A MESSAGE TO THE INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

Since the founding and organization of the Indiana High School Athletic Association in 1903 by a group of High School Principals, this association has earned a reputation for being firm but fair in the supervision and administration of the high school athletic programs of this great state.

Under the astute guidance of past commissioners, our present professional staff and the many members of Athletic Council and Board of Control, both past and present, this association has moved steadily forward to promote better athletic programs for the youth of Indiana. These people have given unselfishly of their time and talents to make the I.H.S.A.A. what it is today.

Today the I.H.S.A.A. is being challenged on many fronts. This challenge is not peculiar to the I.H.S.A.A. alone, but includes most other areas of authority where decisions must be made and some do not like the answer they receive.

It is incumbent on all of us to do all in our power to support the I.H.S.A.A. and to keep the control of high school athletics in the hands of people who understand it best, educators. Again, of course, we must recognize that not everyone is in agreement with everything that is done but we must keep everything in proper perspective, recognizing that without control of the high school athletic program by school oriented individuals, athletic programs will degenerate into utter chaos.

Some of these are: Extensive use of advisory committees made up of coaches, principals and athletic directors; increase in number and improvement of State Championship Series, including, but not limited to, baseball and football; recognition of need for girls athletic programs; permitting high school coaches to coach "All Star" teams; bringing academic requirements more into line with todays curricula. These, along with many others, are designed to keep the I.H.S.A.A. in a position to meet the needs of today and anticipate those of tomorrow.

We in the school-community of Indiana have expected and received the unqualified support of the I.H.S.A.A. in our endeavor to provide quality athletic programs. For us to give the I.H.S.A.A. anything less would be a gross dereliction of duty on our part.

With this in mind I feel sure that we can move ahead with what is already an outstanding high school athletic program to make it the best in the nation.

CONSTITUTION OF INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

Preamble

The principals of the secondary schools of Indiana recognizing the need for a voluntary association of schools to plan, organize and regulate a wholesome, amateur program of interschool athletic competition in which school members of such association would participate, hereby consent and agree to establish the following as the Constitution of the Indiana High School Athletic Association.

Article 1 - Name

The name of this association shall be the "Indiana High School Athletic Association." (The abbreviation of this name is understood to be "IHSAA.")

Article II - Purpose

The purpose of this Association shall be to encourage, regulate and give direction to wholesome amateur interschool athletic competition between the schools who are members of the Association. All such interschool athletic competition coming under regulation by this Association shall be subservient to and complementary to the academic or curricular functions of the member schools which are their primary purposes. To assure that the program of interschool athletic competition remains steadfast to the principles of wholesome amateur athletics and subservient to its primary academic or curricular functions of education of the member schools, the Association shall cooperate with agencies vitally concerned with the health and educational welfare of secondary school students; furnish protection against exploitation of member schools or their students; determine qualifications of individual contestants, coaches and officials; and provide written communications to establish standards for eligibility, competition and sportsmanship.

Article III - Membership

Section 1.

a. All Memberships Are Voluntary. Any secondary school in the state may become a member of this Association by meeting the requirements, by subscribing to these rules and regulations, and by paying the annual dues of one dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50) to the Commissioner on or before September 15 of each year. Memberships expire on September 15 of each year unless the annual dues are paid.

- b. Any member that is at any time unable to voluntarily comply with any and all rules and regulations and final decisions of the Association, its officers or representatives, by virtue of any order or injunction issued by any court without a hearing, is automatically suspended from membership for the duration of such disability.
- c. If at any time the Association, its officers or representatives are prohibited or restrained from carrying out any rule, regulation, decision or action of or for said Association in relation to any member by order or injunction issued by any court or action of any intervening authority without a hearing, such member, in relation to which the Association, its officers or representatives, are so prohibited or restrained is automatically suspended from membership for the duration of such prohibition. When a membership has been suspended the school affected shall be considered as not belonging to the Association. All game and officials' contracts shall be null and void as far as this Association is concerned. The principal of the affected school must make a written request for reinstatement. Approval requires Board action.
- d. Any suspension from membership under Section 1b or 1c shall continue until such time as written evidence is received by the Association showing that:
 - The suspended school and the Association, its officers and representatives, are all again free and able to exercise their own free will and volition without restraint or direction from any authority, or
 - 2. The case is dismissed after a hearing, or
 - 3. After a hearing the court orders otherwise.

Section 2.

Full membership in this Association shall be open to all public, private, parochial, and institutional high schools of the state offering and maintaining three or four years of high school work, provided they meet the requirements of the association and also subscribe to its rules and regulations. A school to be eligible for membership in the IHSAA must be accredited by the State Department of Public Instruction.

Section 3.

Preparatory membership may be extended to any school accredited by the State Department of Public Instruction offering and maintaining school work on the ninth and tenth or tenth grade level with the understanding that such preparatory membership shall extend the privilege of participating in single athletic games, contests, tourneys and meets with other preparatory members. Teams from preparatory members composed of ninth and/or tenth grade students may compete against teams composed of ninth and/or tenth grade students from full members and junior members composed of ninth grade students in single games, contests, tourneys and meets without special restrictions as to the number of teams entered, trial runs, or geographical location within the state.

Such schools are not eligible to enter teams in state tourneys or meets. It must be clearly understood that a preparatory membership is a membership in the Association that requires the principal to subscribe to all of the rules and regulations of the Association. It is further understood preparatory membership is available only to schools that will become eligible for full membership within a two year period. At the end of the two year period the preparatory membership will be reviewed by the Board.

They may receive tickets for the state final championship basketball tourney and other state final meets at the discretion of the Board.

Students may participate on the following bases:

- a. A student must meet the eligibility rules of the Association in all respects.
- b. Students in the ninth and/or tenth grade in a school having preparatory membership may compete against only ninth and/or tenth grade students from other member schools.
- c. Schools having preparatory memberships in the Association may not use students below the ninth grade on their high school athletic teams in interscholastic games.
- d. Schools having preparatory memberships may not compete with schools who do not hold membership in the Association, if such schools are eligible for membership.
- e. The principal in a school holding membership is responsible to the Association for the conduct of athletics in that school.

Note: Schools holding preparatory memberships are subject to all rules and regulations of the Association with the modifications given above.

Section 4.

Junior membership may be extended to any school accredited by the State Department of Public Instruction offering the ninth grade, but not eligible for full, preparatory or associate membership. Junior membership shall extend the privilege of participating in single athletic games, contests, tourneys and meets with other junior members. Junior membership also shall permit teams from junior members composed of ninth grade students to compete against teams composed of ninth and/or tenth grade students from full, preparatory and associate members in single games, contests, tourneys and meets without special restrictions as to the number of teams entered, trial runs or geographical location within the state. Schools holding junior memberships are not eligible to enter teams in state tourneys or meets. It must be clearly understood that a junior membership is a membership in the Association that requires the principal to subscribe to all of the rules and regulations of the Association. Junior members may share in the distribution of tickets to the state final championship basketball tourney and other state final championship meets on a limited basis as determined by the Board.

Section 5.

Associate membership may be extended to any high school accredited by the State Department of Public Instruction and operating as a boarding school, with the understanding that:

- a. Associate membership shall extend the privilege of participating in single athletic games and contests and invitational tourneys and meets, but not in any tourneys or meets conducted for the purpose of determining an official state championship in the Association.
- b. Associate members are bound by all rules and regulations of the Association with the exception that a student who changes schools without a corresponding change of residence on the part of his parents is eligible as to residence immediately, provided there is no undue influence involved in any way.
- c. Associate members are not privileged to share in the distribution of tickets to championship tourneys and meets or in the distribution of surplus funds to member schools.

Section 6.

Each member school shall have one vote.

Section 7.

The Board shall be judge on all memberships.

Article IV — Administration and Legislation

Section 1. Association Districts

- a. For the purposes of election and representation only, there shall be five districts, which may, from time to time, be modified by the authority of the Council.
- b. The state shall be districted by counties into the following districts:

District 1—Benton, Carroll, Cass, Fulton, Jasper, Lake, LaPorte, Marshall, Newton, Porter, Pulaski, Starke, St. Joseph, Tippecanoe and White.

District 2—Adams, Allen, Blackford, DeKalb, Elkhart, Grant, Howard, Huntington, Kosciusko, LaGrange, Miami, Noble, Steuben, Wabash, Wells and Whitley.

District 3—Boone, Clay, Clinton, Fountain, Hamilton, Hendricks, Marion, Montgomery, Morgan, Owen, Parke, Putnam, Tipton, Vigo, Vermillion and Warren.

District 4—Bartholomew, Dearborn, Decatur, Delaware, Fayette, Franklin, Hancock, Henry, Jay, Jefferson, Jennings, Johnson, Madison, Ohio, Randolph, Ripley, Rush, Shelby, Switzerland, Union and Wayne.

District 5-Brown, Clark, Crawford, Daviess, Dubois, Floyd, Gibson, Greene, Harrison, Jackson, Knox, Lawrence, Martin,

Monroe, Orange, Perry, Pike, Posey, Scott, Spencer, Sullivan, Vanderburg, Warrick and Washington.

Section 2. Classes

- a. For the purposes of election and representation only there shall be five classes of high schools in each Association district. These classes may be modified by authority of the Council.
 - Class I-Schools having enrollments of 1-250
 - Class II-Schools having enrollments of 251-450
 - Class III-Schools having enrollments of 451-750
 - Class IV-Schools having enrollments of 751-1300
 - Class V-Schools having enrollments of 1301-and above
- b. The determination of the class of any high school shall be based on the enrollment, in grades nine through twelve, as certified in the latest September Annual Report required by the Division of Inspection of the State Department of Public Instruction.

Section 3. Athletic Council

- The twenty-five district-class units shall at all times be entitled to representation in the Council.
- b. All elective terms of Council members shall be for five years, beginning on July 1 following election, or for the remainder of an unexpired term in case of a vacancy.
- c. Candidate eligibility shall be limited to (1) any administrator or full time teacher from a member school in good standing or (2) any superintendent who has no more than one member high school under his supervision.

To qualify as a nominee (1) such person shall be from the the class of school from which the selection is to be made in that particular year, (2) his name must be submitted on an official nominating petition requested in writing from the Commissioner. This must be signed by five member school principals in his Association district, at least two of whom shall be in his class of school, (3) he must file completed petition with the Commissioner no later than November 15 prior to the election.

The Commissioner shall send printed ballots listing all such names to all principals of member schools in good standing in that district, who constitute the electorate. The person receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected by the Board, who shall constitute the canvassing board. In case of a tie for the winner, the vote shall be taken again, printed ballots listing only the names of those tied to be sent out by the Commissioner with a return date designated by the Board.

d. Removal from an Association district, withdrawal from the teaching profession, resignation, suspension of his school, or a lapse in membership of his school in the Association shall constitute a vacancy to be filled in the manner hearinafter provided. A person elected to represent a certain class member school, who changes to a school of a different class or whose school changes from class to class due to a decrease or increase in enrollment, shall continue to serve out his term as long as he remains in his original district.

- e. Vacancies in the Council may be filled by the Council, the appointees to serve until the successors chosen at the next annual election take office. Such persons must be from the same district and class member school as the member originally chosen.
- f. The Council shall choose a Board of five members from the membership of the Council. Their term of office shall be from July 1 to June 30 following their selection. All five classes of member schools shall be represented on the Board except as hereinafter stated for members who change their school class after being elected. Expiration of membership on the Council shall automatically terminate membership on the Board. Temporary vacancies on the Board may be filled by the Board from the membership of the Council, but only until the next meeting of the Council, when the Council shall itself choose the successors.
- g. No member of the Council shall be eligible for a longer term on the Council than the one he is serving until the expiration of his term.
- h. All elections shall take place each year between December 1 and December 10, all votes being mailed to the Commissioner on ballots prepared by him. Such ballots shall be open for inspection by the candidate or the principal of any member school.
- i. There shall be held an Annual Meeting for the explanation and interpretation of rules and regulations, for inspirational addressed by recognized leaders, for committee reports and such other business as may come before the meeting. The Board shall set the date of the Annual Meeting and may call a special meeting of the Council when considered advisable.
- j. Each year at the time of the State Track Meet the Council shall meet to reorganize for the ensuing year. At this meeting there shall be elected: (1) A Council President and Vice President from those Council members having only two remaining years of their term and (2) five members of the Board to succeed the retiring Board members. The new Board members shall choose their own President.

The Council shall also meet at the time of the annual meeting of the Association.

At these meetings proposals submitted by member school principals, the Commissioner, or members of the Council will be acted upon and other business may be transacted.

- k. All newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their office on the first day of July next following their election.
- The President and Vice President of the Council shall attend meetings of the Board and shall not have voting privileges.
- m. The Commissioner shall serve as Secretary of the Council.
- n. All legitimate expenses of the Council shall be paid out of the Association funds.
- o. Details in connection with the conduct of business of the Council shall be determined by the Council.
- p. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum.
- q. It shall be the duty of the Council to establish the rules and by-laws of the Association.
- r. All Council reports and committee recommendations are to be submitted in writing and in the hands of all Council members at least one week prior to the meeting at which it is to be acted upon.

Section 4. Board of Control

The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties:

- a. It shall have general control over all athletic contests between and among the members of this Association.
- b. It shall have exclusive control of the annual interschool tourneys and meets sponsored by the Association.
- c. It shall determine penalties and forfeitures for violations of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Association.
- d. It shall give interpretations of the rules and by-laws of the Association.
- e. When charges are made in writing by a member of the Association against another member for violation of the Constitution and By-Laws, the Board, after giving due notice of the time and place for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges and if they are found to be true may assess such penalty as may be provided under the By-Laws.
- f. The Board shall decide all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants to meets and tourneys.
- g. When any matter comes before the Board for decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the Board is a representative, the remaining members of the Board shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter.
- h. The Board shall have the power to initiate and make investigations regarding interschool activities participated in by members of this Association and to make and enforce these regulations deemed necessary to make effective the spirit, purpose and wording of the provisions of the

Constitution and By-Laws of the Association. The Board shall have the power to make and enforce temporary regulations deemed necessary to handle emergencies and special conditions that may arise in the regulation of the interschool athletic activities participated in by members of this Association.

In the enforcement of the provisions of this section or any other section or subsection, the Board shall have the power to assess any penalty as may be provided under the By-Laws.

- The Board shall execute the rules governing the Association in the spirit as well as the letter in which they are written.
- j. The Board shall employ a Commissioner to serve for a period not to exceed five years on any one contract beginning on the first day of July following his employment at a salary to be determined by the Board. He shall receive as compensation such sum and such allowance for expenses and clerical help as the Board may approve. All contractual agreements between said Commissioner and Board shall be in written form.
- k. The Board may employ one or more Assistant Commissioners, a Director of Girls' Athletics, such personnel to serve for a period of not to exceed five years on one contract beginning on the first day of July following employment at a salary to be determined by the Board. Said personnel shall receive as compensation such sums and such allowances for expenses and clerical help as the Board may approve. All contractual agreements between said personnel and Board shall be in written form.
- Vacancies in the office of Commissioner, Assistant Commissioner/s or Director of Girls' Athletics may be filed in a manner to be determined by the Board.
- m. The Board shall determine and set out the powers and duties of the Commissioner, Assistant Commissioner/s and Director of Girls' Athletics with the idea of giving the office of Commissioner the powers and duties of a Commissioner of Athletics, whose opinions and actions will be subject to review by the Board upon appeal.
- n. Three members of the Board shall constitute a quorum at any meeting.
- o. The Board shall have the duty, right and authority to refuse sanction to games, meets, tourneys and athletic contests in which member schools are connected if these games, meets, tourneys and athletic contests seem, upon investigation, to be in conflict with the spirit, purpose, ideals, standards, policies or best interests of the Association in their inception, arrangements, promotion or management.
- p. The Board may, when an emergency arises, make a temporary regulation of the Association. Such regulation shall be in force until the next meeting of the Council, at which time it will be subject to the disposition of this body.
- q. Expenditures in excess of the budget shall be subject to the approval of the Board.

- r. The Board may establish a pension retirement plan for regular employees of the Association.
- s. The Board shall provide for the annual audit of the books of the Association and for the proper bonding of the Commissioners and office personnel.
- t. The Board may make any adjustments it deems necessary as they pertain to the State School for the Blind when participating against other blind schools in the Blind School Conference.
- u. The Council authorizes the Board to employ legal assistance when deemed necessary.

Section 5. Commissioner

- a. The Commissioner shall file with the President of the Board on or before June 30 of each year, an estimate of the expenses of the Association for the ensuing year. Such budget to be approved by the Board and become effective on July 1 for the fiscal year.
- b. The duties of the Commissioner shall be to:
 - Collect all receipts and funds and report same to the Board at the next regular meeting following their collection.
 - 2. Approve officials as provided in By-Laws.
 - 3. Collect and compile materials for the Annual Handbook.
 - 4. Issue bulletins as directed by the Board.
 - 5. Prepare all official forms approved by the Board for the use of the Association.
 - 6. Recommend to the Board new standards, regulations and policies for the good of the Association.
 - 7. Initiate investigations, conduct hearings, collect information, render decisions and fix penalties based on the evidence, and in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Association. Such decisions shall be subject to review by the Board on appeal by the Principal/s of the member school/s involved.
 - 8. Conduct correspondence for the Association.
 - Furnish all proper information requested by the National Federation of State High School Associations and other State High School Athletic Associations.
 - 10. Maintain contacts and relations between the Association and: State Department of Public Instruction, colleges, universities, high schools, service clubs, teachers' associations, Athletic Directors' Association, officials' associations, press, physical education groups, coaches' groups, junior high schools, city superintendents, county superintendents, fans, American Legion and similar organizations, and principals of member schools.
 - 11. Assist Association committees in their work by furnishing data and information requested by them.

- 12. Make detailed arrangements for all interschool meets, tourneys and events as directed by the Board.
- Check all tourney reports and other financial statements, to reconcile discrepancies, if possible, and report the same to the Board.
- 14. Prepare and present at each regular meeting of the Board a complete report of the activities of his office since the last preceding meeting of the Board.
- 15. Arrange the program and details of the Annual Meeting of the Association. He may secure speakers subject to the approval of the Board and he may delegate speakers for athletic meetings elsewhere when requested to do so by school officials.
- 16. Have charge of the property and records of the Association.
- 17. Attend meetings of the Board and serve as Secretary.
- 18. Include the rules, amendments and regulations of the Council, as they are passed, in the Constitution, Rules and By-Laws of the IHSAA, harmonizing the related sections in the Constitution with the inclusions.
- The Council authorizes the Commissioner to employ legal assistance when deemed necessary.

Section 6. Assistant Commissioner/s

- a. It shall be his or their duties to:
 - (1.) Assist the Commissioner in any and all such duties as the Commissioner may require.
 - (2.) Act in the capacity of Commissioner in the absence of the Commissioner.
 - (3.) Establish and promote such publicity and public relations, as may be required by the Commissioner and Board for the well being and the promotion of the Association.

Section 7. Director of Girls' Athletics

- a. It shall be her duties to:
 - (1.) Assist the Commissioner in any and all such duties as the Commissioner may require.
 - (2.) To guide, direct and publicize girls' athletic activities as may be required by the Commissioner and Board for the well-being of the Association.

Article V - Finances

Section 1.

There shall be the accumulation and establishment of an adequate working balance in the Association treasury, this amount to be established and maintained as a guarantee that existing obligations will be met; that expansions in the program of service may be made if thought desirable; and that any emergencies in the future may be solved.

Section 2.

There shall be a distribution on an equitable basis among the schools in the Association membership (except associates) of the amounts accumulated above the adequate working balance and above the amount legitimately necessary for the running expenses of the Association, these distributions to be made on October 1, 1932, and on October 1 of and for each three-year period thereafter. Special distributions of surplus funds above the budget and required reserve may be ordered by the Board.

Section 3.

There is granted power and authority to the Board to make the financial adjustments in contracts for interschool games, tourneys, meets and athletic contests that are deemed necessary through the years and to administer, execute and control all receipts, expenditures and holding of monies in connection with the Association.

Article VI - Amendments

Section 1.

The Athletic Council may amend the Constitution at any of its meetings by a minimum affirmative vote of two-thirds of its membership.

Section 2.

The Athletic Council may amend the By-Laws by a minimum affirmative vote of a majority of the members present.

Section 3.

Upon written petition signed by twenty (20) high school principals from each of the five IHSAA districts, the amendments shall be subject to a referendum vote of the principals in the membership.

Section 4.

Amendment proposals may be submitted by any member principal, Council member or the Commissioner and shall be considered by the Council.

- Q.1 Does the Commissioner, Assistant Commissioners or Director of Girls' Athletics have a vote in the Board and in the Council?
- A. They are not members of either group and have no vote in any of their deliberations.
- Q.2 How are the funds of the IHSAA invested?
- A. In U. S. Government Securities.
- Q.3 How are these Government Securities protected?
- A. Burglary and Robbery Insurance are carried on the bank vault box and the Commissioners carry Fidelity Bonds.

- Q.4 Who examines the financial books of the IHSAA?
- A. Ernst and Ernst, Public Accountants, the Board of Control and any high school principal so desiring.
- Q.5 How often is an audit made?
- A. Annually by Ernst and Ernst. The same is printed in the annual Handbook of the Association.
- Q.6 Who is eligible for election to the Council?
- A. Any bona fide faculty representative of a member school belonging to the IHSAA.
- Q.7 How are the Board members selected?
- A. By the members of the Council from their own membership.
- Q.8 Do Board members represent districts?
- A. Yes, they represent districts and enrollment classes of high schools.
- Q.9 Do Council members represent districts or classes?
- A. They represent classes and districts.
- Q.10 Is it necessary for a member school to meet and maintain the policies, regulations and standards for the accreditation and classification of schools in Indiana in order to be a member of the IHSAA?
- A. Yes.

BY-LAWS

PART I - BOYS INTERSCHOOL ATHLETICS

RULE 1 - RULE COVERAGE

Section 1.

The Association rules apply to all athletic teams and all contestants enrolled in grades 9, 10, 11 or 12 participating in any Association sponsored contests, tourneys and/or meets—between member schools, with independent or alumni teams, or member school teams from outside the State of Indiana and who are in good standing with their respective State Association.

Section 2.

Mutual agreements to violate the rules of this Association shall result in suspension of all schools involved.

Section 3.

Member schools may maintain any number of teams in the same sport.

- Q.1 When and how may principals submit proposals for the consideration of the Council?
- A. Principals may submit such proposals at any time in writing to the Commissioner who will submit them to the Council for consideration and action.
- Q.2 May the rules of a school be changed or special examinations be given in order to make students eligible?
- A. The IHSAA expects its members to observe not only the letter but the spirit of its rules and regulations. Changing of school rules and special examinations are not looked on with favor.
- Q.3 May two or more member schools combine to form one athletic team?
- A. No, this is not permitted, unless they legally consolidate and become one school.
- Q.4 May a member school support a grade team in the same school system out of its athletic funds?
- A. Yes, so far as the IHSAA is concerned.
- Q.5 Are any special regulations in force pertaining to discharged veterans?
- A. No. By action of the Athletic Council, May 23, 1947, all IHSAA special regulations concerning discharged veterans were discontinued.

- Q.6 Do seniors have any rights and privileges in athletics not granted to other students?
- A. No, in fact, seniors should appreciate the opportunities that have been extended to them for four years and should be very loyal to the rules and regulations of their high school and of the IHSAA in which their high school holds membership.

RULE 2 — CLASSIFICATION OF SCHOOLS

Section 1.

Schools are not classified for competition purposes except for the Football playoff.

RULE 3 — ADMINISTRATIVE RESPONSIBILITY

Authority

Section 1.

The principal of each member school is recognized as the representative of his school and as such is accountable to the Association for the conduct of the athletic program of that school.

Section 2.

The principal has the authority to designate a faculty member employed in his school system to act as manager of the teams representing the school.

Section 3.

The principal of the member school or member school teacher delegated by him in writing shall represent such school at all called meetings of the Association.

Section 4.

The principal or his authorized representative shall accompany his team to all contests.

Section 5.

It is understood that any school corporation may narrow the scope of athletic activities provided it does not violate the rules of the IHSAA.

Section 6.

Principals shall institute adequate crowd control measures at all contests at home and away, and assure that his school's participants and fans conduct themselves in a proper and sportsmanlike manner. Failure to do so shall be considered sufficient reason for disciplinary action by the Board.

Certification of Eligibility

Section 7.

The eligibility of all contestants shall be certified to by the principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statements shall be exchanged by the principals, in writing, prior to the beginning of any contest.

All questionable cases of eligibility referred in writing to the Commissioner for action of the Board must include the following information: rule reference, student name, grade, date of birth, parent or guardian, present and past residence addresses, athletic transfer blank when applicable, transcript, sports participation, encollment and withdrawal dates. All cases which pertain to Unavoidable Change of Residence require, in addition to the above information, a copy of legal documents, if legal action is involved; letters from student's family; letters from present and former principals stating that a change of residence is necessary for the student to have a home; the reason that the student's change of residence is unavoidable and that no undue influence is attached to the case in any way.

Section 8.

When it is discovered that an ineligible student has participated, the member school principal shall take the following action:

- a) Immediately send a written report to the Commissioner listing the name of the student, the cause of ineligibility, dates and scores of contests in which the student participated when ineligible, how the error was made, etc.
- b) Send letter/s of explanation to the opponent principal/s of contest/s in which the student participated when ineligible; forfeiting points and contests and requesting principals to notify the Commissioner as soon as they receive such letter/s.
- c) Consider and so declare the student ineligible in that sport for the remainder of that sport season. See Rule 16-3 if facts were purposely withheld or misrepresented.
- d) Moving to another school district or school does not remove an ineligibility ruling by the preceding school or the Board.
- e) A student who becomes ineligible under the rules of another state cannot remove that ineligibility by transferring to an Indiana high school. Note:—Questions in a case of this kind are to be referred to the Board.

In team contests, the game/s must be forfeited except in completed tournaments. In contests where individual points are awarded, only the points that the ineligible student scored are forfeited.

Parent and Physicians' Certificates

Section 9.

Prior to a student's first practice in preparation for interschool athletic participation, he shall have had 1) a physical examination

by a physician licensed to practice medicine in Indiana and 2) written consent of parent or guardian for such participation.

Evidence of both, included on the Parent and Physician's Certificate, shall be on file in the principal's office prior to the student's first practice. Such certificate may suffice for the entire school year.

Section 10.

Previous to the student's first inter-school participation, the principal shall certify to the Association the names of participants who Parent and Physician's Certificates are on file in his office.

Section 11.

A student properly certified to participate in interschool athletic activities, who is absent from school for five consecutive days or who is physically unable to practice for five consecutive days due to illness or injury, must present to his principal a statement from a physician licensed to practice medicine in Indiana that he is again physically fit to participate in interschool athletics.

* * * *

Q.1 Who is the responsible party in IHSAA athletics?

A. In the execution of its powers and duties, as designated and authorized in the Constitution of the Association, the Board presumes that the principal of each member school voluntarily taking out a membership in the IHSAA has secured the consent of his superiors, the administrative head or heads of the school system, to take out said membership and that he, the principal, is the administrative head, not only in name but in fact, of the interschool athletic activities of the school and of the students in the school.

Wherever and whenever in the IHSAA membership the conditions are found to be such that the school principal is not the administrative head in name and in fact of the interschool athletic activities of the school and of the students in the school, the Board will consider that the member school has broken its agreement with the IHSAA and has in fact removed itself from the membership in the Association.

The Board will assess at its discretion, after a careful investigation has been made, the penalties deemed necessary in all cases, in which it is found that the member school principal is not the administrative head, in name and in fact, of the inter-school athletic activities of the school and of the students in the school. The proof that the member school principal is the administrative head, in name and in fact, of the interschool athletic activities of the school and of the students in the school shall rest in all cases with the school officials concerned.

- Q.2 Who may manage a member school team?
- A. A member school principal or teacher authorized by him. Student management is not permitted.

- Q.3 Is a Parent and Physician's Certificate required of a student each school year prior to his first practice for any interschool athletic contest?
- A. Yes, this one certificate will satisfy the requirement of the rule for the school year in all interschool athletic contests except a student who is absent from school or who is physically unable to practice for five consecutive days due to illness or injury must present to his principal a statement from a physician licensed to practice medicine in Indiana that he is again physically fit to participate in interschool athletics.
- Q.4 May students, who are ineligible for the first team, play on teams of lower ranking?
- A. No, ineligibility for one team means the same for all teams.
- Q.5 Would a student, declared ineligible by one principal, be ineligible under another principal?
- A. Yes, if the student is ineligible according to the rules of the Association. If the conduct rule applies, a release must be obtained from the former principal.
- 0.6 May an ineligible student practice with the regular team?
- A. Yes, at home in regular practice, but ineligible students should not appear in athletic uniforms at games.

BULE 4 - AGE

Section 1.

Students whose nineteenth birthday occurs before August 15 shall be ineligible for further interschool athletic competition. Those whose nineteenth birthday occurs on or after August 15 are considered eligible until the end of the member school's sport season.

* * * *

- Q.1 What is meant by "end of member school's sport season"?
- A. The baseball season may extend beyond the end of the school year. A student whose 19th birthday occurs on or after August 15 is eligible for the entire baseball season of his school.
- Q.2 What is considered evidence of age?
- A. One or all, if there is doubt, of the following documents duly authenticated and considered in the order named:
 - (a) Birth certificate, properly recorded at or near time of birth.
 - (b) Baptismal certificate.
 - (c) Documentary evidence such as family record of birth in Bible, certificate of arrival in the United States, a passport or a life insurance policy of at least a few years standing.
 - (d) Grade and high school records.

- (e) Written and signed statements by superintendent of schools, public health physician, attending physician, parent or guardian.
- (f) Other evidence.
- Q.3 How may a birth certificate be secured from the Indiana State records?
- A. By writing to Vital Records, Board of Health, 1330 W. Michigan Street, Indianapolis, giving complete information in your first letter.
- Q.4 If doubt exists regarding the age of a student should the student be permitted to participate in games pending removal of doubt?
- A. No, the doubt must be removed prior to participation.
- Q.5 What should be done in cases of doubt as to age?
- A. Submit all evidence to the Board after a complete investigation as outlined in Q1, Q2, Q3 above has been made. If a certificate or document cannot be secured, a signed statement to this effect should be submitted by the proper officials.
- Q.6 If, after all available data regarding the age of a student are submitted to the Board, it cannot be known definitely about the date of birth of a student, what step is taken?
- A. The Board will establish a date for athletic eligibility purposes on the data submitted subject to change should convincing evidence to the contrary be found later.

RULE 5 - AMATEURISM

Section 1.

All contestants in Association sponsored contests must be amateurs.

Section 2.

Professionalism is defined in the IHSAA as accepting remuneration, directly or indirectly, for playing on athletic teams, for officiating in athletic games or for managing athletic teams; or playing, officiating or managing under assumed names. Any member school student who directly or indirectly signs a professional contract loses his amateur standing and immediately becomes ineligible for all interschool high school sports.

Section 3.

A member school student shall be considered as violating his amateur standing if he participates in athletic activities, schools, tryouts, practices and games held or sponsored by professional athletic organizations, clubs, or their representatives during the season of a sport or between the seasons of a sport. This rule applies to all sports except baseball and golf during the summer vacation.

Section 4.

Member school students must not play under assumed names, nor accept remuneration directly or indirectly for their playing.

Section 5.

Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted by a student if such are accepted in service rather than money or in some other material form. See Rule 6, Section 7 for trips to colleges.

Section 6.

A member school student shall not be considered as violating his amateur standing if he participates, during the summer vacation, in baseball schools and clinics sponsored by professional major and minor league baseball clubs.

Note—Any employee or school official of a member school who acts as an agent or encourages any negotiations between a high school student and representatives of organized baseball prior to the student's graduation, is violating the Agreement between the National Federation and Organized Baseball. Such action on the part of any employee or school official may cause his school to be suspended from the IHSAA for a period of time to be determined by the Board.

Any evidence that a representative of Organized Baseball is attempting to or has signed a student prior to graduation should be reported to the IHSAA at once. This is a violation of the Agreement between the National Federation and Organized Baseball, and the penalty for such action is under the jurisdiction of Organized Baseball.

Section 7.

A member school student, who has violated his amateur standing according to the rules and by-laws of the Association may apply to the Board for reinstatement as an amateur in the association one calendar year after the date he was declared ineligible on account of the violation, provided he has been in school throughout the year.

The application shall be signed by the student and his school principal, and shall certify that one calendar year has elapsed since the student was declared ineligible and that the student has not violated amateur rules during that calendar year.

- Q.1 What constitutes professionalism in the IHSAA?
- A. Accepting remuneration, directly or indirectly, for playing on athletic teams, officiating in athletic games or managing athletic teams, or playing, officiating or managing under assumed names. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted, if accepted in service and not in any other way. (See Rule 5)

- Q.2 If a student violates his amateur standing in one sport recognized by IHSAA does he become ineligible for all sports?
- A. Yes, a professional in one sport is ineligible for all sports.
- Q.3 Should a reasonably definite line of demarcation be drawn between professional athletic activities and high school athletic activities?
- A. Yes, there seems to be no justifiable reason for a high school student to participate in professional athletics and also in high school athletics.
- Q.4 Should amateurism be defined by the IHSAA for its specific purposes or should the definitions of other organizations be accepted in the Association?
- A. Amateurism should be defined by the IHSAA for IHSAA purposes. There is no definition of amateurism acceptable to all organizations.
- Q.5 Are member school students permitted to play on teams that split the gate receipts among the players including the high school students?
- A. No, this would be considered professionalism.
- Q.6 Does a student who receives money for his services as a lifeguard, caddie, or summer recreation supervisor, jeopardize his eligibility status in high school?
- A. No, provided he merely receives reasonable and legitimate wages for services actually rendered.
- Q.7 May a student, who has violated his amateur standing be reinstated?
- A. Yes, a member school student, who has violated his amateur standing according to the rules and regulations of the IHSAA may apply to the Board for reinstatement as an amateur in the Association one calendar year after the date he was declared ineligible on account of the violation, provided he has been in school throughout the year.

