federation work has broadened so that all high school athletic and many non-athletic groups profit through an exchange of experiences and a pooling of interests.

The activities of the National Federation are based on the belief strong state and national high school athletic organizations are necessary to protect the athletic interests of the high schools, to promote an ever increasing growth of a type of interscholastic athletics which is educational in both objective and method and which can be justified as an integral part of the high school curriculum, and to protect high school boys from exploitation for purposes having no educational implications. To accomplish these things, it is necessary for high school men to exercise teamwork on a nationwide scale.

#### HISTORY OF IHSAA

The first attempt to organize the high schools of Indiana in a single Association for the purpose of handling athletic activities was made in a meeting of the Northern Indiana Teachers' Association held at Richmond in April, 1903. At this time there was a conference of high school principals, and the conference ended with a body of suggested rules and regulations, called the Richmond Agreement. Due to the fact that there was no central organization having executive power, the Richmond Agreement did little more than point the way toward something better.

Principal J. B. Pearcy, of Anderson, issued a call for a meeting of high school principals interested in a State Athletic organization for December 5, 1903. At this meeting a provisional constitution was adopted. At a similar meeting on December 29, 1903, a final constitution was adopted and a Board of Control of three members was chosen to administer the affairs of the IHSAA.

The first Board of Control was made up of Principal George W. Benton, Shortridge High School, Indianapolis; Superintendent Lotus D. Coffman, Salem, and Principal J. T. Giles, Marion. These men thought and planned well, and we are enjoying the fruits of their vision.

There were fifteen (15) high schools belonging to the IHSAA, March 1, 1904. The membership had a gradual growth through the years, and now includes almost all of the high schools in the state. The peak membership of eight hundred twenty (820) was reached in 1942, the year that private, parochial and institutional schools were admitted to the Association.

In the beginning, one member of the Board of Control served as Secretary, but it soon became very evident that this office furnished enough work for a special man. It was also seen that the future of the organization demanded that the office of Secretary be made more permanent than the office of Board Member. Accordingly, at the annual meeting in 1906 the office of Permanent Secretary was established, and Principal J. T. Giles of Marion was chosen by the Principals to be the first Permanent Secretary. Principal Giles resigned on December 26, 1912, and Principal Isaac E. Neff, South Bend, was chosen by the principals to succeed him. Principal Neff resigned March 15, 1913, and the Board of Control appointed Principal Arthur L. Trester from Alexandria to serve as Permanent Secretary until the next annual meeting in December, 1913. At this meeting, Principal Trester was chosen by the principals as Permanent Secretary.

The Board of Control consisted of three members, chosen by the principals in their annual meetings, until the annual meeting of October 27, 1916. At this meeting it was decided to divide the State into five districts for administrative and representative purposes, and that each district should have one representative on the Board of Control, chosen by mail ballot from his own district by the principals of his district.

In September, 1925, by a referendum vote the principals passed a legislative body proposal calling for four members from each of the five (5) IHSAA districts. The five members of the Board of Control, serving ex officio, and the fifteen other members elected by the principals in a mail vote constituted this legislative body. Prior to this plan all legislation was done at the annual meeting or by referendum voting by mail. This Legislative Body of twenty members passed on all proposals submitted by the high school principals. It was the law making body of the Association. The plan was considered a step in advance in state administration and legislation in athletic activities.

On December 13, 1930, the Legislative Body considered and passed without a dissenting vote the provisions for an Athletic Council. The plan in full continued the five IHSAA districts in the state and arranged for five representatives on the Athletic Council from each district by classes determined by enrollments in the high schools, thus making the Athletic Council a body of twenty-five members representing all sizes of high schools and all districts of the state at all times and elected by the high school principals in the membership. A provision was included for the selection of a 5-man Board of Control from the membership of the Athletic Council by the members of the Athletic Council. The Athletic Council took over the duties of the former Legislative Body and is considered the law making body of the Association.

The title "Permanent Secretary," established in 1906, was changed to "Commissioner of High School Athletics" in October, 1929, by the Legislative Body, and the Commissioner was granted the powers and duties belonging to a Commissioner of Athletics. Mr. Trester continued to serve as commissioner until the date of his death, September 18, 1944, the Board of Control designated Superintendent Morris E. McCarty of Lafayette to serve as Acting Commissioner. In December, 1944, Principal L. V. Phillips of Vincennes was chosen Commissioner to take office January 1, 1945. In 1944, the Board of Control was given authority to employ an Assistant Commissioner. Robert S. Hinshaw, Director of Athletics in Rushville High School, was chosen in November 1945 to take office December 10, 1945 to become the first Assistant Commissioner of Athletics for the IHSAA. In July, 1961, Herman F, Keller of Evansville Bosse High School became the second Assistant Commissioner of Athletics after the death of Mr. Hinshaw. On the retirement of L. V. Phillips, July 31, 1962, the Board of Control selected Phil N. Eskew, Superintendent, Huntington Public Schools, as the third Commissioner of Athletics. The Board conferred the title of "Honorary Commissioner" on L. V. Phillips, On August 1, 1969 Ward E. Brown, Principal of Crawfordsville High School, was selected as Assistant Commissioner to work with Mr. Eskew and Mr. Keller.

The primary purpose of the organizers of the IHSAA to manage and to foster high school athletics on a high plane has been upheld as an ideal by the Association through the life of the IHSAA. New and advanced steps have been taken whenever conditions made them necessary. In the beginning, the Association concerned itself largely with track and football. As time went on it became increasingly evident that the IHSAA should assume the initiative for a well balanced athletic program to meet the needs of all schools and all students desiring to participate in athletics. The Association now sponsors football, baseball, cross country, basketball, swimming,

wrestling, golf, tennis, gymnastics, track and field, and girls' play days. State championships are determined in tennis, cross country, swimming, wrestling, basketball, track, golf, gymnastics and baseball.

A study of the men who have served on the Board of Control through the years will show clearly that the activities of the IHSAA have been in good hands. The titles and addresses are given as they were when the men were Board of Control members. A complete list of former Board members follows:

# Board Of Control Meetings

#### IHSAA BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Indianapolis, Indiana, August 19, 1969

PRESENT: President Norman J. Hubner, Elmer G. Dunbar, James O. Funk, Kenneth D. Miller, Robert L. Myers, Commissioner Phil N. Eskew and Assistant Commissioners Herman F. Keller and Ward E. Brown

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as written.

#### POWERS AND DUTIES

As is the custom at the August Meeting of the Board of Control, the Commissioner reviewed in detail the powers and duties of the Board, the Commissioner and the Assistant Commissioners as set forth in the IHSAA Constitution, Rules and By-laws.

#### IHSAA OFFICE

Ernst and Ernst, certified public accountants, had completed the audit of the IHSAA finances for the year, July 1, 1968, to June 30, 1969. Each member of the Board was provided with a copy of this audit. It is understood that a copy of the audit will be published in the 1969 Handbook.

All members of the Board of Control, the Commissioner and Assistant Commissioners visited the safe deposit vault at the American Fletcher National Bank and Trust Company where the securities of the IHSAA were checked. It is understood that a listing of these securities will be printed in the 1969 Handbook.

#### IHSAA SECURITIES

The Commissioner reported that U. S. Treasury Bills due in July, 1969, in the amount of \$90,000.00 were reinvested in U. S. Treasury Bills due January 15, 1970.

#### HINKLE FIELDHOUSE CONTRACT

The Board approved a contract with representatives of Butler University for the use of the Hinkle Fieldhouse for holding the State Basketball Tourney, March 21, 1970. The rental charge agreed upon is \$4,750.00, which includes the use of Butler University athletic facilities for holding rules clinics and demonstrations or other non-profit athletic activities. Duplicate copies of the contract were signed by the Board Members and the Commissioner.

#### COACHING SCHOOL

Assistant Commissioner Keller reported on the annual coaching school held August 11, 12, 13 and 14, 1969, at Purdue University. Receipts from the registration were \$241.00. Expenditures for the school were \$3,245.31 with the IHSAA paying the deficit of \$3,004.31.

#### ANNUAL MEETING

Tentative plans for the annual meeting of the IHSAA, October 23, 1969, at the Fairgrounds were discussed.

## SECONDARY SCHOOL PRINCIPALS ASSOCIATION

Approval was given for the payment of \$75.00 to the Indiana Association of Secondary School Principals to be applied on the expenses of the Association's annual program.

## HEALTH, PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND RECREATION

As has been the custom for several years, the Board voted to make available upon request a sum not to exceed \$50.00 to each of the divisions of Indiana Health, Physical Education and Recreation Associations for securing a speaker outside Indiana for their meetings held at the time of the Indiana State Teacher's Association Meeting.

#### RULES CLINICS AND FILMS

Assistant Commissioner Keller reported to the Board on the rules clinics and films being sponsored for the IHSAA and local officials associations throughout the state.

#### CROSS COUNTRY SITES

The Board selected the sites for the sectional, regional and state cross country meets. The Board directed the Commissioner's office to proceed with details for holding the meets under the same regulations that were adopted for the 1968 sectionals, regionals and state meet. It is understood that complete details regarding these meets will be published in the September Bulletin.

#### NEW MEMBERS

Lafayette Tippecanoe Junior and Elkhart Concord Junior High Schools' applications for membership were approved.

## KNIGHTSTOWN HIGH SCHOOL—JERRY FREEMAN

This student lives in the Indiana Soldiers and Sailors' Children's Home and is a junior in high school. He wants to attend Knightstown High School. He was placed in the home by the welfare department of Carroll County. Letters are on file from all parties concerned.

#### DECISION

Jerry Freeman should be considered eligible as to attendance in Knightstown High School.

## PLYMOUTH HIGH SCHOOL—KEVIN O'KEEFE

Due to domestic difficulties this boy moved to Minnesota and later to Iowa. He returned to Plymouth on January 21, 1969, and entered the tenth grade at Plymouth High School. Principal Donald L. Slauter asked the Board to determine Kevin's eligibility.

#### DECISION

Kevin O'Keefe is ineligible as to residence for one calendar year from the date of enrollment at Plymouth High School.

#### ROCHESTER HIGH SCHOOL-DONALD E. HART

During December, 1968, this boy was sent to New Mexico to live with an uncle due to many factors and home conditions. He now has returned to Rochester to live with his mother and stepfather. Principal John B. Stone of Rochester High School asked the Board to consider this case under the unavoidable change of residence rule. Principal Stone appeared before the Board to discuss this matter.

#### DECISION

Donald Hart is ineligible for one calendar year from the date of his re-enrollment in Rochester High School.

#### JACKSON HIGH SCHOOL-GREG BOAZ

This student is a ward of the Marion County Welfare and has been placed in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Shaw of South Bend by them. He formerly attended White's Institute. Principal James L. Early asked the Board to consider the case under the unavoidable change of residence rule.

#### DECISION

Greg Boaz may be considered eligible as to residence at South Bend Jackson High School.

The Board adjourned to meet again in the IHSAA Office on September 11, 1969, at 9:30 a.m.

#### CROSS COUNTRY MEETS

Approval was given to a list of officials to be used in the sectional, regional and state cross country meets.

#### SWIMMING MEETS

Preliminary plans for swimming meets were discussed with the understanding that further details would be worked out at the next meeting.

#### WRESTLING MEETS

Details for the state wrestling meet series were discussed with the understanding that further details would be worked out at the next meeting. Approval was given for three wrestling officials to attend a special wrestling rules clinic at Chicago.

#### TENNIS MEETS

Final details for the tennis championship were worked out and approval given to judges for the state meet.

#### NEW MEMBERS

Approval was given to membership applications from the following junior high schools: Huntington Crestview, Huntington Riverview and Columbus Southside.

#### COACHES MEETING

The Board of Control voted to help defray a part of the expenses of the Coaches Meeting on October 23, 1969. The Medical Society has agreed to furnish the program.

#### CORRESPONDING DATES

Scheduling conflicts often develop in football and basketball when calendar dates shift and conference schools adjust their schedules. For the purpose of uniformity in future scheduling of corresponding dates, the Board of Control strongly recommends the following:

#### Football

1. Consider the first Friday in September as the first week. Then number the weeks consecutively according to the total number of games to be scheduled.

2. When scheduling ten games the tenth game may "float" when necessary to the last week in August providing both schools are in session.

#### Basketball

1. Consider the Friday preceding the sectional tournament as the sixteenth week of basketball. Then number the weeks in reverse order.

## BLOOMINGTON HIGH SCHOOL-MICHAEL L. KELLY

This boy is a ward of the Clark County Welfare Department. During the summer of 1969, he was placed in the home of Gary D. Wiggins of Bloomington, who is his legal guardian. Cash tuition will be paid by the Clark County Welfare Department. Letters are

on file from all parties concerned. Assistant Principal Carl Frye asked the Board to consider this case under the unavoidable change on residence rule.

#### DECISION

Michael L. Kelly may be considered eligible as to residence in Bloomington High School.

## COAL CREEK CENTRAL (New Richmond)—RANDY REAHARD

This student lived with his parents in Coal Creek Central school district and attended school there. In the fall of 1968, his parents moved to Fargo, North Dakota. In November, Randy went to Fargo and enrolled and attended school. He was very unhappy and was placed under the care of psychiatrists, he returned to live with his grandparents in the Coal Creek Central district in January. His parents remained in Fargo, North Dakota. Principal Barry Strong asked the Board to consider this case under the unavoidable change of residence rule.

#### DECISION

Randy Reahard is ineligible as to residence for one calendar year from the date of his re-enrollment in Coal Creek Central High School.

## EAST TIPP HIGH SCHOOL (Lafayette)—KERRY MICHAEL WRIGHT

This boy lived in Crown Point and is on parole from the Indiana Boys' school. He was transferred by the Lake County Parole Board to the Tippecanoe Parole Board. He lives with an aunt and uncle in the East Tipp school district. Principal William Francis of East Tipp has asked that this case be considered under the unavoidable change of residence rule.

#### DECISION

Kerry Michael Wright may be considered eligible as to residence at East Tipp High School.

#### MISHAWAKA HIGH SCHOOL-RAY TOLLEY

This boy completed the eighth grade in Emmons Junior High School in Mishawaka. He indicated at that time he intended to enroll in Mishawaka Marian High School in the fall. On August 15, he reported to Marian High School for football practice for three days. He then decided he would rather attend Mishawaka High School and enrolled there September 3. Principal Firmani asked the Board to determine Ray's eligibility.

#### DECISION

When this boy reported for practice at Mishawaka Marian the Board considers that he declared his intention of attending Marian High School. Therefore, he is ineligible for one calendar year from the date of his enrollment in Mishawaka High School.