The application shall be signed by the student and his school principal and shall certify that one calendar year has elapsed since the student was declared ineligible and that the student has not violated amateur rules during that calendar year.

- Q.8 Does a student violate his amateur status when he signs a college enrollment "Letter of Intent"?
- A. No. However, acceptance of other material things might violate his amateur status.

RULE 6 - AWARDS, PRIZES, GIFTS, TRIPS

Section 1.

The giving and receiving of awards and medals shall: (a) be kept within reasonable bounds; (b) have symbolic value only and (c) be

done by and with the consent and under the supervision of the member school principals concerned.

Note—The giving and receiving of awards by and with the consent and under the supervision of the member school principals concerned shall mean that the member school principal in each school shall have real control and supervision without pressure of any kind from outside persons or groups of persons.

Section 2.

Only one sweater, jersey, jacket, blanket or similar article may be given in each sport to a high school student for participation in athletics in each high school in which he may be enrolled.

Section 3.

Awards such as a trophy, metal football, metal basketball, metal track shoe or similar article of symbolic value only may be given in addition to the one award permitted in Section 2, provided the cost of the award shall not be more than the cost of the award in Section

Note—The word "symbolic" shall be understood to refer to a symbol, an emblem or a token rather than to an article having intrinsic value. A diamond ring, a gold watch, an automobile or similar awards do not fall under the term "symbolic" even if the award is duly inscribed. An inscription cannot validate such awards in the IHSAA.

Section 4.

Schools belonging to athletic conferences, or participating in tourneys and meets under the rules of the IHSAA, except in the championship series conducted by the IHSAA, may make awards to the winning school or winning participants, provided such awards are made within the bounds of Sections 1, 2 and 3.

Section 5.

Suitable awards may be accepted by schools and/or students from such local organizations as: service clubs, patriotic organizations, civic groups, dads' and mothers' clubs, and the sports department of a newspaper or radio station. No awards should be accepted which, in any way, advertise any firm or individual so far as commercial or business interests are concerned.

Section 6.

The Board shall have the authority to designate, give and control the medals and trophies to be awarded to the schools and to the individuals on state championship teams in any sport with the understanding that these be kept within the bounds of Sections 1, 2 and 3.

Section 7.

Awards, medals, recognitions, gifts, trips and honors shall not be accepted by players or schools from colleges, universities and higher institutions of learning or their alumni. High school athletes should be permitted to complete their high school careers without being

molested by outside sources. The acceptance of travel expenses either directly or indirectly from a college as a prospective student-athlete shall be considered a violation of this rule. (See Rule 16, Section 7 regarding college tryouts).

Section 8.

No member school or student shall accept a championship award unless the championship has been determined by the IHSAA or its member schools. No award of any type shall be accepted from any outside organization designating athletes as having "All-State" or "All-America" status.

Section 9.

Athletic equipment is considered as merchandise. Any student who attempts to evade the rule by "purchasing" a merchandise prize for a nominal or token sum will be considered as having forfeited his amateur standing in the IHSAA.

Section 10.

Penalties for violations of the above rule will be determined by the Board after all the evidence and circumstances have been considered.

* * * * * Q.1 Is a member school permitted to give sweaters to athletes?

- A. Yes, the IHSAA recommends that the giving of prizes, gifts, sweaters, etc., be kept within reasonable bounds at all times and that such as are given have a symbolic value only. No more than one sweater, jacket or blanket in each major sport may be given to a high school student for participation in high school for the entire four years.
- Q.2 May a student be awarded a second sweater in the same sport if he transfers to another high school?
- A. Yes, if he qualifies in the new high school,
- Q.3 May schools give awards to students for scholarship, sportsmanship and conduct?
- A. Yes, such may be given if sanctioned and administered by the school principal.
- Q.4 What gifts, awards and prizes may athletes receive?
- A. The IHSAA requires that the giving of awards, prizes, medals, etc., be kept on a reasonable basis at all times, and that such as are given have a symbolic value only and be given by and with the consent of the school principal.
- Q.5 What are the regulations regarding prizes and awards made to member school students by organizations outside the school?
- Donors should be checked carefully regarding attitudes, purposes and types of business.

- 2. Recipients should be selected by committees on which the principal and school authorities hold the balance of power.
- 3. All prizes and awards should be limited in number and confined to those reasonable in price and having symbolic value only. Cash or merchandise prizes or awards are not permitted. Awards or prizes of any kind which may be construed as advertising for any individual or firm are not permitted.
- 4. Purposes should be critically studied so that commercial interests, proselyting interests and interests foreign to good school procedure may be eliminated.
- 5. Principals shall be expected to know and to execute the rules, regulations and policies to the best of their ability according to their wording and spirit since the giving and receiving of awards shall be done by and with the consent and under the supervision of the principal in each member school.
- 6. No awards should be made by a "secret committee" of any outside organization, without the knowledge and consent of the high school principal as to the recipient.
- Q.6 Is it a violation for a student to compete in an athletic event in which prizes such as merchandise, merchandise certificates, bonds, stamps, cash or articles having intrinsic value are given?
- A. Yes, if the event is in any of the sports sponsored by IHSAA. The violation consists in the participation in such events regardless of whether or not the prizes are won, accepted, refused, or returned after they are won. (See Exception for Golf, Rule 28 Section 2)

RULE 7 - COACHES

Section 1.

Paid coaches, other than those regularly employed as full time teachers by the trustees of the school, are prohibited. The expression "Paid Coach" refers to any person who receives, directly or indirectly, remuneration of any kind—money, travel expenses, gifts, etc., from outside sources—in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any high school athletic team.

NOTE: When a school corporation is a part of a cooperative program with other school corporations, a full-time teacher employed by the cooperative may coach in the school corporation where he is assigned to teach.

Section 2.

No member school shall be permitted to employ a coach or athletic director who receives any extra pay, salary, gifts, trips or presents from any outside sources for coaching.

- Q.1 Who may coach a member school team?
- A. Qualified teachers in the school system, or cooperative, who are regularly licensed, regularly employed and regularly paid as such by the trustee or school board out of school funds.
- Q.2 Who is a "paid" coach?
- A. Any person who receives, directly or indirectly, remuneration of any kind—money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., from outside sources—in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any high school athletic team.
- Q.3 Are "paid" coaches permitted in the IHSAA?
- A. No, any remuneration received by a coach must come from the school trustee or the school board from school money and not from other sources.
- Q.4 May team members present a gift to their coach?
- A. Yes, so long as it is of symbolic value only.

RULE 8 — CONDUCT, CHARACTER, DISCIPLINE

Section 1.

Any contestant whose habits, conduct or character in or out of school during the school year or during the summer, are such as to reflect discredit upon his school or the Association, may be declared ineligible by the Board.

Note: It is recognized that principals, by the administrative authority vested in them by their school corporation, may exclude such contestants from representing their school.

ale ale ale al

- Q.1 Is a student, who is expelled from school one semester, eligible for the following semester?
- A. The IHSAA has no jurisdiction unless its rules and regulations are broken. Expulsion and suspension from school are usually not athletic matters at all. All rules of the IHSAA are binding on a student under expulsion or suspension. See conduct rules, scholarship rule and enrollment rule.
- Q.2 If a student is expelled from school after the first fifteen days of a semester and does not finish the semester, could he be considered eligible for the next semester?
- No, such student is a failure for his last semester in high school.

RULE 9 - CONTESTS

These GENERAL RULES apply to all interschool contests.

Section 1.

No games, meets, or tourneys, shall be played by a member school without the sanction of the Principal.

Section 2.

All inter-school athletic contests shall be subject to the rules of the Association.

Section 3.

All athletic games, meets, tourneys, and interschool activities participated in by the member schools belonging to the IHSAA must be held under the direct supervision, management and auspices of the schools concerned or under the direct supervision, management and auspices of the IHSAA. (Note—This section applies to games, meets, tourneys and interschool athletic contests within and without the state.)

Section 4.

Participation of students in an athletic contest with or against players not belonging to their school constitutes a game. A "scrimmage" or practice by students with or against teams or players not belonging to their school is considered a game. A tryout or demonstration of athletic ability as a prospective student-athlete for a college shall be considered a violation of this rule.

Section 5.

In all contests the decisions of the officials are considered rinal and binding.

Section 6.

A student may represent only one school in any sport during the tournament series regardless of the change of residence on the part of his parents.

Section 7.

Boys and girls shall not be permitted to participate in interschool athletic games as mixed teams, nor shall boys' teams and girls' teams participate against each other in interschool athletic contests.

Section 8.

In any athletic contest no oxygen shall be administered by mechanical medicinal means except in genuine cardio-pulmonary emergencies and then only by a doctor licensed to practice medicine in the State of Indiana.

Section 10.

There shall be no interschool athletic contests played or practices held on Sunday. Calling one or more team members together on Sunday for the purpose of studying scouting reports or viewing films of games will be considered a violation of this rule.

Section 11.

In order to protect the health and safety of all participants, when a member school is involved in a strike situation which prevents regularly scheduled supervised practice sessions of normal length and frequency, prior to participation there shall be (1) the required 10 preseason practices, if applicable; (2) a minimum of 4 separate days of school approved practices following 5 to 10 consecutive interrupted school days; (3) a minimum of 6 separate days of school approved practices following 11 or more consecutive interrupted school days.

Section 12.

No games shall be played with high schools of this state not belonging to this Association unless such high school is not eligible for membership in the Association. This rule does not prevent a member of the Association from playing high schools outside of the state nor from playing non-high school teams within the state, provided all players on the IHSAA teams are eligible in every way and also provided there are no high school students of Indiana on the opposing teams. No athletic contest shall be held with any high school of another state that is not a member in good standing of its State High School Athletic Association, if eligible for membership.

Section 13.

Withdrawal of a school athletic team from an athletic contest in progress, unless by mutual consent of both schools will jeopardize the standing of the school in the Association.

Section 14.

The use of audio-visual equipment for coaching purposes during athletic contests in any sports which are under jurisdiction of the Association shall be limited or prohibited:

- a. All mechanical means of communication such as walkie-talkies, telephones, etc. between the coach and any other individual stationed at strategic points in the gym is hereby prohibited in all basketball games.
- b. All mechanical means of communication such as walkie-talkies, telephones, etc., between the coach and any other individual stationed at any position other than in or behind the natural coaching position (between the 35 yd. lines) is hereby prohibited in all football games.
- c. Filming, telecasting or video taping for scouting purposes of any season contest by any party other than the two participating schools shall be prohibited.

- d. Mechanical visual aid equipment, including television and video, may not be used by team members of coaches for coaching purposes during any contest or tournament.
- Q.1 May a member school schedule and play single games with teams and schools in Indiana not members of the IHSAA?
- A. Yes, provided these teams and schools are not schools eligible for membership and also provided the members of the IHSAA observe all of the rules of the IHSAA. There should be no high school students on the non-member teams, except school teams not eligible for membership.
- Q.2 What is the difference between a preliminary game and a regular game?
- A. There is no difference as far as the IHSAA is concerned, as the same Association rules and regulations govern.
- Q.3 May a member school schedule and play games during the week?
- A. The IHSAA has no ruling in regard to this matter, but recommends that mid-week games not be scheduled or played except in emergencies.
- Q.4 May schools hold or sanction Sunday practices?
- A. No.
- Q.5 May a member school of the IHSAA schedule and play single games with high schools of other states?
- A. Yes, provided the high schools of these other states, if eligible for membership, are members in good standing in their state high school athletic associations. The principal is obligated to check this matter carefully.
- Q.6 Does the IHSAA stipulate any price for tickets to other than tourneys and meets held strictly under the supervision of the Board of Control?
- A. No, other than a recommendation that reasonable prices be made at all times for all games.
- Q.7 Does the omission of an admission charge make any difference as to the designation of a contest as a game?
- A. No, games are "inter"-contests or "inter"-scrimmages with or without admission charges.

RULE 10 — CONTESTS REQUIRING SPECIAL ATTENTION

Section 1.

All interstate meets and tourneys involving three or more schools must be sanctioned by all of the states concerned, and the National Federation of High School Associations. Written requests must be submitted to your Association at least 30 days in advance. The IHSAA and National Federation do not sanction participation in basketball tournaments involving one or more schools from another state.

Section 2.

Interstate contests involving only two schools need not be sanctioned, provided the round trip travel does not exceed 600 miles.

Note: The IHSAA does not sanction interstate contests involving travel of over 600 miles.

Section 3.

During the school year a school shall not permit the use of its athletic equipment or its employees, directly or indirectly in the management, promotion, player selection, or coaching of any all-star team or contest involving high school players or players who were previously members of the school team.

Section 4.

A school shall not permit its personnel to participate, directly or indirectly, in state tourneys or state meets which are not under the supervision and auspicies of the Association.

ate ate ate at

- Q.1 May a member school of the IHSAA schedule and play single games with high schools of other states?
- A. Yes, provided the high schools of these other states, if eligible for membership, are members in good standing in their state high school athletic associations. The principal is obligated to check this matter carefully.
- Q.2 May member schools participate in meets and tournaments, in Indiana or in other states, in which more than two schools are entered, if one or more of these schools are non-members of their own state high school athletic association?
- A. No.
- Q.3 May schools belonging to the IHSAA take part in track meets or tourney games outside of Indiana?
- A. All games, meets, tourneys and interschool athletic activities participated in by the high schools belonging to the IHSAA must be held under the direct supervision, management and auspices of the member high schools concerned, or under the IHSAA. Interstate basketball tourneys are forbidden by the National Federation to which Indiana belongs.

RULE 11 — CONTRACTS

Game Contracts

Section 1.

The Association's "Official Contract for Games" must be used for all interschool athletic contests and must be countersigned by the Principals of the schools involved. See contract form for further stipulations.

Contracts with Officials

Section 2.

"Contract For Contest Official" forms must be completed and properly signed for specific dates by the Principal and official involved. See contract form for further stipulations.

* * * *

- Q.1 Does the suspension or termination of membership of either school in the IHSAA render game and/or official contracts null and void?
- A. Yes, See contracts.
- Q.2 May a member school cancel a contract for an official or game without making settlement?
- A. No, contracts are binding and a settlement by mutual consent or according to the stipulations of the contract must be made.
- Q.3 Is there any penalty for the cancellation of a contract by an official?
- A. The IHSAA expects all approved officials to abide by their contracts and will handle on its merits any case of violation by the school or official.
- Q.4 If contracts specify that first teams shall participate, can second teams be used?
- No, it is recommended that contracts specify the ranking of the teams.
- Q.5 If game contracts do not clearly specify the ranking of the teams what ranking is understood as binding?
- A. First team ranking.
- Q.6 Who is the proper official to sign contracts for games?
- A. The member school principal always. This authority shall not be delegated. IHSAA contracts (forms A and B) call for the signature of the Principal.

RULE 12 - ENROLLMENT AND ATTENDANCE

Section 1.

No student, who has been enrolled as a high school student in any school, shall be permitted to participate in any interschool contest as a member of any member school until he has been enrolled in such school for 365 days, unless the parents of such student actually change their residence to the second school district or territory. (See Rule 21).

When enrolling in grade 9 a student may choose either a public school or a non-public school. Once he attends, he cannot make another choice without affecting his eligibility.

Section 2.

A student enrolled in one high school of a city or school corporation shall not be eligible in another school of the same city or school corporation until he has been enrolled in the other school for one calendar year, unless there are definitely marked school districts or territories and his parents actually change their residence to the new school district or territory.

Section 3.

Students finishing the courses offered in high schools maintaining less than four years of high school work and transferring, are not bound by sections 1 and 2 above. (See Q.6 below)

Section 4.

The fact that a transfer has or has not been issued, or that the student pays or does not pay his tuition, has no bearing except when the omission of a transfer or payment of full tuition is done for the purpose of unduly influencing a student to enroll for athletic reasons.

Section 5.

No student who has transferred from another high school shall be certified for interschool athletics until the principal has on file an Association Athletic Transfer Blank, signed by the principal of the school from which the student transferred.

Section 6.

A high school student who is regularly enrolled in three or more high school credit courses may, with prior written approval of his high school principal, enroll in or attend an accredited institution of higher learning for credit that is either acceptable for high school graduation or for college credit. The credit may be counted toward high school eligibility (3 semester hours or the equivalent shall be counted as equivalent to one high school credit).

During a vacation period, a high school student with remaining athletic eligibility may enroll in or attend a program in an accredited institution of higher learning that may give him college credit provided he has prior written approval of his high school principal, a copy of which must be placed on file in the office of the Association.

It is clearly understood the approval is for his attendance. The student is responsible for conducting himself in a manner that in no way violates the rules or the spirit of the rules of the Association.

Note: An accredited institution is one that grants credits that count toward a Baccalaureate Degree.

Section 7.

Enrollment eligibility shall be limited to eight semesters with the understanding that a student who enrolls in the ninth grade for the

first time at the beginning of semester two may choose either his first or ninth semester for enrollment eligibility. A mid-year student who participates in any sport during his first semester becomes ineligible for all sports during his ninth semester.

Section 8.

Any student who has been enrolled more than fifteen (15) school days between September 1 and December 1 for four previous times, shall be ineligible for all fall sports.

Section 9.

Any student who has been enrolled more than fifteen (15) school days between December 1 and March 1 for four previous times shall be ineligible for all winter sports except a student who entered high school for the first time during the second semester of a school year and who did not participate in any game during this semester, shall not be ineligible for basketball until he has been enrolled thereafter fifteen (15) or more school days between December 1 and March 1 for four times.

Section 10.

A student who has participated in one or more interschool athletic contests, and who is forced to withdraw from school for the semester during the first fifteen (15) school days because of a disability incurred in connection with athletics, shall not be considered as having participated for that semester. The disability shall be certified to by a physician licensed to practice medicine in Indiana.

Section 11.

Any student who has been enrolled more than fifteen (15) school days between March 1 and June 1 for four previous times, shall be ineligible for baseball, track, golf, tennis and other spring sports with the following exception: a student who entered high school for the first time at the beginning of semester two, may be enrolled five times of fifteen or more school days each between March 1 and June 1 and be eligible for spring sports during the last four times provided he did not participate in spring sports during his first semester of enrollment.

Section 12.

A student who withdraws from school for the semester within the first fifteen (15) days of school without having participated in an interschool athletic contest, shall not be considered as having had an opportunity to participate that semester.

Section 13.

In order to be eligible for athletic competition during any semester, a student must have entered some high school within the first fifteen (15) school days of the semester in which the contest occurs.

Section 14.

Students, whose parents change their place of residence during a semester, may complete the semester in the school in which they have been enrolled, then enter the school in the new district or territory in which their parents reside with residence eligibility in each school during enrollment therein.

A student who resides with his parents and attends high school in their residence district or territory may remain as a student with eligibility in athletics in this high school even though his parents move to another school district or territory, provided no undue influence is attached to the case in any way. (This rule is primarily to enable seniors to remain in the school in which they enrolled and remain eligible to compete in athletics when it is impractical for them to move with their parents.)

In every instance when the parents of an underclassman move, or plan to move, the principal must inform the parents of the IHSAA rule and if the athlete remains in the school after the end of the semester in which his parents move from the school district, it shall be the duty of the principal to obtain Association approval before he is certified for athletic eligibility. The principal shall report the circumstances and reasons why he remained in the school district on the form (Form J) prepared for that purpose. This report shall be sent to the Association office and to the principal of the high school in the district to which the parents moved. A student is not eligible during his next semester until his residence eligibility report has been approved by the Association (Eligibility approval should be requested prior to the semester in which eligibility is desired.)

Section 15.

Change of residence as used in these rules shall mean a bona fide move about which there is no question. If the case is that of a change of residence of parents, the change shall be definite and complete.

Section 16.

Foreign exchange students and students of parents assigned to foreign countries may be considered for residence eligibility by the Board.

- Q.1 What is a five-year man?
- A. Students who have been enrolled in high school for more than fifteen (15) school days between September 1 and December 1, or between December 1 and March 1, or between March 1 and June 1, for four previous times are ineligible respectively, for football, basketball, wrestling and spring athletics, with the following exceptions:

A student who enters high school for the first time at the beginning of semester II of any school year, may be enrolled four times of fifteen (15) or more school days each between December 1 and March 1 following this first semester of his enrollment, and he may be eligible for basketball for these four seasons provided he does not play in any game during his first semester of enrollment. A student, who enters high school for the first time at the beginning of semester II, may be enrolled four times of fifteen (15) or more school days each between March 1 and June 1 following this first semester of enrollment, and may be eligible in spring athletics for these four semesters, provided he does not participate in spring athletics during his first semester of enrollment. Participation in a sport in a school year counts as participation in that sport for one school year.

- Q.2 May a student, who has been in high school four full years, but who has not participated in any athletics participate in athletics?
- A. No, enrollment rather than participation is the determining factor in such cases.
- Q.3 Which is the determining factor in eligibility—enrollment or participation?
- A. Either one may cause ineligibility. Both are factors and must be considered.
- Q.4 If a student changes high schools, when is he eligible?
- A. See Rule 21.
- Q.5 What is considered enrollment in a semester?
- A. Attendance for any length of time or enrollment that may be considered attendance for any length of time (See exceptions under Sections 10 and 12 above)
- Q.6 When are students, who finish the work given in one member school, eligible in another school?
- A. Students finishing the work in a member school giving less than four years of high school work are just as eligible in a new school as they were in the old school. Students who complete the ninth grade in a junior high school in a school corporation that also maintains a senior high school are not considered eligible if they enroll in a high school outside their regular high school district.
- Q.7 Does the fifteen (15) day enrollment requirement mean school or calendar days?
- A. School days.
- Q.8 If a student fails in all subjects for a semester does this count as one of his eight semesters of eligibility?
- A. Yes.
- Q.9 Is a student, who has been out of high school for a semester or more and who has played independent ball during that time eligible when he enters school at the beginning of a semester?
- A. Yes, unless he violated his amateur standing in some way by playing on the independent team and provided he is eligible in all other ways.

- Q.10 Are all students, who attend school outside the school district in which their parents live, required to present legal transfers or pay the regular tuition?
- A. Check this matter with the Fiscal Officer of the State Department of Public Instruction. The report on aggregate attendance calls for definite information about transfers and tuition cases.
- Q.11 If a student misses school for a few weeks in order to work is he eligible during this time and when he returns
- A. This is a school problem and must be answered by the consideration whether regular school work to the extent of twenty hours is being maintained or not. Usually students who miss school are not passing in their school work.
- Q.12 When is a student, who intends to enter high school, eligible?
- A. When he actually enrolls, provided all other requirements have been met. See question 15 below.
- Q.13 How long may a student be enrolled in a semester then drop out without the semester being counted under the Scholarship Rule?
- A. Within the first fifteen (15) school days of the semester, provided he was eligible when he withdrew.
- Q.14 If a student is passing in four regular high school subjects when he drops out during a semester, may he be considered eligible under the Scholarship Rule at the beginning of his succeeding semester of enrollment?
- A. No, such a student would not meet the requirements of passing in four regular high school subjects throughout the last semester of enrollment (See exception, under Sections 10 and 12 above)
- Q.15 Between the first day of practice and the 1st day of school a student
 - 1. Turns in his completed Parent and Physician slip
 - 2. Participates in practice.
 - 3. Then enrolls in a different school without a corresponding change of residence by parents. Is he eligible?
- A. No, he is considered as declaring his intent to enroll where he first practiced and is ineligible for one calendar year.

RULE 13 - GRADUATES

Section 1.

A graduate of any high school is ineligible for participation in interschool athletics.

a) This limitation shall not apply to the graduate who is participating in the spring sports program. He remains eligible until the end of that sport season.

Section 2.

Students meeting requirements for graduation in three and onehalf years in a high school with a regular four-year course shall be eligible to participate in school athletics the last half of the fourth year, provided they are enrolled and meet all other eligibility rules of the Association.

RULE 14 - MARRIAGE

Section 1.

Students who are or have been at any time married are not eligible for participation in interschool athletic competition.

RULE 15 - OFFICIALS

Section 1.

The licensed officials in all interschool contests shall be on the approved list of officials in the Association.

Section 2.

Licenses shall be secured by making application to the Board through the Commissioner, and approved officials shall be given license cards signed by the Commissioner.

Section 3.

The Board shall drop from the list of licensed officials names of persons who are visibly unfair and incompetent in their officiating or who do not serve the ideals and policies of the Association. Disbarment letters shall be given to such officials and their names shall be published in the bulletins of the Association. The Board has the authority to refuse licensing of officials for just cause.

Section 4.

There shall be an annual registration of Association officials each year. The date of registration and membership fee shall be determined by the Board.

Section 5.

Licensed officials in the Association will be classified into two groups: Registered and Certified.

Section 6.

Women may become licensed officials with the Association.

Section 7.

High School students are not eligible for licensing as Association officials.

Section 8.

Licensed officials may not play with or against high school students during the school year.

Section 9.

A school using an official who is not licensed by the Association shall be suspended for a period not to exceed one calendar year.

Section 10.

The membership year for licensed officials is from July 1 to June 30 each year. All license cards issued prior to July 1 each year are void as of that date. Principals should not use officials whose names do not appear in the printed lists or who cannot show license cards issued for the current membership year. Be sure to check all officials carefully and require identification in all doubtful cases. Read license cards carefully to know sports covered, name, validity and signature.

- Q.1 Who is a licensed official of the IHSAA?
- A. A person who has made application to and received the approval of the Board through its Commissioner.
- 0.2 Must all officials be licensed?
- A. Yes. (Timers, scorers, etc. excluded)
- Q.3 Is it necessary for a licensed teacher to be licensed to officiate in an interschool game?
- A. Yes.
- Q.4 Are officials, who are certified in other states, eligible to officiate in Indiana?
- A. No, not until they have made application to the Commissioner and have been licensed in Indiana.
- Q.5 May a member of a high school team officiate in independent games without jeopardizing his standing?
- A. Yes, provided remuneration is not accepted, directly or indirectly, and provided he does not use an assumed name.
- Q.6 What is the penalty for using a non-licensed official?
- Suspension of the school usually, but cases are considered individually by the Board.
- Q.7 Are licensed officials required for girls' games?
- A. Yes, girls are bound by the same rules as boys, except in Play Days.
- Q.8 May a student of a high school officiate in games between member schools?
- No. a high school student is not eligible for licensing as an athletic official.
- Q.9 Must an official renew his license each year?
- Yes, after July 1 each year, to be eligible to officiate for member schools.

- Q.10 What is the policy of the Association toward the decisions of officials?
- A. The decisions of officials are considered final and binding.
- Q.11 Does the Association regulate the pay of officials?
- A. The pay of officials in tourneys and meets arranged by the Board is regulated. In single games, the Principals and officials are expected to have contracts agreed upon prior to the games. The Board will adjudicate difficulties according to contracts.
- Q.12 When was the licensing plan established?
- A. First in 1922—Registered and Certified classifications in 1946.
- Q.13 Are Registered officials eligible to officiate for member schools?
- A. Yes, Registered officials are eligible to officate the sport or sports in which they are licensed.
- Q.14 What is the difference between a Registered and a Certified official?
- A. A Registered official is an official who has been licensed by the Association (1) for less than three years or (2) for three or more years but does not have on file six satisfactory rating cards.
- Q.15 May a licensed official promote an All-Star High School Contest?
- A. See Rule 10, Section 3.
- Q.16 Does the Board have a regulation regarding the playing of a licensed official with or against high school students?
- A. Yes, licensed officials shall be placed on probation for one calendar year if the evidence shows that they participated in such games with knowledge of the rule against such playing by high school students.

RULE 16 - PARTICIPATION

Section 1.

Any student of a member school who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that season.

Section 2.

A student, who has played in one or more interschool games in any season shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season. (See Exception, Rule 12, Section 10)

Section 3.

A student who participates in an interschool contest when ineligible becomes ineligible only in that sport for the remainder of that sport season unless facts were purposely withheld or misrepresented. Such deliberate action makes the student ineligible in all sports for the remainder of that semester and all of his next semester in school.

NOTE: Such action shall always be subject to review by the Commissioner and Board.

Section 4.

A member school student who participates for demonstration purposes, or otherwise, in a coaching school or clinic outside the State of Indiana becomes ineligible for interschool athletics for a period of time as may be decided by the Board. Such participation within the State of Indiana requires advance approval by the Commissioner.

Section 5.

A member school student who participates in an athletic contest or demonstration during a season as an individual or on any other than his school team, becomes ineligible in that sport for the remainder of the season. (See Rule 9, Section 9 for seasons).

Section 6.

A ninth, tenth, eleventh or twelfth grade student may not participate in a contest with or against a student enrolled in a grade lower than the ninth.

Section 7.

Participation of students in an athletic contest with or against players not belonging to their school constitutes a game. A "scrimmage" or practice by students with or against teams or players not belonging to their school is considered a game. A tryout or demonstration of athletic ability as a prospective student-athlete for a college shall be considered a violation of this rule.

* * * *

- Q.1 Is an alumni game considered a game?
- A. Yes, such must be counted as one of the games permitted on the regular schedule.
- Q.2 What is considered an "inter" game or an "interscrimmage?"
- A. Participation of students in an organized athletic contest with or against players not belonging to their school constitutes a game. An organized "scrimmage" or practice by students with or against teams or players not belonging to their school is considered a game.
- Q.3 Is a game between the faculty members and the member school students of the same school considered an intramural game or interschool game?
- A. An intramural game.

- Q.4 What constitutes an "intramural" contest?
- A. When all participants on both teams are members of your school, e.g., faculty, students, class tourney will-be-has-been, etc.
- Q.5 Is an intramural contest interpreted by the Association as a practice or a game?
- A. A practice.
- Q.6 When may a student (athlete or non-athlete) participate in an intramural sport without affecting his eligibility?
- A. 1. Only during that sport season for basketball, football and wrestling.
 2. At any time during the school year for other sports.
- Q.7 Are the same standards of eligibility required for intramural games as for interschool games?
- A. No, the Association has no requirements for intramural.
- Q.8 Is a game between the alumni and the high school students considered an intramural game or an interschool game?
- A. Inter-school game.
- Q.9 May students participate in interschool contests after their school is closed?
- A. Due to the great variation of time in which member schools close in the spring, (a) students may represent their schools in meets and tourneys sponsored by the Association; (b) they may participate in scheduled contests where one of the two schools is still in session; (c) they may participate in a contest where both schools are closed, provided it was a regularly scheduled contest; (d) graduating seniors may participate in contests according to the above conditions, even though they may have received their diplomas, and (e) provided their team is competing in conference contests.
- Q.10 May a student play on any team other than a member school team?
- A. A student becomes ineligible in his school for the entire season of that sport in which he participates as a member of any team other than his school team. There is an additional penalty for participation out of season as set out in the rules regarding football, wrestling and basketball.
- Q.11 What is considered participation in a sport for a season?
- A. Playing in a part of one game or contest in a sport constitutes participation in that sport for that season. (See exception under Rule 12—Section 10)
- Q.12 May member schools play against College, Y.M.C.A. and independent teams?
- A. Yes, in single games, but not in tourneys, meets and leagues. In single games the member schools must obey all of the rules

- of the Association and there must not be any high school students on the opposing teams.
- Q.13 May a student who plays on an independent team be permitted to participate in intramural athletics?
- A. Yes, Association rules and regulations govern interschool athletics only.
- Q.14 Does a student become ineligible in all sports, if he plays on a team other than his school team in one sport?
- A. No, a student becomes ineligible only in the sport in which he participates as a member of a team other than his school team unless he violates his amateur standing or some general rule of the association and then he becomes ineligible in all sports. Playing basketball out of season makes a student ineligible for all sports until the date of the State Final Tourney of the following year. Playing football out of season makes the student ineligible for all sports until the following November 30. Wrestling out of season makes the student ineligible for all sports until the date of the State Final Wrestling Tourney of the following year.
- Q.15 If a student participates in a bowling league or tournament during the school year, does he make himself ineligible in other sports?
- A. No, providing he does not violate his amateur standing.

RULE 17 - PENALTIES

Section 1.

Penalties imposed by the Association upon players, member schools or officials for violations will be determined by the Commissioner or the Board or both. The type and duration will be determined in accordance with the nature and extent of the offense.

Section 2.

FORFEITURES

- a. When an ineligible student participates in team contests, the game must be forfeited.
- b. When an ineligible student participates in contests where individual points are awarded, only the points scored by the ineligible student are forfeited.
- c. When an ineligible student participates in an Association tournament series contest, he must be disqualified immediately when discovered.
- d. Championship honors will be forfeited for withholding known requested data during investigations.

Section 3.

The Board may issue a warning, probation or suspension of membership to any member school for any reason it deems necessary in

order to enforce its decisions or the Constitution and By-Laws: Provided, that in case of a penalty of suspension of membership, the Board shall hold a hearing at which the affected member school or schools may be heard.

A WARNING is an official notice that an unexcusable, unethical or unsportsmanlike action has occurred, is a matter of record, and such an occurrence must not be repeated.

PROBATION is a more severe type of warning. The school may continue its regular schedule and participate in tournaments only after filing a written report with the Commissioner listing measures to be taken to alleviate the problem.

SUSPENSION is termination of membership for any of, but not limited to, the following reasons:

- a. Violations of the Constitution or By-Laws.
- Failure of the principal to assume direct responsibility for the school's interschool athletic program.
- Refusal to abide by the decisions of the Commissioner or Board.
- d. Violation of the Undue Influence Rule.
- e. Violation of contracts with other schools.
- f. Violation of game officials contracts.
- g. Using an ineligible player knowingly.
- h. Failure to provide adequate police protection.
- Removing team from field or floor because of dissatisfaction with the officiating.
- j. Failure to control the spectators and players' bench.
- k. Failure to adequately protect officials and visiting team.
- 1. Violation of practice and playing seasons.
- m. Mutual agreements to violate the rules of this Association.

Note: Being on probation or previous warnings are not a prerequisite. All game and officials' contracts shall be null and void. Following the termination of suspension, the principal must make a written request for reinstatement.

* * * *

- Q.1 This question is often asked: "What will be the penalty for violation of such and such a rule?"
- A. Penalties in the Association are not assigned in advance, as this democratic organization is built on the idea that the observance of its rules and regulations is more to be desired than the enforcement of them. The Association believes that the essense of proper and willing observance is higher than enforcement and that we should resort to enforcement only when observance fails.

RULE 18 - PROTESTS

Section 1.

When a contestant, official, game or decision is protested, the game shall be played as scheduled and the protest, with evidence, then filed with the Commissioner.

Section 2.

In cases of disputes or protests involving a student, the Principal of the school involved must furnish the Board the following data on the contestant in question: number of years of participation; date and place of birth; average mark in each subject for the preceding semester; average mark in each subject from the beginning of the current semester; etc. Other pertinent information will be requested as needed.

Section 3.

In cases of disputes or protests involving school personnel, contracts, etc. the Principal filing the protest must submit all known details in writing to the Commissioner who will determine the action to be taken.

Section 4.

If, after receiving such protests, it is determined that information has purposely been withheld until an "advantageous" time, the Board may, at its discretion, deny the protest.

RULE 19 - SCHOLARSHIP

Section 1.

Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current senester, a passing grade in each of four or more subjects requiring a minimum of twenty regular high school recitations per week, exclusive of rhetoricals, physical training, military drill and deportment; in his last preceding semester in school, he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire semester.

Military Science and Tactics may be accepted for scholarship eligibility, provided it is approved by the State Department of Education as a full-time, solid subject; that it may be counted toward graduation from high school; and that it cannot be substituted for required courses in physical education.

Note: Schools having lengthened periods must meet the time equivalency.

Interpretation

The part of Rule 19, Section 1 reading, "... a passing grade in each of four or more subjects requiring a minimum of twenty regular high school recitations per week" is interpreted to mean—"a passing grade in each of four regular high school subjects having a full semester value and for which a full semester credit is given." The combination of four subjects, not excluded in this

Rule, which total credit value is equal to two full semester credits, may be counted toward eligibility for two and only two of the four regular high school subjects of full semester credit value, provided the four combined subjects remain the same subjects throughout the semester in which they are counted.

A regular high school course granting two credits for the semester due to the fact that additional time and study are required to meet academic requirements, may be counted as equivalent to two subjects.

Section 2.

Students enrolled for the first time must comply with the scholarship requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended.

Section 3.

In each of the subjects representing the minimum requirement of work specified in Section 1 above, the following shall govern:

- a. for the current semester the average of the period grades up to the time of certification must be passing;
- b. for the current or school grading period the average of the daily or weekly grades must be passing;
- c. if the average of the period grades at the beginning of any grading period is below passing in any subject, the pupil is ineligible as far as that subject is concerned for the entire grading period.

Note: Each school will establish consistent grading periods within a semester and within the school year. Student scholastic eligibility will be determined at the time when grades or credits have been made a matter of final record in the principal's office but no later than noon of the fifth school day following the end of such determined grading periods. The principal shall certify these specific dates to the Association on his membership card.

Section 4.

Scholastic deficiencies caused by the inability of a student to take or pass four regular subjects in the previous semester may be made up in night school, summer school, or correspondence school and counted toward eligibility provided:

- a. it be done in a regularly approved school or according to procedures approved by the State Department of Public Instruction.
- b. no more than two credits be given for work done during the summer months.
- c. all work be done and the credits be made a matter of final record in principal's office prior to the opening date of the semester in which eligibility is desired. This does not apply to incompletes.

d. all work and credits be bona fide in every way and certified as such by the high school principal. In all other cases, the record at the end of the semester shall be final. Deficiencies in one semester cannot be made up in a subsequent semester for qualification purposes during that semester.

Section 5.

An incomplete or condition at the end of a grading period or semester counts as a failure until deficiency has been removed, providing such is removed before the end of the following grading period or summer, whichever comes first.

Section 6.

Innovative course credits may be approved by the Board provided:

- a. written request is made by the principal concerned and courses are described in detail,
- b, courses are approved by the State Department of Public Instruction,
- c. the local Board of Trustees counts such credits toward graduation and
- d. total class time is equivalent to a regular course.

Section 7.

A student who withdraws from school for the semester within the first 15 days shall not be considered ineligible as to scholarship at the beginning of his next semester of enrollment, provided he was eligible when he withdrew.

Section 8.

Any student who carries at least fifteen hours of regular high school work is a high school student, provided such a student has been promoted to high school in the regular way and according to good school procedure.

- Q.1 May back work be made up and counted toward eligibility?
- A. Yes, for incompletes only.
- Q.2 Is a student, who has made sufficient credits to graduate at the end of semester one, eligible for athletics during semester two?
- A. Yes, provided he is eligible in all other respects and does not actually graduate at the end of semester one. Such a student must be enrolled and carry regular work during semester two.
- Q.3 May a credit in "Physical Fitness" be counted toward eligibility in athletics?
- A. No. See Section 1 above which specifically excludes "physical training" as a subject to count toward eligibility in athletics. The Board has ruled that "Physical Fitness" comes under the term "physical training" as used in this section.

- Q.4 Does summer school credit in a school other than his home school jeopardize the standing of a student?
- A. No, provided the work is accepted by the State Department of Public Instruction and the home school authorities recognize the work of a non-home school for credit. In fact, the Association recommends summer school work of an approved type for students needing credits.
- Q.5 If a student fails to pass in four regular high school subjects during semester two, may he count work done in summer school toward eligibility?
- A. See Section 4 above.
- Q.6 Does the Association have a passing grade for scholarship?
- A. No, the passing grades of the schools are usually honored, but the Board reserves the right to check the validity of grades and credits and to act on their findings.
- Q.7 To determine eligibility, what constitutes the last semester?
- A. The last semester for any student is the last semester in which the student was enrolled in any school for any length of time after the first fifteen (15) school days.
- Q.8 At the end of the second grading period in a semester, is a student eligible if he makes passing grades in four regular high school subjects for this period.
- A. Yes, providing he meets the scholarship requirement for the previous semester.
- Q.9 Is a "condition" or an "incomplete" considered a "pass" in the Association?
- A. No. See Section 5 above.
- Q.10 Is a student, who carries three regular high school subjects and one or more eighth grade subjects, considered a high school student?
- A. Yes, a student who carries fifteen hours of regular high school work is a high school student, providing such a student has been promoted to high school in the regular way. Such a student would be considered enrolled in high school but would not be eligible because of insufficient subject matter.
- Q.11 Is a student who has been ineligible for a semester on account of scholarship eligible for the night of the last day of the semester?
- A. Only when the principal has previously certified that date for checking eligibility. See Rule 19, Section 3 Note.
- Q.12 What constitutes scholarship eligibility?
- A. In order to be eligible for a current semester a student must have passed in four regular high school subjects in his last semester of enrollment in any high school and he must be maintaining a similar amount of work for the current semester. This statement for semesters applies to grading periods of the semester also.

- Q.13 If a student becomes ineligible on account of scholarship at the end of a semester, does this make him ineligible for one whole semester afterwards?
- A. Yes.
- Q.14 If a student becomes ineligible at the end of a grading period in a semester, when can he become eligible?
- At the end of the following grading period on the date previously certified by the principal for checking eligibility. See Rule 19, Section 3 Note.
- Q.15 If a student becomes ineligible on Friday at the end of a grading period, is he eligible for that night?
- A. See Rule 19, Section 3 Note.
- Q.16 If a student becomes eligible on Friday at the end of a grading period, is he eligible for that night?
- A. See Rule 19, Section 3 Note.
- 0.17 When is a student maintaining his work during a semester?
- A. When he is passing in four regular high school subjects during the past and present grading period of that semester. Semester grades shall be substituted for the final grading period grades. Scholastic eligibility may be checked weekly or at mid-grading periods, etc. by schools desiring to prevent failures at end of grading periods.
- Q.18 If a student fails to pass in four regular high school subjects during the last grading period of a semester but earns credits in four regular high school subjects for the semester, will he be eligible at the beginning of the first grading period of the next semester?
- A. He will be eligible on the date previously certified by the principal for checking eligibility at the end of that semester. See Rule 19, Section 3 Note.
- Q.19 If a student passes in four regular high school subjects during the last grading period of a semester but fails to earn credits in four regular high school subjects for the semester, will he be eligible at all for the next semester,

A. No.

RULE 20 - SEMESTER

One half of a school year constitutes a semester and parts of two semesters or a part of one semester does not make a semester.

RULE 21 — TRANSFERS

Also see Rule 12-Enrollment and Attendance.

Section 1.

No student who has transferred from another school shall be certified for interschool athletics until the principal has on file an

IHSAA Athletic Transfer Blank signed by the principal of the school from which the student transferred.

Section 2.

When a student transfers from one school to another member school his residence eligibility shall be determined as follows:

- a. From a school of a city or school corporation to another school of the same city or school corporation—he shall be ineligible for 365 days unless there are definitely marked districts or territories and his parents make a bona fide change of residence to the new district or territory.
- b. From a public school to another public school—he shall be ineligible for 365 days or until his parents make a bona fide change of residence to the new district, whichever transpires first.
- c. From a public school to a non-public school whose territory does not include that public school district—he is ineligible for 365 days or until his parents make a bona fide change of residence to the new school territory, whichever transpires first.
- d. From a public school to a non-public school located in the same district—he shall be ineligible for 365 days.
- e. From a public school to a non-public school located in a territory serving the same district, he shall be ineligible for 365 days.
- f. From a non-public school to a public school located in the same territory, he shall be ineligible for 365 days.
- g. From a non-public school to another non-public school serving the same territory, he shall be ineligible for 365 days.
- h. From a non-public school to a public school located outside that territory, he is ineligible for 365 days or until the parents make a bona fied change of residence to the new district, whichever transpires first.
- i. From a non-public school to another non-public school located in a different territory, he is ineligible for 365 days or until his parents make a bona fide change of residence to the new territory, whichever transpires first.
- j. From a school located outside the district or territory in which his parents reside and subsequently transfers to a school in his home district or territory, he is includes military schools which offer work on the secondary school level. The Board must review all cases in which the previous school was discontinued.
- Q.1 If a student transfers from a member school located in one city or school district to a school in another city or school district, how is his eligibility determined?
- A. By applying Rule 21 above. Following are some statements which will help to clarify this rule:

- Under normal circumstances, a student usually attends high school in the district or territory where his parents reside.
- b. If the parents move to another school district or territory, the student is eligible as follows (1) if he changes schools at the same time parents change residence, (2) if parents change during a semester, the student may change at the end of that semester, but no later and (3) student need not change schools at all, provided no undue influence is used to retain him there. An underclassman who does not transfer is ineligible until a "Residence Eligibility After Parents Move From District" form has been reviewed by the Association.
- c. It is the duty of the principal to check carefully the record of every student who transfers from another school. The principal should also advise the students who contemplate making a change of schools as to the rules of eligibility regarding transfers.

Section 3.

A student, whose parents are separated or divorced and reside in separate school districts or territories, may choose residence with either parent. Once his place of residence has been determined, either by order of the court, or mutual agreement of the parents, he cannot change residence to the home of the other parent without losing eligibility for one calendar year.

Section 4.

A student who has been enrolled in a correctional school may return to his home school with the same residence eligibility as when he left. Credits earned in the state school are considered the same as those earned in any other high school so far as eligibility is concerned.

Section 5.

When a possible Unavoidable Change of Residence occurs, the Board shall have discretionary power to waive the transfer requirements in case of (a) orphans, (b) unavoidable circumstances necessitating a change of residence in order to have a home, (c) school board policies which provide for or require a change. No such student, however, shall be eligible to participate until written referral has been made by the principal/s involved (See Rule 3, Section 7 for needed information and documents) and Board approval has been obtained.

- Q.1 May practices in one school be counted as such in another school where a student changes schools?
- A. Yes, provided definite proof of the practices are on file from the principal of the school in which the practices were held.

- Q.2 When parents contemplate changing their residence soon to another school district or territory, may a student transfer in advance and be eligible for competition?
- A.(1) He may transfer but will be ineligible for competition until parents definitely change their residence to the second school district or territory.
- A.(2) In such cases the Principal shall inform the student and parents that, if for any reason they do not move and student returns to first school, he shall be ineligible for one calendar year.

RULE 22 — UNDUE INFLUENCE

Section 1.

The use of undue influence by any person or persons to secure or to retain a student or to secure or to retain one or both of the parents or guardians of a student as residents, may cause the student to be ineligible for high school athletics for a period subject to the determination of the Board and shall jeopardize the standing of the high school in the Association.

NOTE: By action of the Council and Board, this rule is interpreted to include any undue influence that may be exerted by anyone on a student who has not yet entered the ninth grade, to enroll in a school other than his home school or the one he ordinarily would be expected to attend or any school where he and/or his parents previously had filed a choice of subject matter card or other written evidence of preliminary enrollment or registration.

Section 2.

No member school student shall be eligible to participate in any interschool contest under the rules of the Association, if it shall be shown that he or any member of his family is receiving any remuneration, either directly or indirectly, to influence him or his family to reside in a given school district in order to establish eligibility on the team of said school, and any school permitting such participation shall, upon satisfactory evidence, submitted to the Board, be suspended from membership in the Association for a term of not less than one year.

NOTE: This rule shall not interfere with the right of high school pupils to work during vacation or during out of school hours in order to earn their way through high school. It shall apply to the use of any funds created by gift, or by subscription with the intent of offering them parts of them for the free use of the player or any member of his family as an inducement to get them to change their residence to the district of the said school and to maintain residence therein.

- Q.1 Is it the duty of the Association to prove that undue influence has been used?
- A. No, the member school principal has agreed to conduct his athletic activities according to the rules and regulations of

the Association. Where there is a question, it is the duty of the high school principal to meet the question. He cannot certify that his students are eligible unless he knows that they are eligible.

- Q.2 Why should a school be penalized because some person outside of school uses undue influence?
- A. Usually a school is not penalized unless it is involved or uses the student in question in athletics. In the second place, the results are the same whether some person in school or some person outside of school uses undue influence: An athlete that has been retained or secured through the use of undue influence and the school that uses such an athlete on teams in interschool athletic competition profits by the use of undue influence.
- 0.3 What constitutes the use of undue influence?
- A. An all-inclusive answer for all time and under all conditions cannot be given, but the use of any of the following inducements may come under the rule:
 - Offer or acceptance of money or other valuable consideration.
 - 2. Reduction or remission of regular tuition.
 - 3. Waiving the requirement of legal transfers according to law.
 - 4. Offer or acceptance of board, room or clothing.
 - 5. Offer or acceptance of remuneration for work in excess of amount regularly paid for such service.
 - 6. Free transportation.
 - Transportation by coach, principal, teacher or school official.
 - 8. Offer of acceptance of school privileges or considerations not granted to other students.
 - Making home with coach, principal, teacher or school official.
 - 10. Free rent or reduced rent for parents.
 - 11. Offer or payment of moving expenses of parents.
 - 12. Any inducement to get parents or students to change residence for athletic reasons.

RULE 23 - BASEBALL

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

Section 1.

The National Alliance Edition of Baseball Rules shall govern in baseball except as modified by the Association.

Section 2.

The baseball season is defined as beginning and ending with the school year. (Exceptions—See Rule 23, Sections 5 and 7)

Section 3.

There shall be ten separate days or organized baseball practice under the direct supervision of the high school coaching staff by each player preceding participation in interschool contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day.

Section 4.

A pitcher may not pitch in more than ten innings in any three consecutive calendar days. This period begins when he officially enters the game as a pitcher and includes season and tournament games.

Section 5.

Independent Summer Baseball

- a. High school students may play on independent baseball teams during the summer when school is not in session without jeopardizing their standing or the standing of their school in the Association provided they do not play under assumed names, provided they do not accept remuneration, directly or indirectly for their playing, and provided their school is not still competing for conference awards.
- b. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted by the students if such are accepted in service rather than in money or in some other material form. The Association expects all high school students to so conduct themselves at all times that they, their high school and the Association will be honored.
- c. All such playing should be checked carefully and frequently. The requirements should be extended to all students. Managers of independent teams should be warned of the dangers of using high school boys on baseball teams. A professional in one sport is a professional in all sports as far as eligibility in the Association is concerned.
- d. High school students, who play on baseball teams other than their high school teams during the school year, make themselves ineligible for baseball in high school in that school year.
- e. High school students, who play on baseball teams other than their high school teams during the school year, must have written permission of their high school principal on file in the principal's office prior to the participation. The responsibility of securing and filing this written permission rests with the student, the manager of the non-high school team and finally with the high school principal. See Note at end of next sub-section.
- f. The Association considers that a member school is entitled to the high school students in baseball during the school year and that participation in baseball elsewhere should not take place except by the written permission of the high school principal in each case.
- Note 1: Permission granted by a principal to a boy to play baseball on a team other than his school team during the school year makes the boy ineligible for the school team in baseball. No permit can be issued to violate any of the rules of the Association.

 $_{\mbox{\scriptsize The purpose}}$ of the permit is to keep the principal informed about his students.

Note 2: It is not considered a violation of present Association rules for a member school, during the summer vacation period, to sponsor a team composed entirely of its own students in such sports as baseball, softball, tennis and golf. While an athletic contest conducted under this interpretation would be similar to that of other independent amateur organizations, it is recommended that participating schools, through their principals, mutually agree to abide by Association rules except for modifications as may be necessary.

Section 6.

A member school student shall not be considered as violating his amateur standing if he participates, during the summer vacation, in baseball schools and clinics sponsored by professional major an minor league baseball clubs.

Note—Any employee or school official of a member school who acts as an agent or encourages any negotiations between a high school student and representatives of Organized Baseball prior to the student's graduation, is violating the Agreement between the National Federation and Organized Baseball. Such action on the part of any employee or school official may cause his school to be suspended from the Association for a period to be determined by the Board.

Any evidence that a representative of Organized Baseball is attempting to or has signed a student prior to graduation should be reported to the Association at once. This is a violation of the Agreement between the National Federation and Organized Baseball, and the penalty for such action is under the jurisdiction of Organized Baseball.

Section 7.

High school students playing on their high school baseball team during the summer while their team is still competing for conference awards make themselves ineligible by participating on any other baseball team during that time.

- Q.1 Does a high school student violate the rules of the Association by playing independent baseball during the summer?
- A. High School students may play independent baseball during the summer months when school is not in session without jeopardizing their standing in high school, provided they do not accept remuneration, directly or indirectly, provided they do not play under assumed names, and provided their school is not still competing for conference awards. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted by such players if accepted in service and not in any other way. All such playing should be checked by principals. (See Rule 23, Section 5).

(Note: This answer applies to other summer sports, not having definite seasons, provided other rules and regulations of the Association are observed.)

- Q.2 Is a student who plays on an independent baseball team during semester one, ineligible for high school baseball during semester two?
- A. Yes, such a student is ineligible for baseball for semester one and two as baseball is a school year sport.
- Q.3 If a student plays on an independent team in baseball or softball during the school year, does he make himself ineligible for baseball in high school?
- A. No, he makes himself ineligible only in the sport in which he participates on an independent team, provided he does not violate his amateur standing in any way.

RULE 24 - BASKETBALL

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

Section 1.

The Official Rules of the National Basketball Committee of the United States and Canada shall govern basketball.

Section 2.

All games other than first-team games shall be played in quarters of six minutes in length.

Section 3.

The maximum number of games for the regular schedule of any team in basketball shall be eighteen. (The penalty is suspension.)

- a. A player may participate in a maximum of seventy-two quarters of interschool basketball, and one invitational tourney during any one season. No player may participate in more than four quarters in any one session. If a player participates in two invitational tourneys, the quarters played in one tourney, shall be included in the seventy-two quarters permitted during the season.
- b. A record of the quarters played in basketball by individual players shall be kept on file in the principal's office at all times for his information in certifying eligibility of players.

Section 4.

"Donkey Basketball," "Skruball," "Skateball" or any similar game in which a basketball and/or basketball goals are used shall be considered a game of basketball. High school students who participate in "Donkey Basketball," "Skruball," "Skateball" or similar games, shall be subject to Association eligibility rules as in regular basketball games.

Section 5.

No inter-school basketball games shall be played by students or schools prior to November 1 of each year or after the closing date of the sectional tourneys of the State Basketball Championship Series each year, except by such students and such schools as are participants in the tourneys of the State Basketball Championship series; and the close of the basketball season for these students and schools shall be not later in any event than the date of the Final Tourney or not later than the elimination of the school in one of these tourneys if earlier than this final tourney date. The penalty is suspension.

Students playing independent, league, recreation or organized basketball games, before November 1 or after the closing date of the Sectional Basketball Tourney of the State Basketball Championship series, make themselves ineligible for all interschool athletics until the closing date of the State Basketball Championship Tournament of the following year. A prospective studentathlete who engages in a practice, scrimmage, tryout or otherwise demonstrates his athletic ability either on or off the campus for a college shall be considered in violation of this rule.

Section 6.

All organized or formal basketball practices by players or teams shall be limited to the period beginning October 1 and ending with the date of the State Final Championship Basketball Tourney each school year.

There shall be ten separate days of organized practice in basketball under the direct supervision of the high school coaching staff by each player preceding participation in inter-school contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day.

Section 7.

Section 8.

All interschool basketball tourneys, other than the State Championship Tourney series, shall be held prior to February of each year. (Exception—See b below)

- a. No interschool basketball tourney which involves more than four schools, shall be held without the sanction of the Association, except where all the schools are located in a single county.
- b. Basketball tournaments for ninth grade and tournaments composed entirely of associate member teams shall be completed prior to the week of the sectional basketball tournament each year. Players who compete in the ninth grade tournament played after January 31, will not be eligible to compete in the State Championship Tourney Series.

Section 9.

Teams and players may participate in two basketball tourneys in addition to the tourneys of the State Basketball Championship Series under the following provisions:

- The games in one tourney may be in addition to the regular schedule.
- b. The games of the other tourney shall be included within the eighteen game limitation for the season's schedule.

- c. Teams or players participating in a tourney which extends into a second week shall not be permitted to enter a second tourney.
- d. No tourney shall be scheduled to extend over more than two consecutive weekends.

The penalty for violation of this section is suspension.

Section 10.

A high school shall not be considered eligible to enter a sectional basketball tourney any year unless the team representing the high school has played eight (8) or more interschool games during that season before the Official Entry List for Tourneys is filed in the Association office.

Note: The following apply to the IHSAA tourney games:

- a. Semi-state and State Final Tourney games will be played on floors 50 x 84 feet. Sectional and regional tourney games may be played on the floors of the same dimensions where conditions permit.
- b. Playing floors shall be marked with a four foot end line wherever deemed practical.
- c. The backboards shall be rectangles, six feet horizontally and four feet vertically in all IHSAA tourneys, but fan shaped boards as described in the official rules may be used in single games by mutual consent prior to the game.
- d. If the backboard is transparent, it shall be marked as follows:

 A rectangle shall be centered behind the ring and marked by
 a two-inch white line. The rectangle shall have outside
 dimensions of twenty-four inches horizontally and eighteen
 inches vertically. For the rectangular backboard, the top edge
 of the baseline shall be level with the ring. Borders of the backboard should be marked with a white line three inches in width.
- e. The regulation type of baskets, as described in the official rules, shall be used in all IHSAA tourneys, but other types of baskets may be used in single games by mutual consent prior to the game. Each basket ring and the attaching flange and braces shall be bright orange in color.
- f. The molded type of basketball, tanned in natural or orange leather color shall be used in all IHSAA tourneys. Other types and other colors may be used in single games by mutual consent prior to the game.
- Q.1 When may students practice basketball?
- A. Organized or formal practices in basketball by players or teams may be held within the school from the period beginning October 1 and ending on the date of the State Final Championship Basketball Tourney each school year.
- Q.2 Does the game limitation apply to the first team only?
- A. The game limitation applies to any team—first, second, third, etc.

- Q.3 Are students limited to eighteen scheduled games?
- A. No, students are limited to 72 quarters during the season's schedule of games.
- Q.4 In how many tourneys may a team play in addition to the games permitted on the regular schedule?
- A See Section 9 of this Rule.
- Q.5 Would a tourney held during two different weeks count as one tourney or two tourneys?
- A. Two tourneys.
- Q.6 May a high school have a complete schedule for the second team in any sport?
- A. Yes, each school team can and should be considered a representative team of the high school and, as such, be governed by all of the Association rules and privileges.
- Q.7 Has the Association established the size of a regulation basketball floor?
- A. No, but the Association uses 50' x 84' in the Semi-State, and State Final, and recommends all floors to be marked with the four foot end-line.
- Q.8 Is there a limit to the number of players a coach may use in a basketball game?
- A. No; except in games and tourneys sponsored and managed by the Association.
- Q.9 What is considered a game of basketball?
- A. A game of any kind in the Association is an "inter" contest as distinguished from an "intra" contest. An "inter" scrimmage is a game.
- Q.10 Must a boy, who has participated in football during the season, have ten days of organized practice in basketball before he is eligible to play in a game of basketball?
- A. Yes.
- Q.11 Are "Donkey Basketball," "Skruball," "Skateball" or other similar games considered basketball in the Association?
- A. Yes, and all Association rules are binding.
- Q.12 When does the basketball season begin and end for teams and individuals?
- A. See Section 6 of this Rule.
- Q.13 May member school players and teams play independent basketball in the interim between the sectional tourneys and the final tourney if the season in the school is closed?
- A. No, such playing would constitute a violation.

- Q.14 May more games than are allowed under the game limitation be played by a team by juggling the players on the teams?
- A. No, the game limitation requirement holds for teams.
- Q.15 May an "A" team or "first" team be designated as "B" team and thus evade the rule?
- No, the wording of the rule and the spirit of the rule are clear and binding.
- Q.16 Are vocational, agricultural and similar teams and players bound by the rules and regulations of the Association?
- A. Yes, all member school teams and players are subject to these rules and regulations. The member school principal is responsible for all players and teams representing the high school in any way.
- Q.17 May the same player be used in more than one basketball game during the same evening or in the same half day (morning or afternoon session)?
- Yes, but players are limited to only four quarters in any one session.
- Q.18 If a "practice" game of basketball is played is it to be counted as one of the eighteen games on the regular schedule?
- A. Inter-"practice" games are regular games and must be counted as such. Intra-"practice" games are not counted as regular games.

RULE 25 - CROSS COUNTRY

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

Section 1.

The National Alliance Edition of Track and Field Rules shall govern Cross Country with the following exception:

a. A member of an Indiana high school cross country team may not run in more than one meet per day in interschool competition.

Section 2.

There shall be ten separate days of organized practice in cross country under the direct supervision of the high school coaching staff by each player preceding participation in interschool contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day.

Section 3.

The Cross Country season is defined as beginning with the opening day of school, or September 1 if school is not in session, and ending with the last day of school each year.

- Q.1 May students participate in cross country independent "road races" held during the summer?
- A. Yes, providing they do not violate their amateur standing.

RULE 26 - FOOTBALL

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

Section 1.

Official Football Rules of the National Alliance shall govern in football.

a. All games other than first team games shall be played in quarters of nine minutes in length.

Section 2.

All interschool football games by players or teams shall be limited to the period beginning with the opening day of school or September 1 if school is not in session and ending November 30 of each calendar year. The penalty to a school for playing football after November 30 of any year shall be suspension, and the penalty for a student so playing shall be ineligibility for all interschool athletics until the following November 30. (Exception, See Section 3e below)

Note: It is assumed that any member school which participates in an interschool football game under the above rule before the opening day of school does so with the approval of their Board of School Trustees through their Superintendent of Schools.

Section 2. (Effective 73-74)

All interschool football games by players or teams shall be limited to the period beginning with the eleventh day of organized football practice and ending on the date of the Semi-State playoff, except for those schools participating in the State Championship play-off. The season ends for these schools when they are eliminated or when they become champions of their class. The penalty to a school for playing football after the above dates of any year shall be suspension, and the penalty for a student so playing shall be ineligibility for all interschool athletics until the Semi-State play-off date the following year.

Note: It is assumed that any member school which participates in an interschool football game under the above rule before the opening day of school does so with the approval of their Board of School Trustees through their Superintendent of Schools.

Section 3.

Excluding Association play-off games, the maximum number of interschool games for any team in football shall be ten and one jamboree.

a. A player may participate in a maximum of forty quarters of interschool football, exclusive of one jamboree, and the playoff games, during any one season. No student may participate in more than four quarters of football on successive days. A student may participate in only four quarters of interschool football during a week. In order to place the emphasis on the varsity squad, the record of quarters of each student shall start on the day of a varsity scheduled game and end the day

before the next varsity game scheduled or seven days which ever comes first.

- b. A record of the quarters played in football by individual players shall be kept on file in the principal's office at all times for his information in certifying eligibility of players.
- c. Schools shall be limited to the playing of one interschool football game in a calendar week for each team sponsored. (Calendar week defined as Monday through Saturday).
- d. A team or player may participate in no more than two quarters in one football jamboree without such participation being charged as a game or quarters played.
- e. No team or player shall participate in a football jamboree earlier than the day following the tenth day of practice nor later than the second calendar day prior to the first scheduled game.

(Note: A football jamboree is defined as a contest in which four or more schools participate. Each school shall be limited to playing of no more than two quarters. Quarters shall be no more than 12 minutes in length.)

Section 4.

Non-contact football practice will be permissible for 90 minutes or less on each of 3 days immediately preceding August 15, excluding Sunday. Except for football shoes, helmets and mouth pieces—no football uniforms, no footballs, no protective equipment such as pads, guards, etc., or training aids such as tackling or blocking equipment or similar devices are to be used. These 3 days are to be used primarily for physical conditioning, sprints, agility drills, etc.

Section 5.

All organized and formal contact football practices by players or teams shall be limited to the period beginning August 15 and terminating no later than the Association Semi-State play-off date except for teams involved in the play-offs.

Section 6.

All football practices shall be held on the regular practice or play facilities and under the direct supervision of the member school coach/es.

Section 7.

There shall be ten separate days of organized football practice by each player preceding participation in interschool contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day. Non-contact practices may be counted toward this requirement.

* * * *

- Q.1 Does the rule requiring football practices to be held on the regular practice or play field under the direct supervision of the high school coaching staff prevent summer football camps for high school teams and players?
- A. Yes.

RULE 27 - GOLF

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

Section 1.

The United States Golf Association Rules shall govern with such exceptions as the Board deems necessary. When USGA rules conflict with any Association rules, the Association rules take precedence.

Section 2.

Member school students may participate in independent golf tourneys and meets during the summer vacation period without violating their amateur standing provided they do not accept cash or merchandise prizes or the equivalent thereof. Medals or trophies may be accepted.

Section 3.

It is not considered a violation of present Association rules for a member school, during the summer vacation period, to sponsor a team composed entirely of its own students in such sports as baseball, tennis, and golf. While an athletic contest conducted under this interpretation would be similar to that of other independent amateur organizations, it is recommended that participating schools, through their principals, mutually agree to abide by Association rules except for such modification as may be necessary.

Section 4.

The Golf season is defined as beginning and ending with the school year.

RULE 28 - GYMNASTICS

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

Section 1.

The National Federation Edition of Boys Gymnastics Rules shall govern.

Section 2.

There shall be ten separate days of organized practice under the direct supervision of the high school coaching staff by each player preceding participation in interschool contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day.

Section 3.

The Gymnastics season is defined as beginning and ending with the school year.

RULE 29 - SWIMMING

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

Section 1.

The Intercollegiate Swimming Guide for interschool swimming shall govern.

Section 2.

There shall be ten separate days of organized practice under the direct supervision of the high school coaching staff by each player preceding participation in interschool contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day.

Section 3.

The Swimming season is defined as beginning and ending with the school year.

RULE 30 — TENNIS

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

Section 1.

The United States Lawn Tennis Association Rules shall govern.

Section 2.

It is not considered a violation of present Association rules for a member school, during the summer vacation period, to sponsor a team composed entirely of its own students in such sports as baseball, softball, tennis, and golf. While an athletic contest conducted under this interpretation would be similar to that of other independent amateur organizations, it is recommended that participating schools, through their principals, mutually agree to abide by Association rules except for such modifications as may be necessary.

Section 3.

The Tennis season is defined as beginning with the opening day of school, or September 1 if school is not in session, and ending with the last day of school each year.

RULE 31 — TRACK AND FIELD

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

Section 1.

The National Alliance Edition of Track and Field rules shall govern in track and field with the following exceptions:

 The section regarding a Games Committee in Rule 2, shall be void.

- b. Scoring: In the State Final Meet, places in the relays shall count as follows: First 10 points; Second, 8 points; third, 6 points; fourth, 4 points; and fifth, 2 points.
 - (Note: All other scoring will follow outline in National Alliance Track and Field Rules Book).
- c. Events: The events in all meets shall be 100 yard dash; 220 yard dash; 440 yard dash; half-mile run; mile run; 120 yard high hurdles; 180 yard low hurdles; discus, running high jump; running long jump; pole vault; putting 12-lb. shot; two-mile run, mile relay and half-mile relay.
- d. Order of Events:
 120 yard high hurdles trials; 100 yard dash trials; 180 yard low hurdles trials; 220 yard dash trials; 120 yard high hurdles final; mile run; 100 yard dash final; 440 yard dash; 880 yard run, 220 yard dash final; 180 yard low hurdles final; two-mile run; mile relay; half-mile relay. Note: All track meets, including dual, shall use this order of events.
- e. A contestant who participates in the two-mile run shall not be allowed to participate in any other track event in which he runs 880 or more yards. Note: In the State Meet Series no contestant in the 880 yard run, mile run or two-mile run may participate in any other race of 880 or more yards.
- f. No contestant shall participate in more than three events (track and/or field) during any season contests or during the State Meet series.