#### SOUTH BEND ST. JOSEPH'S HIGH SCHOOL-STEVEN VAGHY

This boy has lived in Detroit, Michigan, and attended school there during the ninth and tenth grades. His father and mother continue to live in Detroit. Steven came to South Bend to live with his grandparents and enrolled in St. Joseph's High School. Brother James Linscott, Principal, asked the Board to consider this case under the unavoidable change of residence rule.

#### DECISION

Steven Vaghy is ineligible as to residence at St. Joseph's High School for one calendar year from the date of his enrollment there.

#### MILEAGE ALLOWANCE

The Board approved increasing mileage allowance for athletic officials to ten cents per mile. They also approved increasing IHSAA staff, Council and Board Members to twelve cents per mile.

#### CASTLE HIGH SCHOOL—JIM WILTSCHO

This boy moved with his parents from Massena, New York, into the Castle school district about May 1, 1969. Because some subjects which he had been taking in New York were not offered at Castle, the family decided to enroll him in Evansville Day School for the remainder of the semester. This fall he enrolled in Castle High School. Mr. John Wittenbraker, Principal of Castle High School, asked the Board to determine Jim's eligibility.

#### DECISION

Jim Wiltscho is ineligible for one calendar year from the date of his enrollment in Castle High School.

Robert went to live with her and enrolled in Frankfort High School. Principal Frank Goode asked the Board to determine Robert's eligibility.

#### DECISION

Robert Warren is ineligible for one calendar year from the date of his enrollment in Frankfort High School.

#### MUNCIE BURRIS HIGH SCHOOL-VIRGIL SMAIL

This boy's parents are missionaries and he has been attending school in Nigeria. His parents are now transferring to Laos where there are no public schools. He has been sent to Muncie to live with an aunt and uncle to finish his high school career. Principal M. C. Howd has asked the Board of Control to consider this case under Division V, Rule 17.

#### DECISION

Virgil Smail may be considered eligible as to residence of Muncie Burris High School.

## VALPARAISO HIGH SCHOOL—REINSTATEMENT OF AMATEURS

Principal Garth Johnson asked that Ed Daily, Keith Roberts and Andy Barber, who were declared ineligible last year for violating

their amateur standing, be reinstated to their amateur standing. Statements are on file from each boy.

#### DECISION

Ed Daily, Keith Roberts and Andy Barber may be considered eligible as amateurs, beginning November 25, 1969.

## WARSAW HIGH SCHOOL—ROBERT REDDEN

This student is a ward of the court in Florida. He has been assigned to the home of his father in Warsaw by the court. Clayton Smith, Principal of Warsaw asked the Board of Control to consider this case under the unavoidable change of residence rule.

#### DECISION

Robert Redden may be considered eligible as to residence at Warsaw High School.

## IHSAA OFFICE

The Board signed papers authorizing Assistant Commissioner Ward E. Brown to sign checks for the IHSAA.

Letters are on file from all parties concerned. Principal Cleon Ginn asked the Board to consider James' case under the unavoidable change of residence rule.

#### DECISION

James Cormican may be considered eligible as to residence at Oregon-Davis High School.

#### GAA

Clara Dischinger wrote this office regarding the proposed plan for girls to compete on five member teams and use the entire court for basketball. Most of the GAA sponsors are not in favor of this plan.

#### DECISION

The Board recommended that this proposed plan not be followed and the matter was referred to the Athletic Council.

#### NEW MEMBERS

The membership application for Connersville Fayette Junior High School was approved.

#### GIBAULT SCHOOL (Terre Haute)

The Commissioner reported that he had visited with Brother Barret of Gibault School and discussed several problems. This school was not seeking membership, but did want to cooperate with the IHSAA in every way possible.

Later Head Coach Homer Veach refused to continue the game and removed his players from the field with fifty-nine seconds remaining. Only ten able players were available, according to Coach Veach, when he made the decision.

Principal Larry Williams and Coach Veach appeared before the Board to present their viewpoints.

#### DECISION

After reviewing the facts and discussing the case, the Board of Control made the following decision:

- Turkey Run High School is placed on probation until November 1, 1970.
- Assistant Coach Katerhenry is hereby severely reprimanded for his unsportsmanlike conduct.
- Principal Williams is instructed to make sure that his entire coaching staff become thoroughly familiar with all IHSAA rules.
- Coach Veach is hereby reprimanded for withdrawing his team from the contest.

#### REDKEY HIGH SCHOOL

In a reserve basketball game on November 26, 1969, between Redkey and Pennville, assistant coach James Sparks was in complete disagreement with the officiating near the end of the game, at which time a technical foul was assessed. - 3. Principal Anderson is notified that any further incident of this nature will put his school in serious jeopardy and be cause for immediate suspension from the IHSAA.

#### WESTERN(Russiaville) HIGH SCHOOL

In a varsity basketball game on November 26, 1969, between Madison Grant and Western High Schools, it was reported that Coach Erwin Cox acted in an unsportsmanlike manner toward one of the referees. During the course of the game a technical was assessed to the Western bench. It was reported that there was unsportsmanlike conduct displayed by some Western students, especially those with Western honor sweaters. Immediately after the game it was reported that Coach Cox rushed on to the floor and made contact with the official.

Principal Gene Pearson, Athletic Director Dale Baltus, Coach Erwin Cox and Superintendent Richard Rea of Western, Principal Merrill Holloway and Athletic Director Paul Davis of Madison Grant and referee Paul Leamon appeared before the Board of Control.

#### DECISION

- 1. Western High School is hereby placed on probation until November 26, 1970.
- 2. Coach Cox is severely reprimanded for reported actions of unsportsmanlike conduct toward official Leamon.
- 3. Principal Pearson is instructed to properly inform his athletic staff, students, and adults that unsportsmanlike conduct on their part will not be tolerated.
- 4. Any further incidents of this nature could result in immediate suspension of Western High School from the IHSAA.

## SOUTH BEND RILEY HIGH SCHOOL—TERRY THOMAS

Terry Thomas lived with his sister in the Riley district. It was discovered that his father (his mother is deceased) lived in the Adams district. He was then transferred to the Adams district. Since his father refused to provide a home for him, the Welfare Department returned him to the custody of his sister. Principal Howard Crouse of Riley High School requested the Board of Control to consider the case under the unavoidable change of residence rule. Letters are on file from both Principal Crouse of Riley and Principal Landrey of Adams.

#### DECISION

Terry Thomas may be considered eligible as to residence at South Bend Riley High School.

## TERRE HAUTE WILEY HIGH SCHOOL—MICHAEL LEROY WORRELL

Michael Worrell, due to circumstances beyond his control, was unable to enroll in any high school for the 1969-70 school year until October 13, 1969, at which time he enrolled in Wiley High School.

Principal S. T. Proffitt requested a Board of Control ruling on this matter.

#### DECISION

Michael LeRoy Worrell is ineligible for the duration of this semester in accordance with Division V, Section C, Rule 13, of the IHSAA By-Laws.

#### SPECIAL TELECAST REQUEST

At the November 22 meeting the Board granted permission to

Channel 50 to telecast the sectional and semi-state in the Gary area and Channel 11 to telecast the regional and state.

Mr. Joseph Haas of Channel 11 requested that the Board review this decision and permit both stations to telecast all of the tournaments.

After reviewing this matter it was by unanimous opinion that the original decision stand.

#### LIFE FILMS REQUEST

Mr. Harry F. Chapin of Life Films appeared before the Board to discuss the filming of the activities of the four finalists for use on a national telecast after the state tournament. Permission was given for this with the following stipulations: 1. Permission must be given by each of the four finalist schools. The high school principal and coach of each school must approve. 2. After final details have been worked out Time-Life is to present to the Board of Control a copy of the contract giving specifications made by all parties concerned.

#### BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

The Board reviewed the work done at previous meetings on the 1970 state championship basketball tourney series. Final approval was given for the location of sites, ticket prices, number and pay of officials, distribution of quota orders and complimentary tickets, approval of one-site, two-bracket tourneys' time schedules and other details necessary to the conduct of the entire tourney series. The Commissioner or Acting Commissioner was directed to sign definite contracts in duplicate with all tourney center principals, to prepare the tourney bulletin for distribution to the member schools and the press, radio, and television, setting forth all details in connection with the conduct of the tourney. The Commissioner's office was authorized to make minor adjustments which may be necessary in publishing the tourney bulletin.

Approval was given for the employment of Fred R. Gorman, Indianapolis, to assist in the distribution of state tickets and employ, assign and supervise necessary adjustments made because of changes in tournament sites.

The Board decided to continue the plan started a few years ago of presenting a trophy furnished by the IHSAA to each sectional winner.

The Board unanimously approved a change in the season ticket price for the state tournament from that established at the last meeting. The season ticket price shall be \$4.50 instead of \$5.00 as originally approved. Approval was given to accept a bid for the printing of the state tournament tickets from the American Ticket Corporation. This company has printed the IHSAA State Tournament tickets for many years.

Principal Pearcy asked the Board to determine the residence eligibility of Steve. Letters are on file from all parties concerned.

#### DECISION

Steve Underly is ineligible as to residence at Martinsville High School for one calendar year from December 4, 1969.

#### PERU JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL—ANTHONY MARTIN

This student lived with his mother in California and moved to Peru on December 1, 1969, to live with his sister, who states she feels she can give him a better home.

#### DECISION

Tony Martin is ineligible for one calendar year beginning on the date he enrolled in Peru Junior High School this fall.

#### NEEDMORE—WEST WASHINGTON HIGH SCHOOLS

In a basketball game between West Washington and Needmore played at Needmore on December 5, 1969, Jim Sullivan, a junior in West Washington, was reported struck by George Enochs of Needmore and knocked to the floor. Dr. Tower, who attended the boy reported that Jim was unconscious for a short time following this. On receiving the report of this case, Acting Commissioner Herman Keller asked Principal Wagner to withhold George Enochs from competition until further action by the Board of Control.

Principal Warren Wagner of Needmore and Principal Ronald Langdon of West Washington were requested to appear before the Board to discuss this case.

After reviewing all the facts in the case, the Board made the following decision.

#### DECISION

Both principals are to have a clear understanding with both boys as well as other members of their teams that further such action would put their school in jeopardy of suspension from the IHSAA.

#### CRISPUS ATTUCKS—TERRE HAUTE WILEY HIGH SCHOOLS

At a basketball game between these two schools played at Crispus Attucks on January 2, 1970, there were several incidents of slugging, pushing and other attacks on some Wiley fans as they left the gymnasium.

Mr. Earl Donalson and Mr. William Garrett, Principal and Athletic Director respectively of Crispus Attucks together with Principal S. T. Proffitt of Wiley, were asked to meet with the Board of Control to discuss the situation.

After a thorough discussion of all of the incidents the Board of Control outlined the following points:

- Crispus Attucks High School is hereby warned that any future incidents such as these will terminate their membership and right to participate in IHSAA contests.
- Crispus Attucks administrators are to make sure that they have sufficient police protection to insure the safety of all spectators and participants at all athletic events.
- 3. Due to the action of some of the Attucks fans during and following the game, all fans need to realize that the conduct of fans can jeopardize the schools' right to participate. Every effort should be made by all Attucks school officials to stress the value of good sportsmanship among the student body and fans.
- 4. The Board of Control feels that it is unfortunate that a small group of irresponsible fans has contributed to these incidents which could lead to the suspension of the entire sports program.
- 5. The Board respectfully requests that all fans review their responsibility to the total sports program. It was further requested that Principal Donalson submit a written report to Commissioner Eskew listing the precautionary measures which he has taken and plans to take in the future to prevent such incidents from recurring.
- 6. The evidence collected has already been turned over to the Police Department, who is continuing their investigations.

#### IHSAA FINANCES

Treasury Bills will come due on January 15 and 22. The total amount of these bills will be \$90,000.00 Commissioner Eskew reported that we would need about \$30,000.00 in our checking account to maintain a safe balance and for current expenses. The remainder will be reinvested in Treasury Bills.

#### NATIONAL FEDERATION WINTER MEETING

Mr. Keller and Mr. Brown reported on the National Federation Winter Meeting at St. Charles, Illinois, January 6 through 9, 1970. There were no major changes in the football rules.

#### SWIMMING MEETS

The Board approved a list of officials to be used in the swimming sectionals and the state meet.

The Board approved a list of officials to be used in the wrestling sectionals, regionals and state. The financial arrangements with Southport High School for the state tournament were also changed.

#### FOOTBALL PLAY-OFF

Mr. Brown presented the tabulations of the football poll to members of the Board. Many schools had comments and suggested changes in the plan. The Board was given a copy of these to study and plan to discuss them at a later meeting.

#### BASKETBALL TOURNEYS

- 1. The Board approved a tentative list of officials to be used in the tourney series, and Articles of Agreement are to be mailed by the Commissioner to this list of officials.
- 2. The Board approved the plan used last year in which the IHSAA cooperated with the Indiana Broadcasters' Association in the allotment of space to the various stations in the state for broadcasting the final tournament.
- 3. The Commissioner was authorized to handle complimentary tickets under the same plan as used in previous years.
- 4. The Board approved the following policy for televising the 1970 tournaments.
  - Only the final game of the sectional and regionaly may be telecast.
  - b. No delayed telecasts will be permited.
  - c. Stations may telecast in their home areas only.
  - d. In the three Marion County sectionals the Commissioner was authorized to work with Center Principals and TV Stations to set up a guarantee much the same as last year.
- 5. The Board approved filming the three games of the 1970 state tournament on much the same basis as used last year.
- 6. When radio broadcasts are delayed, they must not be on school time.
- 7. It was agreed that the plan used in 1969 for the pairings and release of the schedules to the press would be used again this year. The pairings are to begin at 8:00 a.m. EST, February 18, 1970, with the immediate release to the Indianapolis News, Indianapolis Star, Associated Press and United Press International.

#### INSURANCE ON TOURNAMENT OFFICIALS

Jeffrey Fohl is ineligible for one calendar year from the data of his return to Morton Memorial in January.

Robert L. Myers, member of the Board of Control, did not participate in this decision as his school was involved in the case.

## INDIANAPOLIS CRISPUS ATTUCKS

In the second game of a double header, which Shortridge and Attucks played at Indiana Central College, January 30, considerable debris was thrown on the floor by fans. #### COMMISSIONER AND ASSISTANT COMMISSIONERS

#### NATIONAL FEDERATION ANNUAL MEETING

The Board voted to send the 1970-71 Board of Control, Commissioner and Assistant Commissioners to the National Federation Annual Meeting at Seattle in July, and not to send the President of the Council as has been customary in the past due to the fact that he will be attending such a meeting when he is a member of the Board. All necessary expenses were approved for those attending and an allowance is to be paid in advance to cover such expenses. Approval was given for the incoming Board to meet in the IHSAA Office prior to July 1, to make necessary plans for the National Federation meeting. Expenses are also to be paid for this meeting.

#### COMMENDATION

The Board unanimously commended Ward E. Brown for the excellent work in reorganizing the Constitution, Rules and By-Laws.

The Board of Control adjourned to meet again in Carrollton, Kentucky, on June 22, 1970.

Carrollton, Kentucky, June 21, 22, 23, 1970

PRESENT: President Norman J. Hubner, Elmer G. Dunbar, James O. Funk, Kenneth D. Miller, Robert L. Myers, Commissioner Phil N. Eskew and Assistant Commissioners Herman F. Keller and Ward E. Brown. The wives of the Commissioners and Board Members also attended as guests.

#### L. V. PHILLIPS AWARD WINNER

The Board of Control observed the contestants at the 1970 IHSAA State Baseball Tournament. The information cards signed by the principal and coach of each competing school were carefully analyzed by the Board Members.

It was the unanimous decision of the Board of Control that the L. V. Phillips Baseball Award be presented to David Highmark of North Central High School (Indpls.)

#### TRANSACTIONS IN SECURITIES

The Commissioner reported that \$50,000.00 in U. S. Treasury Bills came due June 6, 1970, and had been deposited in the checking account to be reinvested in Treasury Bills due December 10, 1970.

#### IHSAA TRACK AND FIELD MEETS

The Commissioner presented financial reports covering the 1970 State Championship Track and Field Meets. The reports were examined, approved and ordered published in the 1970 IHSAA Handbook.

#### IHSAA GOLF MEETS

Financial reports covering the 1970 State Championship Golf Meets were presented. The reports were examined, approved and ordered published in the 1970 Handbook.

#### IHSAA BASEBALL TOURNEY

The Commissioner presented reports regarding the third annual State Baseball Championship Series. Financial reports, although not complete were examined. A complete financial report is to be published in the 1970 IHSAA Handbook.

#### IHSAA FINANCES

Approval for payment of salaries and other necessary expenses a few days in advance of June 30, in order that they may clear the bank before July 1, the beginning of the new fiscal year, was given.

#### BUDGET AND FINANCES

Careful consideration was given to a budget recommended by the Commissioner for 1970-71. The Board gave approval to a few expenditures in excess of the 1969-70 estimated expenditures. The Commissioner presented a statement of receipts and expenditures over the past twelve months together with an itemized statement of government securities owned by the IHSAA at present. It is understood that an independent audit will be made by Ernst and Ernst, Accountants, soon after July 1. Results of this audit will be presented to members of the Board of Control at the first meeting after the completion of the audit and will be published in the 1970 Handbook.

The Commissioner was authorized to deposit with the American Fletcher National Bank and Trust Company of Indianapolis for exchange or credit as needed to keep a safe balance in the bank, such securities as may come due. It is understood that all transactions in securities are to be reported at the next Board of Control meeting following such transactions.

#### **OFFICIALS**

A detailed report was presented on the registration of officials in the various sports. The report showed that for the 1969-70 year the IHSAA has approved a total of 4657 officials with fees amounting to \$25,136.00.

## SPECIAL DISTRIBUTION OF SURPLUS FUNDS

After giving careful consideration to the amount of funds on hand, estimated expenditures during the coming year, and the need for adequate reserve in the IHSAA treasury, the Board set \$150.00 as the maximum amount of surplus funds to be paid any member school in the special distribution to be made October 1, 1970. Because there was a special distribution in 1969, all the money to be distributed was earned during the current year.

It was decided to make the distribution according to the following plan:

- 1. One hundred twelve dollars and fifty cents (\$112.50) for participation in the 1970 sectional basketball tourney.
- 2. Thirty-seven dollars and fifty cents (\$37.50) for membership in the IHSAA during the membership year, 1969-70.
- 3. Any school sharing the special distribution must be a member in good standing and existing as a high school at the time of the distribution.
- 4. No school shall receive credit for a year's membership unless it was a member of the IHSAA on January 1, 1970.
- 5. A combination or consolidation of two or more high schools shall count as one school only in this distribution. The check for one share shall be sent to the principal of the new or resulting school.

This distribution is in addition to the premium for the catastrophe insurance for all schools, which the IHSAA is paying this year.

## SEYMOUR SHIELDS JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL—DAVID HARRIS

This boy had lived with an aunt and attended Austin High School until April 23, 1970. At that time it became necessary for him to go elsewhere in order to have a home. He then went to the home of another aunt, Mrs. Marian Staley, who lives in Seymour. Principal C. H. Englehart of Shields Junior High School has asked the Board to consider him under the unavoidable change of residence rule. Letters and athletic transfers are on file from all parties concerned.

#### DECISION

David Harris may be considered eligible as to residence at Seymour Shields Junior High School.

## TERRE HAUTE HONEY CREEK HIGH SCHOOL—LARRY D. WILSON

This case was decided April 17, 1970. Principal William Ray asked the Board to reconsider the circumstances surrounding the move. After carefully considering all information the Board was unanimous in the decision to make no change in the former decision.

## BLOOMFIELD HIGH SCHOOL—SOUTH KNOX HIGH SCHOOL

On May 21, at a baseball game between these two schools an official's decision or interpretation was questioned by Bloomfield.

Letters are on file concerning this situation. Bloomfield has asked the Board to rule on their protest.

#### DECISION

Based on information and evidence submitted, the Board of Control was unanimous in supporting the decisions of the umpires.

## BLOOMINGTON HIGH SCHOOL—JAMES CROWE

This boy played in four baseball games this spring while scholastically ineligible. After discovering the ineligibility he was declared ineligible and the games were forfeited. Since this boy participated while ineligible, through no fault of his own, Principal Jones asked the Board to consider his eligibility for the fall semester.

#### DECISION

James Crowe is ineligible his next semester in school as stated in Division V, Section L, Rule 4, page 50 of the 1969 IHSAA Handbook.

## INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC DIRECTORS ASSOCIATION

Charles Hilton, president of this association, asked the Board of Control to appoint a representative to serve as an ex-officio member and represent the IHSAA at the Executive and General Meetings of the IHSAA. The Board authorized the Commissioner or his representative to serve in that capacity.

## STATE PRINCIPALS' MEETING

The Board of Control authorized scheduling nine principals' meetings over various parts of Indiana where Principals and Athletic Directors can get together to discuss various athletic problems.

## NATIONAL FEDERATION EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

James Funk is a member of the Executive Committee of the National Federation State High School Athletic Associations and as such is required to attend many National Federation Meetings. The Federation makes a limited expense allowance. In the event his expenses would exceed that allowed by the National Federation, the Board authorized payment of the difference as he represents Indiana and the IHSAA in this position.

The Board of Control adjourned to meet again in the IHSAA Office at 9:30 a.m., on August 18, 1970.

# Athletic Council Meetings

#### IHSAA ATHLETIC COUNCIL MEETING

Indianapolis, Indiana, October 22, 1969

PRESENT: President John Bastin, James W. Dold, Myron C. Knauff, Cecil R. Erwin, James L. Early, Norman J. Hubner, James O. Funk, Don L. Smolinske, John F. Hammel, Fred F. Park, Maurice N. Davis, Elbert Fike, Kenneth Miller, Don E. White, William Curry, R. M. Liechty, Clifford Swim, Robert L. Myers, Orvis Gene Burdsall, William Breck, Lowell E. McGlothlin, Lester J. Page, Knofel E. Fortner, Elmer G. Dunbar, Leo O'Neill, Commissioner Phil N. Eskew and Assistant Commissioners Herman F. Keller and Ward E. Brown.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved without reading as the members of the Council had received copies prior to the meeting.

#### VOTING

It was decided to vote by a show of hands and that thirteen affirmative votes be required to pass a motion, except for an amendment to the Constitution which requires a two-thirds vote of the membership.

#### NECROLOGY SERVICE

A necrology service was conducted by Fred F. Park for J. Ord Fortner and Clarence B. Stemen.

#### NATIONAL FEDERATION ANNUAL MEETING-LAS VEGAS, NEVADA

President Bastin and Board President Hubner gave very interesting reports on the National Federation Meeting held in Las Vegas. Nevada.

#### PROPOSALS

- A. To amend Division V., Section H, Rule 1, by deleting the present rule and inserting the following rule:
  - "Students shall be ineligible for any (interschool) athletic competition if they become 20 years of age during the school vear. (School year defined as being from August 15, of one year to June 30, the following year.)"

(Submitted by Principal Warren Wagner, Needmore)

This proposal was postponed indefinitely.

B. To amend Division III, "Baseball" by adding Rule 4: "A pitcher may not pitch in more than ten (10) innings in any three consecutive calendar days. This period begins when he officially enters the games as a pitcher."

(Submitted by Principal William Lehr, New Castle)

This proposal was passed to become effective in the spring of 1970. The vote was 22 for, 2 abstaining.

## REPORTS OF SCHOLASTIC ELIGIBILITY COMMITTEE

Chairman Elmer Dunbar submitted the following recommended rule change on behalf of this committee:

To Amend Division V, Section B, Rule 3, by adding the following note:

"Note: Each school will establish consistent grading periods within a semester and within the school year. Student scholastic eligibility will be determined at the time when grades or credits have been made a matter of final record in the principal's office but no later than noon of the fifth school day following the end of such determined grading periods. The principal shall certify these specific dates to the IHSAA on his membership card."

This proposal passed effective immediately with a vote of 22 for and 2 abstaining.

## COMMISSIONER'S AND ASSISTANT COMMISSIONERS' CONTRACTS

The Constitution now states that the Commissioner's and Assistant Commissioners' contracts shall begin August 1. This was written when our fiscal year ran from January 1 to December 31. Several years ago our fiscal year was changed to run from July 1 to June 30. Because all other contracts and terms begin July 1, consideration was given to changing the Constitution.

The following amendment to the Constitution was passed unanimously (to become effective when new contracts are issued): To Amend Article III, Section 3, Rules k and l by deleting the words, "on the first day of August" and inserting the words, "on the first day of July".

## OFFICIAL ENROLLMENT

A boy, who is about to enter the ninth grade, indicates his intentions of attending a parochial school and attends football practice there a few days. Then he changes his mind and enrolls at the public high school. The Board has always interpreted such action as an indication of the boy's intention to enroll in the parochial school and he is ineligible in the public school.

After a discussion on this matter, it was decided that an interpretation in the questions and answers (under enrollment) should include the fact that the first day of practice in fall sports indicates intention to attend and shall be counted as official enrollment for eligibility purposes.

## FOOTBALL SURVEY

The Commissioner reported on a survey the IHSAA Office will take among the football schools to learn if the principals of these member schools are interested in holding a football play-off.

A discussion was held on a minimum number of contests in some sports to be eligible for tournament participation. Further discussion was held on whether minimum requirements should be placed on swimming and baseball, etc.

## FORTY MINUTE PERIODS—SCHOLASTIC ELIGIBILITY

Mr. Howard Longshore appeared before the Council to explain the problem of forty minute periods in Indianapolis schools as it affects scholastic eligibility. President Bastin appointed the following committee to study Division V, Section B, Rule 1 regarding interpretations and report to the next council meeting: Chairman James Early, Grain Burdsall, Lester Page, Fred Park and Clifford Swim.

A discussion was held on the proposed new experiment with five member basketball teams for girls. The Council decided not to allow these rules to be used in Indiana.

The Athletic Council adjourned to meet again in Indianapolis, May 23, 1970 at 6:00 p.m.

### VOTING

It was decided to vote by voice or show of hands and that twelve affirmative votes be required to pass a motion, except for an amendment to the Constitution, which requires a two-thirds vote of the Council membership.

## BOARD OF CONTROL AND ATHLETIC COUNCIL

The following named Council Members were elected to serve as the Board of Control from July 1, 1970, to June 30, 1971; Elbert L. Fike, Class 1; John D. Bastin, Class 2; Knofel E. Fortner, Class 3; James L. Early, Class 4; and Maurice N. Davis, Class 5. These members met for a few minutes and elected Maurice Davis as President.

The Council elected Fred Park of Bluffton as its President for the 1970-71 school year.

#### PROPOSALS

A. Amendments and reorganization of IHSAA Constitution, Rules and By-Laws as submitted by Ward E. Brown were approved. Complete contents will be printed in the 1970 Handbook, a copy as submitted will be attached to the official minutes. Maurice Davis suggested that amended Constitution and Rules be submitted to our attorney for legal review. By mail vote, June 20-25, the Council approved the following additions to the Constitution, as suggested by legal counsel:

Article III Section 1a-No change

- Add Section 1b—Any member that is at anytime unable to voluntarily comply with any and all rules and regulations and final decisions of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, its officers or representatives, by virtue of any order or injunction of any court or for any other reason, is automatically suspended from membership for the duration of such disability without any notice or formal action of the Association, its officers or representatives.
- Add Section 1c—If at any time the Association, its officers or representatives are prohibited or restrained from carrying out any rule, regulation, decision or action of or for said Association in relation to any member by order or injunction of any court or action of any intervening authority, such member in relation to which the Association, its officers or representatives are so prohibited or restrained is automatically suspended from membership for the duration of such prohibition or restraint without any notice or formal action of the Association, its officers or representatives.
- Add Section 1d—Any suspension from membership under Section 1b or 1c shall continue until such time as the suspended school and the Association, its officers and representatives, are all again free and able to exercise their own free will and volition without restraint or direction from any authority, except as provided under the Constitution and By-Laws, and a written request for reinstatement may be made by the suspended school immediately.
- B. To amend Rule 24 by adding Section 6:

"Section 6: The maximum number of regular season games in baseball for teams and players shall be 18, plus one tourney (excluding the state tournament series)."

(Submitted by the Indiana Lake Shore Conference Principals)
This amendment was tabled indefinitely.

C. To amend Rule 30, (Swimming) by adding Section 3:

"Section 3: All organized or formal practices by students or teams shall be limited to the period beginning October 1, and ending with the date of the State Final Championship. Note: It is not considered a violation of this rule for students or teams to participate in independent meets during the summer vacation period, while school is not in session."

(Submitted by the Indiana Lake Shore Conference Principals)
This amendment was tabled indefinitely.

#### FOOTBALL PLAY-OFF

The Commissioner reported on the football play-off and the Council discussed the many problems involved at length. It was moved by Knofel Fortner and seconded by Clifford Swim that a committee be appointed by the Commissioner to complete a detailed definite plan which would be submitted to the principals of the football playing schools for a "yes" or "no" vote. This motion was defeated 4 to 17.

It was moved by William Curry and seconded by James Early that the Council not act further on the football play-off until a definite proposal has been submitted by a member school principal. The vote was 11 affirmative and 6 no. This motion failed due to lack of majority vote.

## FOOTBALL PRE-CONDITIONING

It was moved by Maurice Davis and seconded by William Curry that the Council establish an optional pre-season football conditioning program effective August, 1970. A committee is to be appointed by the Council President and the Commissioner to work out the exact wording of this regulation. This motion passed 18 to 4.