Section 2.

There shall be ten separate days of organized practice in track and field under the direct supervision of the high school coaching staff by each player preceding participation in interschool contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day.

Section 3.

The Track and Field season is defined as beginning and ending with the school year.

RULE 32 - WRESTLING

Note: See Rule 9 which applies to all sports.

Section 1.

The Intercollegiate Wrestling Guide for High School Wrestling shall govern.

Section 2.

The maximum number of dual meets for the regular schedule of any student or team in wrestling shall be fourteen. A student or team may participate in the following: (a) Fourteen interschool dual meets and one tournament in addition to the State Tournament Series, or (b) additional tournaments may be scheduled and each shall count as two of the fourteen dual meets. Each weigh-in for any

tournament shall count as only one weigh-in toward the minimum requirements for State Tournament Series qualification.

Note: An interschool wrestling meet which involves three or more schools shall be considered a tournament.

Section 3.

There shall be no scheduled wrestling meets or tourneys before November 20 each school year or after the State Final Championship Wrestling Tourney. The penalty is suspension.

Section 4.

All organized or formal wrestling practice by students or teams shall be limited to the period beginning November 1 and ending with the date of the State Final Championship Wrestling Tourney each school year. Students who practice or participate in out-of-season wrestling make themselves ineligible for all interschool athletics until the closing date of the State Wrestling Championship Tourney the following year.

Section 5.

There shall be ten separate days of organized practice in wrestling under the direct supervision of the high school coaching staff by each player preceding participation in inter-school contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day.

Section 6.

During the weigh-in period for dual meets, each coach shall record the name of the student who is to wrestle in each weight classification. These students shall wrestle unless they are unable to do so because of illness or other extenuating circumstances. Substitutions can be made only by mutual consent of the coaches. Penalty: Forfeiture of the match. One additional eligible student in each weight class may be weighed-in at dual meets and tournaments for the purpose of meeting minimum weight classification requirements for the state tournament series.

Section 7.

A student shall be considered as having engaged in a bout if he has officially weighed in, his name has been recorded in the official scorebook, and has appeared on the mat in uniform, willing to wrestle.

Section 8.

Each time a student enters a dual meet or tournament his actual weight shall be recorded in the official scorebook in ink and signed by the referee at weigh-in time. The home scorebook shall be the official book.

Section 9.

A student may wrestle only in his certified weight class determined in December or in one division above his certified class.

Q.1 What is a dual meet?

A meet in which only two schools participate. When three or more schools are involved, it is considered a tournament.

PART II - JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL INTERSCHOOL ATHLETICS

Section 1.

Grade 9 students and/or grade 9 teams in schools having junior membership may participate on the following basis:

- a. A student must meet all the eligibility rules of the Association in all respects.
- h. Teams may compete against only ninth and/or tenth grade teams from other member schools. This does not affect girls playdays, camps or clinics.
- c. Schools may participate in tourneys and meets in accordance with the membership regulations in Article III, Section 4, of the IHSAA Constitution.
- Schools may not use students below the ninth grade on their own ninth grade athletic teams in interschool games.
- Member schools may not compete with schools who do not hold junior membership if such schools are eligible for membership.
- f. A ninth grade student who is eligible in a school having junior membership may compete on either his team or the parent high school team, but not on both. A student who is advanced to the high school team in one sport may not return to his school team in that sport. (Note: It is strongly recommended that ninth grade students

in schools holding junior memberships participate only on their teams.)

- g. A ninth grade student may not participate in a contest with or against a student enrolled in a grade lower than the ninth.
- h. The principal is responsible to the Association for the conduct of athletics in that school.
- i. It is strongly recommended that the spirit and philosophy of the rules and the regulations of the Association be followed by schools in conducting their athletic program for students below the ninth grade. NOTE: Schools holding junior memberships are subject to all rules and regulations of the Association with modifications

given above.

PART III - GIRLS' INTERSCHOOL ATHLETICS

POLICIES AND STANDARDS GOVERNING THE ADMINISTRATION OF GIRLS' INTERSCHOOL ATHLETICS

Competitive sports are an important part of the total physical education program and opportunities for instruction and participation should be included in the educational experiences of every girl in the secondary school. Sports are an integral part of the culture in which we live and are valuable social tools which may be used to enrich the lives of girls in our society. Sports opportunities of all levels of skill should be available to girls who wish to take advantage of these experiences.

In the secondary schools, a program of intramural participation should be arranged to augment a sound and comprehensive instructional program in physical education for all girls. Interschool programs should not be organized until after there are broad instructional programs and a sufficient allotment of time, facilities, and personnel for new programs. The interschool program should not be promoted at the expense of the instructional or intramural programs.

When properly organized and conducted, interschool athletics should provide numerous opportunities for girls to participate in activities which promote self-confidence, growth and development, leadership qualities, and the establishment of desirable interpersonal relationships. These values are more readily attained when the program is based upon accepted standards and practices. When favorable conditions are present, competitive experiences may be wholesome and beneficial and result in acceptable conduct and attitudes. The adoption of practices best suited for the attainment of desirable outcomes is the responsibility of all associated with competitive events. Schools, players, teachers, coaches, officials, and spectators must share the responsibility for valid practices in competitive sports for high school girls.

The rules and regulations for girls' interschool athletics of the Association are based upon the following principles and policies. Those schools who wish to offer an interschool program in grades nine through twelve must adhere to these policies.

PHILOSOPHY FOR GIRLS' INTERSCHOOL ATHLETICS (DGWS)

A. THE ADMINISTRATOR

- The principal shall be responsible for the realization of the values and objectives for which an athletic program is conducted.
- 2. The principal shall ensure the accomplishment of his purpose by the selection of qualified teachers and leaders and by the delegation of certain responsibilities and authority to them.

B. THE LEADERSHIP

- 1. Competent coaching is necessary to assure desirable outcomes.
- 2. The coaches shall exemplify through their behavior those personal and professional qualities which will influence the development of high ideals and standards in others.
- 3. The coach should provide opportunity for participation by the players in planning, conducting, and evaluating the athletic program.

C THE PARTICIPANT

- The participant should derive maximum personal satisfaction from athletics which offer a challenge and foster an appreciation for the skill of others.
- 2. The participant should enhance her personal growth and development through the competitive and cooperative aspects of athletics.
- 3. The participant shall be aware of her responsibility for perpetuating the spirit of fair play which epitomizes ideal athletics.

D. THE OFFICIAL

1. The trained official shall carry out her responsibilities in such a way that the benefits of competition may be realized.

E. NATURE AND CONDUCT OF THE PROGRAM

- 1. The welfare of the participant shall be of primary concern in the conduct of the athletic program.
- 2. The program should be directed, coached, and officiated by qualified women.
- 3. A diverse and well-balanced program should provide maximum opportunity for the participation of players of all skill levels according to their needs and interests.
- 4. A sound and inclusive instructional program should be augmented by a varied intramural and interschool program.
- 5. Knowledge based on current research concerning physical, social and emotional needs of the participant should be basic to the planning of girls' athletic programs.
- 6. The financing of the girls' athletic program should be included in the total athletic budget.
- 7. The objectives of the athletic program shall be consistent with the educational aims of the school.
- 8. Expediency shall not take precedence over principle in the administration of the athletic program.
- DGWS approved rules and standards should be used in all sports unless so modified by the Board.

F. IMPLEMENTATION AND EVALUATION

- 1. Women responsible for leadership in girls' athletic programs shall be involved in formulating policies for these programs.
- 2. The athletic program should be evaluated frequently according to standards and guidelines established by DGWS and criteria based on sound educational philosophy and scientific research.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR GIRLS' ATHLETICS

The Advisory Committee for Girls' Athletics was organized in April of 1972 for the purpose of advising the Board and Council in the areas of control and direction for the girls' athletic program.

Members of this committee include a girls' physical educator from each of the five Association districts, a representative from the Council, a representative from the Indiana League of High School Girls' Athletic Association, a representative from the Indiana Division for Girls and Women's Sports, a representative from the Indiana High School Athletic Directors Association, and the IHSAA Director of Girls' Athletics.

TYPES OF COMPETITION FOR GIRLS

- A. Intramural competition is sports competition in which all participants are identified with the same school. Such teams are usually formed from school units such as classes, home rooms, clubs, etc.
- B. Interschool competition involves the following:
 - 1. Playdays—An informal type of competition in which girls from more than two schools participate on a team that does not represent one school.
 - 2. Sportsday—School participates as a unit and has developed team skills. A sportsday might include one or more activities,
 - 3. Telegraphic Meets—Results are compared by wire or mail.
 - 4. Invitational Meets-Games or matches to which a school invites one or more teams or individuals to participate.
 - 5. Interschool Programs—Groups which are trained and coached to play a series of scheduled games and/or tournaments with like teams from other schools.

RECOGNIZED AND APPROVED SPORTS

The following are sports sanctioned for interschool competition for high school girls:

TEAM SPORTS

- Basketball
- Field Sports
 - a) field hockey
 - soccer
 - speed ball
 - d) speed-a-way
- Softball
- Volleyball

INDIVIDUAL SPORTS

- Archery
- Badminton
- Bowling
- Cross Country
- 5) Golf
- **Gymnastics**
- Swimming
- Tennis
- Track & Field

GIRLS' RULES AND REGULATIONS

Unless otherwise specified in the paragraphs which here follow, the rules and regulations of the Association which pertain to certification of eligibility, parents and physicians' certificates, age, etc. for high school boys shall apply to high school girls.

The rules outlined herein are applicable to only the interschool program offered by the school and do not apply to intramural activities.

RULE 101-OFFICIAL RULES

Section 1.

For girls' interschool contests, current rules of DGWS of the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation must be used except when so modified by the Board of Control. Rules for sports not covered by DGWS rules must be approved by the Association.

RULE 102-RULE COVERAGE

Section 1. Grade Level

Girls must be enrolled in grades nine, ten, eleven or twelve in schools belonging to the Association in order to participate.

Section 2. Girls' Official Athletic Participation Card

Schools must designate sponsored girls interschool sports on the Girls' Official Athletic Participation Card to be filed in the Association office by September 15 of each year.

Section 3. Football

The Association does not approve football type games (flag. touch. tag, powder-puff, etc.) as a part of the girls' interschool program.

RULE 103-ADMINISTRATION OF PROGRAM

Section 1.

Administrative Responsibilities

The principal of each member school is recognized as the representative of his school and as such is accountable to the Association for the conduct of the girls' interschool athletic program.

Section 2. Women Physical Education Teachers

The interschool program for girls should be directed by qualified women physical educators. It is strongly recommended that no program expand beyond the ability of the department of physical education to conduct and direct it.

Section 3. Coaches

- a. If teachers other than trained women physical educators are utilized to coach, they should work closely with the girls' physical education department.
- b. Where it is impossible for women coaches to conduct the interschool program the male coach should be thoroughly knowledgeable with DGWS standards of conduct, conditioning, training, rules and techniques.

Section 4. Female Advisor

a. Where there is a male coach, there must be a female advisor who is employed by the school system as a fulltime certificated employee.

Duties of female advisor:

) Be present at practices, contests and meetings.

2) Accompany team to all events which involve travel and/or overnight trips.

RULE 104—CONTESTS

Section 1. Participation

In order to participate in interschool competition, a girl must engage in a program within her own school involving practice, conditioning, and instruction. See Section 6 of this rule for precompetition practice requirements for each sport.

a. The sport season should include at least three weeks of precompetition practice, training and conditioning.

The pre-competition practice period of actual physical participation shall not exceed 1 1/2 hours per day.

c. The participant may take part in no more than five activity periods per calendar week including games, meets and practices.

Section 2.

Boys and girls' gymnastics, track and field, and swimming meets may take place simultaneously. All points must be allotted separately to each team to determine a boys winner and a girls winner both individually and team wise. The events included in the meet for girls must be those recommended by the official rule book in that particular sport by DGWS.

Section 3. Intramural Participation

Interschool activities should be conducted as an outgrowth of the intramural program in that sport.

Section 4. Curtain Raisers

Girls' athletic contests shall not be conducted as preliminaries, curtain raisers or double headers to other non-school sponsored athletic team sport events.

Section 5. Contest Limitations

- a. Girls' teams shall not compete on the interschool level against a boy's team. Girls' teams must be composed of girls only for interschool contests. Girls shall not compete on the interschool level on boys teams.
- b. See Section 6 for required contest limitations in each sport.
 c. There shall be no more than two contests per sport scheduled
- per calendar week.
 d. Girls may participate on only one interschool team during a sports season excluding telegraphic meets or tournaments.

Rule 104 - Section 6

SPORTS SEASONS & PRACTICES

The recommended length of a sport season should not exceed a maximum of twelve (12) consecutive school weeks except for those activities which require a high level of conditioning for safety. Track and field, gymnastics, and swimming are sports which require more pre-competition practice, training, and conditioning and, thus more than three weeks or pre-competition practice is recommended.

Section 7. Game Contracts

Game contracts for girls' interschool contests must be negotiated on IHSAA contract forms.

RULE 105—FINANCES

Section 1.

It is recommended that financing of girls' interschool programs be included in the total athletic budget or other school approved organizational funds.

Section 2. Paid Admissions

Paid admissions for girls' interschool contests shall be the prerogative of the sponsoring school.

The following guidelines are suggested for schools who desire to charge admission:

a. Admission should not be charged to bus drivers, participants, coaches, car drivers, officials, or any other personnel directly involved in the administration of the contest.

b. If admission is charged, any licensed official should be paid. All profits must be retained by the home school.

c. If in a combined meet (track and field, swimming, and gymnastics) admission is charged, it is suggested that a percentage of the gate be allotted to the girls' athletic fund if such a fund is separate from that of the boys.

Admission charges for sanctioned IHSAA sectional, regional, or state meets will be determined by the Association.

RULE 106—OFFICIALS

Section 1. Qualifications and Responsibilities of Officials

 a. Officials with current OSA ratings should be employed for girls' interschool contests.

b. All women officials contracted by member schools must be licensed by the Association.

c. When a sufficient number of licensed officials are not available, permission to use non-licensed officials must be obtained from the Association office.

Section 2. Officiating Fees

The local officiating fees are determined by the school offering the contract. DGWS rulebooks for each sport contain guidlines for payment to officials.

Section 3.

Officials' Contracts

All officials should be contracted on the IHSAA Officials' Contract Forms.

Section 4.

Officials' Attire

All officials should wear approved emblems and clothing recommended by DGWS and the IHSAA.

RULE 107-TRAVEL

Transportation shall be provided for trips in carriers approved by school administrators.

Section 1.

Limitations

- a. Competition shall be limited to a geographic area which will allow participants to travel at reasonable hours.
- b. Travel late at night or overnight trips should be avoided unless impossible to do so.
- c. Travel shall not exceed 100 miles one way except for sectional regional, or state competition leading to a tournament winner. Travel beyond these limits must be approved by the Association.
- d. Each traveling group shall be under the chaperonage of the designated female advisor.
- e. Each vehicle shall include an adult designated by the school administration for the purpose of adult supervision.

RULE 108-BASKETBALL

Section 1.

The official rules of DGWS shall be the official rules used for girls basketball.

Section 2.

All organized or formal basketball practices by girls or girls' teams shall be limited to the period beginning November 1 and ending by March 31 of each school year.

Section 3.

No interschool girls' basketball games shall be played prior to December 1 of each year.

Section 4.

The maximum number of games for the regular schedule of any girls' team in basketball shall be 12. (The penalty is suspension).

Section 5.

All games other than first-team games shall be played in quarters of six minutes in length.

Section 6.

A player may participate in a maximum of 48 quarters of interschool basketball, and one invitational tournament during any one season. If a player participates in two invitational tournaments, the quarters played in one tourney, shall be included in the 48 quarters permitted during the season.

Section 7.

A record of quarters played in basketball by individual players shall be kept on file to certify eligibility.

Section 8.

"Donkey Basketball," "Skruball," "Skateball" or any similar game in which a basketball and/or basketball goals are used shall be considered a game of basketball. Students who participate in "Donkey Basketball," "Skruball," "Skateball," or similar games shall be subject to Association eligibility rules as in regular basketball games.

Section 9.

There shall be ten separate days of organized practice in basketball under the direct supervision of the coaching staff by each player preceding participation in interschool contests. Only one practice may be counted for any one day.

Section 10.

No invitational interschool basketball tourney which involves more than four schools, shall be held without the sanction of the Association. If a school intends to conduct an invitational basketball tournament with more than four schools involved, the Association must receive the "Request For Tournament" form at least one month prior to the scheduled date of such a tournament.

INDIANA LEAGUE OF HIGH SCHOOL GIRLS' ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

-Purpose-

Many girls in high school are interested in a more extensive program of physical education than can be provided in the regular physical education classes. This desire for a more extensive physical education program has led many high schools to organize some type of girls' athletic association. In 1931 the Indiana League of High School Girls' Athletic Association was formed, with the purpose of stimulating the co-curricular phase of the high school girls' physical education program. Membership in the League is open to any high school in the State of Indiana. The League has the endorsement of

the Indiana High School Athletic Association and the Division of Health and Physical Education of the Indiana State Board of Health.

The State League offers much to both physical education teachers and students. It provides opportunities for sponsors and students to exchange ideas, share problems, receive encouragement, and engage in a variety of learning activities. The enthusiasm generated through the enjoyment of learning and doing things with people of like interests is one of the main reasons the League is steadily growing.

-Activities-

Each organization carries on its own program of varied activities for which points are given. The purpose of awarding points is to encourage regularity of attendance and to furnish a uniform basis for awards, if a school desires to use awards. The Sponsor's Handbook explains the suggested point system.

The State League sponsors activities on both a state and a district basis. Each spring the League, with the co-operation of a state college or university physical education department as host, sponsors a Wall Plaque Winners' playday. Attending this playday is perhaps as great an honor as winning the wall plaque, for here outstanding girls from all over Indiana come together for a day of fun and sport. Each fall the League sponsors a State Leadership Camp—training girls and inspiring both girls and sponsors to be better leaders in their organizations, schools and communities. District activities include dance days, playdays, basketball clinics, and week-end camps—usually two or three such activities each year.

"Sportingly Yours," published six times yearly, contains news of other G.A.A. groups, ideas, new materials, bulletin board materials, and professional articles. Both sponsors and students find it interesting and helpful. "Sportingly Yours," the official organ of the Indiana League, is edited by a high school G. A. A. and is published by the Indiana State Board of Health.

* * * *

- Q.1 Are girls bound by the rules and regulations of the IHSAA?
- A. Yes, all students on all teams in high school belonging to the IHSAA are bound by its rules and regulations.
- Q.2 May girls play basketball according to boys' rules?
- A. No, girls must play according to rules published by the Division for Girls and Women's Sports of the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation.
- Q.3 May men coach girls in athletic games?
- A. Yes. It is recommended, however, that women coaches and women officials be employed for girls' athletics.
- Q.4 May girls' basketball teams play in state tourneys or national tourneys?
- A. No.

PART IV — NATIONAL FEDERATION OF STATE HIGH SCHOOL ASSOCIATIONS

Indiana was admitted in 1924. The National Federation was organized in 1920 and now consists of 50 member state high school associations. Canadian provinces of Manitoba, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Ontario, Prince Edward Island and Saskatchewan are affiliated.

These state associations have united to secure the benefits of cooperative action which eliminates unnecessary duplication of work and which increases efficiency through the pooling and coordinating of efforts of all who are engaged in high school athletic activities,

The legislative body is the National Council made up of one representative from each member state association. Such representative must be an officer or a member of his state board of control. The executive body is the Executive Committee of eight members elected by the National Council from the membership of the Boards of Control, Commissioners and executive secretaries of member state associations from eight territorial sections as outlined in the constitution. Terms are staggered and for three years.

The growth in size and influence of the state high school associations and their National Federation insures some degree of teamwork on the part of 20,100 high schools and this teamwork has enabled them to formulate policies and plans for improving high school athletic conditions and to make these plans function. The National Federation probably represents the largest closely knit organized body of athletes in the world. The opportunities for contributing to the welfare of the high school athletic program are unlimited.

The Federation was organized primarily to secure proper adherence to the eligibility rules of the various state associations in interstate contests and meets. As the prestige of the national organization grew, a program for the sanctioning of interstate meets was developed. This later led to definite action relative to national and sectional athletic events. At the present time, no national athletic meet or tournament is sanctioned. Meets or tournaments, which involve the schools of more than one state, are sanctioned in accordance with definite limitations in connection with the distance to be traveled, the type of sponsor, the amount of school time involved, and extent to which such events interfere with smaller meets which insure participation by greater numbers of those who need the training. The scope of the National Federation work has broadened so that all high school athletic and many non-athletic groups profit through an exchange of experiences and a pooling of interests.

The activities of the National Federation are based on the belief strong state and national high school athletic organizations are necessary to protect the athletic interests of the high schools, to promote an ever increasing growth of a type of interscholastic athletics which is educational in both objective and method and which can be justified as an integral part of the high school curriculum, and to protect high school boys from exploitation for purposes having no educational implications. To accomplish these things, it is necessary for high school men to exercise teamwork on a nationwide scale.

HISTORY OF IHSAA

The first attempt to organize the high schools of Indiana in a single Association for the purpose of handling athletic activities was made in a meeting of the Northern Indiana Teachers' Association held at Richmond in April, 1903. At this time there was a conference of high school principals, and the conference ended with a body of suggested rules and regulations, called the Richmond Agreement. Due to the fact that there was no central organization having executive power, the Richmond Agreement did little more than point the way toward something better.

Principal J. B. Pearcy, of Anderson, issued a call for a meeting of high school principals interested in a State Athletic organization for December 5, 1903. At this meeting a provisional constitution was adopted. At a similar meeting on December 29, 1903, a final constitution was adopted and a Board of Control of three members was chosen to administer the affairs of the IHSAA.

The first Board of Control was made up of Principal George W. Benton, Shortridge High School, Indianapolis; Superintendent Lotus D. Coffman, Salem, and Principal J. T. Giles, Marion. These men thought and planned well, and we are enjoying the fruits of their vision.

There were fifteen (15) high schools belonging to the IHSAA, March 1, 1904. The membership had a gradual growth through the years, and now includes almost all of the high schools in the state. The peak membership of eight hundred twenty (820) was reached in 1942, the year that private, parochial and institutional schools were admitted to the Association.

In the beginning, one member of the Board of Control served as Secretary, but it soon became very evident that this office furnished enough work for a special man. It was also seen that the future of the organization demanded that the office of Secretary be made more permanent than the office of Board Member. Accordingly, at the annual meeting in 1906 the office of Permanent Secretary was established, and Principal J. T. Giles of Marion was chosen by the Principals to be the first Permanent Secretary. Principal Giles resigned on December 26, 1912, and Principal Isaac E. Neff, South Bend, was chosen by the principals to succeed him. Principal Neff resigned March 15, 1913, and the Board of Control appointed Principal Arthur L. Trester from Alexandria to serve as Permanent Secretary until the next annual meeting in December, 1913. At this meeting, Principal Trester was chosen by the principals as Permanent Secretary.

The Board of Control consisted of three members, chosen by the principals in their annual meetings, until the annual meeting of October 27, 1916. At this meeting it was decided to divide the State into five districts for administrative and representative purposes, and that each district should have one representative on the Board of Control, chosen by mail ballot from his own district by the principals of his district.

In September, 1925, by a referendum vote the principals passed a legislative body proposal calling for four members from each of the five (5) IHSAA districts. The five members of the Board of Control, serving ex officio, and the fifteen other members elected by the principals in a mail vote constituted this legislative body. Prior to this plan all legislation was done at the annual meeting or by referendum voting by mail. This Legislative Body of twenty members passed on all proposals submitted by the high school principals. It was the law making body of the Association. The plan was considered a step in advance in state administration and legislation in athletic activities.

On December 13, 1930, the Legislative Body considered and passed without a dissenting vote the provisions for an Athletic Council. The plan in full continued the five IHSAA districts in the state and arranged for five representatives on the Athletic Council from each district by classes determined by enrollments in the high schools, thus making the Athletic Council a body of twenty-five members representing all sizes of high schools and all districts of the state at all times and elected by the high school principals in the membership. A provision was included for the selection of a 5-man Board of Control from the membership of the Athletic Council by the members of the Athletic Council. The Athletic Council took over the duties of the former Legislative Body and is considered the law making body of the Association.

The title "Permanent Secretary," established in 1906, was changed to "Commissioner of High School Athletics" in October, 1929, by the Legislative Body, and the Commissioner was granted the powers and duties belonging to a Commissioner of Athletics. Mr. Trester continued to serve as commissioner until the date of his death, September 18, 1944. The Board of Control designated Superintendent Morris E. McCarty of Lafayette to serve as Acting Commissioner. In December, 1944, Principal L. V. Phillips of Vincennes was chosen Commissioner to take office January 1, 1945. In 1944, the Board of Control was given authority to employ an Assistant Commissioner. Robert S. Hinshaw, Director of Athletics in Rushville High School, was chosen in November 1945 to take office December 10, 1945 to become the first Assistant Commissioner of Athletics for the IHSAA. In July, 1961, Herman F. Keller of Evansville Bosse High School became the second Assistant Commissioner of Athletics after the death of Mr. Hinshaw. On the retirement of L. V. Phillips, July 31, 1962, the Board of Control selected Phil N. Eskew, Superintendent, Huntington Public Schools, as the third Commissioner of Athletics. The Board conferred the title of "Honorary Commissioner" on L. V. Phillips. On August 1, 1969, Ward E. Brown, Principal of Crawfordsville High School, was selected as Assistant Commissioner to work with Mr. Eskew and Mr. Keller, and on January 1, 1972, Miss Patricia Roy of East Gary was selected as Director of Girls' Athletics for the Association.

The primary purpose of the organizers of the IHSAA, to manage and to foster high school athletics on a high plane, has been upheld as an ideal by the Association through the life of the IHSAA. New and advanced steps have been taken whenever conditions made

them necessary. In the beginning, the Association concerned itself largely with track and football. As time went on it became increasingly evident that the IHSAA should assume the initiative for a well balanced athletic program to meet the needs of all schools and all students desiring to participate in athletics. The Association now sponsors football, baseball, cross country, basketball, swimming, wrestling, golf, tennis, gymnastics, track and field, and girls' play days. State championships are determined in tennis, cross country, swimming, wrestling, basketball, track, golf, gymnastics and baseball.

A study of the men who have served on the Board of Control through the years will show clearly that the activities of the IHSAA have been in good hands. The titles and addresses are given as they were when the men were Board of Control members. A complete list of former Board members follows:

Board Of Control Meetings

IHSAA BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Indianapolis, Indiana, August 18, 1971

PRESENT: President R. M. Liechty, Cecil R. Erwin, Lester J. Page, Fred F. Park, Clifford Swim, Commissioner Phil N. Eskew and Assistant Commissioners Herman F. Keller and Ward E. Brown

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as written.

POWERS AND DUTIES

As is the custom at the August Meeting of the Board of Control, the Commissioner reviewed in detail the powers and duties of the Board, the Commissioner and the Assistant Commissioners as set forth in the IHSAA Constitution and By-Laws.

IHSAA OFFICE

Ernst and Ernst, certified public accountants, had completed the audit of the IHSAA finances for the year, July 1, 1970 to June 30, 1971. Each member of the Board was provided with a copy of this audit. It is understood that a copy of the audit will be published in the 1971 Handbook.

All members of the Board of Control, the Commissioner and the Assistant Commissioners visited the safe deposit vault at the American Fletcher National Bank and Trust Company where the securities of the IHSAA were checked. It is understood that a listing of these securities will be printed in the 1971 Handbook.

IHSAA SECURITIES

The Commissioner reported that U. S. Treasury Bonds due August 15, in the amount of \$15,000.00 were exchanged for U. S. Treasury Bonds due August 15, 1981 at 7% interest.

ANNUAL MEETING

Tentative plans for the annual meeting of the IHSAA, November 4, 1971, at the Fairgrounds were discussed. The Commissioner reported that he had secured Mr. Bernie Saggau, Commissioner of the Iowa High School Association as the speaker.

SECONDARY SCHOOL PRINCIPALS ASSOCIATION

Approval was given for the payment of \$75.00 to the Indiana Association of Secondary School Principals to be applied on the expenses of the Association's annual program.

HEALTH, PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND RECREATION

As has been the custom for several years, the Board voted to make available upon request a sum not to exceed \$50.00 to each of the divisions of Indiana Health, Physical Education and Recreation Associa-

tions for securing a speaker outside Indiana for their meetings held at the time of the Indiana State Teachers' Association Meeting.

RULES CLINICS AND FILMS

Assistant Commissioner Keller reported to the Board on the rules clinics and films being sponsored for the IHSAA and local officials associations throughout the state.

The Board unanimously approved required attendance at a minimum of one rules clinic for football, basketball, baseball and wrestling coaches.

CROSS COUNTRY

The Board approved work done on the Cross Country Meet Series and directed the Commissioner's office to proceed with other details and publish all information in the August Bulletin.

TENNIS

Plans for the State Tennis Meet Series were approved by the Board with instructions to publish all information in the August Bulletin.

NEW MEMBERS

Membership applications from Fort Wayne Northrop, Fort Wayne Wayne, Michigan City Rogers and Terre Haute South Vigo High Schools were approved. Approval was also given to applications from Center Grove Junior High (Greenwood) and Madison Junior High.

SUPERVISOR FOR GIRLS' ATHLETICS

On July 9, a letter was mailed to all member school principals notifying them that the Board plans to employ a lady to serve as supervisor for girls' athletics and suggesting if they knew anyone who was interested to have them make application. The GAA Committee asked Sally Dill, the President of IHSLGAA, to write her district chairmen and ask them to submit names of qualified persons.

The Board instructed the Commissioner to send letters to all persons whose names were suggested. This letter is to instruct those persons to make formal application to the IHSAA not later than September 15, if they are interested in being considered for such a position.

COURT CASES

The Commissioner reviewed the status of the pending court cases for members of the Board.

GYMNASTICS CLINIC

Approval was given for the IHSAA to sponsor a gymnastics clinic. Coach John Hinds of Columbus, who is chairman of the National Rules Committee, is to assist the IHSAA in details of the clinic.

ATHLETIC COUNCIL MEMBERSHIP

An interpretation was requested on Article IV, Section 3 d. If a member of the Athletic Council was employed by the State Department of Public Instruction and was assigned to the district which he represents would be maintain his eligibility for membership on the Council?

It was the opinion of the Board he would not be eligible under such circumstances to continue membership since he represented no specific school and was not paid by any school corporation.

EAST NOBLE HIGH SCHOOL (KENDALLVILLE)—DAVID McCLISH

This student lived with his mother in the Garrett school district and attended school there. During the summer he moved to the East Noble school district to live with his father. Principal Tritch asked the Board to determine David's eligibility.

DECISION

Under rule 22, section 6g, David is ineligible for one calendar year from the date of his enrollment in East Noble High School.

EDGEWOOD HIGH SCHOOL (ELLETTSVILLE) — DONALD WARTHAN

Due to an oversight in checking scholastic requirements, this student participated in interscholastic athletics during the second semester of the 1970-71 school year while ineligible. When this was discovered Donald was declared ineligible for the remainder of that semester and his next semester in school. Principal McConnell asked the Board to review the case and declare Donald eligible for the fall semester of the 1971-72 school year.

DECISION

Under rule 16, section 3, Donald is ineligible for the first semester of this school year (1971-72).

EDINBURG HIGH SCHOOL—TERRY MOSIER

Terry has been living with his mother in Columbus, where he attended school through the ninth grade. During this summer he moved to live with his father in Edinburg. Principal McCullum of Edinburg asked the Board to determine his eligibility.

DECISION

Under rule 22, section 6g, Terry is ineligible for one calendar year from the date of his enrollment in Edinburg High School.

INDIANAPOLIS NORTHWEST HIGH SCHOOL — TIMOTHY KEVIN

Due to a mixup in this boys' schedule he only took three and onehalf credits during the second semester of the 1970-71 school year. He did not take any courses during the summer to make up the onehalf credit. Principal Kenneth Smartz asked the Board to determine Timothy's eligibility.

DECISION

Under rule 20, section 1, Timothy is ineligible this entire semester as he did not meet the scholastic standards for eligibility.

MARION HIGH SCHOOL—BARTON SMITH

This student attended Marion Community Schools from kindergarten through the tenth grade. During the eleventh grade he withdrew and enrolled in Culver Military Academy. He has now returned to Marion High School for the 1971-72 school year. Principal William McColly of Marion asked the Board to determine the student's eligibility.

DECISION

Since this is a violation of rule 22, section 6d, Barton is ineligible for one calendar year from the date of his re-enrollment in Marion High School.

SPEEDWAY HIGH SCHOOL-MIKE S. WALKER

This student is a ward of the Tippecanoe County Welfare Department. During the 1970-71 school year he was in a home in Lafayette where he attended Tecumseh Junior High School. On August 12, 1971, he was placed in the foster home of Mr. and Mrs. Heidenreich, which is in the Speedway High School district. Principal Troth asked the Board to consider Mike's eligibility under the unavoidable change of residence rule.

DECISION

Mike S. Walker may be considered eligible as to residence at Speedway High School.

The Board of Control adjourned to meet again in Indianapolis on September 15, 1971, at 9:30 a.m.