The following persons will be asked to serve on this committee: Dick Liechty, Chairman; Ray Amrhein; Bill Curry; Dr. Brad Bomba (Bloomington); Jules Siegle, football coach, East Chicago Washington; Bill Griffith, football coach, Fort Wayne Snider; and Charles Maas, athletic director, Indianapolis Arlington High School.

This committee met and made the following proposal to change the by-laws as follows:

Substitute Rule 27—Section 4—Non-contact football practices will be permissible for 90 minutes or less on each of 3 week days immediately preceding August 15. Except for football shoes, helmets and mouthpieces—no football uniforms; no footballs, no protective equipment such as pads, guards, etc.; or training aids such as tackling or blocking equipment or similar devices are to be used. These 3 days are to be used primarily for physical conditioning, sprints, agility drills, etc.

### Renumber and Reword:

Old 27-4 to 27-5—All organized and formal contact football practices by players or teams shall be limited to the period beginning August 15, and ending November 30, of each school year.

Old 27-5 to 27-6—All football practices shall be held on the regular practice or play facilities and under the direct supervision of the member school coach/es.

Old 27-6 to 27-7—There shall be ten separate days of organized football practice by each player preceding participation in interschool contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day.

This proposal was passed unanimously by mail vote, June 20-25, 1970.

## REPORT OF SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

Chairman James Early reported this committee met April 28, 1970, and discussed the problem of eligibility in schools having less than 55 minute periods. The committee recommended that no change be made at present in the scholastic eligibility rules.

This committee was authorized to continue the study of scholastic eligibility rules.

## REPORT OF TRACK COMMITTEE

Chairman Norman Hubner reported on suggested changes in Cross Country and Track as submitted by the track committee. The Council yoted 22 to 1 to make no changes in Cross Country regulations.

John Hammel moved the consideration of the following changes in the track meets be tabled for future meetings: Discus, Triple Jump, Low Hurdles be replaced by 330 or 440 Hurdles, and limit number of events in which each contestant may participate in all meets.

## REQUIREMENTS FOR PARTICIPATION IN STATE MEET

Norm Hubner moved that at least five contests or meets be held by all schools prior to submitting an entry blank for IHSAA meets and tourneys. This was seconded by Knofel Fortner.

This motion was defeated by a vote of 14 to 4.

### TRACK COMMITTEE

The President appointed a committee composed of Leo C. O'Neill, John Bastin and Knofel Fortner to study track rules and regulations.

## COUNCIL COMMITTEE REPORTS

It was moved by William Curry and seconded by Maurice Davis that all athletic council reports and committee recommendations be submitted in writing and in the hands of all council members at least one week prior to the meeting in order to be acted upon.

This motion passed unanimously.

## CLASSIFICATION OF SCHOOLS

John Bastin reported that the committee on classification of schools for representatives on the Athletic Council had no recommendations at this time.

#### COMMENDATIONS

By unanimous vote the Athletic Council commended President Norman Hubner and the Board of Control for its conduct of Association matters during the past year.

The Council adjourned to meet again, October 21, at 3:00 p.m. in Indianapolis.








FRANKLIN CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOL (INDIANAPOLIS)
Capital District Conference Champions




TIPTON HIGH SCHOOL Central Indiana Conference Champions





JENNINGS COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL (NORTH VERNON) Eastern Indiana Conference Champions






COAL CREEK CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOL (NEW RICHMOND)





# Tennis

The third annual state tennis championships were determined at Pike October 18, 1969 with host school standouts Steve Behrman and Dave Brents sweeping the doubles and Kevin Clarkowski of Scecina the singles.

Juniors Behrman and Brents, unbeaten in 52 singles matches and whipped only once this year in doubles action, gave Pike the state team crown too.

Pike collected 12 points to take the team title, with Bloomington second with 9. Scecina and Lafayette Jeff tied for third with 8 each while Fort Wayne Concordia and Peru deadlocked for fifth with 6. New Albany followed with 5 and Crown Point with 4.

Brents, a lefthander, and righthander Behrman swept past Dale Rockwell and Brent Toloukian of Peru in the morning round, 6-4, 6-1 and then came back to blitz Bloomington's Barry Bundy and Phil Rudman, 6-3, 6-4.

Clarkowski, certainly no stranger to the state finals after making it to the final match in doubles two straight years and coming home a winner last year in the event with Mark Boulias, stopped Charles Ellis of New Albany in the morning action, 7-5, 6-1. He then turned back Fort Wayne Concordia's Bruce Bolyard, 6-4, 6-2.

Bolyard had pulled off an upset in the morning round when he whipped Crown Point's Bob Shrader in a battle that went 1 1/2 hours. Shrader took the first 6-4, dropped the second 6-8 and came back to lock it up 7-5.

In the battle for third place, Lafayette's Steve Chadwell and Charles Hill won 6-2, 7-5, over Rockwell and Toloukian. In singles, Ellis turned back Shrader in another thriller, 5-7, 10-8, 6-2.

## SECTIONAL TENNIS MEETS

-Reprinted from Sept. 1969 Bulletin

Third Annual October 1, 2, and 3, 1969

The Board of Control set up sixteen sectional tennis tournaments to be held October 1, 2, and 3, 1969. The following bases were used in selecting these centers: schools competing in tennis in 1968, travel distance, number of teams in that area, and a willingness on the part of high schools to make their facilities available for these meets. Schools will be assigned to centers after the number of entries has been determined.

## LOCATION OF SECTIONAL MEETS

Ben Davis Bluffton Columbus Evansville Rex Mundi Fort Wayne North Side Gary Horace Mann Goshen Hammond Kokomo Lafavette Lawrence Central Madison Heights (Anderson) New Albany South Bend Adams Southport West Vigo (West Terre Haute)

SCHOOLS ELIGIBLE—These meets are open to all members of the Association except to schools holding preparatory, junior or associate memberships.

ELIGIBILITY OF ENTRIES—The eligibility of each participant shall be certified by the principal of his school. The official entry blank must be used and all data given. ENTRIES WILL CLOSE WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 24, 1969 at 4:00 P.M. The entry lists must be in the IHSAA Office complete in every detail by 4:00 p.m. on that date.

ENTRANTS—Only two teams of doubles and two competitors in singles from any one school will be permitted to compete. No competitor will be permitted to compete in both doubles and singles. A school may enter either singles players or doubles teams or both. Two alternates may be entered for the singles and two alternates for the doubles teams. Singles alternates may substitute only for singles players. Doubles alternates may substitute only for doubles. The same alternates may not be used for both singles and doubles.

MANAGEMENT—The management of these meets rests solely with the Board of Control. Responsibility of local arrangements has been delegated to the Center Principal.

RULES—Unless otherwise specifically provided in the IHSAA instructions, the U.S. Lawn Tennis Association rules shall govern in all tournaments.

TYPE OF BALL-Any standard brand ball manufactured by a reputable manufacturing firm.

AWARDS—Suitable ribbons will be presented to the two boys who place first and second in the singles and to the members of the two teams which place first and second in the doubles.

A trophy will be awarded to the winning school.

EXPENSES—There will be no entry fee. Traveling expenses and meals are to be paid by the competing schools.

EQUIPMENT—Each competitor will be required to appear fully equipped with rackets, two or more good balls, preferably new ones, and all other necessary equipment.

New balls shall be provided by the host manager for all matches. Competitors should be provided new balls if a match goes into a third set.

DRESS-A player shall wear a shirt at all times on the court.

INTERRUPTED MATCHES—In case of bad weather, play should be continued on the first fair day, excluding Sunday, thereafter.

A disrupted or postponed match should be resumed at the point where it was discontinued. No matches should be replayed nor the schedule of games altered in any way. It is recommended that a student play no more than two matches per day.

METHOD OF PAIRING—The tournament manager shall call a meeting in advance of the meet for the purpose of drawing the playing schedule. Each school may have a representative at the meeting. The two top seeded singles players and the two top seeded doubles teams should be placed in opposite brackets.

The No. 1 and No. 2 singles players and doubles teams from the same school shall be drawn in opposite halves of the bracket.

The No. 1 singles players and doubles teams shall be paired with No. 2 singles and doubles teams in the first round.

At least thirty minutes shall lapse between the semi-final and final matches.

SCORING: Singles—Two points shall be awarded to the winner of the first round and two additional points shall be awarded for each round won thereafter.

Doubles—Three points shall be awarded the winner of the first round and three additional points shall be awarded for each round thereafter.

A bye or default will be counted as a win and the proper number of points will be awarded to the player who draws a bye or wins by default. However, no points for byes shall be awarded unless the player or team wins the next match following the bye.

FACULTY REPRESENTATIVE—Contestants must be accompanied by a coach or a faculty member designated by the principal.

SECTIONAL SUBSTITUTIONS—In sectional play any substitutions may be made until actual play has started; however, the substitute must play in the original assigned position of the player he replaces. UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES SHALL THE SCHEDULE OF PLAY BE REDRAWN.

REGIONAL AND STATE SUBSTITUTIONS—There shall be no substitutes for players who qualify in the singles for the regional or state tournament. The singles runner-up is the only eligible substitute. Substitution may be made for a doubles player in case of illness or injury if made prior to the beginning of the regional meet. He must be taken from the doubles alternate list certified on the original entry blank.

REGIONAL MEET QUALIFICATIONS—(1) The first place winner in singles and the first place winning doubles team shall qualify for a Regional Meet. (2) The second place winners in each of above shall be the alternates.

WARNING—Entries close at 4:00 p.m. Wednesday, September 24, 1969. Send all entries to the IHSAA, 812 Circle Tower, Indianapolis, Indiana 46204. The above rules and regulations are subject to change if the Board of Control should deem it necessary. It is suggested that entries be mailed at least two school days prior to the deadline due to the mail service.





# Cross Country

North Central High School (Indianapolis) of Marion County won the 1969 IHSAA state cross country championship at the South Grove Golf Course on November 1, 1969. Excellent team balance—15th, 16th, 17th, 19th, and 39th places—provided the victory.

An extremely large crowd was in attendance at the twenty-fourth annual state cross country meet. The course was in good shape in spite of rains which preceded the meet.

North Central High School won with 106 points. Highland High School came in second with 121 points. Gary West Side High School, with 135, Fort Wayne Elmhurst High School, with 136, and Indianapolis Tech High School, with 138, were the first five finishers in that order.

David Bell, of Highland High School, undefeated during the season, fought off a very strong finishing challenge by Gary Schroeder of Michigan City Elston High School. The winner's time was 9:34.8. Schroeder's time was 9:35.1. Dan Bir of Lafayette Central Catholic High School was third with the time of 9:40.9. In fourth place was Ron Purtlebaugh of Muncie Central High School, with the time of 9:43.4. Tom Alwine of Bloomington High finished fifth in the time of 9:45.2. This is indicative of the closeness of the entire race.

Teams which finished in fourth place in the sectionals and regionals advanced to the next tournament for the first time. This increased the field to sixteen complete teams. Thirteen individuals also participated, which made a total of 109 participants.

Three hundred forty-six boys participated in the cross country sectionals.

## SECTIONAL CROSS COUNTRY MEETS

OPEN CONTEST—These meets are open to all members of the IHSAA except to schools holding junior, preparatory or associate memberships. A school may certify twelve students, with no more than six participating as a team for the championship. Schools that do not enter a team may enter one or more students to compete for the individual awards.

NOTE: Each year some schools file entry blanks, then fail to participate in the meet. You are requested not to file an entry blank unless you fully intend to enter a sectional meet. If for any reason, after filing an entry blank, it becomes necessary to withdraw, please notify the IHSAA office and the Sectional Center Principal immediately.

ENTERTAINMENT—The center principal shall provide adequate dressing rooms, lockers and shower facilities for all contestants.

EXPENSES—There will be no entry fee. Traveling expenses, meals, and lodging are to be paid by the competing schools.

ELIGIBILITY—The eligibility of each player shall be certified to by the principal of his school. The official entry list must be used, and all data given. Entries positively will close Wednesday, October 8. The entry lists must be in the hands of the Commissioner, complete in every detail, by 4 p.m. on that date. Twelve students may be certified for the meet, with six or fewer participating on the day of the meet.

LENGTH OF COURSE—The course must be approximately two miles in length. If possible, it should be laid out on rolling terrain.

SCORING—All competitors who complete the race shall be ranked and tallied in accordance with their placement at the finish. Individuals are ranked and tallied in the placement column, but their position is dropped and not recorded in the team scoring column. The team score shall be determined by totaling the points scored by the first five finishing contestants on each team. The team which scores the lowest number of points will be the winner. In the event of a tie, the tie is to be broken by adding the position of the sixth place man on each team. The team with the lower score will then be awarded the proper place.

In case one of the teams involved in the tie has only five participating members, the team with six participating members, will be awarded the higher ranking position. (Example: In case of a tie for third place, the five-man team will be automatically awarded fourth

place.)

RULES—Each contestant shall wear numbers on both the front and back of his shirt. The rules of cross country running as found on pages 36 and 40 in the 1969 National Alliance Edition of the Track and Field Rules shall govern with IHSAA exceptions—the length of course and limit of contestants. Shoes which have rubber or leather soles must be worn by all contestants during the entire event.

PRIZES—Suitable ribbons will be presented by the IHSAA to the members of the teams qualifying for the regional meet. provided they finish the race. The first five individual winners will receive ribbons. The IHSAA will award a trophy to the winning school.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR REGIONAL MEETS—The first four teams\* to finish in each sectional shall be eligible to advance to the regional meets. The first five individuals to finish shall be eligible for the regional meet regardless of their team position.

\*A school must have five or more boys finishing the race to be con-

sidered a team competing in that sectional.

MANAGEMENT—The management of this meet rests solely with the Board of Control. Officials in charge will be selected by the Board of Control.

ENTRIES—Entries will be limited to the students certified by the principal for the sectional meets.

ENTERTAINMENT—A lunch allowance for each actual participant, one principal and one coach from each competing school will be paid by the IHSAA.

LENGTH OF COURSE—A course two miles in length is planned over a rolling terrain.

RULES AND SCORING—(See Sectional.)

PRIZES—The IHSAA will award the winning school a trophy, and individual medals to members of the teams finishing first, second, third, fourth and fifth. Only actual contestants finishing the race will be eligible for awards. The following rules and regulations were adopted for the 1970 Sectional Gymnastic Meets:

#### LOCATION OF SECTIONAL MEETS

- 1. Crown Point
- 2. North Central (Indianapolis)
- 3. Wabash

#### MANAGEMENT

- 1. The management of these meets rests solely with the Board of Control.
- 2. Responsibility for local arrangements has been delegated to the Center Principals.
- Meet officials will be selected by the Center Principal and Meet Director. The judges will be selected by the IHSAA Board of Control. Enough judges will be provided to run events concurrently.

#### TIME OF MEET

It is recommended that the preliminaries be held at 9:30 A.M. and the finals at 1:30 P.M. The Center Principal shall arrange a program for his meet from the entries sent to him by the Commissioner. Final scratches must be in the hands of the meet director one hour prior to the meet.

#### ADMISSION

The admission fee shall be—session 75¢, season \$1.25.

All actual contestants in uniform, one student manager, one coach, one assistant coach and principal for each team are admitted free to the meet.

#### ALLOWANCE

There will be no travel, meal nor lodging allowance for the competing schools.

#### AWARDS

- 1. Suitable ribbons shall be presented by the IHSAA to the individuals placing from first to and including tenth place in each event, including the All-Around.
  - 2. A trophy will be presented to the winning school.

#### CONTESTANTS AND REQUIREMENTS

Each team will be limited to three All-Around participants but may enter up to five participants in Floor Exercises, Side Horse, Horizontal Bar, Parallel Bars and Still Rings, if at least two of the five are All-Around entries.

#### ELIGIBILITY OF ENTRIES

The eligibility of each student shall be certified to by the principal of the school entering a team. The Official Entry Blank must be used and all data given. Entries will close Wednesday, February 4, 1970 at 4:00 P.M. The entry blanks must be in the hands of the Commissioner COMPLETE IN EVERY DETAIL ON THAT DATE.

#### EVENTS

The list and order of championship events shall be:

- 1. Floor Exercise
- 2. Trampoline
- 3. Side Horse
- 4. Tumbling
- 5. Horizontal Bar
- 6. Parallel Bars
- 7. Still Rings
- 8. All-Around (includes competition in numbers 1, 3, 5, 6 and 7. The nominees of the All-Around event shall be the competitor who obtains the highest aggregate number of points in these events in the preliminaries.)

Note: Two events shall be run concurrently.

#### COSTUME

A complete athletic costume must be worn by all gymnasts. Costumes shall consist of shirt, trunks or long trousers, gymnastic shoes or socks, protective headgear.

#### OFFICIAL RULES

The official rules as outlined in the IHSAA Gymnastics Guide and 1969-70 NCAA Gymnastic Guide shall govern.

#### **PROGRAMS**

Souvenir programs provided by the Center School shall be the only program distributed or sold at the tourney and no solicitation of advertisements shall be made.

#### ALLOWANCE

There will be no travel, meal nor lodging allowance for the competing schools.

#### SCORING

Team scores in the sectional meets shall include all individual events. Ten places shall be awarded points on the basis of 11-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1. In case of a tie, the total score of all four judges will be used to break the tie.

## STATE MEET QUALIFICATION

The first five ranking competitors in each event will qualify for the State Final Meet.

#### WARNING

Entries close at 4:00 P.M. Wednesday, February 4, 1970. Send all entires to the IHSAA, 812 Circle Tower, Indianapolis, Indiana 46204. The above rules and regulations are subject to change if the Board of Control should deem it necessary. It is suggested that the entries be mailed at least two school days prior to the deadline due to the mail service.





Swimming

Eighty-four high schools participated in the sectional swimming meets. This represented a gain of thirteen over the previous year.

Due to the continued growth of the swimming program, eight sectional meets were held instead of seven as in the previous year.

Sectionals were sponsored at Anderson, Bloomington, Frankfort, Kokomo Haworth, LaPorte, Lawrence Central, Munster, and South Bend Washington.

Anderson won at Anderson, Bloomington High at Bloomington, Lafayette Jefferson at Frankfort, Kokomo Haworth at Kokomo, Valparaiso at LaPorte, Southport at Lawrence Central, Hammond Bishop Noll at Munster and South Bend Jackson at South Bend.

For the first time the state meet was held in Ball State University's beautiful new swimming pool. A sell-out crowd was in attendance.

Bloomington High School, with great balance, won its first state high school swimming championship. The Panthers placed in all but one event and amassed a total of 64 points. Southport placed second with 41 points. In third place was South Bend Jackson with 30 points. Kokomo with 18, and Columbus with 17 points finished in fourth and fifth places respectively.

Six new records were established. Pat O'Connor of Indianapolis Cathedral broke his own record in the 200 yard Individual Medley. His time was 2:00.6. He also established a new record in the 100 yard Butterfly in the time of 53.5 seconds.

Rick Roberts of Kokomo High established a new mark of 1:46.1 in the 100 yard Freestyle. Jack Deppe of Bloomington High lowered the 100 yard Backstroke to 55.8 seconds.

The South Bend Jackson 400 Yard Freestyle Relay Team swam in the record time of 3:21.4.

Eric Brunoehler of Southport revised the Diving record with a grand total of 423.45 points.

This blank as well as diving cards filled out in detail and signed by the contestant must be sent to the IHSAA Office with the official entry list.

Each school may enter a team in the relays. Eight names may be entered for each relay and any four will constitute the team. The relays will count as events, No contestants may enter or participate in more than two events.

#### ELIGIBILITY OF ENTRIES

The eligibility of each student entered shall be certified to by the principal of his school. The official Entry Blank must be used and all data given. Entries will close Wednesday, February 4, 1970, at 4:00 P.M. The entry lists must be in the IHSAA Office complete in every detail by 4:00 P.M. on that date.

- 2. Responsibility for local arrangements has been delegated to the Center Principals. Complete tournament information must be sent to all participating schools and officials. This information should be in their hands by Tuesday, February 3.
- 3. Meet officials will be selected by the Center Principal and Meet Director. The referees will be selected by the IHSAA Board of Control.
- 4. Private dressing rooms should be provided for the officials.

#### ADMISSIONS

The admission fee shall be \$1.00 for Thursday night session, \$1.00 for single sessions on Saturday. Season tickets, \$2.50. Actual competing contestants, alternates, student manager, coach, assistant coach and principal shall be admitted free to the meet.

#### ALLOWANCE

There will be no travel, meal, nor lodging allowance for the competing schools.

#### AWARDS

- Suitable ribbons shall be presented by the IHSAA to the individuals placing first, second, third and fourth in each weight division.
- 2. A trophy will be presented to the winning school.

#### ELIGIBILITY OF ENTRIES

The eligibility of each student shall be certified to by the principal of the school entering a team. The Official Entry Blank must be used and all data given. Entries will close Wednesday, January 28, 1970, at 4:00 P.M. The entry blanks must be in the hands of the Commissioner COMPLETE IN EVERY DETAIL ON THAT DATE. The rules and regulations concerning sectional participation require a school to enter ten or more contestants in ten or more weight divisions. This rule does not apply to the Indiana School for the Blind. Two students may be certified for each weight division. These two entrants are eligible for that division or the weight division above, only one may compete on the day of the tournament. All students must have established their qualifying weight classification in the school's official score book on or after the third Thursday in December. A student must have wrestled in a minimum of six interschool dual meets or tournaments in his qualifying weight classification to be entered in that weight division. He may qualify for the weight division above by having wrestled in a total of six or more interschool dual meets or tournaments in the two divisions. A tournament shall count as one match for students that compete. All contestants must have met above qualifications before they may be certified.

#### METHOD OF PAIRING

Pairings and seeding of contestants will be made at 7:00 P.M., Monday evening, February 2, at the Sectional Center site. Each participating school entered in that sectional may have only one voting representative present. Positions of contestants from schools not represented at this meeting will be drawn by lot. At least two and no more than four contestants shall be seeded in each weight division. Each coach must indicate his entrant and alternate (no boy may be an alternate in more than one weight) for each weight classification. These names must be declared before the seeding is started. After these Monday night pairings only the designated alternate may be substituted. Pairings At This Meeting Shall Be Final and Will Not Be Changed. This includes any of the seeded contestants. Any contestant, or his designated alternate, who fails to make weight at the minimum time shall automatically forfeit to his first round opponent. If an entrant fails to appear on the mat willing to wrestle, his opponent shall advance to the next round.

#### METHOD OF QUALIFICATION

Individual and team standings shall be decided by the point system as outlined in the National Intercollegiate Wrestling Guide. (Excep-

tion) All matches shall be "sudden death" until the final four qualifiers of each weight division have been determined.

#### OFFICIAL RULES

The official rules as outlined in the 1970 Intercollegiate Wrestling Guide for High School Wrestling shall govern (Exception IHSAA revised rulings).

NOTE: Time advantage will not be used.

#### PHYSICAL EXAMINATION

It is recommended that each contestant have a physical examination immediately prior to this tournament, and that he participate only if the examining physician certifies that he is physically fit for such participation.



# Basketball

East Chicago Roosevelt won the sixtieth annual state basketball championship tournament and became the fourth team in IHSAA history to go all the way unbeaten. Their record was 28-0.

The championship game was between the Roughriders of East Chicago Roosevelt and the Greyhounds of Carmel. Despite a brilliant final game, record breaking performance by Carmel's Dave Shepherd, the Roughriders were able to control the play. East Chicago Roosevelt led at all stops; however, by only a small margin until in the latter stages of the game. At the end of the first quarter the score was 14-12. At halftime, Roosevelt led by only 32-29. With 3:23 to go in the third quarter Carmel came within two points, 39-37. At this point Roosevelt scored ten points to Carmel's five and led at the end of the third stop 49-42. The Roughriders' tremendous size and board strength showed in the final quarter as they steadily pulled away and won by a score of 76-62.

The first afternoon game between Loogootee and Carmel was extremely close until late in the contest. Carmel had a 14-11 lead at the end of the first quarter and maintained a 25-23 lead at the half. But Loogootee nosed in front 45-43 at the end of three. In the final quarter Carmel gradually forged to the front and won by a score of 71-62.

In the second afternoon game between Muncie Central and East Chicago Roosevelt, Muncie Central raced to a 10-3 lead during the first three minutes, but thereafter Roosevelt asserted itself and led at the first stop 18-16. The half-time score was 39-36. However, early in the third quarter Roosevelt, behind some fine shooting built up a 63-48 gap by the end of the third quarter. The final score was East Chicago Roosevelt 90, Muncie Central 75. Bradley of Roosevelt and Bragg of Muncie Central led their teams respectively with 27 and 28 points.

The Board of Control selected James Trout of Loogootee High School as the recipient of the coveted Arthur L. Trester Award for Mental Attitude.

Due to consolidation, the total number of participants in the sectional tournaments was reduced from 463 to 443.

## ANNOUNCEMENT OF STATE BASKETBALL TOURNEY SERIES THE SIXTIETH ANNUAL

These rules are reprinted from the 1970 January Bulletin

The Board of Control has completed the details for the State Championship Basketball Tourneys and announces the plan in full; with the understanding that the Board of Control reserves the right to readjust the plan and arrangements for any and all tourneys if conditions arise making changes advisable or cancellations necessary.

# GENERAL INFORMATION CONCERNING SECTIONAL, REGIONAL, SEMI-STATE AND STATE TOURNEYS

- 1. TYPE OF BALL—The molded type basketball approved orange or natural tan has been legalized for the State Championship Series. See pages 18 and 20 of January, 1970 Bulletin for the Semi-State and State balls.
- 2. PRIZES—No prizes of any kind are to be awarded to any school or individual from any source, other than the IHSAA. The IHSAA will present a trophy to each sectional winner.
- 3. RADIO AND TELEVISION SERVICE—Radio Stations in Indiana may broadcast IHSAA tourneys provided the requirements in the "IHSAA Rules and Regulations Governing Broadcasting" are observed. Station managers and Center Principals will have copies of these rules and regulations. Television stations may be permitted to telecast only the final game of Sectional and Regional Tourneys as well as all games of Semi-state and State Tourneys. Advanced written approval must be obtained from the center principal. Restrictions are: 1. Stations may telecast in their home area only. 2. Delayed telecasts will not be permitted. 3. A guarantee must be posted to cover costs of unsold seats for the sessions telecast.
- 4. PICTURES—Flashlight pictures of the players shall not be taken during the progress of the games, except where photographers use speed light cameras. This ruling is meant to protect the vision of the players. Photographers desiring to take pictures shall make previous arrangements with the management of the tourney. The number of photographers and their locations shall be determined by the Center School management. Filming of tournament games will not be permitted.
- 5. SOUVENIR PROGRAMS—Souvenir programs other than those provided by the IHSAA shall not be distributed or sold at any tourney, and no solicitation of advertisements shall be made. Neither the Board of Control nor the Commissioner's Office will approve the distribution of such material at any tourney. Anyone claiming to have such approval should be reported to the IHSAA office immediately. All principals should notify their business men now.

- 6. SUGGESTIONS—Sectional Center Principals and participating principals should work with each other prior to the tourney, during the tourney and after the tourney. A conference of all principals, several days prior to the tourney, would result in an agreement on all points such as meals, transportation, rest rooms, seating, tickets, reports, etc. Agreements reached prior to tourneys prevent difficulties during and after tourneys. Make and keep copies of all agreements.
- 7. MANAGEMENT—The exclusive control of all these tourneys rests solely with the Board of Control according to the IHSAA Constitution. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center Principals. Officials for each tourney will be selected and assigned by the Board of Control, and every effort will be made to choose only fair, disinterested and competent men. All schedules and assignment of officials will be made and distributed by the Board. All schedules will be drawn by lot by the Board of Control, and no changes will be made in them. Representatives of the press will be invited.
- 8. TIME SCHEDULE—The Board of Control has ruled that all tourneys will be held on the prevailing time of the community in which the Center is located. All Saturday games will be 12:30, 1:45, and 8:15 p.m.
- 9. OFFICIALS—The assignment of game officials and their decisions will be considered final. Schools enter the tourneys with this understanding. Give this information to your students and fans now.

Official scorer(s) shall be dressed in a manner that will distinguish them from others who may be seated at the scorers and timers table. Black and white striped shirts or jackets are strongly recommended.

- 10. PRIVILEGES—Twelve competing players, coaches, principal and manager for each team (16 in all) shall be admitted free to all games.
- 11. OVERTIME GAMES—The same rule applies in tourneys as used during the regular season games.
- 12. WARM-UP PERIOD—There shall be fifteen minutes allowed between games for warm-up practic. During a session, this period shall start with the ending of the previous game. The first two teams playing in a session shall also be limited to the fifteen minute warm-up period. This fifteen minute period shall be exclusive of announcements and opening ceremonies.
- 13. PLAYERS' BENCHES—Shall be placed along that side of the court on which the scorer's table is located.
- 14. CHEER LEADERS—Only the cheer leaders from the two participating schools may be used in connection with any one game.
- 15. RESTRICTIONS—Please inform your students and others about the following tourney restrictions:
  - Balloons, banners, posters, etc., that are objectionable in the wording or which obstruct the view of others, are not allowed.

- b. Cow-bells, and other such noise instruments are not allowed.
- c. The use of bands at IHSAA tourneys is not sanctioned.
- d. No live animal mascots are permitted.