VALPARAISO DECISION

By unanimous vote the Board instructed Mr. Bell to file an appeal in the decision of Judge Eschbach in the Charles Wellsand vs Valparaiso and IHSAA Case.

MARRIAGE RULE

- 1. The Board authorized the following statement to member schools: After a thorough discussion with our attorney regarding the Valparaiso High School case decision made by U. S. District Court Judge Eschbach—your Board of Control has decided that this rule is presently unenforceable and an appeal will be made to a higher court.
- 2. Therefore, a student presently CANNOT be declared ineligible solely because of marriage.
- 3. Where additional known facts would apply you may want to consider Rule 3, Section 5, which states:

 "The principal has the authority to exclude any contestant who because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not represent his school in a becoming manner."
 - a. This relates not to eligibility but to the principals' responsibility in selecting students to represent his school in interscholastic athletics.
 - Just remember that such reason would be required under oath in case of litigation.

CROWN POINT HIGH SCHOOL-LUIS GOMEZ DE LA VEGA

This student is an exchange student from Venezuela and is attending Crown Point High School. Principal Roger Childress has requested the Board to rule on Luis' eligibility.

DECISION

Luis Gomez de la Vega may be considered eligible as to residence at Crown Point High School.

EAST NOBLE HIGH SCHOOL (KENDALLVILLE)—STAFFORD MORSE

This student is an exchange student from Australia and is attending East Noble during his senior year. Principal Tritch has requested the Board to rule on his residence eligibility.

DECISION

Stafford Morse may be considered eligible as to residence at East Noble High School.

HOMESTEAD HIGH SCHOOL (FT. WAYNE)—LELIO PIAN-COSTELLI deSIQUEIRA

This student is an exchange student from Brazil and is attending Homestead during this school year. Principal Goldsberry has requested the Board to rule on Lelio's residence eligibility.

DECISION

Lelio Piancostelli deSiqueira may be considered eligible as to residence at Homestead High School during this school year.

OAK HILL HIGH SCHOOL (CONVERSE)—LOURIVAL LONGATO JUNQUEIRA

This student is an exchange student from Brazil and is attending Oak Hill for his senior year. Principal Kitch has requested a ruling on his residence eligibility.

DECISION

Lourival Longato Junqueira may be considered eligible as to residence at Oak Hill High School during his senior year.

This student is a ward of the court and has been assigned to live with Mrs. John Nelson, who lives in the Fayetteville school district. Principal Stanley Glenn of Fayetteville asked the Board to determine Steve's eligibility.

DECISION

Steve Staggs may be considered eligible as to residence in Fayetteville High School. However, Principal Glenn is instructed to check Steve's scholastic eligibility before he is permitted to participate.

LAFAYETTE JEFFERSON HIGH SCHOOL — MATTHEW BRIDGES

DECISION

Roger Hogg is ineligible for one calendar year at Tippecanoe Junior High School.

MADISON HEIGHTS HIGH SCHOOL (ANDERSON)—STEPHEN A. PINKERTON

This student lived in New Castle with his mother and attended school there. During the summer of 1971, he moved to live with his father who resides in the Madison Heights school district. Principal Robert Collier asked the Board to determine Steve's eligibility.

DECISION

Steve Pinkerton is ineligible as to residence for one calendar year from the date of his enrollment at Anderson Madison Heights. See

Rule 22, Section 6g, page 47 of the IHSAA Constitution and By-laws.

MADISON HEIGHTS HIGH SCHOOL (ANDERSON)—THOMAS YORK

This student attended Shenandoah High School last year, but he lived with a relative. He has now changed residence to live with a brother in the Madison Heights school district. His brother has been given guardianship papers for Thomas. Principal Robert Collier asked the Board to determine Thomas' eligibility.

DECISION

Thomas York has changed schools without a corresponding change of residence on the part of the people with whom he lived and is therefore ineligible for one calendar year from the date of his enrollment at Madison Heights.

NEEDMORE HIGH SCHOOL (BEDFORD)-MARK D. NEAL

This student lived with his mother and father in the Mitchell school district and attended school at Mitchell. Because the father and mother felt the boy would be better off living with younger people he was sent by the father to live with a brother-in-law in the Needmore district. DECISION

William Webb may be considered eligible as to residence at Short High School.

LOGANSPORT HIGH SCHOOL—DONALD BRUCE JAMES

This boy is a ward of the court of Texas County, Missouri, and has been placed in the home of his grandparents who live in the Logansport school district. Letters are on file from all parties concerned and Principal Hugh Leeman asked the Board to consider this case under the unavoidable change of residence rule.

DECISION

Donald James may be considered eligible as to residence at Logansport High School.

SPEEDWAY HIGH SCHOOL—KEVIN STRATTON

This student is a ward of the court and was placed in the custody of Mr. & Mrs. William Lahr who live in the Speedway district. Principal Troth asked the Board to consider this case under the unavoidable change of residence rule. Letters are on file from all parties concerned.

DECISION

Kevin Stratton may be considered eligible as to residence at Speedway High School.

MEMBERSHIPS

The Board approved the application of Marion Justice Junior High School for junior membership in the IHSAA.

BLOOMINGTON UNIVERSITY HIGH SCHOOL — WARREN STURRUP

The IHSAA Board of Control was notified of a hearing scheduled with Judge James M. Dixon in Monroe County Superior Court at Bloomington on behalf of Warren Sturrup who is a junior football player and wrestler enrolled in University High School.

Sturrup lived with his parents in Miami, Florida and attended Palmetto High School last year before moving to Bloomington to reside with his brother. After participating in three football games at University High School this year he and his brother were informed, in writing, by Dr. Robert Mahan, University High School Principal, that according to IHSAA Rule 22, Warren would be ineligible; the rule further provides that further written evidence may be obtained from his former high school principal stating that the change was unavoidable in order that the student have a home; and that after additional evidence is acquired, according to the rule, such must be referred to the Board of Control for final disposition.

The requested evidence was never acquired.

On Wednesday, October 6, Principal Mahan was served a legal notice of the hearing on a preliminary injunction scheduled for Friday, October 8.

Every effort was made by Commissioner Eskew in gathering accumulated evidence from the University High School principal and additional evidence was obtained from the parent, former principal and assistant principal of Palmetto High School. According to Rule 22, all such evidence is to be required by University High School principal before permitting the student to compete.

DECISION

According to Rule 22, Warren Sturrup cannot be considered eligible as to residence until he has been enrolled in University High School for one calendar year.

If and when additional pertinent evidence is received by the Board of Control, it will review the case.

IHSAA FINANCES

The Commissioner reported that \$20,000.00 in U. S. Treasury Bills due September 23, 1971, had been deposited to the checking account on August 23. He also reported that \$20,000.00 in Treasury Bills, due September 23, 1971, were deposited to the checking account September 15. Two certificates of deposit (\$200,000.00) came due September 23. Of this amount, \$80,000.00 was reinvested in a certificate of deposit, due December 23, 1971, at 5% interest. The remaining amount was deposited to the checking account for the regular distribution and current expenses.

WRESTLING

Some tentative plans were discussed concerning the wrestling tournament series. Final details will be worked out at the next meeting.

SWIMMING

Plans were discussed concerning the swimming meet series. Approval was given for each contestant to be eligible to enter three events, one of which must be a relay.

For large meets the scoring shall be based on twelve places.

GYMNASTICS

Preliminary plans were discussed concerning the state gymnastics meet series. The National Federation Rules will be followed for all gymnastics meets.

ANNUAL MEETING

IHSAA Annual Meeting plans were discussed. This meeting will be on November 4 at 10:00 a.m. in the Farmers Building Auditorium at the Fairgrounds.

VALPARAISO HIGH SCHOOL

Principal Garth Johnson and Athletic Director C. J. Doan appeared before the Board to discuss their concerns of the handling of the Wellsand vs. Valparaiso Community Schools case.

CASCADE HIGH SCHOOL (CLAYTON)—MARK LUTTRELL

This student's father died and left him without a home. Mark was placed in the home of his grandfather in the Cascade school district by the judge of the Putnam Circuit Court. Letters are on file from all parties concerned.

DECISION

Mark Luttrell may be considered eligible as to residence at Cascade High School.

CHESTERTON HIGH SCHOOL—BARBARA EGOLF

This is a foreign exchange student from Switzerland and Principal William Crockett asked the Board to determine her eligibility under Rule 12, Section 16.

DECISION

Barbara Egolf may be considered eligible as to residence at Chesterton High School.

FORT WAYNE WAYNE HIGH SCHOOL-JAMES KELLER JR.

This student lived with his parents in Cassopolis, Michigan and attended high school there. It appeared there was some doubt whether Cassopolis schools would open this fall due to the refusal of the voters to approve a tax levy. There were other reported problems with discipline in the school. James' father decided to send him to Ft. Wayne to live with a sister and James entered Wayne High School. On August 28, the tax levy was approved by the voters and school began as usual. The sister was appointed legal guardian. Principal William Davis of Wayne asked the Board to determine James residence eligibility.

DECISION

James Keller Jr. is ineligible for one calendar year from the date of his enrollment in Wayne High School due to the fact that he changed schools without a change of residence on the part of his parents.

MORTON MEMORIAL HIGH SCHOOL—JOSEPH WALTER SAUNDERS

This student is a ward of the Hendricks County Department of Public Welfare and has been placed in the LaRue Carter Hospital in Indianapolis. The Welfare Department, on the advise of LaRue Carter Hospital, has placed Joseph in the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Children's Home where he attends Morton Memorial High School. Superintendent Max Stanley has asked the Board to consider this case under the unavoidable change of residence rule.

DECISION

Joseph Walter Saunders may be considered eligible as to residence at Morton Memorial High School.

MORTON MEMORIAL HIGH SCHOOL—KENNETH FRANCIS TAMEWITZ, JR.

This student was placed in the Indiana Soldiers' and Sailors' Children's Home on the recommendation of the LaRue Carter Hospital. Principal Max Stanley asked the Board to consider this case under the unavoidable change of residence rule. Letters are on file from all parties concerned.

DECISION

Kenneth Francis Tamewitz, Jr. may be considered eligible as to residence at Morton Memorial High School.

LAWRENCEBURG HIGH SCHOOL—PEKKA OHBERG

This is a foreign exchange student and Principal William Brinkman asked the Board to determine his eligibility under Rule 12, Section 16.

DECISION

Pekka Ohberg may be considered eligible as to residence at Lawrenceburg High School.

PLYMOUTH HIGH SCHOOL—LEVI CRAWFORD III

This student lived with his mother in Aurora, Illinois, and attended school there. His mother is a deaf mute and because of this the judge placed Levi in the guardianship of the Family Division of the Circuit Court. This Family Division has placed him in the home of Mr. Terry Crawford in Plymouth. Principal Houston of Plymouth High School asked the Board to consider the case under the unavoidable change of residence rule. Letters are on file from all parties concerned.

DECISION

Levi Crawford III may be considered eligible as to residence in Plymouth High School.

BLOOMINGTON UNIVERSITY HIGH SCHOOL — WARREN STURRUP

Attorney Harold Bell was present to discuss this case with Board Members.

GIRLS' ATHLETIC SUPERVISOR

Pat Roy and Priscilla Conway were interviewed by the Board for the position of Girls' Athletic Supervisor. Additional candidates will be interviewed at the November 4 & 5 meeting.

BUDGET

PENN HIGH SCHOOL (MISHAWAKA)—DANIEL STUCKI

Daniel is a foreign exchange student and Principal James Pugh asked the Board to consider the case under Rule 12, Section 16.

DECISION

Daniel Stucki may be considered eligible as to residence at Penn High School.

SOUTH BEND LASALLE HIGH SCHOOL—FUMIO MORITO

Fumio is a foreign exchange student from Japan attending LaSalle High School this year. Principal Roy Hafner asked the Board of Control to consider the case under Rule 12, Section 16.

DECISION

Fumio Morito may be considered eligible as to residence at South Bend LaSalle High School.

DISTRIBUTION CHECK

Principal Richard Loveless of Eminence reported that he did not receive the regular distribution check or it had been lost after it arrived. After checking the bank statement it was learned the check had not been deposited for payment. The Board approved issuing a duplicate check to Eminence High School.

BLOOMINGTON UNIVERSITY HIGH SCHOOL-WARREN B. STURRUP

The Commissioner reported that Judge William T. Sharp of Owen County refused to grant an injunction in the Sturrup case.

Judge Sharp's decision included the following statements:

". . . Participation as a representative of University High School in interscholastic athletic contests is a privilege and not an exercise by the plaintiff of a fundamental right which is protected by the constitution.

"The rule of the defendant association distinguishing between eligibility of students whose residence changes along with that of their parents and those students who change their residence without their parents' corresponding residency change is not inherently suspect and irrational, but is with impartiality and considered judgment directed toward the legitimate concern of defendant association that the student athletes of its members not transfer from one school to another because of any preoccupation with their interscholastic athletic activities or because of any recruitment activities of the schools themselves or their enthusiastic community supporters,

"The granting of an injunction against the defendants barring enforcement of the existing residency rules of defendant association because the interests of plaintiff would be enhanced would be a substitution of this court's judgment for that of the member schools of defendant association and would create chaos in the administration of its affairs and greatly hamper its effectiveness in carrying out its worthwhile program and objectives.

Conclusions of Law

"1. The plaintiff has not shown an irreparable injury to plaintiff's civil or property rights.

- 2. This court should not substitute its judgment for that of defendant association in the making and interpreting of its rules.
 - 3. The law is with the defendant.

"It is therefore ordered, adjudged and decreed that plaintiff's application for preliminary injunction in this cause be and it is hereby denied."

GYMNASTICS

Assistant Commissioner Keller outlined the plans for the state gymnastics tournament series. Approval was given for these plans with instruction to publish the details in the December Bulletin.

SWIMMING

WRESTLING

 - a. Sectional—season \$2.50; session—\$1.00 (no change)
 - b. Regional—season \$2.50; session—\$1.00
 - c. State—season \$3.75; session—\$1.50
- 5. Referees—4 shall be assigned to Regionals

MEMBERSHIP

Approval was given to the application of Fort Wayne Miami Junior High School for junior membership.

CONSTITUTION REVISION COMMITTEE

Fred Park moved that the Athletic Council Constitution and By-Laws Revision Committee consider adding school sponsored volleyball, soccer and other athletic events. This motion was seconded by Clifford Swim. The motion passed unanimously.

GIRLS' ATHLETICS COORDINATOR

The following ladies were interviewed as candidates for the position of Girls' Athletics Coordinator: Mrs. Florence Molinder, Mrs.

Onnolee Smith, Mrs. Claudia Zuege, Miss Fredina Crowe, Miss Olive Wade, Mrs. Clara Dischinger. A decision will be made at a later date on the lady for this position.

He could not find employment in Cassapolis and came to the Jimtown district where he found employment and is making his home with a sister. The sister has been appointed his legal guardian. Principal Smith of Jimtown High School has asked the Board to consider this case under the unavoidable change of residence rule.

DECISION

Arlan Daniel House is ineligible for one calendar year from the date of his enrollment in Jimtown High School.

LAFAYETTE JEFFERSON HIGH SCHOOL—GEORGE THOMAS

This boy lived with his parents and attended school at John Marshall Harlan High School, Chicago. On February 1, 1971, he came to Lafayette to live with another family and enrolled in Jefferson High School. Principal William Levering asked the Board to consider George's residence eligibility under the unavoidable change of residence rule.

DECISION

Because he changed schools without a corresponding change of residence on the part of his parents, George Thomas is ineligible at Jefferson High School until February 1, 1972.

MADISON HEIGHTS (ANDERSON) HIGH SCHOOL-STEVE ALLEN PINKERTON

Principal Robert Collier asked the Board to reconsider Steve's eligibility under the unavoidable change of residence rule.

DECISION

The Board did not change the decision of September 17, 1971; therefore, Steve Allen Pinkerton will be ineligible at Madison Heights High School until September, 1972.

LAFAYETTE TIPPECANOE JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL—ROGER HOGG

This case was considered by the Board on September 15, 1971. Principal John W. Von Kannon asked that the case be reviewed by the Board.

DECISION

Roger is ineligible for one calendar year from September 8, 1971.

INDIANA LAKE SHORE CONFERENCE

Principal D. D. Lockey, President of the Indiana Lake Shore Conference asked the Board to consider changing the baseball final tournament from June 24, 1972 to June 17, 1972.

DECISION

The Board did not feel it wise to make the change due to the following:

- 1. The date has already been set and published in the IHSAA Calendar and September Bulletin.
- 2. Only four schools will be involved in the final tournament.

BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

- 1. The Board reviewed terms of a tentative contract with Indiana University. Certain details were clarified and the Commissioner was instructed to prepare a contract with Indiana University for the use of Assembly Hall for the State Basketball Tournament on March 18, 1972. BRAZIL HIGH SCHOOL—CLINTON HIGH SCHOOL

Principals, athletic directors and football coaches of both schools appeared before the Board to discuss the football game played November 5, between these two schools where unsportsmanlike conduct occurred among players. Both principals reported the incident immediately following the game and outlined the disciplinary action taken.

After a thorough discussion the Board made the following decision:

DECISION

1. The Board commends both principals and the Brazil coach for their handling of the matter.

2. The IHSAA looks with disfavor on any coach who permits such behavior as exhibited by some Clinton players.

3. The Clinton coach must exhibit more control over his squad in the future.

4. Further such conduct could jeopardize the standing of either school in the IHSAA.

Ray Pavey, President, Marvin Tudor and Maurice Pollard appeared before the Board to present a proposal that sectional basketball tournament game officials be reassigned to other tournaments for the final three games. Due to the time element no action was taken at this time.

FORT WAYNE ELMHURST HIGH SCHOOL - HAROLD FOWLKES

This student lived in the Fort Wayne South Side school district. On October 7, by order of the court, Harold was placed in the home of his maternal grandmother who was given permanent custody of the boy. Letters are on file from all parties concerned. Principal Eickhoff of Elmhurst asked the Board to consider the case under the unavoidable change of residence rule.

DECISION

Harold Fowlkes may be considered eligible as to residence at Fort Wayne Elmhurst High School.

DELPHI HIGH SCHOOL—VICTOR MANUEL PORTILLO

This is a foreign exchange student from El Salvador. Principal Garald Manahan of Delphi asked the Board to consider this case under rule 12, Section 16.

DECISION

Victor Manuel Portillo may be considered eligible as to residence at Delphi High School.

MORTON MEMORIAL HIGH SCHOOL—RONALD LEE NIX

This student was first admitted to the Soldiers' and Sailors' Children's Home on April 25, 1969. The parents were divorced and the mother was unable to control him and provide adequate supervision. Ronald left the Home in May of 1971, to live with his father and stepmother. Ronald and the stepmother could not get along so he finally left and returned to his mother's home. The mother asked to return him to the Home. He re-enrolled in Morton Memorial High School on November 10, 1971. There was no court order and no change of residence on the part of his parent.

Principal Max Stanley requested a ruling on this boy's eligibility.

DECISION

Ronald Lee Nix is ineligible for one calendar year from the date of his re-enrollment in Morton Memorial.

HARRISON HIGH SCHOOL (West Lafayette) - GLOVER MITCHELL

This boy is a ward of the Tippecanoe Welfare Department and has been placed in a home in the Harrison High School District. Letters are on file from all parties concerned. A court order is also on file. Principal David Dickerson of Harrison asked the Board to determine Glover's eligibility.

DECISION

Glover Mitchell should be considered eligible as to residence at Harrison High School. In order to be eligible scholastically he must he passing four subjects his last semester in school. It should be noted that Glover has used three fall and two spring semesters of eligibility which leaves him only one fall and two spring semesters.

COMMISSIONERS' RETIREMENT BENEFITS

In accordance with public law 476 of the 1971 Legislature, the IHSAA is now required to pay 4.2% of the gross salaries of Mr. Eskew, Mr. Keller and Mr. Brown, Until this time the IHSAA was not required to contribute to State Teachers' Retirement Fund. The Commissioners will continue to pay the percentage required from them. The Board approved the payment of the 4.2% for the three Commissioners effective July 1, 1971.

ATHLETIC COUNCIL ELECTION

These elections were held by mail vote in each of the IHSAA Districts between December 1 and 10, 1971. The Board of Control tabulated the votes and approved the results shown below. A Board member who is a candidate for re-election does not particiate in the tabulating of votes in his district. The ballots are open to inspection by any candidate or principal of a member school. The Board unanimously approved holding the 1972 State Baseball Tournament in Indianapolis at Busch Stadium.

BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

The Board reviewed the work done at previous meetings on the 1972 state championship basketball tourney series. Final approval was given for the location of sites, ticket prices, number and pay of officials, distribution of quota orders and complimentary tickets, approval of one-site, two-bracket tourneys' time schedules and other details necessary to the conduct of the entire tourney series. The Commissioner was directed to sign definite contracts in duplicate with all tourney center principals, prepare the tourney bulletin for distribution to the member schools and the press, radio and television, setting forth all details in connection with the conduct of the tourney. The Commissioner's office was authorized to make minor adjustments which may be necessary in publishing the tourney bulletin.

Approval was given for the employment of Fred R. Gorman, if available, to assist in the distribution of state tickets and other details in connection with the management of the state tournament.

The Board decided to continue the plan started a few years ago of presenting a trophy furnished by the IHSAA to each sectional winner.

Approval was given to accept a bid for the printing of the state tournament tickets from the American Ticket Corporation. This company has printed the IHSAA State Tournament tickets for many years.

DIRECTOR OF GIRLS' ATHLETICS

The Board signed contracts with Pat Roy for a term of three years and six months beginning January 1, 1972, as Director of Girls' Athletics.

The Board adjourned to meet again in the IHSAA Office at 9:30 a.m. January 12 and 13, 1972.

The Commissioner was instructed to have Mr. Moore, Headmaster, bring Mr. Coppens to the next meeting of the Board.

MUNCIE SOUTHSIDE HIGH SCHOOL

Dr. Harold Huff, Principal of Muncie Southside High School appeared before the Board to discuss the position of the IHSAA regarding married students, signing of game contracts, etc.

INDIANAPOLIS CATHEDRAL HIGH SCHOOL — STEVEN CHARLES WILLIS

This student was ineligible under a previous ruling. The age rule was amended June 24, 1971, which would now allow him to be eligible.

DECISION

Provided Steven Charles Willis meets scholastic requirements he should be considered eligible as of January 19, 1972, which is the closing date of the present semester as certified to this office.

HEBRON HIGH SCHOOL—STEVE RANS

This boy had attended high school at Hebron. During the summer of 1971 his family moved to the Lowell school district with the intention of returning to Hebron as soon as housing was available. Steve enrolled in Hebron High School although he lived in the Lowell District and attended school there until November 1. He was then informed that he would either have to pay tuition or attend school in his home district. He withdrew from Hebron and entered Lowell High School where he attended two weeks. Housing became available and the parents moved back to the Hebron school district and Steve re-enrolled there. Principal Broughton asked the Board to determine his eligibility as to residence.

DECISION

Steve Rans should be considered ineligible as to residence at Hebron High School for one calendar year from the date he re-enrolled in Hebron in the fall of 1971.

MICHIGAN CITY ROGERS HIGH SCHOOL—GERARDO LATONI

This student's father is in the military service of the United States. He has been in Vietnam and is now assigned to Puerto Rico.

Gerardo is making his home with an aunt in Michigan City. Mr. Frank Nowak, Principal of Rogers High School asked the Board of Control to consider the case under Rule 12, Section 16.

DECISION

Gerardo Latoni may be considered eligible as to residence at Michigan City Rogers High School.

LALUMIERE SCHOOL

Mr. James R. Moore, Headmaster and Coach James Coppens appeared before the Board of Control to discuss the basketball game played between their school and Washington Township High School, December 10, 1971. With eleven seconds remaining on the clock and Washington Township leading by a score of 70 to 67, Coach Coppens removed his team from the floor. Headmaster Moore reported this situation immediately to the IHSAA and apologized for Mr. Coppens' action. Mr. Coppens also wrote a letter of apology. A letter was also filed by Principal James Dold of Washington Township

After discussing this situation the Board reached the following decision.

DECISION

- 1. Mr. James Coppens is severely reprimanded for his actions and Headmaster Moore is instructed to make certain that Mr. Coppens becomes thoroughly familiar with the Constitution and By-laws of the IHSAA.
- 2. LaLumiere School is severely reprimanded and given a stern warning that any further such action could cause the school to be suspended from membership in the IHSAA.

NORTH NEWTON HIGH SCHOOL

The North Newton High School swimming team competed in a junior high invitational swimming meet in Rensselaer on Saturday, January 8. It was their understanding that the students from grades 7 & 8 would compete against one another and that students from grade 9 would compete against other 9th grade students.

When they arrived they found it was a 7th & 8th grade meet. The North Newton coach allowed five freshmen boys to compete against boys in the 8th grade. Coach Eason apparently was not aware of the rule prohibiting 9th grade students from competing against students in lower grades. Principal Anderson has forfeited all the points won by the five freshmen boys. He asked the Board to determine the future eligibility of these five boys.

DECISION

The five freshmen boys who competed against the students in the lower grades should be considered ineligible for swimming for the remainder of this swimming season.

STATE SWIMMING MEET SERIES

The Board approved a list of officials to be used in the swimming sectionals and state meet.

STATE WRESTLING MEET SERIES

The Board approved a list of officials to be used in the wrestling sectionals.

STATE GYMNASTICS MEET SERIES

The Board approved a list of officials to be used in the gymnastics meets.

BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT OFFICIALS' MEETING

The Board approved a meeting of all new and reserve sectional basketball tournament officials to discuss their work in these tourneys. These men will be guests of the IHSAA for lunch.

BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

- 1. The Board approved a list of officials to be used in the tourney series, and Articles of Agreements are to be mailed by the Commissioner to this list of officials.
- 2. The Board approved the plan used last year in which the IHSAA cooperated with the Indiana Broadcasters' Association in the allotment of space to the various stations in the state for broadcasting the final tournament.
- 3. The Commissioner was authorized to handle complimentary tickets under the same plan as used in previous years.
- 4. The Board approved filming the three games of the 1972 state tournament on much the same basis as used last year.
- 5. It was agreed that the plan used in 1971 for the pairings and release of the schedules to the press would be used again this year. The pairings are to begin at 8:00 a.m. EST, February 16, 1972, with the immediate release to the Indianapolis News, Indianapolis Star, Associated Press and United Press International.

NORTH SALEM HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Richard Thompson, Principal, and Mr. Rick Schaekel, Athletic Director and Basketball Coach, appeared before the Board with Mr. Rex Goodnight and son, Kyle, to discuss the conduct rule.

Mr. Thompson had held a hearing with Kyle and his parents and after this hearing, Kyle Goodnight was declared ineligible under the conduct rule.

After discussing the matter, the Board unanimously agreed to support Mr. Thompson in his decision,

SOUTH BEND ST. JOSEPH'S HIGH SCHOOL - PERRY COALMAN

This student lived with a sister in the South Bend LaSalle High School District and attended school there. On January 11, 1972, the St. Joseph County Welfare Department placed him in the home of his brother, Sylvester Coalman, who lives in the Washington School District. At that time Perry enrolled in St. Joseph's High School. Brother James Linscott asked the Board to determine Perry's eligibility under the unavoidable change of residence rule.

DECISION

Rule 22, section 2, states:

"If a student transfers from one school of a city or school corporation to another of the same city or school corporation. he shall be ineligible for participation for one calendar year unless there are definitely marked districts and his parents actually change their residence to the new school district."

Since the St. Joseph's attendance district includes both LaSalle and Washington High School districts, and the residence of Sylvester Coalman is in the Washington district, Perry Coalman is ineligible for interscholastic athletics for one calendar year from the date of his enrollment in St. Joseph's High School.

When he was placed in the brother's home in the Washington district, his eligibility at Washington High School could have been established under the unavoidable change of residence rule; however since he has enrolled in St. Joseph's High School he could not now enroll in any high school in the St. Joseph's attendance district or in the South Bend attendance district with residence eligibility before one calendar year from the date of his enrollment in such school.

SOUTHWEST DUBOIS COUNTY SCHOOL CORPORATION

Superintendent W. E. Schnute asked that permission be granted to operate the two high schools in his district as one school beginning 1972-73, as they are building a new high school and hope to be in it by January, 1973.

DECISION

Permission was granted to operate the two schools as one school provided they have one principal, one membership in the IHSAA and file a single report with the State Department of Public Instruction.

LAPEL HIGH SCHOOL

As of January 1, Jackson Township of Madison County, which had no high school, consolidated with West Central Community School Corporation. Students living in Jackson Township had been permitted to attend the school of their choice in that area. Since they now are in the West Central Corporation, some of the students will attend Lapel High School and some will attend Frankton High School.

Victor Smith now enrolled in Anderson High School, lives in the Lapel school district and wishes to change schools now. Principal Roudebush asked the Board to determine Victor's eligibility at Lapel High School.

DECISION

Victor Smith may be considered eligible as to residence at Lapel High School provided he meets all other IHSAA requirements for eligibility.

The Board adjourned to meet again in the IHSAA Office on February 15, 1972 at 2:00 p.m.

Letters are on file from both principals regarding this game.

DECISION

- 1. Miss Marilyn Davidson is severely reprimanded for her actions and Mr. Philip Lambert is instructed to make certain that Miss Davidson becomes thoroughly familiar with the Constitution and By-laws of the IHSAA.
- 2. Southmont High School is severely reprimanded and given a stern warning that any further such action could be cause for suspension from membership in the IHSAA.
- 3. Greencastle High School is severely reprimanded and given a stern warning that any further use of officials who are not registered with the IHSAA could cause the school to be suspended from membership in the IHSAA.

TWIN LAKES HIGH SCHOOL—SANDY YOUNG

It was reported that this girl bowled on an American Junior Bowling Congress team during the school year. On February 5, 1972, she participated in the District IV GAA Bowling Tourney, representing Twin Lakes High School. The Board asked that written verification of her part in the AJBC travelling league be sent to this office.

DECISION

When such participation is verified the following action shall be

- 1. Sandy Young is ineligible for her high school bowling team for the remainder of the school year.
- 2. All tourney points earned by her shall be forfeited.
- 3. All team points earned by Twin Lakes shall be forfeited.
- 4. Since the IHSAA did not present awards for the District IV event, the GAA shall act upon the disposition of the trophies presented to Twin Lakes and Sandy Young.

WABASH HIGH SCHOOL

Principal Robert Slavens reported to this office by telephone that some members of the Wabash Girls' Gymnastics Team had participated in a meet without having parents and physicians' certificates on file.

DECISION

Information presented by phone indicates that the Wabash team should forfeit honors won and any games and that the entire team is ineligible in gymnastics for the remainder of the gymnastics

Principal Slavens is instructed to review and comply with Rule 3, Sections 11 and 12 of the IHSAA By-Laws.

SOUTH BEND ST. JOSEPH'S HIGH SCHOOL

A suit has been brought on behalf of Perry Coalman. Members of the Board of Control were requested to be present at the hearing scheduled in Elkhart on February 17.

IHSAA OFFICE

The Board approved a plan presented which will increase benefits for employees under the Blue Cross, Blue Shield Insurance.

As of January 1, 1972, organizations such as the IHSAA are under the Indiana Employment Security Act, thus enabling employees to receive unemployment checks should such employees qualify. Under the act the IHSAA could either make monthly contributions on the basis of our payroll or elect to reimburse the Indiana Employment Security Division should any benefit payments be made to former employees. The Board chose to make payments in lieu of contributions.

FORT WAYNE CENTRAL CATHOLIC

In a letter dated February 9, Reverend James F. Seculoff, Superintendent of the Diocese of Fort Wayne and South Bend, informed the Board of Control that beginning with the school year 1972-73, Fort Wayne Central Catholic High School will be merged with Fort Wayne Bishop Dwenger and Fort Wayne Bishop Luers High Schools. A map showing the newly established dividing line between the two remaining school districts was enclosed and is on file in the IHSAA Office.

The three Catholic high schools in Fort Wayne had definite boundaries within the city limits for enrollment into the three schools. Those who lived outside the city limits were free to attend any one of three schools. With the merging of the three schools into two, a new boundary line has been set. Basically, the boundary line will divide Fort Wayne into North and South. Those who reside in the northern section will attend Bishop Dwenger and those who live in the southern section will attend Bishop Luers high school. The boundary line going from west to east, from city limits to city limits, highway 14, which becomes the Illinois Road, to highway 24, which becomes Jefferson Street and then Washington Street which is the northern most part of highway 24 since Jefferson and Washington are one-way streets through Fort Wayne. The boundary line continues on Washington through town to Coliseum Boulevard which is the eastern city limits for Fort Wayne.

Reverend Seculoff has asked the Board to determine the eligibility of the students attending Central Catholic High School.

DECISION

1. Beginning with the 1972-73 school year grade nine students and 1971-72 Central Catholic High School grade nine, ten and eleven students living north of the boundary line, but within the Fort Wavne city limits, may be considered eligible as to residence at Bishop Dwenger High School.

- 2. Beginning with the 1972-73 school year grade nine students and 1971-72 Central Catholic High School grade nine, ten or eleven students living south of the boundary line, but within the Fort Wayne city limits, may be considered eligible as to residence at Bishop Luers High School.
- 3. Beginning with the 1972-73 school year grade nine students and 1971-72 Central Catholic High School grade nine, ten or eleven students living outside the city limits of Fort Wayne may choose either Bishop Luers or Bishop Dwenger High Schools with residence eligibility provided there is no undue influence involved. Such students will not be considered eligible in any other high school unless their parents actually move to a new school district.

BUDGET

The Board approved \$6,000.00 additional to be used in the Handhook and Bulletin account and an additional \$10.00 in the Dues account.

BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT

- 1. All 426 entry blanks, having filed on time, complete in every detail were accepted.
- 2. It was decided that the selection of the Trester Award Winner would be made according to the same plan as used in previous years. This includes ratings of players by the principals and coaches and observations by Board Members at both semi-state and state tourneys.
- 3. The Commissioner was authorized to employ help to conduct the state tournament.
- 4. The schedules for the sectional, regional, semi-state and state tourneys were drawn by the Board of Control in the presence of representatives of the Indianapolis News and Star and the Associated Press and United Press International. Immediately after the first schedule was drawn, the office staff started typing and checking copies for the press. These copies were made available to the news media for immediate release.
- 5. The Board of Control voted to continue the presentation of silver medals to members of the two teams that do not participate in the final game of the state tourney.
- 6. Permission was given for closed circuit TV to the Church Street Gymnasium in New Castle for the regional tournament. Tickets are to be sold at a price slightly lower than for tickets to the New Castle Fieldhouse. All money drived from this closed circuit telecast shall be put in with the regular tournament receipts.

SWIMMING AND WRESTLING

Plans for the state swimming and wrestling meets were reviewed with the Board Members.

TRACK

The various recommendations of the Track and Field Advisory Committee were reviewed and discussed and the following action

DECISION

Miguel Fachin may be considered eligible as to residence at Brazil High School.

CAEROLL HIGH SCHOOL (Fort Wayne)-KENNETH G. BROOKS

Kenneth lived with his father and step-mother in Anchorage, Alaska, where he attended school. He became unhappy over disagreements with his father. Kenneth went with his stepmother to Bronson, Michigan, where his grandparents reside. Kenneth's parents are contemplating a divorce. The stepmother was placed in the Irene Byron Hospital in Fort Wayne and Kenneth stayed with friends of the parents in the Fort Wayne area. Kenneth's father requested that Kenneth live with these friends, Mr. & Mrs. Arthur West, who live in the Carroll district. The Wests became Kenneth's legal guardian on January 3, 1972. The step-mother has been released by the hospital and has returned to Bronson, Michigan. Principal Harry Andes has requested the Board to consider Kenneth's case under the unavoidable change of residence rule.

DECISION

Kenneth Brooks is ineligible for one calendar year from the date of enrollment in Carroll High School due to the fact that he has changed schools without a change of residence on the part of the person with whom he lived.

DUBOIS HIGH SCHOOL-JAMES KLEE

This student is a ward of the Hendricks County Juvenile Court and was assigned to the home of an uncle, Robert Klee, who was made legal guardian. Mr. Klee lives in the Dubois High School district and James enrolled there on February 3, 1972. Letters are on file from all parties concerned. Principal James Wahl of Dubois asked the Board to consider this case under the unavoidable change of residence rule.

DECISION

James Klee may be considered eligible as to residence at Dubois High School. It is the responsibility of Dubois High School to determine the eligibility status of this student in the matter of all other factors, for example scholarship, participation, conduct, etc.

GOSHEN HIGH SCHOOL-JACK ROGERS

This student attended school at Goshen for the first twelve days this fall and then withdraw. On September 21, 1971, he enrolled in Bethany Christian High School, a local private school, and attended there until October 6, at which time he withdrew from school completely. According to his parents he was having health problems. At the beginning of the second semester he reentered Goshen High School. Principal John G. Johnson asked the Board of Control to determine his eligibility.

DECISION

Jack Rogers is ineligible for 365 days from the date he re-enrolled in Goshen High School.

NORTH CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOL (Indianapolis)—DONALD S. PHIPPS

This student lived with his parents and attended school in Kingston, Jamaica. This fall he moved to live with an aunt who resides in the North Central district and entered North Central High School on September 7, 1971. The aunt was made guardian of the boy. Donald is not a foreign exchange student nor have his parents been transferred from this country to Jamaica. Principal Eugene Clonce has asked the Board to determine Donald's eligibility.

DECISION

Since Donald S. Phipps changed schools without a corresponding change of residence on the part of his parents, he is ineligible for one calendar year from the date of his enrollment in North Central High School.

TWIN LAKES HIGH SCHOOL-IVO HUISMAN

This student is from South Africa and on the student exchange program sponsored by the Rotary Club. Ivo is living with Dr. & Mrs. Charles Lindborg in the Twin Lakes school district. Principal Larry Pinkerton has asked the Board to consider the case under Rule 12, Section 16.

DECISION

Ivo Huisman may be considered eligible as to residence at Twin Lakes High School.

TWIN LAKES HIGH SCHOOL—SANDY YOUNG

Verification of Sandy's participation in the American Junior Bowling Congress Bowling League has been received. (See Feb. 15, 1972 Board Minutes)

BEECH GROVE HIGH SCHOOL (Indianapolis)

Principal Thomas Thompson has sent this office a letter regarding an incident at the State Wrestling Meet involving a Beech Grove student and the Bloomington wrestling coach. The Board approved of the action taken by Principal Thompson and deemed no further action was necessary.

RONCALLI HIGH SCHOOL (Indianapolis)

Principal Bernard Dever, Athletic Director Jim O'Brien, Miss Coon, girls athletics supervisor, and Chris Cliny, a student, met with the Board of Control concerning a basketball game played between Roncalli and Decatur Central. In this game one of the players displayed unsportsmanlike conduct and Miss Coon took her team from the floor. After discussing the matter the Board decided to ask the Decatur Central principal and girls' physical education instructor to appear before them at the next meeting to further discuss the situation before making a decision.

NATIONAL FEDERATION MUTUAL LEGAL AID FUND

In the past we have subscribed to this fund and the Board approved the purchase of four copies (\$100.00) of court briefs and decisions in other states.

TRACK

The Board gave final approval to sites and also approved a change in awards and places in regional, which will be published in the April Bulletin.

GOLF

The Board approved plans for the state golf meet series. Approval was given for the use of caddies in the state tournament only as it is a 36 holes tournament. Details will be published in the April Bulletin.

The Board of Control recessed to reconvene on March 18.

The Board of Control reconvened on March 18, at 4:00 p.m.

TRESTER AWARD WINNER

It was the unanimous decision of the Board that the Arthur L. Trester Medal for Mental Attitude be awarded to Mark Inman of Jeffersonville High School.

DECISION

Mario Viola may be considered eligible as to residence at LaVille High School.

PORTLAND HIGH SCHOOL-ANDRES ANDRESSON

Andres is a foreign exchange student on the American Field Service Program from Iceland, Principal Jim Laws of Portland asked the Board to consider his eligibility under Rule 12, Section 16.

DECISION

Andres Andresson may be considered eligible as to residence at Portland High School.

SCHMUCKER MIDDLE SCHOOL—KELLY GLASSBURN

This student's parents lived in South Bend, but he attended Howe Military School. During the fall semester of the 1971-72 school year his parents moved from South Bend to the Penn-Harris school district. Kelly finished the first semester at Howe and enrolled at Schmucker Middle School. Principal Larry Crabb has asked the Board to determine Kelly's eligibility.

DECISION

Kelly Glassburn may be considered eligible as to residence at Schmucker Middle School.

TWIN LAKES HIGH SCHOOL—STEVE OLSON

This student lived in Wisconsin Dells, Wisconsin, with an aunt and uncle where he attended school until February 16, 1972. He moved back to the home of his parents after certain problems had been resolved. Principal Larry Pinkerton of Twin Lakes asked the Board to determine Steve's eligibility.

DECISION

Steve Olson is ineligible as to residence at Twin Lakes High School for 365 days from the date of his enrollment this semester.

RONCALLI-DECATUR CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOLS

Principal Paul Armstrong and Miss Wood, Girls' Physical Education instructor, of Decatur Central High School appeared before the Board to further discuss the Roncalli-Decatur Central girls' basketball game held February 16, 1972. This case was continued from the March 15 meeting.

DECISION

- 1. Chris Klene of Roncalli is ineligible for interscholastic athletics until February 16, 1973.
- 2. A warning is issued to Roncalli High School pursuant to Rule 17, Section 13.
- 3. Miss Gerri Coons, girls' basketball coach at Roncalli, is severely reprimanded for removing her team from the floor and is instructed to become thoroughly familiar with the IHSAA rules and by-laws,

EVANSVILLE MAGISTER NOSTER LATIN SCHOOL

This school is closing at the end of this school year. Principal Donald C. Dilger has asked the Board to determine the status of the students for the coming year. Many of the students come from outside the city of Evansville—some as far away as Washington, Jasper, Loogootee, etc.

DECISION

Due to the fact that Evansville Magister Noster is closing, students who have attended that school may be considered eligible as to residence in the school in their home district beginning in the fall of 1972. If however one of the students wants to enroll in a school outside his home district, the Board of Control would have to clarify such student's eligibility at that time,

EVANSVILLE REX MUNDI HIGH SCHOOL

Superintendent Raymond Kuper; Father Stone, Member of the Board of Education; Athletic Director Joe O'Kane and Principal James Bluma of Reitz Memorial; appeared before the Board to discuss the eligibility of students who are now attending Rex Mundi. This school will no longer offer work on the high school level after it closes this spring.

It was clearly understood that students now attending Rex Mundi will have residence eligibility only at either of the Evansville parochial schools or as districted by the parochial Board of Education.

IHSAA FINANCES

The Commissioner reported that \$200,000.00 of tourney funds had been invested in Certificates of Deposit due October 2, 1972.

The Board reviewed quarterly expenses and made additional appropriations as follows: Salary (Pat Roy)—\$8002.00, Board Expenses \$3500.00, Rules Books \$1500.00, Postage \$5000.00, Service on Office Equipment \$100.00, Dues \$200.00, and Publications \$100.00.

STATE FINAL CHAMPIONSHIP RINGS

On April 10, 1963, the Board of Control decided to present 16 rings annually to the championship and runner-up teams for the state basketball tournament. Since many schools feel that they need some extra rings, the Board voted to allow a school to purchase up to four

additional rings. The Board also decided this regulation would apply to medallions which were added as part of the awards in 1970. Cost of these additional awards is to be borne by the school.

BASEBALL TOURNAMENT SERIES

The Board approved the sites for the baseball tournament series to be published in the May Bulletin.

FOOTBALL

The Board of Control agreed to establish a procedure for breaking ties in football games for the 1972 season. Details of the plan will be worked out later.

FALL MEETINGS

The Board asked the Commissioner to make plans for the fall meetings of the principals, girls physical education teachers, athletic directors and one secretary from each school.

STATE BASEBALL TOURNAMENT SERIES

Plans for the baseball tournament series were discussed and baseball officials were selected.

CONCORD HIGH SCHOOL-LARRY BOHDE

This student had attended New Haven High School and was sent by the court to the Bashor Home, which is located in the Wa-Nee School District. The principal of Concord High School asked the Board to determine this student's eligibility since the Bashor Home is located in another school district.

DECISION

Larry Bohde should be considered eligible as to residence in Concord Community Schools.

CULVER MILITARY ACADEMY—HARRY STEINBRENNER

This student lives in Bay Village, Ohio, where he has attended the ninth grade. He is now entering Culver Military Academy in the fall of 1972 to repeat the ninth grade. Mr. E. E. Benson, Dean of the Academy, has requested a ruling on the number of semesters of eligibility remaining for this student.

DECISION

By attending the ninth grade in Bay Village, Ohio, Harry Steinbrenner has used two semesters of enrollment eligibility; therefore he has six semesters of enrollment eligibility remaining.

FAIRFIELD HIGH SCHOOL-ROBERTO ALVAREZ

This student is a native of Puerto Rico but attends school at Fairfield High School in Elkhart County. Rafael Lopez, Commissioner of Basketball, Puerto Rico, has written the Board asking permission for Roberto Alvarez to participate in a try-out for the Puerto Rico Olympic Team during the summer of 1972.

DECISION

According to Rule 25, Section 5, Roberto Alvarez would make himself ineligible for all sports until March 17, 1973, if he participates in such a program.

LAKE CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOL (ST. JOHN)-GLEN TEIBLE

This student lived in the Lake Central school district and had some reading problems and did not enroll in Lake Central High School until October of this year. He was enrolled in high school, although he received no credit from October until the close of the first semester. Beginning the second semester he is carrying a load of four solid subjects and made passing grades for the first six weeks. Principal Jones asked the Board to determine Glen's eligibility.

DECISION

Since Glen was enrolled in school the first semester of the 1971-72 school year but did not receive four credits he should be considered ineligible scholastically until such time as he is passing in four full credit subjects and maintaining the same standard for his past semester in school. These two semesters of the 1971-72 school year

will count as two of the eight semesters of enrollment eligibility to which each student is entitled.

NEW HAVEN HIGH SCHOOL-JOHN CHOVAN

This student was a ward of the court and was placed in the Langley Star Commonwealth School in Van Wert, Ohio. He was released from the school on January 12, 1972, and enrolled in New Haven High School. Principal Robert Clark of New Haven High School asked the Board to determine John's eligibility as to residence.

DECISION

John Chovan may be considered eligible at New Haven High School as to residence.

NORTH SPENCER COUNTY SCHOOL CORPORATION

Superintendent Tom Brumett of North Spencer County School Corporation asked permission for Dale and Chrisney to operate as one high school beginning with the 1972-73 school year. A new school, Heritage Hills, is to be ready for occupancy on January 1, 1973.

DECISION

Permission was granted to operate the two schools as one school provided they have one principal, one membership in the IHSAA, and file a single report with the State Department of Public Instruction.

The Board of Control adjourned to meet again in Indianapolis on May 12, 1972, at 9:30 a.m.

Also Gary was represented by Attorney Martin H. Kinney and legal stenographer Bill Daniels of Indianapolis.

ABSENT: Ex-officio member John Hammel and Incoming Board Member William Breck.

Mr. Eskew opened the meeting by reading the following statement:

"The IHSAA is a voluntary organization and Quentin Smith signed the following statement when he applied for membership in 1971, 'We hereby subscribe to the Constitution and By-Laws of the IHSAA and agree that the above school will conduct its interscholastic athletics during this membership year in accordance with the IHSAA Constitution, By-Laws and decisions as interpreted and administered."

Mr. Eskew further stated that this was not a court hearing and no one was under oath. He then read the following:

On March 27, the Commissioner received a letter of apology from Mr. Smith, which stated that he had some things he would like to discuss with the Board of Control.

On April 5, Mr. Smith, Athletic Director Waterhouse and Assistant Coach Jackson attended a Board of Control special meeting by invitation where they discussed events which took place before, during and after the State Final Basketball Tournament. Mr. Smith stated he would continue his investigation and report his findings to Mr. Eskew. To date no such report has been received.

On April 12, The Board of Control, at its regular meeting, instructed Mr. Eskew to arrange a hearing with Gary West Side school officials on May 4, at 10:00 a.m.

April 26, Mr. Eskew wrote to Mr. Smith informing him of the hearing date and the procedure that would be followed.

On May 1, Mr. Eskew received a phone call from Mr. Smith stating he would be present on May 4, probably with legal counsel.

May 2, Mr. Eskew received a phone call from Mr. Smith and Mr. Robert Addison, attorney, followed by a letter from Mr. Addison, requesting postponement of the hearing until May 18. The reason given was to allow them more time to prepare for the hearing.

May 3, during the Board of Control meeting the request was discussed. Due to the many school activities of several members who would be unable to attend on May 18, it was decided to reschedule the hearing on May 12, at 10:00 a.m. if at all possible.

May 4, Mr. Addison and Mr. Smith were notified of the new date.

May 6, A letter was mailed to Mr. Eskew by Mr. Addison listing several objections to the hearing procedure including the objection to Mr. Eskew presiding at the hearing.

May 8, The Commissioner wrote Mr. Addison and Mr. Smith restating the purpose of the hearing. He also attempted to answer some of the questions and objections listed in the May 6 letter.

Mr. Eskew stated the purpose of the meeting was to inquire into and consider the matter referred to in paragraph 2 of the letter dated April 26.

- A. Acts of violence committed by Gary West fans and students
 - 1. Property damage

- 2. Personal injury
- 3. Robbery
- 4. Unsportsmanlike conduct
- B. Display of disrespect and poor sportsmanship by members of the basketball team during the awards ceremony following the final game.

Mr. Eskew then read, Article IV, Section 4 i of the Constitution, which states:

"The Board of Control shall have the power to initiate investigations regarding inter-school athletic activities participated in by the members of this Association and to make and enforce, with such penalties as this Board may consider proper, the regulations deemed necessary by this Board to make effective the spirit, the purpose and the wording of the provisions of the Indiana High School Athletic Association Constitution, Rules and By-Laws; and further, the said Board of Control shall have power to make and enforce with such penalties as this Board may consider proper, temporary regulations deemed necessary by this Board to handle emergencies and special conditions that may arise in the management of the inter-school athletic activities participated in by members of this Association"

All parties had an opportunity to make statements or ask questions concerning the charges.

At the conclusion of the hearing the Board of Control after considering all evidence directed the following statement be prepared:

GARY WEST HIGH SCHOOL

On March 18, 1972, the final tournament of the IHSAA basketball championship series was held at Bloomington, Indiana. One of the participating teams was Gary West Side High School, Gary, Indiana. On the day of the final tournament, Gary West Side lost to Connersville High School and a series of unsportsmanlike and violent acts were observed and/or reported to the Board of Control to have occurred on the part of Gary West Side student personnel and followers. The Board of Control and its staff have investigated the reported events and heard Gary West Side school officials and their representatives. The Board of Control has come to the following conclusions, to wit:

- 1. That the Gary West Side High School and its officials and staff provided routine supervision and precautions for control over its student personnel and followers during the final tournament.
- 2. That, in spite of said routine supervision and precautions, the Gary West Side student personnel and followers were not controlled and engaged in damage to property and inflicted physical injury to other spectators, largely as an apparent expression of disappointment at losing the final game of the tournament.
- 3. That the scale of the damage and injuries are such that they must be prevented from happening in the future and that Gary West Side High School must show its ability to control its student person-

nel and followers before being allowed to continue its membership in the Association.

DECISION

After a careful review of all of the information before it and giving due consideration to the best interests of both Gary West Side High School and the other 427 regular members of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, The Board of Control of the Indiana High School Athletic Association hereby suspends Gary West Side High School from membership in the IHSAA from and after the date of this decision to and including March 17, 1973.

On and after that date Gary West Side High School may apply for reinstatement of membership with the understanding that Gary West Side High School show satisfactory proof that is has ability to control its student personnel and followers.

The Board of Control feels that it is unfortunate that a small group of irresponsible students and fans has jeopardized the sports program of the entire Association. The Board respectfully requests that all students and fans review their responsibility to their school and the total sports program.

BASEBALL TOURNAMENT

The Board approved scheduling sectional baseball tournament games on Saturday, June 3, if mutually agreed upon by all participating schools and provided there were no regular players of the participating baseball teams qualified for the state track meet. Such a schedule must also be approved by the Commissioner.

ATHLETIC INSURANCE

Fisk Landers who handles the athletic injury insurance, presented a policy for the coming school year. This policy is much the same as has been offered in past years, is written by the Puritan Life Insurance Company of Providence, Rhode Island and was accepted by the Board.

The policies for coverage on athletic officials and catastrophe insurance on students, coaches, etc. are the same as last year and were also approved.

The Board of Control adjourned to meet again in the IHSAA Office on May 19, at 9:30 a.m.

GARY WEST HIGH SCHOOL

A temporary injunction was issued May 18, 1972, by Judge Andrew V. Giorgi in Lake County Superior Court on behalf of Michael D. Pate, Plaintiff, by his father Dr. Frank Pate, preventing the IHSAA from enforcing the Board order excluding Gary West High School from participating in all athletic activities. This was done without a hearing.

The Commissioner, Assistant Commissioners and President of the Board of Control received notification of this temporary injunction on May 19, 1972.

It was moved, seconded and voted unanimously that without regard to the Board's order of May 15, 1972, suspending Gary West Side High School from membership in the IHSAA, in view of the issuance of the restraining order by the Lake Superior Court, Room 4, at 3:45 p.m. on May 18, 1972, one hour and fifteen minutes prior to the start of said Sectional Track Meet, and the consequent automatic suspension, under Article III. Section (c) of the IHSAA Constitution, of Gary West High School from membership until there is a hearing on said restraining order, all placings, times, results and activities of Gary West Side High School and its individual representative contestants in said Sectional Meet be set aside and not considered in the IHSAA records or in advancing of the schools and contestants from said Sectional Meet to the subsequent Regional Meet.

It was moved, seconded and voted unanimously that the Regional Track Meet presently scheduled to be held at Gary on May 25, be cancelled and that said Regional Meet be rescheduled at a time and place to be determined.

INJUNCTIONS

The Board of Control directed the Commissioner to send the following statement to all member schools:

"The Board of Control has ruled that effective immediately all Center Principals and City Athletic Directors, who host an IHSAA sponsored tournament or meet, be instructed:

- 1. When you are confronted with an injunction or restraining order, contrary to the IHSAA Board of Control rules or IHSAA Constitution and By-Laws, you shall immediately postpone the start of such tournament or meet and communicate with the Commissioner/s for further instructions.
- 2. All future contracts for such tournaments and meets must include the instructions contained in paragraph 1, above.

DISTRIBUTION CHECKS

The Board authorized the issuance of the following duplicate checks to replace those not received: Connersville and Indianapolis Cathedral High Schools, \$150.00 each; Battle Ground and Fort Wayne Jefferson Junior High Schools, \$37.50 each.

The Board of Control adjourned to meet again on June 2, 1972, in Indianapolis.

After a review of the evidence previously heard and examined and after careful consideration of such new evidence as has been presented by Mr. Smith it is the opinion of the Board of Control that there is insufficient evidence to justify a change of its previous decision and that the suspension of Gary West Side High School should stand as previously decided.

STATE BASEBALL TOURNAMENT

Plans were discussed and arrangements completed for the State Baseball Tournament at Busch Stadium, June 24.

FINANCIAL REPORTS OF TOURNEYS

Financial reports of tourneys held during the past year were presented, examined, approved and ordered published in the 1972 Handbook.

BUDGET AND FINANCES

Careful consideration was given to a budget recommended by the Commissioner for 1972-73. Three new items were added to the budget this year. These items are: Professional Services (which includes legal fees and audit); Testing and Observing Officials and Public Relations (which is primarily for expenses in the area principals meetings). The Board gave approval to a few expenditures in excess of the 1971-72 budget. The Commissioner presented a statement of receipts and expenditures over the past twelve months together with an itemized statement of government securities owned by the IHSAA at present. It is understood that an independent audit will be made by Ernst and Ernst Accountants soon after July 1. Results of this audit will be published in the 1972 Handbook.

The recommended budget was approved with additional funds added to the Professional Services Account.

The Commissioner was authorized to deposit with the American Fletcher National Bank and Trust Company of Indianapolis for exchange or credit as needed to keep a safe balance in the bank, such securities as may come due. It is understood that all transactions in securities are to be reported at the next Board of Control meeting following such transactions.

SPECIAL DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS

After giving careful consideration to the amount of funds on hand, estimated expenditures during the coming year, and the need for adequate reserve in the IHSAA Treasury, the Board set \$80.00 as the maximum amount of surplus funds to be paid any member school in the special distribution, October, 1972. Because there was a regular distribution in 1971, all the money to be distributed was earned during the current year.

It was decided to make the distribution according to the following plan:

- 1. Sixty dollars for participation in the 1972 sectional basketball tourney.
- 2. Twenty dollars for membership in the IHSAA during the 1971-72 membership year.
- 3. No school shall receive credit for a years' membership unless it was a member of the IHSAA on January 1, 1972.
- 4. Any school sharing the special distribution must be a member in good standing and existing as a high school at the time of the distribution.
- 5. A combination or consolidation of two or more high schools shall count as one school only in this distribution. The check for one share shall be sent to the principal of the new or resulting school.

OFFICIALS

A detailed report was presented on the registration of officials in the various sports. The report showed that for 1971-72 year the IHSAA had licensed a total of 4452 officials and had received a total of \$47,184.00 from officials payment of fees.

COMMISSIONER AND ASSISTANT COMMISSIONERS

The Board signed new three year contracts with the Commissioner and Assistant Commissioners.

CROSS COUNTRY

The Board voted unanimously to make the following changes in the cross country regulations:

- 1. Distance-from two to two and one-half miles.
- 2. For the tournament series, a maximum of seven contestants may participate as a team with the team score being determined by totaling the points scored by the first five finishing contestants on each team.

TENNIS

The Commissioner presented some proposals from the Tennis Committee for reorganization of the state tennis meet series. Due to the time element, the Board did not adopt these proposals as they want to further study the plans.

AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION

(without any notice or formal action of the Association, its officers or representatives)
- c. If at any time the Association, its officers or representatives are prohibited or restrained from carrying out any rule, regulation, decision or action of or for said Association in relation to any member by order or injunction (of) issued by any court or action of any intervening authority without a hearing, such member, in relation to which the Association, its officers or representatives, are so prohibited or restrained is automatically suspended from membership for the duration of such prohibition. (or restraint without any notice or formal action of the Association, its officers or representatives)
- d. Any suspension from membership under Section 1b or 1c shall continue until such time as written evidence is received by the Association showing that:
 - 1. The suspended school and the Association, its officers and representatives, are all again free and able to exercise their own free will and volition without restraint or direction from any authority, or

- 2. the case is dismissed after a hearing, or
- 3. after a hearing the court orders otherwise.

This amendment passed unanimously to become effective immediately.

 - a. They must have had passing grades in at least four units of credit at the end of their last semester of attendance,
 - b. They must maintain passing grades in at least four units of credit during all grading periods in which they participate."

Interpretations

- 1. The amount of credit given for any subject or unit shall be as determined by the State Department of Public In-
- 2. Any subject requiring one full period of daily recitation five days a week, or the equivalent for one semester and for which one credit is counted toward graduation, is considered as one of the four units required for eligibility. Subjects for which two credits are awarded for one semester toward graduation shall be considered as two of the four units required.
- 3. The combinaton of four part-time subjects having a total value of two credits may be considered as two the four

units required provided the four combined subjects remain the same subjects throughout the semester in which they are counted.

4. All transfer students must meet these same scholastic re-

5. Students attending state approved vocational schools may requirements. transfer such credits to their home school for the purpose of establishing eligibility.

6. If a student is ineligible scholastically at the end of a grading period he is ineligible for the following grading period, At the end of a semester the semester grade takes precedence.

7. Old Section 5.

E. To amend Rule 20, Section 6, to read: "Inovative course credits may be approved by the Board provided: (1) written request is made by the principal concerned and courses are described in detail, (2) courses are approved by the State Department of Public Instruction, (3) the local Board of Trustees counts such credits toward graduation and (4) total class time is equivalent to a regular course."

Action-Passed by 17-3 vote.

F. To amend Rule 27, Section 5 to read: "All organized and formal contact football practices by players or teams shall be limited to the period beginning August 15 and terminating no later than the Association Semi-State play-off date, except for teams involved in the play-offs."

Action-Passed by 21-0 vote.

To amend Rule 27, Section 7, by adding: "Non-contact practices may be counted toward the requirement."

Action-Passed by 17-7 vote.

CONSTITUTION REVISION COMMITTEE

Recommended revisions were reported by Ward Brown for the Constitution, Part I and II of the By-Laws and by Patricia Roy for Part III of the By-Laws. The purpose being to minimize the chances of our Association being subjected to litigation as well as to simplify, clarify and update where needed. Attorneys Mark Bell and Mike Phillips have assisted in the preparation of these recommendations, Action—Approved per finalized changes by a 24-0 vote.

Complete contents will be printed in the 1972-73 Handbook and a copy as submitted and finalized will be attached to the official minutes.

COMMENDATION FOR IHSAA BOARD

The Council commended the Board of Control for upholding the spirit and policies of the Indiana High School Athletic Association.

The Athletic Council adjourned to meet again in Indianapolis on November 1, 1972, at 3:00 p.m.

SCHOOLS ELIGIBLE—These meets are open to all members of the Association except to schools holding preparatory, junior or associate memberships.

ELIGIBILITY OF ENTRIES—The eligibility of each participant shall be certified by the principal of his school. The official entry blank must be used and all data given. ENTRIES WILL CLOSE WEDNESDAY, SEPTEMBER 22, 1971 at 4:00 P.M. The entry lists must be in the IHSAA Office and sectional center principal's office complete in every detail by 4:00 p.m. on that date.

ENTRANTS—Only two teams of doubles and two competitors in singles from any one school will be permitted to compete. No competitor will be permitted to compete in both doubles and singles. A school may enter either singles players or doubles teams or both. Two alternates may be entered for the singles and two alternates for the doubles teams. Singles alternates may substitute only for singles players. Doubles alternates may substitute only for doubles. The same alternates may not be used for both singles and doubles.

MANAGEMENT—The management of these meets rests solely with the Board of Control. Responsibility of local arrangements has been delegated to the Center Principal.

RULES—Unless otherwise specifically provided in the IHSAA instructions, the U. S. Lawn Tennis Association rules shall govern in all tournaments.

TYPE OF BALL—Any standard brand ball manufactured by a reputable manufacturing firm.

AWARDS—Suitable ribbons will be presented to the two boys who place first and second in the singles and to the members of the two teams which place first and second in the doubles.

A trophy will be awarded to the winning school.

EXPENSES—There will be no entry fee. Traveling expenses and meals are to be paid by the competing schools.

EQUIPMENT—Each competitor will be required to appear fully equipped with rackets, two or more good balls, preferably new ones, and all other necessary equipment.

New balls shall be provided by the host manager for all matches. Competitors should be provided new balls if a match goes into a third set.

DRESS-A player shall wear a shirt at all times on the court.

INTERRUPTED MATCHES—In case of bad weather, play should be continued on the first fair day, excluding Sunday, thereafter.

A disrupted or postponed match should be resumed at the point where it was discontinued. No matches should be replayed nor the schedule of games altered in any way. It is recommended that a student play no more than two matches per day.

^{*}Schools from these counties did not compete in 1970.

METHOD OF PAIRING—The tournament manager shall call a meeting in advance of the meet for the purpose of drawing the playing schedule. Each school may have a representative at the meeting. The two top seeded singles players and the two top seeded doubles teams should be placed in opposite brackets.

The No. 1 and No. 2 singles players and doubles teams from the same school shall be drawn by lot. The first drawn shall be placed at the top of the upper half and the second at the top of the lower half.

The No. 1 singles players and doubles teams shall be paired with No. 2 singles and doubles teams in the first round.

At least thirty minutes shall lapse between the semi-final and final matches.

SCORING—Singles—Two points shall be awarded to the winner of the first round and two additional points shall be awarded for each round won thereafter.

Doubles—Three points shall be awarded the winner of the first round and three additional points shall be awarded for each round thereafter.

A bye or default will be counted as a win and the proper number of points will be awarded to the player who draws a bye or wins by default. However, no points for byes shall be awarded unless the player or team wins the next match following the bye.

When the score becomes 6-6 in set one or two the nine-point tie breaker system will be used. The player who receives five points is declared the winner 7-6. The procedure for using this system is: "A" serves the first two points; "B" serves the next two points; opponents change sides and "A" serves the next two points, if needed; "B" serves the next three points, if needed; "B" would serve the next game.

FACULTY REPRESENTATIVE—Contestants must be accompanied by a coach or a faculty member designated by the principal.

SECTIONAL SUBSTITUTIONS—In sectional play any substitutions may be made until actual play has started; however, the substitute must play in the original assigned position of the player he replaces. UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES SHALL THE SCHED-ULE OF PLAY BE REDRAWN.

REGIONAL AND STATE SUBSTITUTIONS—The only eligible substitutes for players who qualify in the singles for the regional or state tournament shall be the singles runners-up. Substitution may be made for a doubles player in case of illness or injury if made prior to the beginning of the regional meet. He must be taken from the doubles alternate list certified on the original entry blank.

REGIONAL MEET QUALIFICATIONS—(1) The first place winner in singles and the first place winning doubles team shall qualify for a Regional Meet. (2) The second place winners in each of above shall be the alternates.

WARNING—Entries close at 4:00 p.m. Wednesday, September 22, 1971. Send all entries to the IHSAA, 812 Circle Tower, Indianapolis, Indiana, 46204. It is suggested that entries be mailed at least two school days prior to the deadline due to the mail service.

The management of this meet rests solely with the Board of Control.

ENTRIES

Contestants shall consist of the first place qualifiers from each Regional Meet.

SCORING

Points earned by each school in state competition will be added to those points earned on the regional level by that school to establish a team championship. Points will be awarded the same as in Sectional and Regional play. There will be a playoff for third place. The third place winners in each division will win one point.

AWARDS

The IHSAA will award the winning school a trophy and medals to contestants placing 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th in both singles and doubles.

- b: Transportation allowance (Marion County schools excluded) according to round trip road map mileage—for mileage of 120 miles or under, \$2.00 per person; for mileage of 121 to 250 miles, \$4.00 per person; and for mileage of 251 miles or more, \$6.00 per person.

Expense statement forms must be completed and filed by each participating school when the team checks in at Pike High School on the day of the tourney. Reimbursement checks will be mailed to Principals following the tourney.



Cross Country

Southport High School won its second straight State Cross Country Championship in a most convincing manner. This was the twenty-sixth annual cross country championship meet and one of the most colorful. The weather was beautiful and the competition keen. Another record crowd was in attendance.

Southport, which has not lost in the last two seasons, ran away with the meet by scoring the unusually low total of 56 points. On the team scoring basis, Southport runners placed first, third, thirteenth, eighteenth and twenty-first. This great team balance provided the easy victory.

Robin Shipman of Bedford High School, one of Indiana's finest high school distance runners, defeated the defending individual state champion, Phil Wysong of West Noble. These two runners ran stride for stride until near the end at which time Shipman took the lead and won going away. He won in a record clocking of 9:20.0. Wysong's time for second was 9:33.6. In third place was Dirk Berard of Crawfordsville in 9:36.5, fourth was Brant Bennett of Southport—9:36.9 and fifth was Jim Rasch of Munster—9:38.5.

Sixteen complete teams and twelve individuals participated in the state cross country meet. Three hundred sixty teams participated in sixteen sectionals.

There were 4 regional cross country meets. North Vigo of Terre Haute won at Bloomington, Elkhart at Fort Wayne, Griffith at LaPorte and Southport at Richmond.

THE BOARD MAY FIND IT NECESSARY TO ALTER THIS PLAN IF A GREATER NUMBER OF SCHOOLS ENTER THAN IS ANTICIPATED.

Schools have been assigned by counties and the accompanying plan gives the Center Principals and the counties assigned to each center.

MANAGEMENT—The management of these meets rest solely with the Board of Control. Responsibility for local arrangements has been delegated to the center principals. All meet officials will be selected by the center principals except the referee-starter, who will be assigned by the Board of Control.

The meet must be held Friday afternoon, October 15 after 4 p.m. unless previous arrangements have been made by the center principal. The center principal shall notify all participating schools and the IHSAA office by Tuesday, October 12, as to the time and place of holding the meet. The center principal shall arrange a program for his meet from the entries sent to him and confirmed by the Commissioner. Team positions at the start are to be drawn by lot.

OPEN CONTEST—These meets are open to all members of the IHSAA except to schools holding junior, preparatory or associate memberships. A school may certify twelve students, with no more than six participating as a team for the championship. Schools that do not enter a team may enter one or more students to compete for the individual awards.

NOTE: Each year some schools file entry blanks, then fail to participate in the meet. You are requested not to file an entry blank unless you fully intend to enter a sectional meet. If for any reason, after filing an entry blank, it becomes necessary to withdraw, please notify the IHSAA office and the sectional center principal immediately.

ENTERTAINMENT—The center principal shall provide adequate dressing rooms, lockers and shower facilities for all contestants.

EXPENSES—There will be no entry fee. Traveling expenses, meals and lodging are to be paid by the competing schools.

ELIGIBILITY—The eligibility of each player shall be certified to by the principal of his school. The official entry list must be used, and all data given. Entries positively will close Wednesday, october 6. The entry lists must be in the hands of the Commissioner and the center principal, complete in every detail, by 4 p.m. on that date. Twelve students may be certified for the meet, with six or fewer participating on the date of the meet.

LENGTH OF COURSE—The course must be approximately two miles in length. If possible, it should be laid out on rolling terrain.

SCORING—All competitors who complete the race shall be ranked and tallied in accordance with their placement at the finish. Individuals are ranked and tallied in the placement column, but their position is dropped and not recorded in the team scoring column. The team score shall be determined by totaling the points scored by the first five finishing contestants on each team. The team which scores the lowest number of points will be the winner. In the event of a tie, the tie is to be broken by adding the position of the sixth place man on each of the tied teams. The team with the lower score will then be awarded the proper place.

In case one of the teams involved in the tie has only five participating members, the team with six participating members, will be awarded the higher ranking position. (Example: In case of a tie for third place, the five-man team will be automatically awarded fourth place.)

RULES—Each contestant shall wear numbers on both the front and back of his shirt. The rules of cross country running as found in the 1971 National Alliance Edition of the Track and Field Rules shall govern—with IHSAA exceptions, the length of course and limit of contestants. Shoes which have rubber or leather soles must be worn by all contestants during the entire event.

PRIZES—Suitable ribbons will be presented by the IHSAA to the members of the teams qualifying for the regional meet, provided they finish the race. The first five individual winners will receive ribbons. The IHSAA will award a trophy to the winning school.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR REGIONAL MEETS—The first four teams* to finish in each sectional shall be eligible to advance to the regional meets. The first five individuals to finish shall be eligible for the regional meet regardless of their team position.

*A school must have five or more boys finishing the race to be considered a team competing in that sectional.

The Twenty-fifth Annual State Championship Cross Country Meet will be held on Saturday morning, October 30, 1971, at 11 a.m. E.S.T. at South Grove Golf Course, 1800 W. 18th, Indianapolis.

ENTRANTS—The individual winners and the qualifying teams from each of the regional cross country meets will be eligible to compete in this meet.

MANAGEMENT—The management of this meet rests solely with the Board of Control. Officials in charge will be selected by the Board of Control.

ENTRIES—Entries will be limited to the students certified by the principal for the sectional meets.

ENTERTAINMENT—Each qualifying contestant in uniform, one coach one assistant coach and the principal from each participating school will be entertained on the following bases:

- a: Meal allowance per person \$2.00
- b: Transportation allowance (Marion County schools excluded) according to round trip road map mileage—for mileage of 120 miles or under, \$2.00 per person; for mileage of 121 to 250 miles, \$4.00 per person; and for mileage of 251 miles or more, \$6.00 per person.

Expense statement forms must be completed and filed by each participating school when the team checks in at South Grove Golf Course on the day of the tourney. Reimbursement checks will be mailed to Principals following the tourney.

LENGTH OF COURSE—A course two miles in length is planned over a rolling terrain.

RULES AND SCORING—(See Sectional.)

PRIZES—The IHSAA will award the winning school a trophy, and individual medals to members of the teams finishing first, second, third, fourth and fifth. Only actual contestants finishing the

race will be eligible for awards. Medals of gold, silver or bronze will be awarded the individual winners of first, second, third, fourth and fifth places in the race.

ADMISSION—There will be no admission charge. Coaches and spectators will be restricted to roped areas and will not be allowed on the course during the race.

REGISTRATION—All contestants must be checked in at South Grove Club House by the coach or principal. The check-in office will be open at 9:00 a.m. E.S.T. on Saturday, October 30. All teams must be checked in by 10:00 a.m. in order to complete arrangements for the meet. Principals, or their representatives, are responsible for the proper registration of their teams on time. Each team will be limited to six entrants (1 to serve as an alternate) in long horse vaulting, strip floor exercise, sidehorse, horizontal bar, parallel bars and still rings if at least 2 of the 6 are all-around entries. In the all-around and trampoline each team will be limited to 4 entries.

For actual competition each team will be limited to three All-Around participants but may enter up to five participants in Long

Horse Vaulting, Strip Floor Exercises, Side Horse, Horizontal Bar, Parallel Bars and Still Rings, if at least two of the five are All-Around entries. A maximum of 3 participants will be permitted in the Trampoline.

ELIGIBILITY OF ENTRIES

The eligibility of each student shall be certified to by the principal of the school entering a team. The Official Entry List must be used and all data given. Entries will close Wednesday, February 16, 1972 at 4:00 P.M. The entry lists must be in the hands of the commissioner and the Center Principal COMPLETE IN EVERY DETAIL ON THAT DATE.

EVENTS

The list and order of championship events shall be:

- 1. Long Horse Vaulting
- 2. Strip Floor Exercise
- 3. Side Horse
- 4. Horizontal Bar
- 5. Trampoline
- 6. Parallel Bars
- 7. Still Rings
- 8. All-Around (includes competition in numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 6 and 7. The nominees of the All-Around event shall be the competitor who obtains the highest aggregate number of points in these events in the preliminaries.)

Note: Two events shall be run concurrently.

COSTUME

A complete athletic costume must be worn by all gymnasts. Costume to consist of shirt, trunks or long trousers, gymnastic shoes or socks.

OFFICIAL RULES

The official rules as outlined in the 1971-72 National Federation Boys Gymnastics Rules Book shall govern.

PROGRAMS

Souvenir programs provided by the Center School shall be the only program distributed or sold at the tourney and no solicitation of advertisements shall be made.

SCORING

Team scores in the sectional meets shall include all individual events. Ten places shall be awarded points on the basis of 11-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1. In case of a tie, the total score of all four judges will be used to break the tie.

STATE MEET QUALIFICATION

The first five ranking competitors in each event shall qualify for the State Final Meet.

Entries close at 4:00 P.M. Wednesday, February 16, 1972. The above rules and regulations are subject to change if the Board of Control should deem it necessary. It is suggested that the entries be mailed at least two school days prior to the deadline due to the mail service.



Swimming

A record breaking number of high school swimming teams participated in the eight IHSAA sponsored sectional swimming meets. One hundred one teams participated. This was a gain of five over the previous year.

Sectional meets were sponsored at Bloomington High, Kokomo Haworth, Lafayette Jefferson, LaPorte, Munster, Pendleton Heights, South Bend Washington and Warren Central (Indianapolis).

Bloomington High, Kokomo Haworth, Lafayette Jefferson, LaPorte and Munster all won their sectionals. Anderson won at Pendleton Heights; Jackson won at South Bend Washington and Southport at Warren Central.

For the first time the twelve-place scoring system was used. Consolation finals—seventh through twelfth places—were run off in all events.

Three new records were established. The Bloomington High 200-Yard Medley Relay wiped out the oldest record in the books with a time of 1:42.333. The team was composed of John Komorita, Paul Komorita, Douglas Deppe and Chris Bartlett. Two new records were set by Bloomington High's outstanding junior Mike Kearney. He swam the 200-Yard Freestyle in 1:46.052 and the 400-Yard Freestyle in 3:45.591.

CONTESTANTS AND REQUIREMENTS

In each of the nine individual events, each school may enter three contestants and two may compete. The student's best time during the season must be indicated for each event's on the official entry lists. Unless the contestants best performance is indicated in the proper space he will not be considered entered in that event. Diving cards filled out in detail and signed by the contestant must be sent to the center principal with the entry list.

Each school may enter a team in the relays. Eight names may be entered for each relay and any four will constitute the team. The relays will count as events. No contestant may enter nor participate in more than three events, at least one of which must be a relay. Being designated as a relay contestant shall count as an event.

ELIGIBILITY OF ENTRIES

The eligibility of each student entered shall be certified to by the principal of his school. The official Entry List must be used and all data given. Entries will close Wednesday, February 2, 1972, at 4:00 P.M. The entry lists must be in the hands of the Commissioner and the Center Principal complete in every detail by 4:00 P.M. on that date. The diving card must be sent to the Center Principal with the entry list.

SCRATCH MEETINGS

A scratch meeting for the Thursday night session shall be held at 5:00 P.M., one hour prior to the start of the session. The coach or a representative shall be in attendance. A similar scratch meeting

MIKE KEARNEY Bloomington High School 200 Yd. & 400 Yd. Freestyle New State Record





Wrestling

The 1972 IHSAA State Wrestling Tournament Team Championship was won by Bloomington High School with a narrow margin of one-half point over Beech Grove. This was the fourth consecutive team championship for the Panthers and their thirteenth crown in the thirty-four year history of this event.

Tournament format was changed to include 32 sectionals where 265 teams and approximately 3100 contestants participated. 768 contestants representing 188 schools advanced to the 8 regionals, 96 contestants from 63 different schools advanced to the State Finals to compete in three sessions before 13,000 fans in the Southport Fieldhouse.

The Board of Control selected John Hobbs of Shortridge High School as the recipient of the Harold F. Mumby Award for Mental Attitude.

State

Southport High School will host the thirty-fourth annual tournament. Albert Theil is the Center Principal in charge of local arrangements.

IV ELIGIBLE SCHOOLS-Only those schools with full membership in the Association are eligible to enter.

Each school must enter contestants in ten or more weight classes (except School For The Blind & School For The Deaf) and a school's varsity team must have participated in a minimum of six interschool scheduled dual meets or tournaments to be eligible to enter.

V ENTRIES

- A. Entry List-The eligibility of each entrant shall be certified by the principal of the school entering a team and entries will close Wednesday, January 26 at 4:00 P.M. This list must be in the hands of the Commissioner and Center Principal COM-PLETE IN EVERY DETAIL BY THAT DATE, All contestants must be eligible in every respect when they are certified.
- Weight Certification-The blue copy of the Certified Actual Wrestling Weight Report must accompany the Sectional Center copy of your Official Entry List.

- C. Physical Examination-Whenever a contestant's physical condition is questionable, it is recommended that he have a physical examination immediately prior to this tournament to determine whether he is physically fit to participate.
- D. Representation-A school shall be represented by only one contestant in each weight class and no substitution is allowed from that school for an injured contestant or for a forfeit once they have weighed in at the tournament.

VI AWARDS

- A. Sectionals-Ribbons shall be presented to individuals placing first, second, third and fourth in each weight class. A trophy will be presented to the winning school.
- B. Regionals-Ribbons shall be presented to individuals placing first, second, third and fourth in each weight class.
- C. State—A trophy will be presented to the winning school and medals to individuals placing first, second, third and fourth in each weight class.

The Board of Control will award the Harold F. Mumby Award For Mental Attitude to an outstanding senior participant. The recipient must excell in mental attitude. scholarship, school citizenship and athletic ability in wrestling. Nominations must be initiated by the candidate's principal and coach.

VII ELIGIBILITY OF ENTRANTS

- A. Each entrant whose name appears on the entry list shall have previously met the following special eligibility requirement/s:
 - 1. Wrestled in a minimum of 5 interschool meets or
 - 2. To enter in his certified weight class-he must have weighed-in at a minimum of 7 meets in that class or
 - 3. To enter in the class immediately above his certified weight class-he must have weighed-in at a minimum of 7 meets in his certified weight class and/or in the class immediately higher.
 - NOTE: See Rule 33-6. He may count a match held before the third Thursday in December if he made the weight class in which he was later certified. Only those contestants who receive a forfeit may count such as a qualifying match. Weighing-in at a tournament shall count as one weigh-in.

VIII FINANCIAL TERMS

- A. Sectionals and Regionals-
 - 1. Tournament expenses excluding cost of equipment, shall be paid by the center school from the gross receipts.
 - 2. The center school shall receive fifty dollars (\$50.00).
 - 3. The sectional balance shall be divided 40% to center school and 60% to IHSAA.

- The regional balance shall be divided 25% to center school and 75% to IHSAA.
- 5. Deficits will be reimbursed by the IHSAA.
- 6. There will be no travel, meal nor lodging allowance paid to the competing schools.
- B. State—Allowance will be as follows: (1) Meals—The IHSAA will pay \$4.00 per man for actual participants, one student manager, one coach, one assistant coach and the principal. (2) Mileage—The IHSAA will pay transportation expenses for each of the actual participants, one student manager, one coach, one assistant coach and the principal. Mileage will be paid on the following basis:

Two dollars (\$2.00) per man for schools traveling one hundred twenty miles (round-trip) or under from Southport High School, Indianapolis, the schools in Marion County not sharing; Four dollars (\$4.00) per man for schools traveling between one hundred twenty-one miles and two hundred fifty miles (round-trip) from Southport High School; Six dollars (\$6.00) per man for schools traveling two hundred fifty-one miles or over (round-trip) from Southport High School. Mileage in all cases shall be ascertained from the latest Indiana road map.

IX MANAGEMENT

- A. The management rests solely with the Board of Control.
- B. Responsibility for local arrangements has been delegated to the Center Principals. Complete information must be sent to all participating schools and officials.

X OFFICIALS

- A. Bench officials, etc. are to be selected by the Center Principal and meet director. Only qualified adult help shall be used as official score-keepers and timers.
- B. Referees will be selected by the IHSAA Board of Control.
 Three are assigned to sectionals, four to regionals and six to
 the State.
- C. Judges will be used in sectionals during overtimes only. The center school is authorized to employ a licensed IHSAA wrestling official, or use one of the varsity coaches present without remuneration, to assist the third referee as judge. Regional and State referees shall rotate as judges-referees.

XI TICKETS—ADMISSIONS

- A. Sectional—Single session \$1.00, season ticket \$2.50. Actual competing contestants, alternates, student manager, coach, assistant coach and principal shall be admitted free.
- B. Regional—Single session \$1.00, season ticket \$2.50. Actual competing contestants, student manager, coach, assistant coach and principal shall be admitted free.

C. State—Single session \$1.50, season ticket \$3.75. Actual competing contestants, student manager, coach, assistant coach and principal shall be admitted free.

XII TOURNAMENT RULES

- A. Official Rules—The current rules as published in the Official NCAA Wrestling Guide, as modified for high school participation and as further modified in these regulations by the IHSAA, shall govern.
- B. Weight Classifications are 98, 105, 112, 119, 126, 132, 138, 145, 155, 167, 185, Heavyweight Limited 185-250. The certified actual weight of each contestant for a weight class must be one of the above weights or less except in the heavyweight limited class.
 - 1. Weighing-in—A contestant may NOT wrestle in a class lower than the class of his certified actual weight. He may NOT wrestle in a class higher than the class immediately above his certified actual weight. Exception, those weighing less than 185 lbs. may not wrestle in the heavyweight limited class.
 - Weight Allowance—ALL weight classifications are allowed two additional pounds in January and one additional pound in February. This allows a net weight increase of three pounds beginning February 1.

C. Advancement

- Sectional to Regional—The first and second place contestants in each weight class will advance to the Regional.
 Third place shall qualify as first alternate with fourth place qualifying as second alternate.
- 2. Regional to State—The first place winners shall advance to the State. The second place winner shall qualify as first alternate with third place qualifying as second alternate.

Schools who have contestants qualified and unable to compete must notify their Meet Director as soon as possible.

- D. Disqualifications—Forfeits—Disqualification due to a technical violation, illegal holds or less flagrant unnecessary roughness does not eliminate a contestant from further competition for consolation matches. Disqualification for any other reason eliminates a contestant from further competition. A forfeit eliminates a contestant from further competition.
- E. Length of Matches—Overtimes—All matches shall be six minutes in length, divided into three periods of two minutes each with no rest between periods. In case of a tie after the three periods, the contestants shall wrestle three extra periods of one minute each. When there is a tie in points at the end of the overtime periods, a jury of two judges and the referee shall render a final decision.

F. Pairings and Seeding

1. Sectional pairings and seeding will be made at 7:00 PM

- on Monday preceding the sectional tournament at the center site.
- a. Each participating school in that sectional may have only one voting representative present. Positions of contestants from schools not represented will be drawn by lot.
- b. At least two and no more than four contestants shall be seeded in each weight class. Coaches should bring their official team score book.
- c. A copy of the Official Entry List and Certified Actual Weight Report from each school will be in the hands of the tourney director at the time of seeding meeting.
- d. Each coach must designate the names of his entrant and alternate for each weight class before the seeding is started. NO entrant may be an alternate in more than one weight class.
- e. Only the designated alternate may be substituted after this meeting.
- f. Pairings at this meeting shall be by lot after the seedings are made. These pairings shall be final and will not be redrawn.
- g. If a contestant or his designated alternate fails to qualify in his weight class at weigh-in time for the sectional, he shall forfeit to his first round opponent.
- h. If a contestant cannot qualify in his weight class on a subsequent day of the tournament, he shall be disqualified and a forfeit shall be awarded to his opponent.
- 2. Regional pairings will be made by the IHSAA placing the first and second place sectional winners in opposite brackets.
- 3. State pairings will be made by the IHSAA.
- G. Scoring—Individual and team scoring shall be decided according to Rule 5 in the NCAA Wrestling Guide. (Exception—all matches shall be "sudden death" until the final four qualifiers of each weight class have been determined). No points are awarded for a bye in any round.
- H. Sideline Coaching—Two chairs shall be provided at each mat, preferably at opposite corners, for the head coaches of the two participants. Coaching shall be limited to words of help and encouragement. Derogatory remarks made from this position will serve as bases for banishment to the regular team bench area.
- Programs—Souvenir programs provided by the Center School shall be the only program distributed at the tournament and no solicitations or advertisements shall be made.
- J. Signs and Banners—The displaying of signs, banners, etc. is prohibited. Such devices obstruct the view of spectators and in many instances are hazardous.
- K. Time Advantage—No riding time will be kept and there will be no points awarded for time advantage.

L. Time-out—A total of three minutes is allowed during the progress of each match to care for injuries. No rest period is allowed for fatigue or for any other reason except as provided between bouts.

XIII SUGGESTED PROCEDURES TO FOLLOW AT SEEDING MEETING

- A. Equipment and Supplies: Chalkboard, numbers and shaker bottle; sufficient chairs and tables; sufficient blank bracket sheets for each weight and coach (brackets will also be needed for classes in which all schools do not enter).
- B. Have each head coach stand, introduce himself and his assistant and tell what school they represent.
- C. Follow the conduct of tournament recommendations in the NCAA Official Wrestling Guide—Rule 4.
- D. Each coach is encouraged to prepare a complete individual record of his wrestlers to be seeded including opponents names and schools and match scores.
- E. Coaches should strive to keep open minds when seedings are being decided. The main objective of seeding is to have outstanding wrestlers separated in the brackets so that they will not meet each other until the finals.
- F. When there are several with equal ability to be seeded their positions shall be determined by drawing. Consideration should be given to (a) a returning champion or runnerup, (b) an undefeated season record—greatest number of wins having preference, or (c) an exceptional record against acknowledged strong opposition.
- G. A seeded contestant shall have the same opportunity to draw for a bye as other contestants in his bracket.

XIV SEASON REGULATIONS

- A. WEIGHT CLASSIFICATIONS ARE: 98, 105, 112, 119, 126, 132, 138, 145, 155, 167, 185, Heavyweight Limited 185-250. The certified (actual) weight of each contestant for a weight class must be one of the above weights or less excent in the heavyweight limited class. A contestant may NOT wrestle in a class higher than the class immediately above his certified actual weight. THE USE OF A SWEAT BOX OR SIMILAR ARTIFICIAL HEAT DEVICE FOR WEIGHT REDUCTION PURPOSES IS PROHIBITED.
- B. WEIGHT ALLOWANCE: ALL weight classifications are allowed two additional pounds in January and one additional pound in February. This will make a net weight increase of three pounds beginning February 1.
- C. WEIGHING-IN: Contestants shall weigh-in without clothing and their actual weight shall be recorded in ink in the official (home) score book and signed by the referee.

- A. Prior to the third Thursday in December a contestant may wrestle
 - (1) in any weight class for which he had made weight or
 - (2) in the next higher weight class above his actual weight class.
- D. CERTIFIED ACTUAL WEIGHT: On the third Thursday in December, a contestant's certified weight class for the IHSAA tournament series and season meets shall be established by his ACTUAL NET WEIGHT before 6:00 PM on that date.

Thereafter he must weigh-in his certified weight class or in the next higher weight class. If he weighs-in below his certified weight class HE IS INELIGIBLE. If he weighs-in the class immediately above his certified weight class then he cannot wrestle in any other class during that meet or tournament.

- All schools sponsoring wrestling must complete Certified Actual Wrestling Weight Report/s and file with IHSAA office on this date.
- 2. The official weigh-in must be conducted by the coach in the presence of the principal.
- 3. Any wrestler who is legitimately absent from school (injury, illness, etc.) or who is scholastically ineligible on this date must be weighed-in on the first day that he returns to school or the first day that he becomes scholastically eligible. His supplementary Certified Actual Weight Report must be on file in the IHSAA office before he is eligible to wrestle in a meet or tournament.

E. CERTIFIED ACTUAL WRESTLING WEIGHT REPORT

- 1. To be completed in triplicate on the third Thursday in December
- 2. The WHITE copy must be filed with the IHSAA office and postmarked on the third Thursday in December.
- 3. The BLUE copy shall be retained by the school and must accompany the Sectional Center copy of your Official Entry List.
- 4. The YELLOW copy shall be retained by the school and must be presented at all weigh-ins for regularly scheduled meets. If this is not presented at time of weigh-in, the meet shall proceed with the understanding that no results are final until the yellow copy or facsimile is furnished to the other school or meet manager within four days. Failure to furnish this copy within the time limit will result in the forfeiture of all matches by the offending school.
- F. Time Advantage—No riding time will be kept and there will be no points awarded for time advantage.
- G. Timers' and Scorers' Responsibilities

Match timekeepers are:

- In charge of the scorers and should be constantly checking their activities at all times.
- 2. Responsible for keeping the over-all time of the match.
- 5. Responsible for recording accumulated time-outs for injury.
- 4. Responsible for informing the referee when a coach requests a conference with the referee or whenever there is a disagreement by the official scorers.
- 5. Responsible for assisting the referee in determining whether a situation occurred before or after the termination of a period.
- Responsible for calling the minutes to the referee, contestants and spectators in each match. The last minute shall be reported at fifteen second intervals.

Scorers are responsible for:

- Recording which contestant has the position of advantage at the start of the second and third periods.
- Recording points scored by both contestants when signaled by the referee.
- 3. Constantly checking each other's score reading.
- $4_{\scriptscriptstyle \parallel}$ Immediately advising the match time keeper when they are in disagreement regarding the score.
- Keeping the score board operator continually advised of the official score during each match.
- 6. Showing the referee the score card at the end of each match.






HAROLD F. MUMBY AWARD

Basketball

Connersville High School won the sixty-third annual State Basketball Championship tournament. Their record was 26-3.

The State Tournament was held for the first time in spacious new Indiana University Assembly Hall. A record crowd of 17,427 was in attendance.

In the championship game the underdog Connersville Spartans led all the way except for a few seconds near the end of the first quarter. Their lead was 14-11 at the quarter, 45-28 at halftime and 58-45 going into the final quarter. The final score was 80-63. The meticulous and well-drilled Spartans executed well during the entire game. The play of the guards, Larry Miller and Gary Redelman with 26 and 20 points respectively was particularly outstanding. Phil Cox added 13 points and 9 rebounds.

In the first afternoon game Gary West with a blistering 15 of 28 first half shooting defeated Madison Heights of Anderson by a score of 75-67. The score at the quarter was 20-12, 38-24 at halftime; 61-45 at the three quarter mark and the final score 75-67 with Gary West leading all the way. Madison Heights gamely charged back, but due to the large lead built up by Gary West in the first half and inability to hit free throws could never close the gap.

The second game of the afternoon was a nerve-shattering, heart-stopping double overtime game in which Connersville defeated Jeffersonville 76-69. Connersville led 14-12 at the quarter; 35-32 at halftime and 50-43 going into the final quarter. However Jeffersonville outscored Connersville 22-15 in the final quarter and tied the score at 65 all. In the first overtime, each team tallied 4 points to remain deadlocked at 69. However, in the second overtime Connersville scored 7 points to 0 for Jeffersonville, making the final score 76-69 in favor of Connersville.

The Board of Control selected Mark Inman of Jeffersonville High School as the recipient of the coveted Arthur L. Trester Award for Mental Attitude.

Consolidations again decreased the number of participants from 443 the previous year to 427.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF STATE BASKETBALL TOURNEY SERIES

THE SIXTY-SECOND ANNUAL

The Board of Control has completed the details for the State Championship Basketball Tourneys and announces the plan in full;

with the understanding that the Board of Control reserves the right to readjust the plan and arrangements for any and all tourneys if conditions arise making changes advisable or cancellations necessary.

GENERAL INFORMATION CONCERNING SECTIONAL, REGIONAL, SEMI-STATE AND STATE TOURNEYS

- 1. TYPE OF BALL—The molded type basketball approved orange or natural tan has been legalized for the State Championship Series. See pages 17 and 20 for Semi-State and State balls.
- 2. PRIZES—No prizes of any kind are to be awarded to any school or individual from any source, other than the IHSAA. The IHSAA will present a trophy to each sectional winner.
- 3. RADIO AND TELEVISION COVERAGE—Radio and television stations in Indiana may broadcast or telecast IHSAA tourneys provided the requirements in the "IHSAA Rules and Regulations Governing Broadcasting and Telecasting" are observed. Station managers and Center Principals will have copies of these rules and regulations. No delayed broadcasts of these games will be permitted during school hours. Television stations may be permitted to telecast only the final game of Sectional and Regional Tourneys as well as all games of Semi-state and State Tourneys. Advanced written approval must be obtained from the center principal for broadcasting or telecasting all tournaments except the State Final. Telecasting restrictions are: 1. Stations may telecast in their home area only, 2. Delayed telecasts will not be permitted. 3. A guarantee must be posted to cover costs of unsold seats for the sessions telecast.
- 4. PICTURES—Flashlight pictures of the players shall not be taken during the progress of the games, except where photographers use speed light cameras. This ruling is meant to protect the vision of the players. Photographers desiring to take pictures shall make previous arrangements with the management of the tourney. The number of photographers and their locations shall be determined by the Center School management. Filming of tournament games will not be permitted.
- 5. SOUVENIR PROGRAMS—Souvenir programs other than those provided by the IHSAA shall not be distributed or sold at any tourney, and no solicitation of advertisements shall be made. Neither the Board of Control nor the Commissioner's Office will approve the distribution of such material at any tourney. Any one claiming to have such approval should be reported to the IHSAA office immediately. All principals should notify their business men now.
- 6. SUGGESTIONS—Sectional Center Principals and participating principals should work with each other prior to the tourney, during the tourney and after the tourney. A conference of all principals, several days prior to the tourney, would result in an agreement on all points such as meals, transportation, rest rooms, seating, tickets, reports, etc. Agreements reached prior to tourneys prevent diffi-

culties during and after tourneys. Make and keep copies of all agreements.

- 7. MANAGEMENT—The exclusive control of all these tourneys rests solely with the Board of Control according to the IHSAA Constitution. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center principals. Officials for each tourney will be selected and assigned by the Board of Control, and every effort will be made to choose only fair, disinterested and competent men. All schedules and assignment of officials will be made and distributed by the Board. All schedules will be drawn by lot by the Board of Control, and no changes will be made in them. Representatives of the press will be invited.
- 8. TIME SCHEDULE—All sectional tourneys will be held on the prevailing time of the community in which the center is located. Game times will be 7:00 & 8:30 PM for two-game sessions, 7:30 PM for single game sessions other than the championship game session which will be held at 8:00 PM.
- 9. OFFICIALS—The assignment of game officials and their decisions will be considered final. Schools enter the tourneys with this understanding. Give this information to your students and fans now.

Official scorer(s) shall be dressed in a manner that will distinguish them from others who may be seated at the scorers and timers table. Black and white striped shirts or jackets are strongly recommended.

- 10. PRIVILEGES—Twelve competing players, coaches, principal and student manager for each team (16 in all) shall be admitted free to all games.
- 11. OVERTIME GAMES—The same rule applies in tourneys as used during the regular season games.
- 12. WARM-UP PERIOD—There shall be fifteen minutes allowed between games for warm-up practice. During a session, this period shall start with the ending of the previous game. The first two teams playing in a session shall also be limited to the fifteen minute warm-up period. This fifteen minute period shall be exclusive of announcements and opening ceremonies.
- 13. CHEER LEADERS—Only the cheer leaders from the two participating schools may be used in connection with any one game. They shall use only that portion of the floor which is immediately in front of their fans and shall remain outside the boundary lines at all times while the game is in progress.
- 14. RESTRICTIONS—Please inform your students and others about the following tourney restrictions:
- a. Balloons, banners, posters, etc., that are objectionable in the wording or which obstruct the view of others, are not allowed.
- b. Cow-bells, and other such noise instruments are not allowed.
- c. The use of bands at IHSAA tourneys is not sanctioned.
- d. No live animal mascots are permitted.

e. "Line-up" lanes of fans shall not be permitted on the playing floor at any time.

It shall be the responsibility of each high school principal to see that his fans (adult & student) abide by the above restrictions, NOTE: Card sections as part of the cheering block are permitted.

15. HOME TEAM—The first named team in each game throughout the entire tournament is always designated as the "Home Team." It shall wear white uniforms and have a choice of bench (exception—host team shall have choice of home bench).

The second named team in each game shall have choice of basket and wear colored uniforms. In the event the Host Team is the second named team, it shall wear colored uniforms but have choice of bench only.

SECTIONAL TOURNEYS

February 21-26

The following bases were used in selecting sectional, regional and semi-state centers:

(1) Invitations filed by the principals. (2) Locations considered but not necessarily the determining factor. (3) Transportation facilities. (4) General conditions—attitude of local authorities, floors, seating capacities and entertaining facilities. (5) Rotation. (6) Success and satisfactory management of previous tourneys. (7) Adjustment because of reorganization and consolidation.

Many schools have been assigned by counties but there are a number of exceptions which are clearly indicated. Some changes were made to equalize the number of participating teams resulting in better balanced schedules or the use of less school time. The plan arranged is to have no less than 4 teams and no more than 8 teams in each tourney, and the assignment of all schools is given in the list which follows. The number of schools that probably will enter the tourneys is indicated. No doubt these numbers will be very nearly correct for this year. Correct information will not be available until the entry blanks have been received and accepted by the Board of Control. The numbers are tentative. The winners will constitute the teams in the Regional Tourneys according to assignment. Entry blanks are necessary. An entry blank is enclosed with the Principal's copy of this bulletin.

MANAGEMENT—Four officials will be assigned by the IHSAA to all tourneys. Two officials will work each game. In one-game sessions a third official is designated as an alternate and is obligated to be present and ready for work while the fourth official will be unassigned and shall not report at that session.

In two-game sessions all four officials are obligated to be present and ready for work throughout the entire session. The Center Principal shall notify the assigned officials of times, parking, etc.

TOURNEY REQUIREMENTS—A high school shall not be considered eligible for entering an IHSAA sectional basketball tourney in any year unless the team known as the first team and representing the high school has played eight (8) interscholastic games during that season before filing an entry blank. Schools holding associate, junior or preparatory membership are not eligible to enter.

ENTERTAINMENT—Twelve men may be certified and in uniform. The Center Principals have contracted with the Board of Control to entertain sixteen men (which must include two coaches,

principal and student manager) from each competing school according to the following plan:

- Transportation—All schools are entitled to one round-trip mileage allowance each day the tourney is in session.
- Meals—All schools are entitled to one meal for each day the tourney is in session.
- 3. Due to the variations of time schedules of "One-Site Two-Bracket" tourneys, the time schedules, entertainment schedules and admission prices will be set up by the IHSAA and sent to all Center Principals concerned. It will be the obligation of the Center Principal to send copies to all schools in his sectional area. The time schedules of all tourneys will be published as usual at the time of the drawings.
- 4. No lodging shall be paid.