It shall be the responsibility of each high school principal to see that his fans (adult & student) abide by the above restrictions.

NOTE: Card sections as part of the cheering block are permitted.

16. HOME TEAM—The first named team in each game throughout the entire tournament is always designated as the "Home Team." It shall wear white uniforms and have a choice of bench (exception—host team shall have choice of home bench).

The second named team in each game shall have choice of basket and wear colored uniforms. In the event the Host Team is the second named team it shall wear colored uniforms but have choice of bench only.

#### SECTIONAL TOURNEYS

#### February 23-28

The following bases were used in selecting sectional, regional and semi-state centers:

(1) Invitations filed by the principals. (2) Locations considered but not necessarily the determining factor. (3) Transportation facilities. (4) General conditions—attitude of local authorities, floors, seating capacities and entertaining facilities. (5) Rotation. (6) Success and satisfactory management of previous tourneys. (7) Adjustment because of reorganization and consolidation.

Many schools have been assigned by counties but there are a number of exceptions which are clearly indicated. Some changes were made to equalize the number of participating teams resulting in better balanced schedules or the use of less school time. The plan arranged is to have no less than 5 teams and no more than 8 teams in each tourney, and the assignment of all schools is given in the list which follows. The number of schools that probably will enter the tourneys is indicated. No doubt these numbers will be very nearly correct for this year. Correct information will not be available until the entry blanks have been received and accepted by the Board of Control. The numbers are tentative. The winners will constitute the teams in the Regional Tourneys according to assignment. Entry blanks are necessary. An entry blank is enclosed.

MANAGEMENT—Four officials will be assigned to all tourneys. Two officials will work each game, alternating as referee and umpire. Each official is obligated to be ready for work throughout the tourney.

TOURNEY REQUIREMENTS—A high school shall not be considered eligible for entering an IHSAA sectional basketball tourney in any year unless the team known as the first team and representing the high school has played eight (8) interscholastic games during that season before filing an entry blank. Schools holding associate, junior or preparatory membership are not eligible to enter.

ENTERTAINMENT—Twelve men may be certified and in uniform. The Center Principals have contracted with the Board of Control to entertain sixteen men (which must include coaches, principal and manager) from each competing school according to the following plan:

1. Transportation—All schools are entitled to one-round trip mileage allowance each day the tourney is in session.

Meals—All schools are entitled to one meal for each day the tourney is in session.

- 3. Due to the variations of time schedules of "One-Site Two-Bracket" tourneys, the time schedules, entertainment schedules and admission prices will be set up by the IHSAA and sent to all Center Principals concerned. It will be the obligation of the Center Principal to send copies to all schools in his sectional area. The time schedules of all tourneys will be published as usual at the time of the drawings.
- 4. No lodging shall be paid.

Fairness by all parties must prevail in this matter of entertainment. Money spent for entertainment decreases the amount to be divided among the schools.

EXPENSES—An entrance fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each team must accompany the entry blank. The Center Schools have contracted to make settlement out of the receipts of the tourneys according to the following plan and in the following order:

1. All legitimate expenses, such as meals, officials, etc., except for transportation, shall be paid from the gross receipts.

2. The Center High School shall receive two hundred dollars (\$200).

3. The transportation shall be paid. (The Board of Control has decided on four (4) cents per mile per man (limited to 16 men) for the round trip. Mileage should be considered as the most direct distance between the school building of the participating school and the gymnasium in which the tourney is held.)

4. The Center High School shall receive one hundred dollars (\$100).

5. The IHSAA shall receive one percent (1%) of the fourth balance.

6. (a) One-half of the fifth balance shall be divided equally among the participating schools, the Center School sharing.

(b) One-half of the fifth balance shall be divided among the participating schools on an enrollment basis.

7. The Board of Control shall pass on all reports by the Center School and all reports by the participating schools.

8. The Center School shall furnish a complete financial report to the IHSAA and to each participating school by Thursday, March 5.

ELIGIBILITY—The eligibility of each player must be certified by the principal of the school sending the team. Certification must be made on the Official Entry Blank furnished by the Commissioner and all data must be given as indicated. An Entry Blank marked "Your Duplicate" is enclosed for your convenience. Be sure to send only the "Official Entry Blank" to the IHSAA. All entries must be in the IHSAA office before 4:00 p.m. Wednesday February 11. Do not mail entry blanks before February 2. All students must be eligible when they participate as well as when they are certified. It is advisable to mail the entry blanks early, as changes can be made by telephone, telegram or letter any time up to 4:00 p.m. Wednesday. February 11. Registered letters are not recommended, as they are a slow form of delivery. Regular or special delivery mailing is the most satisfactory. A postal card from this office will acknowledge receipt and correctness of your entry. The Board of Control has ruled that late entry blanks will not be accepted.

ADMISSION—The admission fees in all tourneys shall be as indicated below and the tickets shall be printed with the following information on them:

Session ticket (all regular tourney)-\$1.50

#### ONE-SITE TOURNEYS:

Season ticket:

- a. Three-session tourney-\$3.00
- b. Four-Session tourney—\$4.00

Tickets shall not be sold for more nor less than the prices listed. Season tickets only shall be sold prior to the opening session of the tourney. Any remaining tickets may be sold as session tickets. ONE-SITE TWO-BRACKET TOURNEYS:

Due to the variation in the number of sessions, season ticket prices shall be established by the Board of Control through the IHSAA office and the Center Principal.

No more tickets shall be sold than the seating capacity of the gymnasium will justify. Standing room shall not be sold or used. All requirements of the State and City Fire Marshals shall be met in all tourneys.

RESERVED SEATS—The Board strongly recommends that all seats be reserved.

DISTRIBUTION OF TICKETS—The following plan for the division of sectional tourney tickets was adopted by the Board of Control:

 Deduct from the total number of tickets available, sixteen tickets for each competing school, press and complimentary tickets. Each Athletic Council Member and each Ex-Board member shall be granted two tickets to the sectional in his area upon request by Thursday, February 19.

- 2. Ten percent of the remaining tickets shall be divided equally among the competing schools. (Every school regardless of enrollment, has a certain "must" list; such as assistant coaches, trainers, student managers, cheerleaders, etc. This allotment is intended primarily for this use.)
- 3. The remaining ninety percent shall be divided among the competing schools on the basis of enrollment of each participating school in grades 9 through 12 as certified to the State Department of Public Instruction, September 15, 1969, or the third day of school if the opening day is later than September 15.

No tickets shall be distributed by the Center Principal until his tourney schedule has been released. Season tickets must be ready for distribution by Thursday, February 19. The IHSAA will furnish Center Principals with enrollments of all high schools participating in their tourneys. Season tickets unsold shall be returned by 8:00 a.m. on the day the tourney begins, except that in "one-site two-bracket" tourneys, they shall be returned by 1:00 p.m. the day before the tourney if the tourney begins with a day time session; and by 8:00 a.m. on the day of the tourney if the tourney begins with an evening session. The Center Principal is under no obligation to accept the return of tickets after these hours, unless previous arrangements have been made with him.

WARNINGS—Entries close at 4:00 p.m., Wednesday, February 11, and cannot be changed or accepted afterward. An entrance fee of one dollar (\$1.00) must accompany each entry blank. Special privileges will not be granted. Send all entry blanks and checks to IHSAA, 812 Circle Tower, Indianapolis. All data must be given on entry blank. Get all data right the first time and on time, but do not mail blanks before February 2. Late or incomplete entry blanks cannot be accepted. Be sure to send only the "Official Entry Blank" to the IHSAA.

Each Athletic Council Member and each Ex-Board Member shall be granted two tickets to the semi-state in his area upon request prior to Saturday, March 7. Each participating school is entitled to sixteen complimentary tickets for the use of its twelve players, the principal, coaches and a manager. A list of the complimentary tickets must be furnished the IHSAA, giving the name, position and number of tickets.
- 6. The Center School, if not a participant, shall receive five percent of the number of tickets representing the actual seating capacity of the gymnasium.
- 7. Schools entered in a sectional tourney may secure sixteen (16) tickets to the semi-state tourney in their area. Orders must reach the semi-state principal between February 28 and March 4. All principals should use the Semi-State Ticket Order enclosed with this bulletin, and should attach a check in the proper amount, sending the order and remittance TO THE SEMI-STATE CENTER PRINCIPAL IN THEIR AREA.
- 8. Each participating school may secure tickets at this stage as follows, providing they are purchased and paid for by the high school principal not later than March 10.
  - (a) One-half of the tickets remaining divided on an equal basis.

- (b) One-half of the tickets remaining divided on an enrollment basis, the enrollment being that for grades 9 through 12 as submitted to the Inspection Office of the State Department of Public Instruction, September 15, 1969, or the third day of school, if the opening date is later than September 15.
- (c) If one or more of these participating schools do not purchase all of the tickets allotted to them, then these tickets shall be apportioned to the other participating schools and the Center School if not a participant, on the two bases mentioned in (a) and (b).
- 9. All tickets remaining at this stage shall be placed on open sale on Thursday, March 12, 9:00 a.m., with the understanding that all sales shall be controlled to insure fairness to all.

# STATE TOURNEY HINKLE FIELDHOUSE, INDIANAPOLIS March 21

ENTRANTS—The four (4) winning teams of the semi-state tourneys shall constitute the participants in the State Tourney. The schedule will be drawn by lot by the Board of Control according to sectional tourney plan.

ENTRIES—One entry fee covers all tourneys. Twelve men may be certified, and in uniform and eligible to compete in any one game. These men must be designated to the official scorer prior to the team's game. These teams may or may not be made up of the same men that participated in the other tourneys. The semi-state entry blank will suffice for the State Tourney and will be used as made, unless you instruct the IHSAA office otherwise on Monday, March 16. If you desire to make any substitutions in your entry blank, wire or telephone the IHSAA office, giving complete data on Monday, March 16.

ENTERTAINMENT—Sixteen men will be entertained on each team from each school. Each school having a team playing in the tourney will receive the following: \$500.00 for meals and lodging and \$500.00 for bonus, 16 season tickets and cost of transportation to and from Indianapolis. Four cents per mile per man for the round trip for sixteen men will constitute the basis for figuring transportation. The mileage shall be considered the most direct and reasonable distance from the high school of the participating school to the field house in Indianapolis.

ADMISSION—The admission fee will be as indicated and the tickets will be printed with the following information on them.

- 1. Session Ticket-\$3.00
- 2. Season Ticket—\$4.50

AWARDS—The winning school will be awarded a shield, cup or similar trophy, and each member of its team an individual award.

A trophy will be given to the runnerup team and individual awards to its team members.

The Arthur L. Trester Award for Mental Attitude will be presented to the athlete who, in the opinion of the Board of Control, shall qualify for this award.

CONDUCT OF PERSONS DURING STATE TOURNEY—The IHSAA endeavors to secure proper conduct of all persons attending the tourney, while in hotels and elsewhere, and instructs principals, superintendents, coaches, teachers, parents and communities that the receipt of tickets by their high school principal places the direct and immediate responsibility on him for the conduct of the persons attending the tourney.

Management—The Board of Control has designated Phil N. Eskew, Commissioner, as Manager with Herman F. Keller and Ward E. Brown, Assistant Commissioners, as Assistant Managers of this tourney. Their telephone number is 637-1519. Fred R. Gorman, Indianapolis, will assist with the arrangements for the tourney at the field house.

Press and Radio reservations will be made directly to the IHSAA office. Requests should be filed not earlier than February 19, and not later than Thursday, March 12. An identification plan will be used for press representatives, who must be properly certified by their managers at the time requests are made. School newspapers, and school radio stations are not included.

Tickets—All tickets will be handled by the IHSAA Office according to the following plan:

1. Season tickets, only will be sold prior to Saturday, March 21. In recent years all tickets were sold prior to this date. If the capacity of the Fieldhouse is not sold in season tickets, session tickets will be sold on the day of the tourney. The seating capacity is estimated at approximately 14,943.

2. Each high school principal having a team entered in an IHSAA Sectional Basketball Tourney for 1970, may order tickets to 3.4 percent of his high school enrollment not exceeding 1000 students. The Board of Control has established two to six tickets according to enrollment as the number that may be ordered by each junior and preparatory member school principal. Principals whose high school enrollments exceed 1000 may order 3.4 percent of the enrollment

to 1000 and one (1) additional ticket for each 500 students, or fraction thereof, over 1000 enrollment. The enrollment shall be for grades 9 through 12 as submitted to the Inspection Office of the State Department of Public Instruction, September 15, 1969. A fraction of one-half or more may count for a ticket and no school shall be limited to less than four tickets, Post graduates shall not be counted. Principals should carefully observe the limitations as outlined. If there are questions, ask them now. All enrollments will be checked with the report herein mentioned. Be sure you are right. A chart giving the enrollments with ticket allotments will be printed on the reverse side of the ticket order blank.

3. Tickets will be sold by mail order only. Telephone, telegraph and personal call orders will not be honored. A ticket order blank is enclosed with this bulletin. It is official and you should use it according to instructions.

4. Ticket orders must be specific as to number of tickets and a check for the correct amount payable to the IHSAA must accompany each order. Tickets purchased cannot be returned. Please do not send cash. The limitations below must be observed as given:

(a) Orders for tickets having official postmarks on the envelopes from and including Thursday, February 19, to and including Friday, February 27, will be accepted if received not later than Saturday, February 28. Ticket orders mailed prior to February 20 will be returned for proper mailing. The IHSAA reserves the right to check the mailing of all ticket orders and act on the findings.

5. Principals are obligated to distribute these tickets properly to persons in their own school districts before distributing any tickets elsewhere. Each principal will be required to keep on file the full names and addresses of all ticket purchasers for the information of the Board of Control, should such be desired for checking purposes. Tickets distributed by principals in an improper way or at a price higher than the price on the ticket will jeopardize the standing of their schools.

6. All tickets remaining unsold after the high school principals have ordered, according to the privilege of their enrollment quotas, will be distributed pro rata among the principals of the 64 sectional tourney winning schools if ordered by them. Principals should state on their order blank, ordering their quota of tickets according to enrollment, whether or not they would accept and pay for any tickets that may be distributed to them if they are sectional tourney winners. No tickets, other than those remaining after the enrollment quota orders are honored, are offered in this paragraph. There may be only a few or no tickets so remaining. None is guaranteed. Tickets purchased cannot be returned.

7. In order that all may know how ticket orders are filled, the following statements are made:

(a) Ticket orders from principals are due any time from February 19 to February 27, inclusive. Postmark will determine mailing date.

(b) Upon receipt of ticket orders in the IHSAA office, they are checked. All correct orders are arranged alphabetically according to the name of the school, numbered and filled. THIS

# YEAR ORDERS WILL BE FILLED IN ALPHABETICAL ORDER.

(c) Incorrect orders are returned with instructions.

(d) The method of filling ticket orders is entirely by lot and the plan automatically assigns the seats. The location of seats of any particular school depends upon date of receipt of order, number of orders received in same mail, number of tickets covered by the orders received in the same mail, alphabetical order of the school name among the orders received, accuracy of ticket order, station reached in drawings determined by the orders received, etc.

#### MISCELLANEOUS

1. All seats will be reserved and tickets sold to principals as outlined above.

2. Blocks of seats, when sold, will be arranged from front to back rather than around the playing floor, about twenty percent of the number in each block being assigned to the front of the block.

3. No pass-out tickets will be issued. Holders of tickets may leave the Fieldhouse when they choose in any session, but they cannot re-enter until the next session. The Fieldhouse will be cleared between sessions.

4. All tickets will be printed in coupon form, carrying the statement that coupons will not be good if detached. The IHSAA tickets will be printed in a way that will make duplication very difficult, but a warning is given against bogus tickets.

5. Ticket holders will be seated prior to the opening game in each session, between halves and between games only. All persons must remain seated in their own seats during the games. All games will be started on scheduled time and will be played in quarters

of 8 minutes each.
6. Comfort accommodations will be found on each floor at each

end of the Fieldhouse.
7. Tickets will indicate the Gate, Ramp, Section, Row and Number.
As you approach the Fieldhouse look for the Gate Number above

the door corresponding to the one on your ticket.

8. Two blocks of seats in the middle on the west side of the playing floor and two blocks in the middle on the east side of the playing floor, having 1000 seats to the block, will be reserved until Monday, March 16, for the four schools whose teams are in the tourney. Twelve blocks of seats, immediately around the playing floor with 25 seats to the block, will be reserved for the other twelve schools participating in the semi-state tourneys. The high school principals, whose teams are represented, should contact the IHSAA office by Monday, March 16, about these tickets for they will be sold to other eligible schools. These blocks will be assigned by lot by the Board of Control.

9. First Aid Rooms are located in the east end of the field house. Look for the sign. A tourney physician and a nurse will be avail-

able during the tourney.

10. Principals are asked to instruct all ticket holders to refrain from smoking in the Fieldhouse. This precaution is taken for the benefit of the players and the safety of the spectators.





# Track and Field

Gary Roosevelt won its ninth track and field state championship in the sixty-seven years of the championship event. A near capacity crowd was in attendance at the Indianapolis Technical High School Indpls. Crispus Attucks

On a very nice day Gary Roosevelt won the meet with an impressive total of 31 points. North Central (Indianapolis) was second with 19 points. In third place was Elkhart, the defending state champion, with 18 points. Gary Horace Mann scored 16 points, Lawrence Central 14 points and Indianapolis Northwest 12 for fourth, fifth, and sixth positions respectively, in the state meet. Ninety-two high schools were represented in the state meet and forty-six broke into the scoring column.

Two new records were established. Gary Mann's Pat Gullett was responsible for a new record in the 220 yard Dash around a curve in

the time of 21.4. This broke the old record by .5 of a second. In the greatest exhibition of pole vaulting skill ever displayed in Indiana, as well as the entire United States this year, Gordon Crail of Greenwood High School won with a vault of 15 ft. 5 1/2 in. He was the defending state champion. The old record of 15 ft. 0 1/2 in. was held by Gary Thrapp of East Noble High School. Dixon Baughman of Kokomo also broke the old record with a fine vault

of 15 ft. 3 1/2 in. Bruce Leek of Gary Roosevelt skimmed over the low hurdles in near-record time of 18.7 with teammate Ed Givens shadowing him across the finish line in second place.

The defending champion mile relay team from Elkhart defended

its championship in the time of 3:21.1.

Dave Churchill of Crawfordsville High School, who won the high jump last year, changed events this year and won the long jump with a leap of 23 ft. 1 1/2 in.

Lawrence Central's Chris Read ran an impressive 440 around two curves in the time of 49.7. Marty Hill of Brebeuf won the Mile Run

in 4:16.6.

Greg Martin of Indianapolis Attucks defended his 100 yard championship for the third year in 9.7. His teammate Tom Jackson won

the high hurdles in 14.4.

Bill Hicks of Indianapolis Northwest won the 880 in 1:54.3, Dan Bir of Lafavette Central Catholic the 2 mile in 9:25.9, Mike Larrison of Indianapolis Northwest the shot put with 59 ft. 8 3/4 in. and Leon Martin of Vincennes Lincoln the high jump with 6 ft. 6 in. The Gary Roosevelt 880 relay team won in the good time of 1:28.6.

The Board of Control unanimously selected Dave Bell of Highland High School as the ninth recipient of the Robert A. Hinshaw Award. The recipient must excel in scholarship, mental attitude, school citizenship, as well as athletic ability in track and field.

A total of 372 high schools entered the sixteen track and field

sectional meets.

Management—The management of these meets rests solely with the Board of Control. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center Principals. All meet officials will be selected by the Center Principal, except the Referee-Starter, and he will be assigned by the Board of Control. He will be in complete charge of the meet and shall assume the duties of a Referee and Starter as a representative of the IHSAA.

The meet must be held Friday afternoon, Friday evening, Saturday afternoon or Saturday evening. The Center Principal shall notify all schools participating in his sectional, and the IHSAA office by Tuesday, May 5, as to the time and place of holding the meet. The Center Principal shall arrange a program for his meet from the list of entries sent to him by the Commissioner.

Admission Fee—Admission fee to all meets shall be not less than fifty cents (50¢) or more than one dollar (\$1.00).

Open Contest—These meets are open to all members of the Association, except to schools holding preparatory, junior or associate memberships.

Entertainment—The Center Principal shall provide adequate dressing rooms, lockers and shower facilities for all contestants.

Expenses—There will be no entry fee. Traveling expenses must be paid by the competing schools.

Privileges—All actual contestants in uniform, one coach, one assistant coach and principal for each team are admitted free to the meet.

Entrance Requirements—The minimum standards of performance which contestants must achieve to be eligible to enter sectional track and field meets shall have been equalled or bettered in actual competition in regularly scheduled interschool meets during the present outdoor track season. These performance standards may be established by competent timing of the first three, four or five places in interschool outdoor meets.

Eligibility—The eligibility of each participant who equalled or bettered the standards of performance in actual competition must be certified to by the principal of the school sending the team. The best performance for each contestant must be indicated for each event or events in the regular IHSAA entry blank. Unless the best performance is indicated in the proper space the contestant will not be considered entered in that event. Entries positively will close Wednesday, April 29, at 4:00 P.M. This means the entry blank must

be in the hands of the Commissioner, complete in every detail, on the date. See warnings below.

Official Rules—The current National Alliance Edition of the Track and Field Guide as published by the National Federation is official in the IHSAA. A few modifications have been made by the IHSAA and they are given in the present Bulletin. In both relays "off the curve" method of exchange shall be used. Both relays may be run in lanes the first 220 yards with a staggered start if lanes have been marked. When the half mile relay is run with the first 220 yards marked in lanes the first and second runners will exchange in their own lane.

Scoring-Winning first place in any event in the sectional meet counts five points; second place, three points; third place, two points; and fourth place, one point. Points in the relays will be counted in determining the winning team, the points for each place in each relay to be double the points in each place in other events. In case of a tie in a track event, the points shall be divided equally and the prizes awarded by lot. Ties in the high jump and pole vault shall be decided by awarding the position, with its points, to the contestant with the lowest number of trials for the tied height, If the tie still is not broken, the fewest total misses in the entire competition is the determining factor. Existing ties at this stage shall be decided by the method outlined in Rule 5, Section 2, I (a, b, c, d, and e), pages 21 and 22, of the 1970 Track Rules Book. No misses shall be charged to a competitor for a passed height, In case of a tie in the shot put or long jump, position and points are awarded according to Rule 5, Section 2, II (a and b) "determined by distance," page 22 of the 1970 Track Rules Book.

In case two or more contestants tie for fourth place the above method shall be applied to this place for determining the contestant who advances to the Regional and wins the ribbon. This means that ties for the last qualifying position for the Regional must be broken by applying Rule 5-2-I to insure that no meet will send more qualifiers to the Regional than they are permitted. Be sure the contestants are notified of any ties immediately after the event so they will be available for any runoff for the qualifying position. Points are not affected.

Limitations—No contestant may be certified in more than 3 events (including relay) and no contestant may be certified for both relays.

A contestant may be certified in the 880 yard run, mile run and/or two mile run but may participate in only one.

It is recommended, especially in the 440 yard dash, that this race be run in heats, no more than 12 contestants in a heat. Referring to the best performance, the 12 contestants having the fastest times shall be placed in the first heat, the next 12 fastest in the second heat, etc. Four places shall be timed in each heat. It is suggested that there be three watches on each of the four winners.

The opening time trial for the high hurdle event should be at least one hour, but not less than 45 minutes prior to the final high hurdle race. Field events should begin 30 minutes prior to the opening time trial for the high hurdle event.

Prizes—Suitable ribbons shall be provided and presented by the Center School to the winners of first, second, third and fourth places in each event. The IHSAA will provide a trophy to be presented to the winning school in each sectional. No other prizes shall be given.

Warning—Entry blanks must be in the IHSAA office on or before 4:00 p.m., Wednesday, April 29, and they cannot be accepted afterwards. Special privileges will be granted to no one.

#### QUALIFICATIONS FOR REGIONAL MEET

- 1. The winners of first, second and third places in the 440, 880, mile and two-mile races and winners of first, second, third and fourth places in all other individual events, shall constitute the entrants for a Regional Meet.
- 2. Relay teams finishing first and second in each Sectional shall qualify for a Regional Meet. Six men may qualify for a relay team, if contestants' names are listed on the IHSAA Official Entry Blank.
- 3. In cases of ties concerning the first three or first four places, the winners shall be decided by lot, except as outlined on page 19. (Scoring rule). Names of winners must be clearly designated on the score sheet. Only three men from the 440, 880, mile and two-mile races and four men from other individual events are eligible to qualify for a Regional Meet.

Entrants—Three contestants in the 440, 880, mile and two-mile races; four in all other events, and two half-mile and two mile relay teams will qualify from each sectional for regional participation. (See qualifications for regional.)

Privileges—All actual contestants in uniform, one coach, one assistant coach and principal for each team are to be admitted free to the meet.

Admission Fee—The admission fee to the meet shall be one dollar (\$1.00).

Management—The management, protests and privileges will be governed according to the regulations pertaining to the Sectional Meets. The Center Principal shall arrange a program for his meet from the list of entries sent to him by the Commissioner.

The Center Principal shall notify all schools participating in his regional, and the IHSAA office by Tuesday, May 12, as to the place of holding the meet.

Entertainment—The Regional Center Principal shall provide adequate dressing rooms, lockers and shower facilities for all contestants.

Expenses—There will be no entry fee. Traveling expenses must be paid by the competing schools.

Official Rules—The official rules as outlined in the 1970 National Alliance Edition of the Track and Field Rules & Records shall govern. Modifications made by the IHSAA are given in the present Bulletin.

A contestant must be at the starting mark in the uniform of his team when the starter calls the contestants to the mark the first time.

The start shall be staggered and the first 220 yards run in lanes for both relays, using "off the curve" method of exchange. In the half-mile relay the first and second runners will exchange in their own lane. The first runners in the mile relay shall run an equal distance in lanes to a designated place before being allowed to cut for the pole position. This spot must be marked by a flag or line across the track on the back stretch approximately 5 yards beyond the turn.

Order of Events and Limitations. (See Sectional, for this item.)

Scoring-Winning first place in any event in the regional meet counts five points; second place, three points; third place, two points and fourth place, one point. Points in the relays will be counted in determining the winning team, the points for each place in each relay to be double the points in each place in other events. In case of a tie in a track event, the points shall be divided and the prizes awarded by lot. Ties in the high jump and pole vault shall be decided by awarding the position with its points to the contestant with the lowest number of trials for the tied height. If the tie still is not broken, the fewest total misses in the entire competition is the determining factor. Existing ties at this stage shall be decided by the method outlined in Rule 5, Section 2, I (a, b, c, d, and e), pages 21 and 22, of the 1970 Track Rules Book. No misses shall be charged to a competitor for a passed height. In case of a tie in the shot put or long jump, position and points are awarded according to Rule 5, Section 2, II (a and b), "determined by distance," page 22, of the 1970 Track Rules Book.

In case two or more contestants tie for fourth place the above method shall be applied to this place for determining the contestant who advances to the State and wins the ribbon. This means that ties for the last qualifying position for the State must be broken by applying Rule 5-2-I to insure that no meet will send more qualifiers to the State than they are permitted. Be sure the contestants are notified of any ties immediately after the event so they will be available for any runoff for the qualifying position. Points are not affected.

Prizes—Suitable ribbons shall be provided by the IHSAA to the winners of first, second, third and fourth places in each event. No other prizes shall be given,

Entrants—Only three contestants in the 440, 880, mile and two-mile races, four in all other individual events, and two half-mile and two mile relay teams will qualify from each regional for State Meet participation.

- 1. Entertainment—The IHSAA will pay transportation expense for each of the qualifying contestants in uniform, one coach, one assistant coach and the principal from each school represented in the meet. Mileage will be paid on the following basis: Two dollars (\$2.00) per man for schools traveling one hundred twenty miles (round-trip) or under from Technical High School, Indianapolis, the schools in Marion County not sharing; Four dollars (\$4.00) per man for schools traveling between one hundred and twenty miles and two hundred fifty miles (round-trip) from Technical High School; Six dollars (\$6.00) per man for schools traveling two hundred fifty-one miles or over (round-trip) from Technical High School.
- 2. The IHSAA will furnish a noon meal at Technical High School on Saturday, the day of the meet, for the qualifying contestants in uniform, one coach, one assistant coach and principal from each school represented in the meet, the schools in Marion county sharing. Serving hours will be from 10:30 to 12:30.

- 3. Only qualifying contestants in uniform, one coach, one assistant coach and the principal from each school will be entertained. Mileage in all cases shall be ascertained from the Indiana State Road Map.
- 4. The Board of Control has designated Commissioner Phil N. Eskew, as Manager, Assistant Commissioners Herman F. Keller and Ward E. Brown as Assistant Managers, with Athletic Director, Jack Bradford, Technical High School, in charge of the track.

Inner Ground—No person except officials shall be allowed on the track. Authorized persons shall wear a badge. Competitors not engaged in the events actually taking place shall not be allowed inside or upon the track.

All photographers and members of the press must wear badges. These must be obtained from the IHSAA Office in advance.

Official Rules—The 220 yard dash will be around the curve. The 440 yard run will be around two curves. Only spikes of 1/4 inches will be permitted. Hex-head spikes will not be allowed. No one is to bring starting blocks. Technical High School will furnish all starting blocks. Also see Official Rules, section for Regionals.