Fairness by all parties must prevail in this matter of entertainment. Money spent for entertainment decreases the amount to be divided among the schools.

EXPENSES—An entrance fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each team must accompany the entry blank. The Center Schools have contracted to make settlement out of the receipts of the tourneys according to the following plan and in the following order:

- 1. All legitimate expenses, such as meals, officials, etc., except for team transportation, shall be paid from the gross receipts.
- 2. The Center High School shall receive two hundred dollars (\$200).
- 3. The transportation shall be paid (The Board of Control has decided on four (4) cents per mile per man (limited to 16 men) for each round trip. Mileage should be considered as the most direct distance between the school building of the participating school and the gymnasium in which the tourney is held.)
- 4. The Center High School shall receive one hundred dollars (\$100).
- 5. The IHSAA shall receive one percent (1%) of the fourth balance.
- 6. (a) One-half of the fifth balance shall be divided equally among the participating schools, the Center School sharing.
- (b) One-half of the fifth balance shall be divided among the participating schools on an enrollment basis.
- 7. The Board of Control shall pass on all reports by the Center School and all reports by the participating schools.
- 8. The Center School shall furnish a complete financial report to the IHSAA and to each participating school by Thursday, March 2.

ELIGIBILITY—The eligibility of each player must be certified to by the principal of the school sending the team. The Official Entry List must be used and all data given. Entries will close Wednesday, February 9, 1972, at 4:00 P.M. The entry lists must be in the hands of the Commissioner and the Center Principal COMPLETE IN

EVERY DETAIL BY 4:00 P.M. ON THAT DATE. Do not mail entry blanks before January 31. All students must be eligible when they participate as well as when they are certified. It is advisable to mail the entry blanks early as changes can be made by telephone, telegram or letter any time up to 4:00 p.m. Wednesday, February 9. Registered or certified letters are not recommended, as they are a slow form of delivery. Regular or special delivery mailing is the most satisfactory. A notification from this office will acknowledge receipt and correctness of your entry. The Board of Control has ruled that late entry blanks will not be accepted.

ADMISSION—The admission fees in all sectional tourneys shall be as indicated below and the tickets shall be printed with the following information on them:

Tickets shall not be sold for more nor less than the prices listed. Season tickets only shall be sold prior to the opening session of the tourney. Any remaining tickets may be sold as session tickets.

ONE-SITE TWO-BRACKET TOURNEYS:

Due to the variation in the number of sessions, season ticket prices shall be established by the Board of Control through the IHSAA office and the center Principal.

No more tickets shall be sold than the seating capacity of the gymnasium will justify. Standing room shall not be sold or used. All requirements of the State and City Fire Marshals shall be met in all tourneys.

RESERVED SEATS—The Board strongly recommends that all seats be reserved.

DISTRIBUTION OF TICKETS—The following plan for the division of sectional tourney tickets was adopted by the Board of Control:

- 1. Deduct from the total number of tickets available, sixteen tickets for each competing school, press and complimentary tickets. Each Athletic Council Member and each Ex-Board member shall be granted two tickets to the sectional in his area upon request by Wednesday, February 16.
- 2. Ten percent of the remaining tickets shall be divided equally among the competing schools. (Every school regardless of enrollment, has a certain "must" list; such as assistant coaches, trainers, student managers, cheerleaders, etc. This allotment is intended primarily for this use.)
- 3. The remaining ninety percent shall be divided among the competing schools on the basis of enrollment of each participat-

ing school in grades 9 through 12 as certified to the State Department of Public Instruction, September 17, 1971, or the third day of school if the opening day is later than September 17.

No tickets shall be distributed by the Center Principal until his tourney schedule has been released. Season tickets must be ready for distribution by Thursday, February 17. The IHSAA will furnish Center Principals with enrollments of all high schools participating in their tourneys. Season tickets unsold shall be returned by 8:00 a.m. on the day the tourney begins, except that in "one-site two-bracket" tourneys, they shall be returned by 1:00 p.m. the day before the tourney if the tourney begins with a day time session; and by 8:00 a.m. on the day of the tourney if the tourney begins with an evening session. The Center Principal is under no obligation to accept the return of tickets after these hours, unless previous arrangements have been made with him.

WARNINGS—Entries close at 4:00 p.m. Wednesday, February 9 and cannot be changed or accepted afterward. An entrance fee of one dollar (\$1.00) must accompany IHSAA copy of entry list. Send only the IHSAA copy of entry list and your check to IHSAA, 812 Circle Tower, Indianapolis. Send "Tournament Copy" of entry list to Center Principal. Get all data right the first time and on time, but do not mail lists before January 31. Late or incomplete entry lists cannot be accepted.

Entertainment will begin, if necessary, at 9:00 a.m. Saturday, March 11, and continue if necessary, to 8:00 a.m. Sunday, March 12. All competing schools are requested to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary. The Center Schools have contracted to make settlement out of the receipts of the tourneys according to the following plan and in the following order:

- 1. (a) The Center School shall receive two and one-half per cent $(2\ 1/2\%)$ of gross receipts. (b) The Field House Rental (which shall not exceed twelve and one-half percent [12 1/2%] of gross receipts) shall be paid.
- 2. All other legitimate expenses, such as meals, rooms, officials, etc., except for team transportation, shall then be paid from the remaining balance.
- 3. The team transportation shall be paid. (See sectional transportation allowance page 11.)
- 4. Each participating school shall receive a bonus of six hundred dollars (\$600.00).
 - 5. The IHSAA shall receive the remainder.
- 6. The Board of Control shall pass on all reports by the Center School and all reports by the participating schools.
- 7. The Center School shall furnish a complete financial report to the IHSAA and to each participating school by Wednesday, March 15.

ADMISSION—The admission fees in all semi-state tourneys shall be as indicated and the tickets shall be printed with the following information on them:

- 2. Season ticket:\$4.00

Tickets shall not be sold for more nor less than the prices listed. Season tickets only shall be sold prior to the opening session of the tourney. Any remaining tickets may be sold as session tickets. No more tickets shall be sold than the seating capacity of the gymnasium will justify. Standing room shall not be sold or used. All requirements of the State and City Fire Marshals shall be met in all tourneys.

BALL-The following balls shall be used at each site as indicated:

TIME OF GAMES-12:00, 1:30 and 8:00 p.m. prevailing time of center.

DISTRIBUTION OF TICKETS—All tickets shall be distributed by the Center School Principal according to the following plan:

- 1. Season tickets only shall be sold prior to Saturday, March 11, and shall be sold only to high school principals in the Semi-state area.
- 2. Each Center Principal will be required to keep on file the full names and addresses of all ticket purchasers prior to the open sale, together with the number of tickets purchased by each and shall make a complete report to the IHSAA. Tickets distributed by principals in an improper way or at a price higher than the price on the ticket will jeopardize the standing of the high school.
- 3. Press. (a) Each paper within the Semi-state district but outside the tourney center may be granted one ticket upon request not later than Saturday, March 4.
- (b) Each daily paper in the tourney center and each daily paper in the city of participating school may be granted three tickets upon request not later than Monday, March 6.
- (c) Papers outside of the state shall not be granted tickets unless they have a large coverage in the state, and then the limit is given under (a).
 - (d) School papers shall not be granted tickets.
- 4. Radio. Each station broadcasting the games may be granted three tickets upon request not later than Monday, March 6. (School stations excluded).
- 5. Complimentary tickets shall be confined to those directly connected with the tourney in some way. Each Athletic Council Member and each Ex-Board Member shall be granted two tickets to the semi-state in his area upon request prior to Saturday, March 4. Each participating school is entitled to sixteen complimentary tickets for the use of its twelve players, the principal, two coaches and a student manager. A list of the complimentary tickets must be furnished the IHSAA, giving the name, position and number of tickets.
- 6. The Center School, if not a participant, shall receive five percent of the number of tickets representing the actual seating capacity of the gymnasium.
- 7. Schools entered in a sectional tourney may secure sixteen (16) tickets to the semi-state tourney in their area. Orders must reach the semi-state principal between February 26 and March 1. All principals should use the Semi-state Ticket Order enclosed with this bulletin, and should attach a check in the proper amount, sending the order and remittance TO THE SEMI-STATE CENTER PRINCIPAL IN THEIR AREA.
- 8. Each participating school may secure tickets at this stage as follows, providing they are purchased and paid for by the high school principal not later than March 7.
 - (a) One-half of the tickets remaining divided on an equal basis.

- (b) One-half of the tickets remaining divided on an enrollment basis, the enrollment being that for grades 9 through 12 as submitted to the Inspection Office of the State Department of Public Instruction, September 17, 1971, or the third day of school, if the opening date is later than September 17.
- (c) If one or more of these participating schools do not purchase all of the tickets allotted to them, then these tickets shall be apportioned to the other participating schools and the Center School if not a participant, on the two bases mentioned in (a) and (b).
- 9. All tickets remaining at this stage shall be placed on open sale on Thursday, March 9, 9:00 a.m., with the understanding that all sales shall be controlled to insure fairness to all.

STATE TOURNEY

ASSEMBLY HALL INDIANA UNIVERSITY, BLOOMINGTON MARCH 18

ENTRANTS—The four (4) winning teams of the semi-state tourneys shall constitute the participants in the State Tourney. The schedule will be drawn by lot by the Board of Control according to sectional tourney plan.

ENTRIES—One entry fee covers all tourneys. Twelve men may be certified, and in uniform and eligible to compete in any one game. These teams may or may not be made up of the same men that participated in the other tourneys. The semi-state entry list will suffice for the State Tourney and will be used as made, unless you instruct IHSAA office otherwise on Monday, March 13. If you desire to make any substitutions in your entry list, telephone the IHSAA office giving complete data on Monday, March 13.

ENTERTAINMENT—Sixteen men will be entertained on each team from each school. Each school having a team playing in the tourney will receive the following: \$500.00 for meals and lodging and \$500.00 for bonus, 16 season tickets and cost of transportation to and from Bloomington. Four cents per mile per man for the round trip for sixteen men will constitute the basis for figuring transportation. The mileage shall be considered the most direct and reasonable distance from the high school of the participating school to the Assembly Hall in Bloomington.

ADMISSION—The admission fee will be as indicated and the tickets will be printed with the following information on them.

- 2. Season Ticket:\$4.50

AWARDS—The winning school will be awarded a trophy, and each member of its team an individual award. A trophy will be given to the runnerup team and individual awards to its team members.

Medallions will be awarded to each team member of the other two teams.

The Arthur L. Trester Award for Mental Attitude will be presented to the athlete who, in the opinion of the Board of Control, shall qualify for this award.

CONDUCT OF PERSONS DURING STATE TOURNEY—The IHSAA endeavors to secure proper conduct of all persons attending the tourney, while in hotels and elsewhere, and instructs principals, superintendents, coaches, teachers, parents and communities that the receipt of tickets by their high school principal places the direct and immediate responsibility on him for the conduct of the persons attending the tourney.

Management—The board of Control has designated Phil N. Eskew, Commissioner, as Manager with Herman F. Keller and Ward E. Brown, Assistant Commissioners, as Assistant Managers of this tourney. Their telephone number is 637-1519. Fred R. Gorman, Indianapolis, will assist with the arrangements for the tourney at the Assembly Hall.

Press and Radio reservations will be made directly to the IHSAA office. Requests should be filed not earlier than February 17, and not later than Thursday, March 9. An identification plan will be used for press representatives, who must be properly certified by their managers at the time requests are made. School newspapers, and school radio stations are not included.

Tickets—All tickets will be handled by the IHSAA Office according to the following plan:

- 1. Season tickets only will be sold prior to Saturday, March 18. In recent years all tickets were sold prior to this date. If the capacity of the Assembly Hall is not sold in season tickets, session tickets will be sold on the day of the tourney. The seating capacity is estimated at approximately 16,662.
- 2. Each high school principal having a team entered in an IHSAA Sectional Basketball Tourney in 1972 may order tickets according to their enrollment in grades 9 through 12 as submitted to

the Inspection Office of the State Department of Public Instruction on September 17, 1971. Post graduates shall not be counted.

Enrollments of 242 or less-are limited to eight tickets.

Enrollments of 243 to 1000—are limited to 3.5% of enrollment. Enrollments of over 1000—are limited to 3.5% of enrollment to 1000 and one (1) additional ticket for each additional 300 students enrolled, or fraction thereof.

A fraction of one-half or more may count for a ticket. Principals shall observe the limitations as listed and if there are questions, ask them now as all enrollments will be checked. A chart showing ticket allotments, according to enrollment, is printed on the reverse side of the ticket order form.

- 3. Each junior and preparatory member school principal may order from two to six tickets according to their enrollment in grade 9 only. See ticket order form for exact number.
- 4. Tickets will be sold by mail order only. Telephone, telegraph and personal call orders will not be honored. A ticket order blank is enclosed with this bulletin. It is official and you should use it according to instructions.
- 5. Ticket orders must be specific as to number of tickets and a check for the correct amount payable to the IHSAA must accompany each order. Tickets purchased cannot be returned. Please do not send cash. The limitations below must be observed as given:
 - a. Orders for tickets having official postmarks on the envelopes from and including Thursday, February 17, to and including Friday, February 25, will be accepted if received not later than Saturday, February 26. Ticket orders mailed prior to February 17 will be returned for proper mailing. The IHSAA reserves the right to check the mailing of all ticket orders and to act on the findings.
- 6. Principals are obligated to distribute these tickets properly to persons in their own school districts before distributing any tickets elsewhere. Each principal will be required to keep on file the full names and addresses of all ticket purchasers for the information of the Board of Control, should such be desired for checking purposes. Tickets distributed by principals in an improper way or at a price higher than the price on the ticket will jeopardize the standing of their schools.
- 7. All tickets remaining unsold after the high school principals have ordered, according to the privilege of their enrollment quotas, will be distributed pro rata among the principals of the 64 sectional tourney winning schools if ordered by them. Principals should state on their order blank, ordering their quota of tickets according to enrollment, whether or not they would accept and pay for any tickets that may be distributed to them if they are sectional tourney winners. No tickets, other than those remaining after the enrollment quota orders are honored, are offered in this paragraph. There may be only a few or no tickets so remaining. None is guaranteed. Tickets purchased cannot be returned.

- 8. In order that all may know how ticket orders are filled, the following statements are made:
 - a. Ticket orders from principals must be postmarked any time from February 17 to February 25, inclusive. Postmark will determine mailing date.
 - b. Upon receipt of ticket orders in the IHSAA office, they are checked. All correct orders are arranged alphabetically according to the name of the school, numbered and filled. ORDERS WILL BE FILLED IN ALPHABETICAL ORDER.
 - c. Incorrect orders are returned with instructions.
 - d. The method of filling ticket orders is entirely by lot and the plan automatically assigns the seats. The location of seats of any particular school depends upon date of receipt of order, number of orders received in same mail, number of tickets covered by the orders received in the same mail, alphabetical order of the school name among the orders received, accuracy of ticket order, station reached in the drawings determined by the orders received, etc.

MISCELLANEOUS

- 1. All seats will be reserved and tickets sold to principals as outlined above.
- 2. Blocks of seats, when sold, will be arranged from front to back rather than around the playing floor, about twenty percent of the number in each block being assigned to the front of the block.
- 3. No pass-out tickets will be issued. Holders of tickets may leave the Assembly Hall when they choose in any session, but they cannot re-enter until the next session. The Assembly Hall will be cleared between sessions.
- 4. All tickets will be printed in coupon form, carrying the statement that coupons will not be good if detached. The IHSAA tickets will be printed in a way that will make duplication very difficult, but a warning is given against bogus tickets.
- 5. Ticket holders will be seated prior to the opening game in each session, between halves and between games only. All persons must remain seated in their own seats during the games. All games will be started on scheduled time and will be played in quarters of 8 minutes each.
- 6. Rest Rooms will be found on each floor of the Assembly Hall.
- 7. Tickets will indicate the Entrance, Ramp, Section, Row and Number. As you approach the Assembly Hall look for the Gate Number above the door corresponding to the one on your ticket.
- 8. Two blocks of seats near the middle on the west side of the playing floor and two blocks near the middle on the east side of the playing floor, having 1250 seats to the block, will be reserved until Monday, March 13, for the four schools whose teams are in the tourney. Twelve blocks of seats, at one end of the playing floor with 25 seats to the block, will be reserved for the other twelve schools participating in the semi-state tourneys. The high school principals, whose teams are represented, should contact the IHSAA office by

Monday, March 13, about these tickets or they will be sold to other eligible schools. These blocks will be assigned by lot by the Board of Control.

9. The First Aid Room is located on the first floor of the Assembly Hall. Look for the sign. A tourney physician and a nurse will be available during the tourney.

10. Principals are asked to instruct all ticket holders to refrain from smoking in the Assembly Hall. This precaution is taken for the benefit of the players and the safety of the spectators.

The Principals and Coaches of the four schools filed with the IHSAA these cards for their players before the tourney was held. The Board of Control did not see the cards until Saturday afternoon after the second game of the Final Tourney when they had observed the playing of all of the teams. In the meeting to select a winner of the mental attitude award the data cards were studied carefully and were given careful consideration along with the opinions of the Board of Control members as a result of their observation of the playing of the boys in the afternoon. Several boys received very favorable consideration.

Contrary to the opinions often expressed this medal has not been given as a consolation prize through the years. It is true that few boys on the winning teams have received the award but it is not true that the IHSAA has ever had a policy of giving the medal as a consolation prize. Such a policy would remove the value of the award and would make the winners feel that they had not won anything. The winners of the award have legitimately won the award and have the right to be proud of it. It will be interesting to follow these boys down through the years. Schools should take an interest in these boys, as the IHSAA desires to be proud of them always.



Management—The management of these meets rests solely with the Board of Control. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center Principals. All meet officials will be selected by the Center Principal, except the Referee-Starter, and he will be assigned by the Board of Control. He will be in complete charge of the meet and shall assume the duties of a Referee and Starter as a representative of the IHSAA.

Meet must be held Thursday afternoon or evening. Postponements due to weather must be scheduled on the following day if possible. The Center Principal shall notify all schools participating in his sectional, and the IHSAA office by Tuesday, May 2, as to the time and place of holding the meet. The Center Principal shall arrange a program for his meet from the entry lists sent to him by the assigned schools.

Admission Fee—Admission fee to all meets shall be not less than fifty cents (50ϕ) or more than one dollar (\$1.00)

Open Contest—These meets are open to all members of the Association, except to schools holding preparatory, junior or associate memberships.

Entertainment—The Center Principal shall provide adequate dressing rooms, lockers and shower facilities for all contestants.

Expenses—There will be no entry fee. Traveling expenses must be paid by the competing schools.

Privileges—All actual contestants in uniform, one student manager, one coach, one assistant coach and principal for each team are admitted free to the meet.

Entrance Requirements—The minimum standards of performance which contestants must achieve to be eligible to enter sectional track and field meets shall have been equalled or bettered in actual competition in regularly scheduled interschool meets during the present outdoor track season. These performance standards may be established by competent timing of the first three, four or five places in interschool outdoor meets.

Eligibility—The eligibility of each participant who equalled or bettered the standards of performance in actual competition must be certified to by the principal of the school sending the team. The best performance for each contestant must be indicated for each event or events in the regular IHSAA entry list. (Unless the best performance is indicated in the proper space the contestant will not be considered entered in that event.) Entries positively will close Wednesday May 10 at 4:00 P.M. This means entry lists must be in the hands of the Commissioner and the Center Principal complete in every detail, on this date. See warnings below.

Official Rules—The current National Alliance Edition of the Track and Field Guide as published by the National Federation is official in the IHSAA. A few modifications have been made by the IHSAA and they are given in the present Bulletin. In both relays "off the curve" method of exchange shall be used. Both relays may be run in lanes the first 220 yards with a staggered start if lanes have been marked. When the half mile relay is run with the first 220 yards marked in lanes the first and second runners will exchange in their own lane.

Scoring-Winning first place in any event in the sectional meet counts five points; second place, three points; third place, two points; and fourth place, one point. Points in the relays will be counted in determining the winning team, the points for each place in each relay to be double the points in each place in other events. In case of a tie in a track event, the points shall be divided equally and the prizes awarded by lot. Ties in the high jump and pole vault shall be decided by awarding the position, with its points, to the contestant with the lowest number of trials for the tied height. If the tie still is not broken, the fewest total misses in the entire competition is the determining factor. Existing ties at this state shall be decided by the method outlined in Rule 6, Section 2, I (a, b, c, d, and e), pages 22 and 23 of the 1972 Track Rules Book. No misses shall be charged to a competitor for a passed height. In case of a tie in the shot put or long jump, position and points are awarded according to Rule 6, Section 2, II (a and b) "determined by distance," page 23 of the 1972 Track Rules Book.

In case two or more contestants tie for fourth place the above method shall be applied to this place for determining the contestant who advances to the Regional and wins the ribbon. This means that ties for the last qualifying position for the Regional must be broken by applying Rule 6-2-I to insure that no meet will send more qualifiers to the Regional than they are permitted. Be sure the contestants are notified of any ties immediately after the event so they will be available for any runoff for the qualifying position. Points are not affected.

Limitations—No contestant may be certified in more than 3 events (including relay) and no contestant may be certified for both relays.

A contestant may be certified in the 880 yard run, mile run and/or two mile run but may participate in only one.

It is recommended, especially in the 440 yard dash, that this race be run in heats, no more than 12 contestants in a heat. Referring to the best performance, the 12 contestants having the fastest times shall be placed in the first heat, the next 12 fastest in the second heat, etc. Four places shall be timed in each heat. It is suggested that there be three watches on each of the four winners.

Entrants-Three contestants in the 440, 880, mile and two-mile races; four in all other events, and two half-mile and two mile relay teams will qualify from each sectional for regional participation. (See qualifications for regional.)

Privileges-All actual contestants in uniform, one student manager, one coach, one assistant coach and principal for each team are to be admitted free to the meet.

Admission Fee-The admission fee to the meet shall be one dollar (\$1.00).

Management—The management, protests and privileges will be governed according to the regulations pertaining to the Sectional Meets. The Center Principal shall arrange a program for his meet from the list of entries sent to him by the Commissioner.

The Center Principal shall notify all schools participating in his regional, and the IHSAA office by Monday, May 22, as to the place of holding the meet.

Entertainment—The Regional Center Principal shall provide adequate dressing rooms, lockers and shower facilities for all contestants.

Expenses-There will be no entry fee. Traveling expenses must be paid by the competing schools.

Official Rules—The official rules as outlined in the 1972 National Alliance Edition of the Track and Field Rules & Records shall govern. Modifications made by the IHSAA are given in the present Bulletin.

A contestant must be at the starting mark in the uniform of his team when the starter calls the contestants to the mark the first time

The start shall be staggered and the first 220 yards run in lanes for both relays, using "off the curve" method of exchange. In the half-mile relay the first and second runners will exchange in their own lane. The first runners in the mile relay shall run an equal distance in lanes to a designated place before being allowed to cut for the pole position. This spot must be marked by a flag or line across the track on the back stretch approximately 5 yards beyond the turn.

Order of Events and Limitations. (See Sectional, for this item.)

Scoring—Winning first place in any event in the regional meet counts six points; second place, four points; third place, three points; fourth place, two points; and fifth place one point. Points in the relays will be counted in determining the winning team, the points for each place in each relay to be 10-8-6-4-2. In case of a tie in a track event, the points shall be divided and the prizes awarded by lot. Ties in the high jump and pole vault shall be decided by awarding the position with its points to the contestant with the lowest number of trials for the tied height. If the tie still is not broken, the fewest total misses in the entire competition is the determining factor. Existing ties at this stage shall be decided by the method outlined in Rule 6, Section 2, I (a, b, c, d, and e), pages 22 and 23, of the 1972 Track Rules Book. No misses shall be charged to a competitor for a passed height. In case of a tie in the shot put or long jump, position and points are awarded according to Rule 6, Section 2, II (a and b), "determined by distance," page 23 of the 1972 Track Rules Book.

In case two or more contestants tie for fourth place the above method shall be applied to this place for determining the contestant who advances to the State and wins the ribbon. This means that ties for the last qualifying position for the State must be broken by applying Rule 6-2-I to insure that no meet will send more qualifiers to the State than they are permitted. Be sure the contestants are notified of any ties immediately after the event so they will be available for any run-off for the qualifying position. Points are not affected.

Prizes—Suitable ribbons shall be provided by the IHSAA to the winners of first, second, third, fourth and fifth places in each event. No other prizes shall be given.

- 2. The IHSAA will furnish a noon meal at North Central High School on Saturday, the day of the meet, for the qualifying contestants in uniform, one student manager, one coach, one assistant coach and principal from each school represented in the meet the schools in Marion county sharing. Serving hours will be from 10:30 to 12:30.

- 3. Only qualifying contestants in uniform, one student manager, one coach, one assistant coach and the principal from each school will be entertained. Mileage in all cases shall be ascertained from the Indiana State Road Map.





NORTH CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOL (Indianapolis) 1972 State Track & Field Champions





The Indians turned in two 18 hole rounds of 312-293 for a 605 total. This was a 10 stroke bulge over the runnerup. The team was led by James Cue with 76-72-148. Jeff Roberts 74-75-149, Dick Peck 82-74-156 and Scott Steger 80-72-152 completed the team.

South Bend Adams High School placed second with 615. In third place was Carmel, the defending state champion with 617.

James Cue of Anderson High School took low medalist honors with 76-72 for a total of 148. Carmel's John O'Neal and Anderson's Jeff Roberts tied for medalist honors with 149. However, in a sudden death one hole play-off, O'Neal won second place honors.

Craig Light of Warsaw High School, only Indiana high school player to score a hole-in-one in the state finals (he did it as a sophomore two years ago) was presented the second Fred A. Keesling Award for mental attitude, scholarship and school citizenship, as well as athletic ability in golf. It was the third successive year he had helped bring Warsaw High School to the state golf finals.

Twelve complete teams and three low medalists participated in the state meet. A total of 310 teams entered the sixteen sectionals.



Baseball

The Bloomington High School Panthers won the sixth annual Indiana High School Athletic Association baseball tournament series by defeating South Adams (Berne) High School by a score of 3-0 in the title game. Four hundred twenty high schools participated in the 64 sectional tournaments. This represented more than 98 percent of the entire membership.

The state tournament was returned to Bush Stadium after an absence of one year. Boonville, Hammond Morton and South Adams High Schools made their first appearances in the final four.

In the first game South Adams defeated Boonville 4-0. Kevin Lehman accounted for three Starfire runs with two hits and Davey Neuenschwander pitched a two hitter.

Bloomington High sent home three runs against Hammond Morton in the bottom of the first inning to promptly take a 3-0 lead in the second game. Morton tied the game in the top of the second inning. However, in the sixth inning, Bloomington scored 2 more runs for a 5-3 lead. Morton scored a lone run in the top of the seventh inning to make the final score 5-4 in favor of the Bloomington Panthers.

In the final game for the state championship, the Bloomington Panthers defeated the South Adams Starfires 3-0. The Panthers scored lone runs in the first, second and fifth innings. Rick Carmichael pitched one of the finest games of his career in allowing the hard-hitting Starfires only two hits. He faced only 23 batters at the plate. The championship ended the Bloomington High season with a 28-3 mark and South Adams finished with 22-5.

The Board of Control unanimously selected Alan Beitler of South Adams as the recipient of the sixth annual L. V. Phillips Award. The recipient of this award must excel in scholarship, mental attitude and school citizenship as well as ability in baseball.

STATE BASEBALL TOURNAMENT SERIES

THE SIXTH ANNUAL

The Board of Control has completed the details for the State Championship Baseball Tournament and announces the plan in full; with the understanding that the Board of Control reserves the right to readjust the plan and arrangements for any and all tournaments if conditions arise making changes advisable or cancellations necessary.

The following bases were used in selecting sectional, regional and semi-state centers: (1) Location—geographical with reference to

schools desiring to participate; (2) Transportation accommodations; (3) General conditions—attitude of local authorities, fields, entertaining facilities, etc.; (4) Invitation.

GENERAL INFORMATION

- 1. BALL—The Board of Control has selected the Rawlings #R.O. ball as the official ball for the 1972 tournament series. Practice balls must be furnished by competing schools.
- 2. LENGTH OF GAME—All Tournament games are scheduled for seven innings, unless shortened by weather conditions or the game ends in a tie, in which case the game will continue until one team is the winner.

A game shall also end when, if after five innings, a team is 10 or more runs behind and has completed its turn at bat. (Exception—the final state championship game).

- 3. OFFICIAL RULES—The Baseball Rules 1972 National Alliance Edition, will be the Official Rules in all games and tournaments, except as modified by IHSAA.
- 4. SCHOOLS ELIGIBLE—All schools having full membership in the IHSAA are eligible to enter teams in the tournament series. Each eligible school may enter a team in the tournament series even though its second semester may end before or during the tournaments.

However, only those students who are eligible at the close of school may be used on the tournament team. Seniors who may have graduated at the close of the second semester may participate in the tournament provided they meet all other eligibility requirements.

- 5. SINGLE ELIMINATION—All phases of the IHSAA Tournament are based on the single elimination plan.
- 6. MEN IN UNIFORM—In each of the tournaments, no school shall have more than eighteen players, the team coach (or coaches) and two managers (one of whom must be the bat boy). The eighteen players shall be the ones certified for the tournament. Trainers not in uniform may be permitted on the bench.

The only representatives of a school allowed on the bench are the players, coaches, managers, and a trainer.

- 7. COACHER'S BOXES—The Coacher's Boxes may be occupied by two coaches, one coach and one member of the team or two members of the team and all must be in uniform.
- 8. PITCHING REGULATION—A pitcher may not pitch in more than ten (10) innings in any three consecutive calendar days. This period begins when he officially enters the games as a pitcher.
- 9. DECISIONS OF UMPIRES FINAL—The decisions of the umpires are final and protests arising from the decisions of the umpires or any inadvertent misinterpretation of the rules will not be considered by the IHSAA.

- 10. HEAD PROTECTOR REQUIRED—The catcher, each batter and runner in all IHSAA games and tournaments is required to wear a head protector. "LINER-TYPE" HEAD PROTECTORS WILL NOT BE PERMITTED.
- 11. HOME TEAM—The first named team in each game throughout the entire tournament is always designated as the "Home Team". It shall have a choice of dugout except when participating against the host team.
- 12. PRE-GAME PRACTICE—Each team will be allowed 15 minutes practice before each game to be used as the coach sees fit. Prior to the championship game the winner of the first game has the option of taking 20 minutes of batting practice to be followed by 20 minutes of batting practice by the winner of the second game. The two teams will then take 10 minutes of infield practice in the same order allowing a 10 minute period prior to game time for the preparation of the diamond.

13. CONDUCT OF COACHES AND PLAYERS:

- A. No coach, player or other person officially connected with the team shall be permitted to smoke on the bench or playing field either during practice or while a game is in progress.
- B. No coach or other school official shall, during the progress of a game, be allowed on the field of play except by permission of the game officials.
- C. Except for those coaches or eligible players who may be serving as coaches at first or third base and players legally in the "next batter" boxes, all other coaches, managers, substitutes and players awaiting their turn at bat shall remain on the players' bench. Umpires will be instructed to enforce this rule to the limit.
- D. The captain and the head coach shall be the official spokesmen and the sole representatives of their team in all communications with the officials.
- E. Abusive remarks to game officials by coaches or players shall be regarded as unsportsmanlike conduct. The offender or offenders shall be disqualified and removed from the bench and playing field.

14. INTERRUPTED GAMES—Interrupted tourney games shall start at the point of interruption until it is an official game in accordance with Rule 4, Section 2, Article 4 (a) & (b) of the Official Rules.

Example: At the end of the second inning, game is interrupted by rain. When play is resumed either on that day or a following day the same line-ups shall be used and the game will proceed from the point of interruption. Runs, count on batter, baserunners, etc. shall be the same when the game is resumed.

If 5 innings or more have been played at the time of interruption, it is a regulation game.

15. COACHES CONFERENCES—Each team may be granted not more than three charged conferences during a game, without penalty, to permit a coach or his representative to confer with a defensive player or players. PENALTY—For any charged conference in excess of three, the pitcher must be removed as pitcher for the duration of the game.

Each team when on offense may be granted not more than one charged conference per inning to permit the coach or any of that team's personnel to confer with base runners and/or the batter. The umpire shall deny any subsequent offensive team requests for charged conferences.

Time granted for an obviously incapacitated player shall not constitute a charged time out.

- 16. FIELD MARKINGS—The playing field shall be marked in accordance with Rule 1, Section 2, Article 1. The foul lines should be extended a minimum of 250 feet from home base.
- 17. UMPIRES—Three umpires will be assigned by the IHSAA to all sectional tournaments.
- 18. PLAYING SCHEDULES—All pairings for all tournaments will be made by a chance drawing by the Board of Control on May 19, 1972. Games will be played according to the way they are drawn on the schedule.

Weather permitting, a minimum of one and one-half hours is strongly recommended between the end of the second semi-final game and the beginning of the championship game.

19. The Re-entry Rule 3-1-3 will NOT be used in any of the State Sponsored Baseball Tournaments, A Withdrawn Player shall not reenter the game.

SECTIONAL TOURNAMENTS

May 29 or 30 to June 5, 1972

Many schools have been assigned by counties but there are a number of exceptions. Some changes were made to equalize the number of participating teams resulting in better balanced schedules or the use of less school time. The plan is to have no fewer than 5 teams and no more than 8 teams in each tournament, and the tentative assignment of all schools is given in the list which follows. The winners will constitute the teams in the Regional Tournaments according to assignment. ENTRY LISTS ARE NECESSARY. AN ENTRY BLANK IS ENCLOSED.