Order of Events-(See Sectional for this item.)

High Jump—Will begin at 12:00 noon and continue until completed. The bar will be placed at 5 feet 8 inches for warm-up. Competition will begin at 5 feet 10 inches and the bar raised 2 inches and 1 inch thereafter.

Pole Vault—Will begin at 12:00 noon and continue until completed. Warm-ups will start at 12 feet. Competition will start at 12 feet 6 inches and the bar will be raised 3 inches at a time thereafter. If weather conditions warrant the referee-starter may designate a lower beginning height.

Shot Put-Will begin at 12:00 Noon and continue until completed.

Long Jump—Will begin at 12:00 Noon and continue until completed. A 24 inch take-off board will be used in the sectional, regional and state meets.

Scoring—Winning first place in any event in the State Meet counts six points; second place, four points; third place, three points; fourth place, two points and fifth place, one point. Points in the relays will be counted in determining the winning team, the points for each place in each relay to be 10-8-6-4-2. In case of a tie in a track event, the points shall be divided and the places awarded by lot. Ties in the high jump and pole vault shall be decided by awarding the position to the contestant with the lowest number of trials for the tied height. If the tie is still not broken, the fewest total misses in the entire competition is the determining factor. Existing ties at this stage shall be decided by the method outlined in Rule 5, Section 2, I (a, b, c, d and e), pages 21 and 22, of the 1970 Track Rules Book. No misses shall be charged to a competitor for a passed height. In case of a tie in the shot put or

the long jump, position and points are awarded according to Rule 5, Section 2, II (a and b), "determined by distance," page 22 of the 1970 Track Rules Book.

Ties for all places in the high jump or pole vault must be broken by applying Rule 5-2-I. This is for determining the proper awarding of medals. Points are divided equally for all places except first.

Prizes—The IHSAA will award the winning school a trophy; the winners of first, second, third, fourth and fifth places in each event will receive medals of gold, silver or bronze. No other prizes shall be given.

Privileges—All qualifying contestants in uniform, one coach, one assistant coach and principal for each team are to be admitted free to the meet.

Admission Fee—The admission fee to the meet shall be one dollar and twenty-five cents (\$1.25).

Management—The management, protests and privileges will be governed according to the regulations pertaining to the Sectional Meets.






GARY ROOSEVELT HIGH SCHOOL 1970 State Track and Field Champions



Carmel High School captured the thirty-fourth annual Indiana High School Athletic Association state golf championship by squeezing out a one-stroke victory over North Central (Indianapolis) the defending state champion. It was the first state golf championship for Carmel.

For the first time thirty-six holes were played instead of eighteen as in the past. The state meet was also moved to the beautiful Old

Oakland Golf Club course located at Oaklandon.

Carmel's four man-team compiled a total of 611 strokes to 612 for North Central. The team members were John O'Neal with a card of 72-71-143, Pete Holm with 71-74-145, Russ Craig with 78-75-155 and Don Currise with 86-82-168.

Gary Lew Wallace High School finished third with 620 strokes. In fourth place was Warsaw High School with 623 strokes and New

Albany High School finished fifth with 627.

Gary Gant of North Central (Indianapolis) romped off with low medalist honors with sparkling rounds of 70-69-139. A long hitting young man from New Albany High School, Frank Zoeller, opened with a 75 in the morning and closed out with a blistering 67 in the afternoon for a total of 142, and runner-up low medalist honors. Zoeller's 67 was the best 18-hole stint of the day. In third place was John O'Neal of Carmel with 72-71-143.

Craig Light of Warsaw aced the 159 yard, No. 8 hole, sending a six-iron shot into the cup. This was the first hole-in-one in the

state finals in its entire history. The first three teams and the first three low medalists from each

of the sixteen sectionals advanced to four regionals.

The same qualifiers from each regional advanced to the state meet. Twelve complete teams and three individual low medalists qualified for the state meet. A total of 301 schools entered the sixteen sectionals. This represented an increase of eight high schools over the previous year.



# Baseball

The fourth annual baseball tournament series sponsored by the Indiana High School Athletic Association attracted 425 of its member teams. This represented over 95% of the entire membership.

Bloomington, Jasper, Madison Heights (Anderson) and South Bend hosted semi-state tournaments. North Central (Indianapolis) defeated New Castle 3-2 at Bloomington. At Jasper Evansville Memorial won over New Albany 2-1. The defending state champion, Lafayette Jefferson was defeated by Kokomo Haworth 3-2 at Madison Heights, and South Bend Clay won 1-0 over Gary Wirt at South Bend.

The final three games were played at Bush Stadium in Indianapolis in beautiful weather. This was the first appearance of all four teams in the state finals.

In a real first game thriller, Evansville Memorial won from Kokomo Haworth by a 1-0 score. Len Jacobs of Memorial pitched a two-hit game, but Brad Barber of Haworth pitched 5 2/3 innings before allowing Memorial their only safety. Both pitchers were in excellent form.

The South Bend Clay-North Central game was another thriller which ended in the first extra inning. With the score 1-1 going into the last half of the eighth inning, Clay scored a run by way of a walk with the bases loaded. This forced in the winning run for a 2-1 victory for South Bend Clay.

The final game was equally as thrilling as the first two games. With the score tied 2-2 in the seventh inning, Clay's Kent Juday drove a sharp grounder at the Evansville Memorial shortstop. He bobbled the ball and Bob Schell came in with the winning run, and the state championship in Clay's possession. The final score was South Bend Clay 3-2 over Evansville Memorail.

As evidence of the keen competition in baseball this year, the last game of each semi-state, and the final three games in the state tournament were all decided by one run with the highest score being 3-2. This meant that the last seven games of the tourney series were decided by a margin of one run.

The Board of Control unanimously selected Dave Highmark of North Central High School the recipient of the fourth L. V. Phillips Award. The recipient of this award must excel in scholarship, mental attitude, school citizenship, as well as athletic ability in baseball.

# STATE BASEBALL TOURNAMENT SERIES

-Reprinted from May, 1970 Bulletin

#### THE FOURTH ANNUAL

The Board of Control has completed the details for the State Championship Baseball Tournament and announces the plan in full; with the understanding that the Board of Control reserves the right to readjust the plan and arrangements for any and all tournaments if conditions arise making changes advisable or cancellations necessary.

The following bases were used in selecting sectional, regional and semistate centers: (1) Location—geographical with reference to schools desiring to participate; (2) Transportation accommodations; (3) General Conditions—attitude of local authorities, fields, entertaining facilities, etc.; (4) Invitation.

# GENERAL INFORMATION

- 1. BALL—The Board of Control has selected the MacGregor #97C ball as the official ball for the 1970 tournament series. Practice balls must be furnished by competing schools.
- 2. LENGTH OF GAME—All Tournament games are scheduled for seven innings, unless shortened by weather conditions or the game ends in a tie, in which case the game will continue until one team is the winner.

A game shall also end when, if after five innings, a team is 10 or more runs behind and has completed its turn at bat. (Exception—the final state championship game).

- 3. OFFICIAL RULES—The Baseball Rules 1970 National Alliance Edition, published by the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations will be the Official Rules in all games and tournaments.
- 4. SCHOOLS ELIGIBLE—All members in good standing in the IHSAA are eligible to enter teams in the series of tournaments. Each eligible school may enter a team in the tournament series even though its second semester may end before or during the tournaments.

However, only those students who were eligible at the close of school may be used on the tournament team. Seniors who may have graduated at the close of the second semester may participate in the tournament provided they meet all other eligibility requirements.

- 5. SINGLE ELIMINATION—All phases of the IHSAA Tournament are based on the single elimination plan.
- 6. MEN IN UNIFORM—In each of the tournaments, no school shall have more than eighteen players, the team coach (or coaches) and two managers (one of whom must be the bat boy). The eighteen

players shall be the ones certified for the tournament. Trainers not in uniform may be permitted on the bench.

The only representatives of a school allowed on the bench are the players, coaches, managers, and a trainer.

- 7. COACHER'S BOXES—The Coacher's Boxes may be occupied by two coaches, one coach and one member of the team or two members of the team and all must be in uniform.
- 8. PITCHING REGULATION—A pitcher may not pitch in more than ten (10) innings in any three consecutive calendar days. This period begins when he officially enters the game as a pitcher.
- 9. DECISIONS OF UMPIRES FINAL—The decisions of the umpires are final and protests arising from decisions of the umpires or any inadvertent misinterpretation of the rules will not be considered by the IHSAA.
- 10. HEADPROTECTOR REQUIRED—Each batter and runner in all IHSAA games and tournaments are required to wear a head protector. "LINERTYPE" HEAD PROTECTORS WILL NOT BE PERMITTED.
- 11. PRE-GAME PRACTICE—Each team will be allowed 15 minutes practice before each game to be used as the coach sees fit. Prior to the championship game, 20 minutes will be allowed each team for batting practice and 10 minutes for fielding, weather permitting.
- 12. HOME TEAM—Prior to each tournament game, home team privilages shall be determined by the toss of a coin. The home team shall occupy the third base bench.

#### CONDUCT OF COACHES AND PLAYERS:

- a. No coach, player or other person officially connected with the team shall be permitted to smoke on the bench or playing field either during practice or while a game is in progress.
- b. No coach or other school official shall, during the progress of a game, be allowed on the field of play except by permission of the game officials.
- c. Except for those coaches or eligible players who may be serving as coaches at first or third base and players legally in the "next batter" boxes, all other coaches, managers, substitutes and players awaiting their turn at bat shall remain on the players' bench. Umpires will be instructed to enforce this rule to the limit.
- d. The captain and the head coach shall be the official spokesmen and the sole representatives of their team in all communications with the officials.
- e. Abusive remarks to game officials by coaches or players shall be regarded as unsportsmanlike conduct. The offender or offenders shall be disqualified and removed from the bench and playing field.

14. INTERRUPTED GAMES—Interrupted tourney games shall start at the point of interruption until it is an official game in accordance with Rule 4, Section 2, Article 4 (a) & (b) of the Official Rules.

Example: At the end of the second inning, game is interrupted by rain. When play is resumed either on that day or a following day the same line-ups shall be used and the game will proceed from the point of interruption. Runs, count on batter, baserunners, etc. shall be the same when game is resumed.

15. COACHES CONFERENCES—Each team may be granted not more than three charged conferences during a game, without penalty, to permit a coach or his representative to confer with a defensive player or players. PENALTY—For any charged conference in excess of three, the pitcher must be removed as pitcher for the duration of game.

Each team when on offense may be granted not more than one charged conference per inning to permit the coach or any of that team's personnel to confer with base runners and/or the batter. The umpire shall deny any subsequent offensive team requests for charged conferences.

Time granted for an obviously incapacitated player shall not constitute a charged time out.

- 16. FIELD MARKINGS—The playing field shall be marked inaccordance with Rule 1, Section 2, Article 1. The foul lines should be extended a minimum of 250 feet from home base.
- 17. UMPIRES—Three umpires will be assigned by the IHSAA to all sectional and regional tournaments. Four umpires will be assigned to all semi-states and the state tournament.
- 18. PLAYING SCHEDULES—All pairings for all tournaments will be made by a chance drawing by the Board of Control on May 15, 1970. Games will be played according to the way they are drawn on the schedule.
- 19. The Re-entry Rule 3-1-3 will NOT be used in any of the State Sponsored Baseball Tournaments. A Withdrawn Player shall not reenter the game.

# SECTIONAL TOURNAMENTS

May 25-30, 1970

Many schools have been assigned by counties but there are a number of exceptions. Some changes were made to equalize the number of participating teams resulting in better balanced schedules or the use of less school time. The plan is to have no fewer than 6 teams and no more than 8 teams in each tournament, and the tentative assignment of all schools is given in the list which follows. The winners will constitute the teams in the Regional Tournaments according to assignment. ENTRY BLANKS ARE NECESSARY. AN ENTRY BLANK IS ENCLOSED.

RAINED OUT GAMES—If a game in any tournament must be postponed because of rain or wet grounds; or if a game is called by the umpire because of rain, darkness, or other reasons the game must be re-scheduled for the following day and resumed at the point of interruption. If the postponed or called game is the first opening round game, it should take precedence. This procedure shall be continued if there are two or more consecutive days when it is necessary to postpone or call any game or games. See page 4 of May, 1970 Bulletin for interrupted games.

NOTE: Center Principals may request approval from IHSAA to reschedule certain games in case of emergencies, e.g., conflicts with graduation exercises, availability of facilities. All games played on Memorial Day must be by mutual agreement of the participating schools.

OPEN CONTEST—These tournaments are open to all members of the Association, except to schools holding preparatory, junior or associate memberships.

ENTERTAINMENT—If possible, the Center Principal shall provide adequate dressing rooms, lockers and shower facilities for all teams.

EXPENSES—There will be no entry fee. Traveling expenses must be paid by the competing schools.

ELIGIBILITY—The eligibility of players must be certified by the principal of the school sending the team. Certification must be made on the Official Entry Blank furnished by the Commissioner and all data must be given as indicated. An Entry Blank marked "Your Duplicate" is enclosed for your convenience. Be sure to send only the "Official Entry Blank" to the IHSAA. All entries must be in the IHSAA Office before 4:00 p.m. Wednesday, May 13. Do not mail entry blanks before May 1. All students must be eligible when they

participate as well as when they are certified. It is advisable to mail the entry blanks early, as changes can be made by telephone, telegram or letter any time up to 4:00 p.m. Wednesday, May 13. Registered letters are not recommended, as they are a slow form of delivery. Regular or special delivery mailing is the most satisfactory. A postal card from this office will acknowledge receipt and correctness of your entry. The Board of Control has ruled that late entry blanks will not be accepted.

AWARDS—The IHSAA will provide a trophy for the winning school in each sectional. No other prizes shall be given.

ADMISSION FEE—The admission fee in all sectional tournaments shall be fifty cents (50¢) per session.

BALLS—The IHSAA will furnish three baseballs for each game. Great effort should be made to conserve balls at all times.

PRIVILEGES—All actual contestants in uniform, one coach, one assistant coach, two managers, one trainer, and principal for each team are to be admitted free.

REPORTING GAME WINNERS—It is the responsibility of the Center Principal to turn in a complete summary of the games played on the official form to the IHSAA Office immediately at the conclusion of the tournament.

PROGRAMS—Programs provided by the Center Principal shall be the only program distributed or sold at the tournament and no solicitation of advertisements shall be made.

REGIONAL TOURNAMENT QUALIFICATIONS — The winning team of each sectional tournament shall advance to the Regional Tournament.

WARNINGS—Entry blanks must be in the IHSAA Office on or before 4:00 p.m. Wednesday, May 13, and they cannot be accepted afterwards. Special privileges will be granted to no one. Send all entry blanks to the IHSAA.

## L. V. PHILLIPS AWARD


